## Somalia trade ban lifted

The Kenya Government last night announced an end to the trade ban on Somalia. 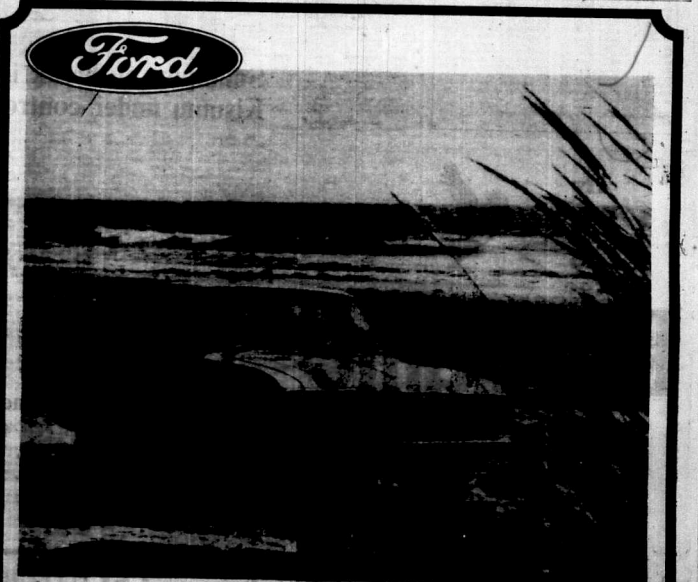

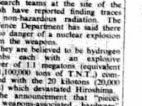

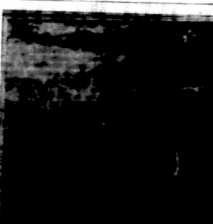

# Inside Kenya's unique Red Cross village

A tiny, neatly laid out village half a mile north-east of Limuru town can claim to be unique.

Kirithimo Village at the foot of a green, flowery hillside, has six white-painted round huts as a monument to the work of the Red Cross. It was due to the Divisional Director of the Red Cross at Kirithimo, Mrs. A. R. Vickars, that the Kirithimo Red Cross Village came into being.

Her interest in Red Cross work was highlighted last year with the publication of her book, *Simple Mother and Baby Care*.

The National Director of the Red Cross Society, Kenya, Mrs. Maza, also keeps a keen eye on the development of the centre, which caters for people from an area of 100 square miles.

Recently, the centre received two important Red Cross visitors: Tom Genova, Ruth Williams, Deputy Under-Secretary-General of

the League of Red Cross Societies, Geneva, and Mr. Nicholas H. Phillips, executive officer of the League, were pleased with the programme which reflected exactly the sort of task the Red Cross is undertaking.

There are 109 countries with Red Cross bases. Recurrent expenditures of the Red Cross is about £12,000-£13,000 but with the increasing need for more projects, this figure may be doubled, and it is the aim of the Red Cross to make possible reciprocal services between countries.

Kirithimo, the only village of its kind in the country, is a shining example of what self-help efforts can do. Money and material for its construction came not only from the people. The Red Cross contributed £200, and £100 was given by Mr. Charles Kabia, the last mayor of Nairobi.

Working with both the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Agriculture, the picturesque village is almost self-supporting. The Ministry of Agriculture made land available to the Red Cross for growing vegetables and crops, and the shamba can now feed the entire village.

The village's African girl field officer, Miss Zippora Mbugwa Douglas, received her training at the Church Army School in Nairobi. She is energetic, charming and hard working—essential qualities in her kind of work, and has recently been provided with a scooter to enable her to cover the area.

"The village has as its motto, 'Teach a mother, save a child', which means exactly what it does," Miss Douglas is charged with the duty of educating both girls and women, young and old.

She teaches life and to police the daily better ways of living and to council ambulance drivers, and hundreds of primary

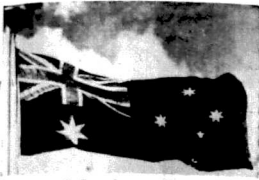

## The National Flag

The Australian National Flag, pictured above in its present form, is 65 years old. The flag has the Union Jack in the top left corner, the stars of the Southern Cross constellation on the right side and a white seven-pointed star under the Union Jack. The field is blue and the stars are white. Since after the city of Canberra, Australia united in 1901, an international competition was held to find a suitable design for a flag. More than 30,000 designs were submitted and the people shared first prize. The design selected was the same as the present flag except that the star under the Union Jack had only six points. For the six stars. In 1908 a seventh point was added to represent the Australian territories. But until 1953 did the Federal Government legislate to declare the first English-officially Australia's flag.

Today Australia celebrates its national day, the day on which the first settlement was made in 1788. Although there is much reason for hope in the future, Australia's beginning was not a happy one.

When Phillip, the first Governor, landed at Sydney Cove, his task was to establish a penal settlement, rather than to found a nation.

The tiny population nearly starved for a while. Sydney, hemmed in by mountains for long impossible, produced little food from its apparently poor land.

It was not for 34 years that a way over the mountains was discovered, and the riches of Australia became known to the world. Rich farms and grazing lands were opened, settlers began to stream into the country, and its future as a nation, rather than as a colony, became established.

New settlements, one day to become big cities, were established round the rim of the continent. Hobart, Brisbane, Melbourne, Adelaide and Perth were founded, to become in time the capitals of the sovereign States of Tasmania, Queensland, Victoria, South Australia and Western Australia, living off from the parent colony of New South Wales.

It was not until 1900 that these States joined together as the Commonwealth of Australia, with its capital at Canberra, a city which began as a sheep run on a high plateau and is now a bustling and very beautiful city of more than 100,000 people.

After inland Australia was found accessible the country soon became prosperous, founding its economy on sheep, cattle and grain crops. Fortunes were made in wool, which is still the staple item in the economy, though much less so than it was.

But from 1850 on the pattern changed. Gold was discovered, and fortune hunters flooded into the country from every corner of the world. The

population soon doubled, and the whole pattern of society was changed. The merchant and the manufacturer began to take over leadership from the farmer and the grazier, and the major cities grew apace.

All this led to a great industrial period, which, when it broke in the 1930s, finished thousands of rich men and set the nation back for a decade or more. As the new century dawned, however, growth of a more sober kind was resuming, and, with the exception of the 1930s, has continued ever since.

Up until the Second World War the Australian manufacturing industry grew slowly. Skills were acquired, but the size of the home market was not sufficient to encourage

much mass production industry.

The picture is now totally changed. Australia makes her own cars, her own ships, some of her own aeroplanes, and nearly all of the consumer durables. She is now in the expert field for many of these commodities, so diversifying her economy.

But the biggest economic development has come in the last few years, with the discovery of oil, natural gas and other mineral resources. Oil and gas have only been partly explored, but already it is clear that the nation will be self-supporting in these products soon.

The mineral finds have been in the treasure class. Vast iron ore resources in excess of 100,000,000 tons have been discovered, and extraction has started.

Bauxite is present in vast quantities, and copper, nickel and phosphates are fast-growing industries. These discoveries are fast transforming the economy. For instance they are diverting overseas trade from Britain, the U.S.A., supplier and customer, to other markets.

The future of this country is exciting. Although small in population — it has not yet reached the 12 million mark — and short of development capital, it is poised on the verge of tremendous expansion. It has the natural riches, the know-how, the energy, the hope and the stability to make a positive contribution to the peaceful development of her own resources and those of other developing countries.

To its people Australia is a good and healthy place to live in but, more important, Australians are proud of the fact that their country is contributing to the peace, stability and prosperity of their friends and allies. # A complex pattern made productive

Australia was established as a British colony in 1788. In less than 12,000 long sea miles from Britain and the need for self-sufficiency in food production was clear. The soils and climate, however, were very different from those the colonists were used to, and the varieties of crops which they brought out were often unsuited to the new environment.

An exploration of the new continent took place across more fertile than the coastal strip were discovered, but, compared to Britain and Europe, Australia's soils were generally less fertile, its rains less reliable and its natural grasses and herbage not so well suited to continuous grazing by sheep and cattle.

The colonists also brought their own problems in the form of disease and insects. From the cattle tick and the prickly pear to the sheep blow fly, Australia soon introduced by the colonists. They all flourished. Many of the subsequent scientific triumphs have been those which involved the control of these imported pests.

One hundred years after the first colonists landed the population had reached 2,000,000, due to the fertility of the soils. Railways had been laid down, a wool industry established, the wheat and dairying industries started to develop in the last part of the 19th century. Markets for foodstuffs were developing in Europe, and the creation of refrigeration enabled perishable Australian products to enter the world market. Dairying and the wool export industries.

The economic depression of the world in the twenties through a decline in the demand for wool and the depression of the Australian currency was developed in an attempt to improve the country's lowering prices. Wages and interest rates were reduced. Assistance was given to wheat, apple and orange exports. Before the end of the depression forty every food product was receiving assistance from the Government.

The Depression forced both the Government and farmers to take more notice of, and make better use of, technical and scientific knowledge. Superphosphate fertiliser gained wider acceptance. Chemicals were introduced into agriculture to increase nitrogen content of the soil and so improve the quality of the grasses on which sheep and cattle grazed.

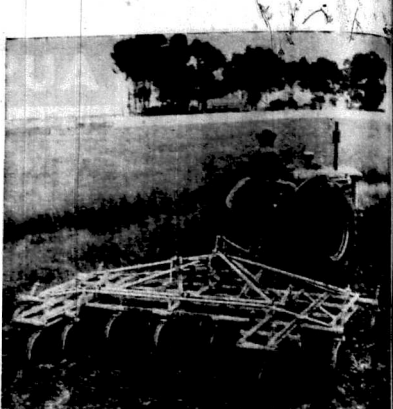
Recovery from the Depression was accelerated by the Second World War. Food was necessary in local areas, and was cut down by the neglect of farm production. In 1942-43, the percentage of population which died during the drought of 1944-45, the percentage of population which died after the war, and the Government's control over industrial production had only risen per cent above the pre-war level.

But the population had increased by 50 per cent as a result of the inflow of refugees and a high rate of migration from war-torn Europe.

In 1952-53 the representative of the Government's agricultural policies was announced. It was to meet the needs of the population in respect of scientific research, to extend the production of food and to assist the Government, which had assumed the activities of the private sector, which had been responsible for the agricultural sector.

The economic emergency provided farmers with the financial security and incentive to bring about the great technological changes that have taken place in Australian agriculture over the last 20 years.

has doubled to over 55,000 acres, the number of tractors on rural holdings has tripled, and is now 2,000, and the area treated from aeroplanes has gone from zero to about 100,000 acres. And during this time the rural workforce was down decreasing it to now about 15 per cent of the total workforce.

In 1950 it looked as if Australia would have difficulty feeding itself. Today more than 50 per cent of farm production can be exported. These exports include wheat, flour, rice, meat, fruits and canned fruits and vegetables, wool, dried fruit, prepared stock foods, wine and spirits, tobacco, sheep, beef, poultry, butter, cheese, eggs, powdered and condensed milk and honey.

The increases in food production of many nations. The economic price stabilization schemes, price subsidies, and other measures were partly responsible.

The products and extension services provided by private firms, tractor, fencing, seeds, and so on, were also particularly important. The network of extension and advisory services provided by the State Department of Agriculture, the Commonwealth Bureau of Agricultural Economics, and the many other social institutions that help spread the knowledge and use of known substances.

But a large part of the explanation for Australia's development as a major food exporter is to be found in the scientific application of new knowledge. The increase in production that has resulted from controlling pests and diseases increasing

soil fertility, and improving the pasture on which sheep and cattle grazed have been very great. They have been the result of relatively little capital expenditure, but of a lot of scientific research help. There have been many spectacular scientific triumphs: the prickly pear, cattle tick, control of thousands of various insects in the north-east, was destroyed by the introduction of an insect parasite.

The rabbit population, which had grown to plague proportions, was drastically reduced and brought under control by the introduction of the myxomatosis virus, which is specific in attacking large areas of infertile land in many parts of Australia have been made fertile by correcting their deficiencies of such trace elements as copper, cobalt, and phosphorus.

Each of these projects has resulted in large economic benefits, both direct and indirect for people. But other work, although less spectacular, has yielded even greater economic benefits. These have come from implementing the

results of research into the improvement of soil fertility through the introduction of superphosphate, lime, and other fertilisers, the better selection of new pasture plants to establish with drought resistance, and provide better food for grazing animals. In general, research into the relationships between soil, plants, animals and insects — a study, in effect, of the physical environment in which food production is carried out.

Perhaps the most interesting way to illustrate this broad approach is not to describe past successes, but rather to indicate the way in which a current national problem is being solved by research.

The problem is the development of Australia's empty north, where the main form of land use is pastoral production. But the soils there have low fertility, water is scarce, and the land is too dry to support the grazing animals, the buffalo fly and the cattle tick are serious pests.

The unimproved environment is treated to economically efficient food production. But research is changing the environment, and hence the economy of food production in the north. The land is being surveyed, the soils analysed, new pasture plants tested, new methods of cattle tick control developed, and the dung beetle is being brought through the final tests before being put to work to control the buffalo fly. By destroying its breeding sites.

No two countries have so many physical, social and economic similarities and environments, so this research will differ little from country to country.

In Australia the physical environment has provided limiting factors and so research in the natural sciences has been of tremendous benefit in Australia's development as a food producer.

The value of Australia's principal grain crops — wheat, barley and oats — each year approximates the returns from wool production, and is about three-quarters of the value of the wool clip. With domestic requirements normally returning about per cent each year, Australia in recent years has had available between 120,000,000 and 180,000,000 bushels for export.

10 per cent of students foreign

Overseas students, on having more paying their own way, comprise about 10 per cent of the full-time student body at Australian universities.

Since 1959 more than 10,000 students and teachers have been admitted on training in Australia under the Colombo Plan. A further 1,000 students are expected to arrive in 1962.

The main fields of study have been engineering, education, public administration, nursing, medicine and health, agriculture and social studies.

Under 425 awards enabling students to receive training by correspondence were issued in 1961.

In 1962 there were about 10,000 students from Asia, Africa and the Pacific studying privately in Australian schools, colleges and technical colleges.

Foreign students are not directly supported by the Australian Government but all technical educational institutions, except private schools and commercial colleges, are heavily subsidised by State and Federal Government.

**Cost of fares**

Subsidy fares do not meet more than one-fifth of the operating cost of services.

The cost of training students from South and South-East Asia under the Colombo Plan amounts to about £10,500,000 at the end of last June.

Technical Assistance Programme, and £10,000 under the Australian International Awards Scheme.

Several types of training are provided under Australian aid schemes. About half of the 700 or so awards granted each year are for courses of instruction in Australian universities, technical colleges or teaching hospitals.

In some cases, trainees are attached to Government Departments or industrial enterprises. Others take courses specially designed by the Government in collaboration with its own commercial, private enterprise, or voluntary organisations.

A programme of Third Country training, aimed mainly at the expansion of technical training facilities in South and South-East Asia, is being developed.

# Primary products still play biggest part

The history of the Australian economy since the Second World War has been one of strong and sustained growth in all sectors. Population has increased by 50 per cent and national output has doubled. With one exception only, each year has brought gains in Gross National Product at constant prices.

In the general economic expansion which has occurred since the war, industrial development has been a major feature and the scope and sophistication of manufacturing industries has increased significantly. However, Australia still depends heavily on primary products for the bulk of its export earnings. This dependence has been accentuated by the post-war period because of the high cost of imported machinery and modern farm and processing machinery. From synthetic fibre to electrical equipment, the range of unproductive goods to be imported is increasing. The various reasons for local climatic, topographical, soil, water, or lack of a power supply with a steady output will continue to play a dominant role in economic production.

It is today vital to secure the material industry, because profitable growth is being restricted for farming and grazing. Areas that sprouted only stunted crops have been developed, including specially developed regions for the export of wool. For a nation of less than 10 million people, Australia's production figures are impressive. She exports 2,000,000 sheep with an annual killing of 50 million for meat production, and the world's highest output of wool.

Australia cannot match the output of India, the New Zealand or several other nations, but she leads in beef, cattle, tanning, iron-ore, copper, concrete, agricultural machinery, and other goods to name but a few.

Consistent annual pastoral production runs to 2,000,000,000 lbs (450,000,000 tons) of the total coming from the three federated States of New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland. These figures have risen by 50 per cent in the past six years, a remarkable increase which is a consequence that almost all the available land was developed during the war and that the huge inland continent, despite its precarious climate, offers security from lack of water.

**Fertile coast**  
The lack is highlighted by one world statistic. There are 100 per cent of Australia's area has no annual crop, but 100 per cent of the world's annual rainfall.

Fertile production is largely concentrated along the fertile coastal zone of the south-western coast and the south-eastern coast of the Great Dividing Range.

The Murray-Darling river system, both Australia's largest river system, has long been famous for the means of man. Unfortunately, primary dams and water works have reduced the volume of water available, and the difficulty to the establishment of a great and valuable river industry, as well as adding to the depletion of wool, beef, and dairy produce.

The River Murray catchment basin of 400,000 square miles, drains an area of almost 100,000 square miles of the continent.

CSIRO plays an important part in the woolled sector of Australia's primary production. Although wool export values rose to 2,000,000,000 lbs, with a 100,000,000 lbs, the wool production has declined 10 per cent in the past six years.

It is in the field of grain production that both Commonwealth and State Governments have found some of their greatest challenges. Australia's wheat production has declined 10 per cent in the past six years, with a 100,000,000 lbs, but not so with Europe - 10,000,000 lbs, and South America 20,000,000 lbs.

There are various reasons. One certain reason is that grain export values in one factor and there is no doubt to be done in this direction. But two other factors - better fertilisers and better grasses - are required.

Russia's nursery science —without Grimm's nightmares

A HARVEST OF RUSSIAN CHILDREN'S LITERATURE, edited by Miriam Moss (University of California Press, £5).

For stark tragedy and grim reality in Russian literature, as exemplified by Dostoyevsky, Tolstoy, Turgenyev and Chekhov, has comparison.

Yet as a literature that echoes the understanding struggle of a people who, in days past, lived from their own labours on the land, it has a wealth of tradition, fable and folklore.

This anthology, covering a period from 1825 up to the present, is a treasure house of stories from some of Russia's best-known classical authors.

Contents range from nursery rhymes, animal tales and parables to science fiction, short modern stories and poems. The anthology has three purposes: to make

available to English-speaking children a representative selection of literature read by their Russian counterparts; second, to help teachers and librarians and others who work with children and books; and, thirdly, to give an insight into an important aspect of Russian culture.

As well as the authors already mentioned, there are also selections from Maxim Gorky, Pushkin, Sholokhov and Mikhalukov. These stories, amply illustrated both by woodcuts and drawings, would be most enjoyable to many of the offerings of the Brothers Grimm and other similar writers. Most copies of these stories may be had as a gift.

# Government attacks K.P.U. criticism of radio

The President's Office yesterday issued a statement criticising a report of an M.P.'s Press release which was reported in the East African Standard last Saturday, under the heading "K.P.U. attacks American influence in Kenya radio".

The statement said that the report "did not contain facts to the point of dispute between the East African Standard and the Voice of Kenya, but alleged the existence of American influence in the running of the affairs of the Kenya Government".

The relevant paragraph of the report, it said, was:

"It is true that the United States Government has given financial aid to Kenya — with strings attached. As a result in every Ministry or department, government and boards and V.A.K., most of

the senior posts are held by people recruited from the United States. Experts and advisers too are from the same country."

The President's Office comment said: "It is necessary to correct the erroneous impression given by the unfounded allegation in the first place, experts and advisers in the service of the Kenya Government do not hold established posts."

"All these experts work to African top officers who have been selected on the basis of merit and the Government is completely satisfied that they are discharging their duties to the best interests of the nation. Any expatriate experts working in any Government department advise local officers and Ministers and are in no position to direct Government policy in the statement in question."

"It is essential to note just that, in accordance with its policy of non-alignment, the Kenya Government has recruited experts from many other nations, than just the United States of America."

In the service of the Kenya Government today there are many — the United Kingdom, Yugoslavia, Italy, India and New Zealand, Norway, Denmark, Russia, Finland, Sweden and Japan.

"Although the presence of the United States of America seems to have some people, the Kenya Government is not in any way influenced in the direction of the affairs of this nation."

A statement was also issued yesterday by a spokesman for the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, in reply to the East African Standard allegations that there was American influence in the Voice of Kenya."

There was no demonstration outside the nearby Mbarika Hotel, where South African delegates were staying. The South Africans entered the conference by a different door without even seeing the demonstrators.

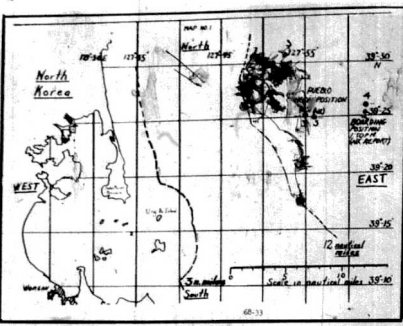

# S.A. plans to disenfranchise Coloureds

# Bonn reopens ties with Belgrade

The long and West German resumed diplomatic relations were seen as a new step in the 'opening up' of the 14-month-old coalition cabinet.

The announcement came one year to the day after West Germany broke off formal relations with Romania, the first firm result of the Bonn government's policy of 'no contact' with Communist countries.

A brief joint statement issued simultaneously in Bonn and Belgrade said the two sides would exchange ambassadors as soon as possible. This decision was 'in line with the need for a steady and peaceful co-operation among European States' and was a 'positive contribution towards the process of easing tensions in Europe.'

# U.S. plans two 'spy' satellites

The United States plans to launch two new 'spy' satellites with improved capability for detecting Chinese atmospheric nuclear tests.

The Atomic Energy Commission, in a annual report to Congress, said the satellites will have an 'enhanced detection capability' for detecting Chinese atmospheric nuclear tests.

Although the report did not state that satellites have provided information on previous Chinese nuclear explosions.

The report also said the U.S. is studying the possibility of re-orienting its 'spy' satellites to detect nuclear weapons in 1968-69, more than 100,000 tons above the current level.

# Concern on Lagos ship takeovers

He said Biafra's main imports since the Nigerian civil war began had been materials. Biafra had spent over \$10,000,000 on military equipment since July and this could go on for a long time.

He said Biafra had never depended much on imported food, but difficulties were bound to arise from shortage of food for its own people.

There could be no trade with Biafra for a long time if the takeover in Lagos had gone out of production.

# MOSCOW 'PREFERS' REBEL TO CASTRO

Cuba's anti-party group is quoted as believing that the Soviet Union had 'more confidence' in the micro-Union leader, Mr. Anibal Escalante, than in the Premier, Dr. Castro.

Mr. Escalante, the pro-Soviet Communist leader who acted as intermediary between the Cuban Communist Party last week and the Soviet government, said he would be glad to accept a self-environment admitting his resignation, which, again, according to reports, would be possible in connection with a firm which would supply political goods.

According to the daily and installation of a long report made by the Premier, Mr. Leonid Brezhnev, Dr. Castro's brother-in-law, the Central Committee Party last week and published yesterday, the pro-Soviet group believed 'Cuba's internal economic position by 1970 and the international situation would force Dr. Castro to adopt this pro-Moscow line.'

They felt the Soviet Union would induce Dr. Castro to accept 'a Federal republic' with Mr. Escalante, a veteran Communist who was expelled from the leadership in 1962 for separatism.
