Four and six Safari service cars in pile-up

Nairobi, April 11 (AP)—A heavy lorry, traveling from Nairobi to Nakuru, carried four six Safari service cars, including several from Ford and Porsche. The driver of the lorry was injured slightly but did not need hospital treatment. No one else was hurt.

The extent of the damage to the cars was not immediately known, but some cars were believed to be badly seriously damaged.

The incident took place before the lorry had reached the spot but although the road was blocked for some time none of the competitors was delayed.

Among the damaged cars was the Porsche service car, driven by the Portuguese agent in East Africa, Mr. Gordon Crowe.

Mr. Crowe was on his way with the service team for the first checkpoint at Githi. He managed to stop the lorry before it reached the road, but could not avoid badly damaging the side of his car.

He dashed back to Nairobi to bring a replacement car.

Mr. Crowe said a press car was among those badly damaged in the pile-up.

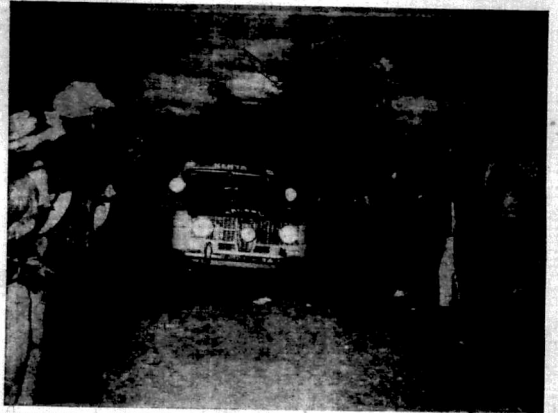

Racial anger abates in America with 42 dead

The tide of racial anger which swept over more than 100 cities across the United States ebbed yesterday as Negroes and Whites began to assess the damage of six days of violence.

National Guardsmen and Federal troops stayed on duty in several cities as rioting continued to be reported, but police forces across the country gradually returned to a state of relative calm.

On the night of Wednesday night, 42 people had been killed, more than 600 injured and more than 100,000 looted in 122 U.S. cities.



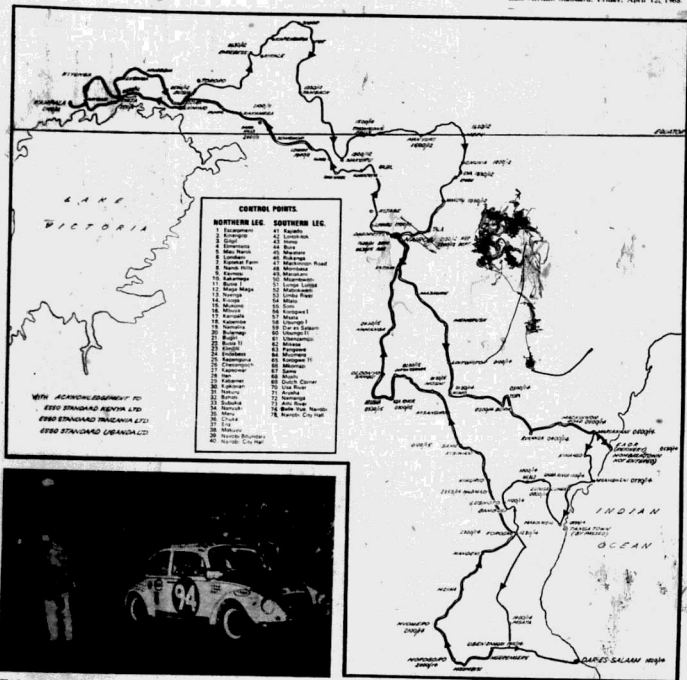

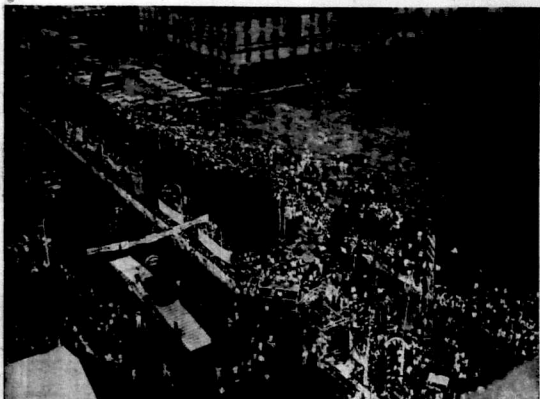

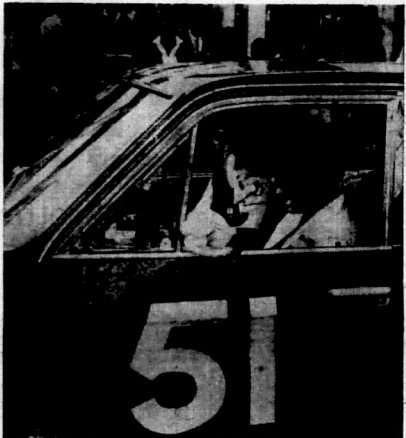

Seven armies, heads, seven lives saved and seven patients who, by all the laws of medicine, should have died. And this is only a fraction of the survival total that, after two years as Provincial Surgeon at Mchakos, is still on a p.p.s. Dr. Ladislav Malinsky.

After arriving in Kenya as part of an aid programme arranged by the United Nations, Malinsky was a surgeon at the United Nations Hospital in Nairobi when he arrived in January, 1960. He found that the Kenyan presented a new sort of challenge. The majority of his patients were brought in with wounds and injuries from which a European would have been three days dead.

It is this survival factor and recovery rate that convinced Dr. Malinsky that he was experiencing a new kind of medicine. His work in Mchakos, he found, was in fact common with surgery in Prague.

Warriors from the Masai and Kamba tribes are frequent patients. Many of the victims of the clashes between tribes had been shot dead.

Dr. Malinsky pointed to the arrow from the right. All were taken from patients. It was not a wound from a rifle but a sharp blow from a spear which had been brought in by police officers. A wound from a spear, doctor recalled. The police brought the patient to the hospital. He recovered. Any European with injuries like that would have died instantly.

There is an exception to the survival factor. "In my experience with patients like that would have died instantly."

Machakos recovery rate amazes Czech surgeon

Seven armies, heads, seven lives saved and seven patients who, by all the laws of medicine, should have died. And this is only a fraction of the survival total that, after two years as Provincial Surgeon at Mchakos, is still on a p.p.s. Dr. Ladislav Malinsky.

After arriving in Kenya as part of an aid programme arranged by the United Nations, Malinsky was a surgeon at the United Nations Hospital in Nairobi when he arrived in January, 1960. He found that the Kenyan presented a new sort of challenge. The majority of his patients were brought in with wounds and injuries from which a European would have been three days dead.

It is this survival factor and recovery rate that convinced Dr. Malinsky that he was experiencing a new kind of medicine. His work in Mchakos, he found, was in fact common with surgery in Prague.

Warriors from the Masai and Kamba tribes are frequent patients. Many of the victims of the clashes between tribes had been shot dead.

An injection of something extra

Prospect has acquired approximately 20 per cent of the car and light utility vehicle market in East Africa. This is probably the highest market penetration achieved by Peugeot anywhere in the world.

This popularity in East Africa is mainly due to the suitability of the cars for use on rough roads and their characteristic of requiring surprisingly little repair and maintenance. These facts have been clearly demonstrated by numerous successes in the East African Motor Trials and other major local rallies. In 1960 and 1961 Bert Sherwell and Chris Rothwell emerged the overall winners driving a 404 injection model.

The standard 404 shown is probably the best-looking Peugeot in East Africa and sells in Nairobi for £1,181. It is equipped with a 1,618 cc engine which produces 80 h.p. and transmits through a carburetor.

Without doubt, the Peugeot 404 injection model is a very interesting touring car with plenty of space, a powerful engine, a large steering wheel, a large gear change, and a large gear change. Time to make the herdsmen pay their way

In the Mlila Plains, one of the three areas in the Komoziok scheme the Range Commission is setting up a demonstration scheme to show the Maasi how modern ranching can be carried out.

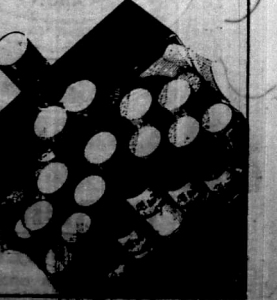

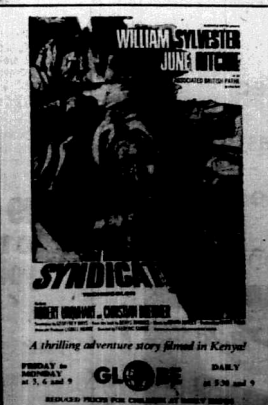

52 FEARED DEAD IN FERRY DISASTER

Police said yesterday that 46 bodies had been recovered from the ferry steamer Wahine which capsized in the entrance to Wellington harbor, New Zealand, on Wednesday, and that only six people were unaccounted for.

Earlier reports had said the final death toll could be more than 100. Latest figures, however, showed that 56 of the 614 passengers on board the 1,944-ton ferry had been rescued, with 110 crew members.

A police spokesman also disclosed earlier reports that bodies had been heard inside the hull of the partly submerged vessel. He said fragments had made a detailed check and were convinced there was no one alive inside the ship.

Of the 116 survivors admitted to hospital, 11 have been released and only one person was said to be seriously hurt.

The ferry boat was forced on to rocks by 120 m.p.h. winds, watched by thousands of horrified spectators at the mainline.

Some of passengers and crew leapt into the churning water only to be battered by the waves and the 100-foot yacht from safety.

The Wahine ran at the end of her 38-mile regular voyage from Lyttelton, the port of Christchurch in the South Island, when the strait-

Police laboriously checked the names of survivors from the passenger and crew list as Boadicea attempts contained into darkness after the disaster.

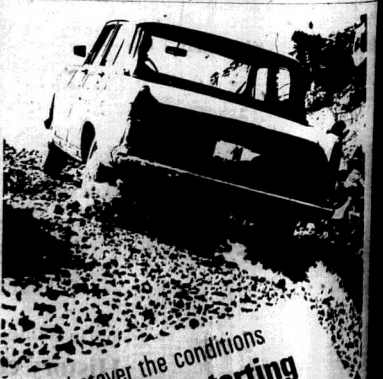

52 FEARED DEAD IN FERRY DISASTER

Police said yesterday that 46 bodies had been recovered from the ferry steamer *Wahine*, which capsized in the entrance to Wellington harbour, New Zealand, on Wednesday, and that only six people were unaccounted for.

Earlier reports had said the first death toll would be more than 100, latest figures, however, showed that 202 of the 614 passengers on board the 8,644-ton ferry had been rescued, with 110 crew members.

A police spokesman also disclosed earlier reports that tapping had been heard inside the hull of the partly submerged vessel. He said druggies had made a detailed check and were convinced there was no one alive inside the ship.

Of the 106 survivors admitted to hospital, 11 have been released and only one person was said to be seriously hurt.

The ferry boat was forced on to rocks by 120 m.p.h. winds, watched by thousands of horrified spectators on the mainland.

Some of the passengers and crew leapt into the churning waters only a few hundred yards from safety. The *Wahine* was at the end of her 300-mile regular voyage from Lyttelton, a port of call en route to the South Island, when she struck

one of the worst storms to hit New Zealand in 30 years.

Police laboriously checked the names of survivors from the passenger and crew list and immediately attempted to contact relatives elsewhere after the disaster.

After being held against the rocks, the *Wahine*, holed and tearing, was swept across the harbour by waves, and the ship stood helplessly, many clinging for dear life to the debris.

Suddenly she started to roll and minutes later she sank.

Shortly before the *Wahine*, Capt. H. G. Robertson, had ordered "abandon ship" and 110 boats and lifeboats were launched from the sinking vessel.

Mary, unable to scramble aboard the boats, threw herself into the waves and within minutes an armada of little ships sped across the harbour to pick up the survivors from the sea.

Some survivors reached land after being in the water for 10 minutes. The *Wahine* was taken to hospital. The last people off the *Wahine* were Capt. Robertson and the Chief Officer and Pilot and Capt. Robertson walked along on the shore, shocked and dazed.

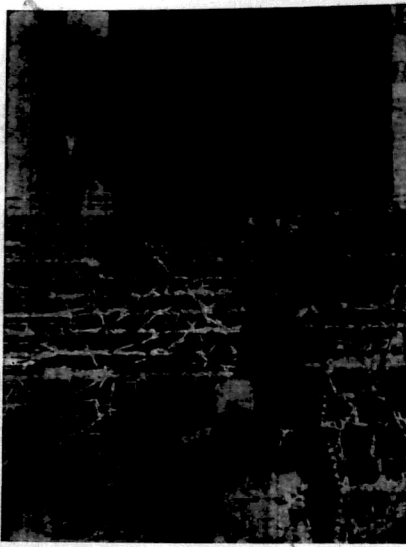

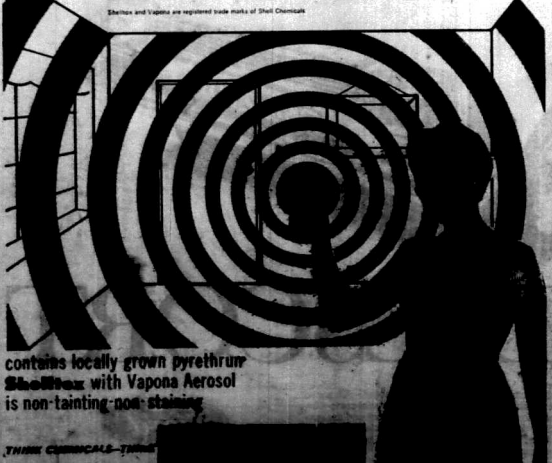

New future for soy-beans in East Africa

One of the beneficial by-products of the abortive 'Green Revolution' scheme of East Africa was the introduction of various varieties of soyabean to the farmers of the continent. Already, the use of soybean flour in bread has become popular in Uganda. Three towns now have schemes for distributing soybean flour to schools, each flour being said to contain as much protein as all eggs.

Interest in soy-beans as a potential crop for East African farmers has, in the past, been limited. This has been partly due to some rather low prices which in Uganda have fallen to below 200 shillings a ton.

Furthermore, yields have been very low. This has been due to the fact that the varieties which have been produced for soil conditions of the highlands were not adapted to the lowland conditions of the highlands.

Mr. Ruhubayo, a Ugandan research student at the Faculty of Agriculture, Makerere University College, crosses-pollinating soy-bean plants at the university farms. Mr. Ruhubayo is carrying out a breeding programme to produce a high-yielding variety.

With the increased local demand for soy-beans as an ingredient of human foods and livestock feeds, the price has improved. Uganda's two main mills are keeping fairly consistently at a price of 25 cents a lb. delivered.

With a yield of 1,500lb. and a farm price of 20 cents this would represent a return of 300c. an acre. This may not seem attractive compared with some crops, but might be worthwhile as an avenue to crop for two years.

Already soybeans are proving to be an attractive cash crop for farmers, in the Masaka District of Uganda, supplying Uganda Foods in Kampala.

Lessons learned from world's toughest rally

An analysis by TORQUE, the "East African Standard" Motoring Correspondent

During the past four years the mud-bank in the East African Safari has been mud, mud, mud. For the start of this year's event, it appeared that B.M.C. might change the mud-bank.

For the third successive year Peugeot 404 injection emerged the victor in the driving skill of Nick Nowicki, who has composed in four years and has only failed to finish as a safari instructor and manager.

This year's Ford challenge was probably the strongest ever. Normally the five Ford Cortina Lotus machines with group one drivers were private entries.

In fact, four of the cars were specially assembled at the Ford of England's Sport Performance Centre. The fifth was prepared to the same specifications by Peter Huth and Ian Grant and it was this car

which finished second overall. The team, consisting of a standard Lotus-Overground model was selected to represent Ford and a considerably faster than the Ford cars and the fact that all five crews were in group one.

Deceivably the overall winner arrived at the finish line with a face that was anything but smiling. The five main factors making this year's East African Safari tough were the extremely wet weather and the very high speeds set for the majority of sections.

Traditionally the Safari is held over the Easter weekend each year. This means that conditions have to change from dry and dusty to wet and muddy depending on whether Easter falls in mid-March or mid-April.

The Safari weekend generally sees rain at some point along the 3,000-mile route. The 1967 rally was an exception and went down in Safari history as the 'dry' Safari with 49 of the 91 starters, including as finishers.

This year's event was a complete contrast with deep mud a feature of many sections. Conditions were so difficult that even the fastest cars were bogged down.

In the case of 25 of the 75 sections making up the Safari, the high average speeds set for the organisers were virtually impossible to achieve even under ideal conditions. These sections, combined with the muddy roads and pools of water which characterised so much of the route resulted in a tremendous heavy loss of points. The organisers were forced to extend the maximum lateness allowed to a total of 20 hours for 1,200 penalty points.

Obviously, these extensions have attracted criticism. The organisers claim that had the conditions selected as the chosen route which the time ex-

ceptions became effective. It is such a pity that the Clerk of the Course has no alternative but to maintain a respectable standard of conditions and it is reasonable that the decision to extend the time should be made by those who have suffered from the rain that are predominantly late as time has been lost.

At first sight it seems fair to extend the time for the wet weather but the organisers have a very valid reason for making their decision. Their objective was to penalise serious and correct work by ensuring penalty points because of the time taken to effect repairs.

The cars in Class A (up to 1,000 c.c.) and Class B (1,000-1,500 c.c.) were incapable of keeping up with the Class C machines (1,500 to 2,000 c.c.). It appears that some thought should be given to specifying one class of time for Class A and B cars so that the time taken could be difficult to achieve, but the organisers set for the weather conditions could not be completely unworkable.

Such a move would encourage more private entries because smaller cars are cheaper to buy. However, it is not clear if they are slower machines and will have a chance of taking a place in a class.

It was unfortunate for the Kenya Rally Drivers' Club entries that private entries were not permitted to compete in the Safari for the first time. The organisers' plans for participation in as many rallies as possible prove to be a failure.

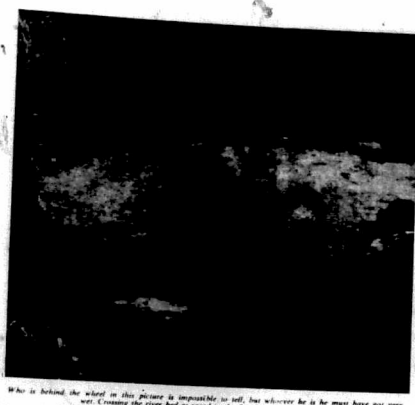

Their repertoire is varied, ranging from traditional, popular and modern, anything that goes to the heart of the matter and that they feel they can do justice to.

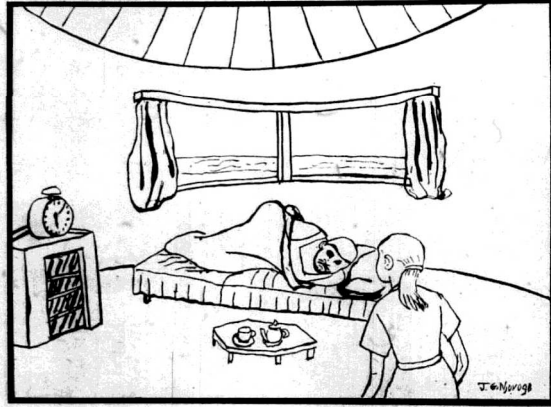

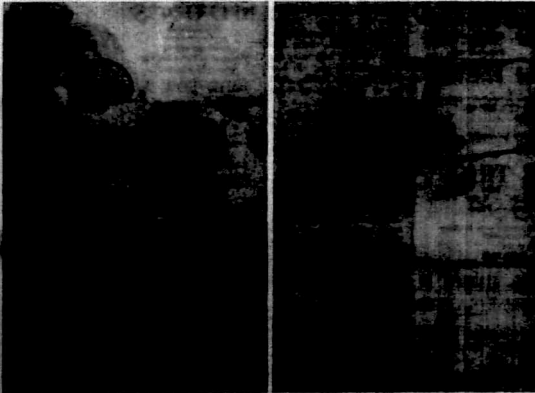

BOOK REVIEWS

Guide-book that leaves little unsaid

WILDLIFE AND SAFARI IN KENYA by East African Publishers House, 6/6

According to Aldous Huxley visitors coming to a country for the first time should not read guide-books.

His advice is to come, fresh and unprejudiced, make one's own observations then go home and read the best available guide-books which will make a second visit, and the two sets of impressions, the personal and the book, will enable one to gain a deep perspective which is otherwise unobtainable.

In a country like Kenya, however, when the scope of the tourist is immense and his visit normally brief and unrepeatable, there is a need for a general guide which will give him at least a feeling of how best to occupy his time.

Books on Kenya are numerous and the tourist who is already clear about the particular purpose of his visit has access to many books — some scholarly, some fanciful, through which he can pursue his individual interest.

Mr. Huxley and Mr. Huxley sets out to do a great many bits of information on a great many aspects of the country.

It is also encouraging to find that this book does not give a false picture of the people of the country — conclusively, but

possibly to include all the books on Kenya but the overseas reader in particular has difficulty in choosing where to start and would find some value in a guide to the most useful books in the selection facing him.

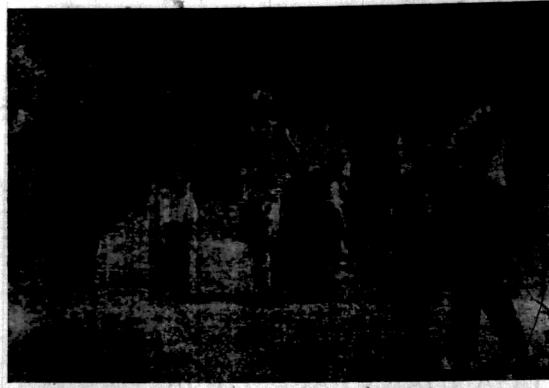

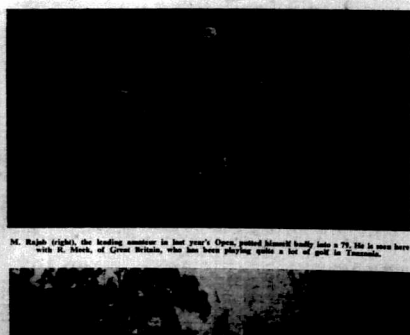
