THE NEW HUNGARIAN TO ACAD FINLAND Details Of British Arms Supplies

ARMY OF 100,000 VOLUNTEERS IS BEING PREPARED IN HUNGARY TO GO TO THE AID OF THE FINNS. SOME HUNDREDS FULLY EQUIPPED, ARE ALREADY ON THEIR WAY TO FINLAND.

Details of British armaments being sent to Finland show that it comprises a great variety of equipment including over 140 planes, 23 howitzers, 30 field guns and 24 anti-aircraft guns.

Equipment sent to Britain includes 10,000 anti-tank mines, 50,000 hand grenades, 25 howitzers, 20 anti-aircraft guns and ammunition, 20 field guns, four tanks, 12 anti-aircraft guns and ammunition, 10 mortar and ammunition, 100 anti-tank mines, 100 machine guns and ammunition and a large quantity of small arms. Other British supplies include respirators, tents and telephones.

A statement by British ministers in Finland was made by the Home Secretary, Sir John Anderson, in the House of Commons on Wednesday. He said exit permits would be granted and no difficulties would be experienced in the way of British subjects provided they had been approved by the Finnish Legation.

The Prime Minister also said that a Swedish mission would be allowed to visit Finland and that the Government would be prepared to consider the possibility of providing assistance in the event of the evacuation of British subjects from the country.

North and Lake Ladoga heavy bombers are being made over to the Finns. On the Central front the Russians continue their efforts to relieve the Finnish forces which are surrounded. The rate of the 16th Division's advance is being maintained. Lake Ladoga is attempting to turn the eastern flank of the Finnish forces. Both Finnish and Russian Air Headquarters claim to have destroyed the Finns claim to have captured three troop concentrations and one Russian division.

MR. CHURCHILL ON U-BOAT LOSSES Greater Than Had Been Foreseen

In the House of Commons Mr. Winston Churchill stated that success against U-boats had been greater than foreseen.

The successes of recent weeks had shown that the rate of U-boat losses which he gave the House in December (two to four weekly) had not been exaggerated.

The First Lord added: "The results must vary from week to week as the enemy intensifies his campaign against the fleets of the world or withdraws U-boats for refitting, recuperation or repair."

More neutral losses at sea are reported. They were the result of the sinking of the Norwegian and Dutch ships. The Norwegian ship was sunk by a German submarine on Thursday.

Commenting on the Norwegian protests about the sinking of Norwegian vessels, Mr. Blum, the Socialist party, the Populists, this morning deeply regrets the suggestion in Norway that England made an advance to meet the needs of a smaller nation.

In addition to the two reported sinkings, the Netherlands have lost two more vessels. One was a tanker, the other a motor vessel. The other was the other a 9,000 ton tanker which sank off the coast of the Netherlands.

Thirteen of the crew are missing. Norway has lost two vessels. The Danish Government has forbidden Danish ships to sail in the North Sea south of latitude 41 degrees North. This latitude passes roughly through the Heligoland Channel.

Shortly after mid-day the Air Ministry issued an announcement saying that a Heinkel bomber had been brought down off the East coast. A few minutes later came another announcement that a second German plane had been attacked and brought down in a field near the Scottish border.

BOMBS WENT WILD Earlier this morning a trawler was unsuccessfully attacked off the Norfolk coast. The Nazi planes dropped bombs but missed the ship by a wide margin and as soon as the trawler opened fire with its machine gun the raiders made off at a high speed.

The two planes brought down today being the total enemy aircraft believed to have been shot down since the war began to 50.—(Reuter).

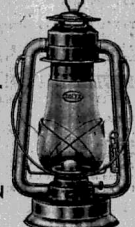

The Pig Industry

The Editor: "E.A. Standard"
Sir—The admirable report of the meeting of the Kenya Co-operative Creamery Society at Nakuru last Friday the 16th, and the rather interesting account of the meeting of the Kenya Farmers' Association in the afternoon of the same day, together fall to furnish some of the vital figures necessary (particularly to members not present) to enable a sound appreciation to be made of the general situation the action to be taken by the Joint Committee now dealing with the establishment of a cooperative bacon industry for this Colony.

Some of these figures have appeared in the press, and the report of the broadcast made by Mr. Mansour on the 19th. One most important one, regarding the capacity of the Uplands factory, was omitted, during the K.F.C.C. meeting. First, however, the statement of the Chairman, K.F.C.C. in the morning meeting, that the total unit was to be completed within 18 months at a cost of £50,000—his opinion—should be noted. Section was granted the K.F.C.C. to interest itself in the extent of £50,000—K.F.C.C. to £20,000 and a similar amount. 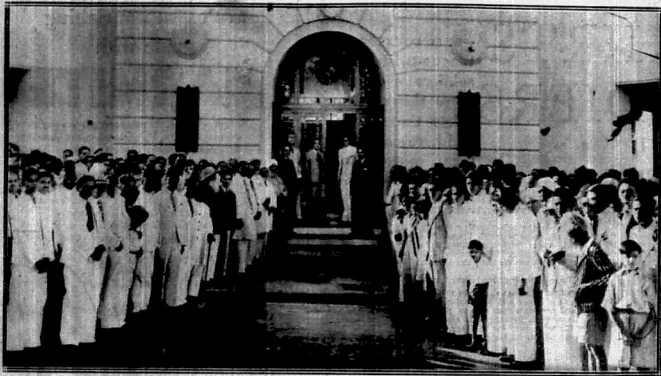

The Balkan Entente Conference

THIS article on the vitally important conference of the Balkan Entente, which opened in Belgrade on February 2nd, is by a leading Yugoslav publicist who at present holds an important diplomatic post.

Over 300 British Seamen Rescued From German Ship

VIOLATION OF NORWAY'S TERRITORIAL WATERS: STRONG PROTESTS

ONE OF THE MOST DARING EXPLOITS OF THE WAR AND ONE MORE THAN EVER IN ACCORDANCE WITH "SEA WAR" THE OLD STYLE HAS RESULTED IN OVER 300 BRITISH SEAMEN, PRISONERS ON A SUPPLY SHIP OF THE GRAF SPEE, BEING RESCUED BY BRITISH WARSHIPS IN NORWEGIAN TERRITORIAL WATERS.

The German ship, the Altmarrk, armed with pom-pom guns and machine-guns, took refuge in a Norwegian fjord. Frantically negotiations between British and Norwegian authorities followed, after which the Admiralty ordered the cruiser, Cosack, to enter the fjord and rescue the British prisoners.

Norway has strongly protested against the violation of her territorial waters, but it is pointed out in London that the German ship obtained permission under false pretences to use the territorial waters, and if she had been allowed to pass through them it would have been an un-neutral act. The action of His Majesty's ships was taken with the full approval of Government.

Germany, of course, has strongly protested to Norway stating that she takes the most serious view possible of the incident, which is one that 'may have the gravest consequences'.
