Door shut on Kenya Asians

Britain's Commonwealth Immigrants Bill was due to become law at midnight last night (2 a.m. today E.A. time), with the Queen giving her Assent in time to bring the Bill into immediate operation.

The Bill was being rushed to the Queen immediately after being passed by the House of Lords in a debate which aroused fierce passions over the restrictions it places on the British citizenship rights of Asians from Kenya, who have been flooding into Britain in thousands during the past week in an attempt to beat the curb deadline.

As the Bill went before the Lords, the controversy it has aroused in other Commonwealth countries reached its apex.

"Music is more than just a hobby; it's a reason for living."

With these words, the conductor of the Nairobi Orchestra, Dr David Dendi, summed up why he and a group of about 30 musicians also give up their spare time to take part in a pursuit unequalled in its demands for discipline and concentration.

Many of the members of the orchestra are good enough to play professionally, and one or two have considered it as a career only to be persuaded by other considerations to choose to play an instrument at one time or another.

But they all have one thing in common—a profound love of music.

The present Nairobi Orchestra was revived last year and gave its first concert in June. Its programme for 12 years during which it had some notable achievements, including its performance of a Nairobi Cantata, written especially for Nairobi's 50th anniversary of city status in 1959.

Dedication of the music-makers

It was revived in 1967 as a result of a plan in this newspaper from Dr R. R. Scott, a former chairman of the committee of the old orchestra, who still finds musical scores to the new orchestra. Several musicians were interested in the orchestra mainly by word of mouth, until they were enough to make a start.

The public performances, of which there is one in the All Saints Cathedral Hall next week, are a triumph over many difficulties. Not the least of these is the survival of the orchestra, consistently thinning population, and the fact that it is by a really threatened as it is by a fall in the population.

ing a programme. Most of the work of the Romantic composers is ruled out because a large number of musicians is demanded and the classical composers demand a high level of technique which is all too rare even in professional orchestras.

Nevertheless, it is possible to choose music that is both interesting and far more important. The players themselves are not a compromise but a triumph over many difficulties.

There are two early symphonies by Mozart (25 and 26) and Beethoven's Symphony No. 1, which the complex baroque cadenza, being played on the piano by Peter Ward, the Director of Music at Kenya High School.

The programme represents the extreme limit, particularly in the case of the Mozart last movement, which the orchestra can grow to two weeks as a concert approach to see at once the great difficulties which the orchestra has to overcome.

Not the least of these concerns the strains which, because of the numbers required for first and second violins, violas, cellos and double basses, the greatest shortage occur.

The need for sheer numbers is not so great in the woodwind and brass sections, but a complete absence of trumpet and trombone and a shortage of horns has led to some remarkable adaptations.

Clarinetts are often used to fill in above and then parts but no pieces with large or complex parts for these instruments are chosen.

The only permanent horn player is Mr Frank Thornton, the director of the Police Band and as a result the trombone player, Mr. Mary Condy, doubles up on the horn parts.

Dr Dendi's research thesis is an accomplished flute player and is one of those who might

have taken up music as a career. He played with the Nairobi Youth Orchestra and the Nairobi Orchestra with people as distinguished as musical respectability as high degrees of fact.

The player that he kept his eye on three things, his score, the conductor and the leader of the section. Dr Dendi may stop the playing to point out that the violin came in late, the woodwinds are too sharp or that the violins are playing too loudly to fill the office through.

But he knows that there are some things that cannot be avoided or improved. Whatever its faults, the Nairobi Orchestra is certainly good enough to fill the hall with enthusiastic staves of live music when a concert is performed.

The orchestra contains people from all walks of life, some of whom have achieved prominence in other spheres. There are professors of maths and physics, a bank manager and the head of a college to name only a few.

Although there are about 30 players, it is usually only possible to muster 25 for a concert, some of whom have to come from distant places and rehearse only once. The bassoon player, for instance, is a teacher at Nairobi.

In addition to concerts, the Nairobi Orchestra has filled an important gap on the local stage by providing accompaniment to musical shows and plays.

Although the present and future of the Nairobi Orchestra is to say the least, hazardous, it is already looking ahead to possible directions of future development.

One of Dr Dendi's ambitions is to have the orchestra accompany one of the accomplished soloists who periodically visit Kenya through the East Africa Conservatoire of Music, Antwerp, France and the Goethe Institute. He himself would like to per-

form one of Mozart's flute concertos, and another possibility is the Handel organ concerto, especially as concerts are held in the cathedral.

The Kenyans Musical Ensemble, which will be combined with the orchestra to perform several pieces, notably the Mozart Mass. But Dr Dendi admits that the main hope for the future, remains more Kenyans in performance.

He hopes that the experiments

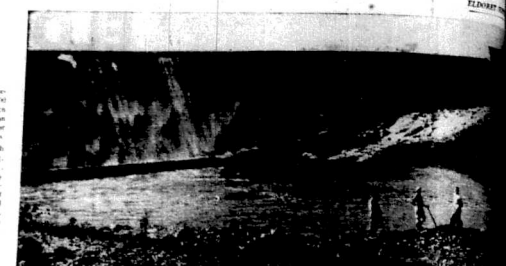

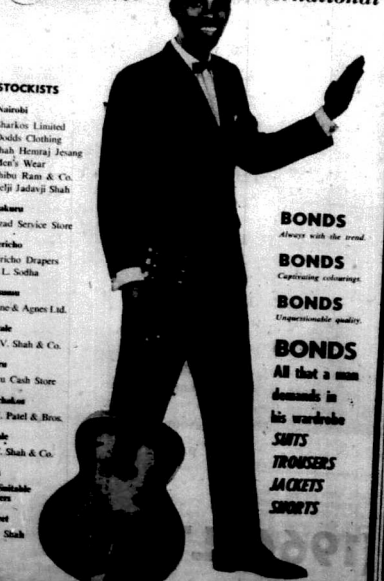

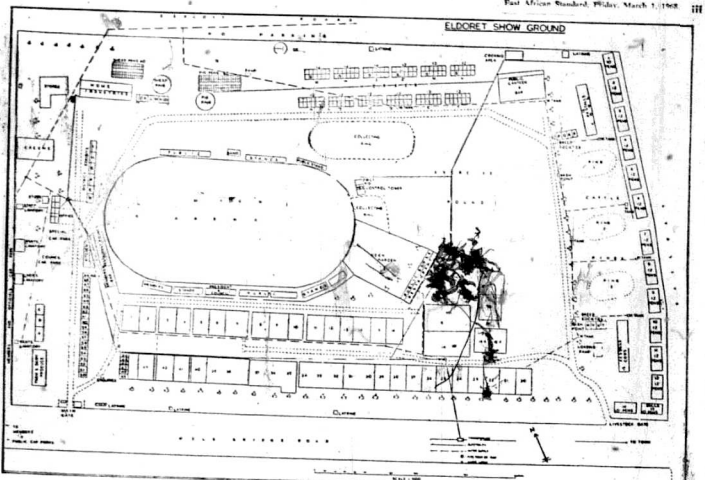

Eldoret is the fifth largest town in Kenya, with a population of about 25,000. Eldoret's beginnings in 1912 sprang from its importance to the structure of the East African Plateau.

It was a convenient centre in those early days. Today its status as the centre of a large farming area—about halfway between Nairobi and Kampala—offers manufacturers and the Government a central position in the economic distribution of Kenya.

Feelings have been running high in Nairobi this week as the Asian exodus to Britain gathered momentum, reaching its peak on Tuesday night and exploding into violence at Nairobi Airport where 5,000 people came to see off between 1,500 and 2,000 relatives.

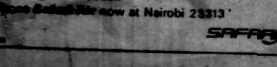

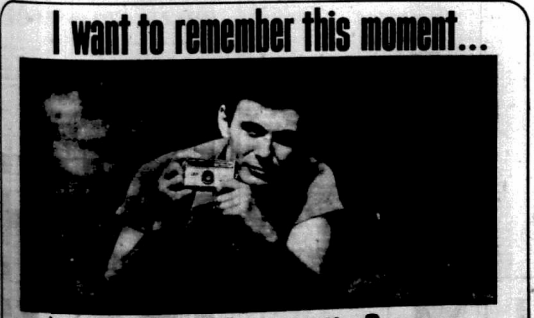

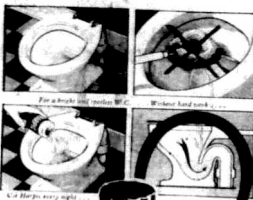

in a healthy state. It must be borne in mind that the premises which have been closed since the outbreak of the strike on plant and stock and resources have been used for the production of a new crop. It is given three years in which to recover and have an ample supply of food to produce a crop of high-quality coffee.

By extending all the wood left over from the forest, there will be no more removal of valuable plant food. Working in such a densely planted area could pose a problem, however, that is taken care of by an ingenious portable, mechanical wood-cutting machine in Japan and coming on to the East African market in the near future. This is actually a mechanical mower, with a number of adaptations including a cutting head, with which one person can clear-cut an acre or more per day, in an operation, thus dispensing with manual labour. This means that half the area can be cleared in half the time, and the cost of labour is reduced by half.

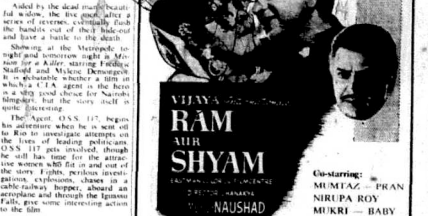

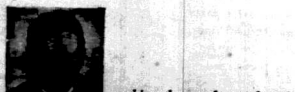

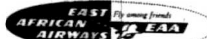
