## India still restricting entry of Kenya Asians

Indian High Commission in Nairobi said today that it will continue to restrict entry of Kenya Asians to India. The spokesman added that India is not open to Kenya citizens or Asians with Indian passports who are resident in Kenya.

"A Nairobi lawyer, Mr. C. G. Amin, who is a former president of the Kenya Indian Association, has criticised the Indian High Commission on its attitude to Asians with British passports."

He said that since Monday the High Commission had imposed very strict control on the issue of visas, apparently on instructions from New Delhi, which were contrary to the assurances given by Mr. Gandhi on Wednesday and even before the new British Immigration Act became law.

"People who have been calling at the High Commission offices have been told that visas will only be granted on exceptional grounds. There are the serious illness of either their father or mother or India, or for their daughter's wedding, or for students travelling to India for studies."

Mr. Amin said he felt that, if India must argue with Britain over the issue of Kenya Asians, she should adopt some other method, instead of using the Kenya Asian passport holders.

He expressed his hopes and trusts that the latest renewed assurance by Mr. Gandhi will be converted to the Indian High Commission without delay and that it will be carried out.

Visas are also still required by Kenya Asians wishing to travel to Pakistan. Before the British Immigration Act was passed all holders of Commonwealth passports were allowed into the country freely.

Visas are now required not only by Asians with British passports but also by Asians who are Kenya citizens and who wish to visit Pakistan. (Editorial comment—Page 8)

Fish as an art. Hardly one would think it the most promising of premises, but it is the main inspiration for the hundred or so people who make up Kenya's Aquarist Club.

Despite efforts to publicise itself the club remains one of the least known in Nairobi. Even the name is confusing; many people think it is concerned with deep-sea diving or underwater swimming.

The outsider, whose only knowledge of tropical fish may come from rather inferior displays in hotels and bars, would find it hard to realise how breathtakingly beautiful a well-handled fish tank can be.

The art lies in arranging rocks and plants (plants, by the way, are a speciality on their own) and then choosing the fish carefully and with a sense of artistry to suit the setting.

The effect can be stunning as, inevitably, the fish seem to respond to their owner's intentions. The general effect is one of a delicately changing pattern of stripes, vivid reds, iridescent greens and blues.

blue, and amber blacks as fish, some beautiful, some grotesque, move around in groups with an uncanny sense of stagecraft.

"A living picture", is one of the aquarist put it.

If the aquarist thinks of himself first as an artist, it is inevitable with the general lack of knowledge about the habits of tropical fish that they should find themselves filling the role of scientist as well.

Many of them, even in Nairobi, are happening through into the habits of certain species, especially if they are lucky enough to have a dam or river where they can be bred.

Central to the activities of Nairobi's aquarists are the monthly meetings of the Aquarist Club, at the Mountain Club of Kenya headquarters, Wilson Airport, on the first Sunday of the month.

There, the members have talks and exchange knowledge ideas and fish. Towards the end of the meeting, an auction is held and members bid for fish brought along by other members. The usual price is between K5 and 20, a group.

Another feature is a competition to exhibit, usually involving one species. At the last meeting, original introductions from South America for mormonism, but can be inbred like goldfish to produce beautiful varieties.

### Instant sea-water

Because of Nairobi's distance from the sea, fresh-water animals are preferred. But coral fish, as caught at the Coast and shipped to Europe, can be kept in "instant water" which can be bought from specialist suppliers or can be made from distilling sea-water.

On the whole, East Africa's fresh-water fish tend to be dull. The most colourful come from South America and Indonesia.

Comparatively speaking, keeping tropical fish is not cheap. Even a small tank has to be made professionally, as the glass will crack if the arguments are not true, and usually costs about Sh5, not counting the filtration units, heating, lighting and aerating which are essential for healthy fish keeping.

For larger tanks, plastic glass has to be used, or the water pressure will burst the tank. One particularly beautiful tank I saw in the home of one of the most understanding members, Mr. B. W. Russell, contained 10 gallons and weighed 1,000lb. So great was the weight on the floor that one of them had displaced one of the wooden blocks on which it stood.

Another problem is feeding, as some live food must be provided.

To overcome this, Mr. Russell had installed a tank in his garden which had some 100 litres of live cycle of its own. The algae which were eaten by its larvae, minute organisms which he would careen by other fish, but visible organisms called Daphnia which have been introduced. The fish eat these will grow.

In addition, the dried eggs of white fish, imported from America, which are sold in packets, are used. The rest of the food is provided by mixing up meat, fat, and hard and grating it with a cheese grater.

Among the more interesting of Mr. Russell's fish are a pair of July fish, found in East Africa and much sought after in Europe. They are a semi-rare fish which he has had some success in breeding in his special tanks which he keeps in a sun-roomed greenhouse in his garden.

Fish-keeping has some distinguished enthusiasts in East Africa, the most respected of whom must be Dr. L. S. B. Lasky, the anthropologist.

In spite of his many other interests, Dr. Lasky's "half-hour a day" leading his guppies and it is a credit to his thoroughness in this, as in all his other interests, that he has first and second prizes for coloured guppies in an international competition at Belle Vue, Manchester, in spite of the travelling involved.

### Family appeal

Aquarism — if that is the right word — appeals to people from all walks of life, and of course in advantage it has a big family appeal. Nearly half of the members are women.

Interest also comes from a rather unexpected group of people, pilots. One of their great advantages is that they can bring in their overseas destinations fish which are too expensive for other members to import, as duty is imposed on the fish — and the water in which they are contained.

One of these pilots, Mr. Bruce Alexander, who is a first officer on the VICO, has been interested in fish since he was a child, and certainly has a remarkable collection.

His prima donna is undoubtedly Oscar, the biggest fish he has kept in Nairobi, which looks for all the world like a piscine Sir Winston Churchill.

Great ones, which he has taken when introducing new caught fish or lake-catch to a tank, which can be doubled if the water is aerated.

If this is done, attention is given to constant light, temperature and regular cleaning. The fish are not usually difficult to keep. The only fish which are a bit of a problem is one which is called the "ghost" (the water is aerated).

### Post mortem

When fish die mysteriously, they can be autopsied and sent to a pathologist in America, who will perform a post mortem. The only fish pathologists take place better if a special type of artificial sunlight lamp is used.

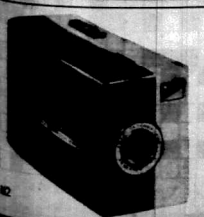

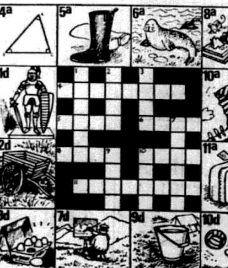

East Africa's Department of Revenue has announced that the highest annual increase in the past 13 years was recorded in a record yield of £33.8m. from the national government for the year ending 1967.

The department's annual report for 1967, issued by the East African Community, says that the department's responsibilities were taken to establish working relations with the Central Banks and Immigration Departments, which put a burden on the Income Tax Department's limited resources, the report says.

Despite these difficulties, the record yield was achieved at a low cost of 2.2 per cent.

# The pioneer days of the Scottish Mission

By B. G. McINTOSH

The story of the East Africa Scottish Mission goes back to 1839 when plans were made by Sir W. H. Murray Mackinnon and Alexander Leitch Bruce for a private Scottish mission to the Kikuyu and Maasi people.

In 1839 the East African Scottish Mission opened the first Presbyterian Church in Kikuyu country. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of East Africa, currently in session at Kisumu, is celebrating the seventieth anniversary of this event. Tomorrow President Kenyatta will unveil a stone commemorating the work of the early missionaries at Kisumu and Kikuyu. This article describes the events from 1831 to 1906.

Mackinnon's request, he gladly accepted the mission of founding a new Lovelaid in East Africa.

On September 19, 1831, Stewart, having raised an expedition of seven missionaries and 277 porters, was ready to leave for the interior. His companion, Dr. Robert Lewis, Thomas Forster, James Thomson, George Balfour, grandson of Robert Moffat, was held in the small wooden church. There was a congregation of some 200 Kamba on that occasion.

After Stewart had gone, the young missionaries did their best to develop the work which had been started. By 1840, the mission was an industrial, educational, medical and religious institution.

Many difficulties were reported out, the worst of them being a great famine in Uganda and fear of Maasi attacks. The Taita were up in arms against both sides, and some sections of the Kamba were at war with each other, and some bands of Maasi warriors had disrupted the monthly runner service. John Linton was sick for most of the year and died in January, 1841. Cornelius Rabeman was dismissed for fraud, desertion and insubordination, and at the end of 1842 Dr. Moffat resigned to join Sir Gerald Portal's mission in Uganda.

Prospects for the future seemed a little more rosy with the arrival at Kisumu in March, 1843, of a new superintendent and a new agricultural missionary. These were Dr. David Charters and John Paterson. Later in the year Mr. and Mrs. Victor Hill joined the staff as well as David Charters had been a missionary with the Raptist in the Congo in the 1830's and had transported the explorer Henry Morton Stanley some distance up the River Congo at the start of the Emin Pasha Relief Expedition.

He had great energy and enthusiasm for missionary work. By 1844 he had revitalized the

four departments of the mission's work. Watson had been dispatched to open an outstation at Nyeri in Upper Ukamba, and George Wilson and his Kamba wife were busy building the main road between Kisumu and Meru. Progress ended suddenly in 1849, when Dr. Charters mysteriously disappeared. Mr. Francis Colburn, at request of the British Branch of the International Protestant Association, came to establish a Utopian settlement, had come to East Africa, and had charged had gone on a shooting expedition at the Meru. On the evening of September 27 the two men failed to return to their base camp. Two little Maasi school boys who had been waiting for them at the camp spent the night in a tree and arrived at the mission next day to raise the alarm.

### Never found

Everyone in the area was alerted for the search. Watson came down from Nyeri and C. W. Hobbes went down a number of days, but no trace of the two men was ever found. The mission at Kisumu never really recovered from this blow. At the end of 1844 Mr. and Mrs. Hill returned to England, and George Wilson, who had resigned in order to join the Uganda Protectorate Administration. The plans for an outstation at Kisumu were shelved and Paterson remained in sole charge of Kisumu until the arrival of General Sir James Lambie, in April, 1850.

The work continued fit with notable results. Brick-making was developed. Charters had built a brick dormitory for May, 1850. Watson had completed a large brick bungalow for the school in anticipation of a removal.

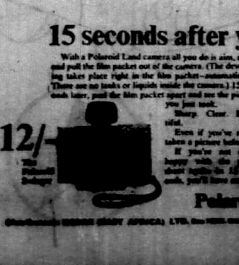

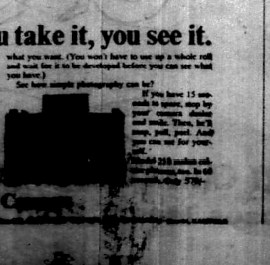

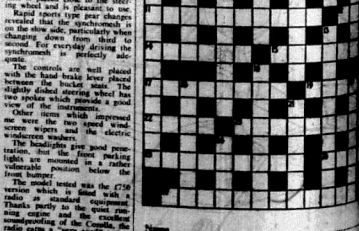

# Juniors accused of undermining T.L.B. policy

## BIG ROLE FOR COUNCIL

Junior Government officials in the Transport Licensing Board were accused yesterday of undermining Government efforts to curb the multiple processes currently facing Kenya's transport industry.

The managing director of Express Transport Ltd., Mr. Jack Robinson, said yesterday he believed the Government was genuinely anxious to promote an orderly and viable transport industry for the country and was not to blame for the present difficulties.

# Warning on self-help plans

The Nyanza Provincial self-help development co-ordinating committee has distributed £7000 received from the National Council of Self-Help Development Projects to the four Nyanza districts—Kisumu, Kisumu, Siaya and South Nyanza.

Addressing the committee at a meeting in the Kisumu county commission hall at Kisumu, Provincial Commissioner Mr. Charles M. Mwangi said he had to explain to the public that the self-help projects were not carrying out such projects if they could not sustain them after they were completed.

The Government could not take over all self-help projects since there had to be maintained and looked after by the people themselves. The people must be prepared to maintain their own health centres, self-help schools and also to pay the medical staff and buy the required medicines for their self-help health centres.

Mr. Mwangi appealed to the members of the committee to the more realistic when telling their people of self-help projects. He told members to stress those projects that would be self-sufficient in energy and money if the completed projects could not meet the needs of the people. There were many self-help health centres and schools which were not in operation because there were no funds. Community development activities have expanded, particularly since the division of Central Nyanza into Siaya and Kisumu Districts last year. This was stated in the annual report on community development in Nyanza Province.

The Provincial Community Development Officer at Kisumu, Mr. M. Mwangi, said the Ministry of Local Government had been warning the public, by making the delay in approving self-help projects, that it was unable to recruit local staff and that the front-line workers, if estimates were not approved promptly, would be dismissed. Mr. Mwangi said that the Government had been receiving £7000 and an extra £2000 from the Ministry of Local Government since independence upon which the Government had been receiving £472 are still incomplete.

The Kiboko pilot project conducted to receive its assistance under the agreement between the Government and U.S. Agency for International Development. Work on extensions to primary schools showed a marked improvement. At the moment there were 13 of these extensions to 18 were finished and 10 incomplete. The four sub-projects in Kiboko had completed one harambee secondary school and another was nearing completion. It was expected to admit students early next year.

The Kani Kuni District branch has recommended that the party sub-branch office be built at Kiboko near Kiboko. This had been set aside.
