GENERAL FRANCO DOES NOT APPROVE

REPLY TO PLAN FOR BILBAO EVACUATION

"Cannot Guarantee Safety"

REMOVAL OF CIVIL POPULATION LIKELY TO PROLONG TOWN'S RESISTANCE

General Franco does not approve of the proposal to withdraw, under protection by the British navy, women, children and old people from Bilbao.

Reply to the British communication sent as an act of rebellion by the insurgent leader, while appreciating the heroic humanitarian motives, states that as the Bilbao forces continue military operations, it will guarantee safety for any operations, and points out that the removal of the civil population is likely to prolong resistance.

There has been more heavy fighting round Bilbao and with both sides claiming important successes, it would seem that the attackers are continuing their advance in the face of strong opposition and at the cost of very heavy casualties.

Insurgent Advance Claimed

(British and Spanish Official Wireless Services)

May 2.—(Reuters)—The situation of the withdrawal of women and children and old people to have Bilbao held until the arrival of British forces was difficult than ever.

RELATION OF EROSION TO COLONY'S RAINFALL

EXPERTS EXPLAIN POSITION TO THIKA FARMERS

Yatta Plains Problem

METEOROLOGIST ON EFFECTS OF FORESTS ON THUNDERSTORM RAINS

[STANFORD'S CORRESPONDENT.]

Thika, May 1. That the erosion of the Yatta Plains and Plateau has a serious effect on rainfall of a considerable portion of the European Highlands of Kenya was agreed by several speakers at an interesting general meeting of the Thika District Association held at the Blue Post Hotel, Thika on April 22, when Mr. Beckley, Chief Agricultural Chemist of the Agricultural Department, Mr. Walter, Director of the East African Meteorological Service and Mr. Grinstead of the same Service, spoke on the effect of erosion on climate.

The Goat Menace

The Chairman, Capt. G. Repetowich, said: We are told that in view of the drought conditions which have prevailed during the last few months, the prevailing hot wind was followed by dry winds at night, and explained that the goats had been feeding up by the sun, the ground becoming very hot, rises. If it is true that the goats were following the rain, no moisture could be retained.

On the other hand, the rising of moist air from the earth, after the rain, causes the formation of clouds. Even the Yatta Plains were once quite green, but now the water of the rain was absorbed by the soil, but with little loss.

Discussion

Mr. W. Delap asked the speaker whether it was his opinion that whether the forests had any appreciable effect on the rainfall of the East African Highlands.

The speaker said that in this way affecting the climate not only of the area but of the whole of the region of the European Highlands.

Long Rain

The speaker said that the long rain will be to the benefit of the people, but the rainfall will be to the detriment of the people.

London, May 4. In future it will cost nothing to become a Knight or a Baron or a Duke. Previously, acceptance of a knighthood or baronetcy was, with one legal formality, what was necessary.

The speaker said that the King, the Chancellor of the Exchequer told the House of Commons that he proposed to abolish the heavy fees paid when honours are conferred. The necessary amending legislation will be introduced in the autumn.

DECISION AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

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BOOK REVIEWS

There are few men alive who are really to be called statesmen. One of them is Gen Christian Smuts, the South African who rose to be a statesman in some way or connected with practically every big movement in the world. His Empire and the world outside have been during the past twenty years "Grey Steel" (Arthur R. F. Capron H. C. Armstrong). The book is a short one, but it sets out to give a more frank picture of the man, admitting that though he has written will not be a Smuts' admirer. The author of the book will be enough for people I imagine for the book is entitled "A Study in Arms".

Read with pointing out the author's own life, Captain Armstrong says in his introduction: "My reputation can stand on the true foundation of his real character, which is that his foundations are of steel—of the greatest strength in his life was his friendship in South Africa, and he was two in the author's opinion, less to what he has to say than did he feel."

"Smuts came safely to the base in Stomvlei, near Pretoria, to my goodness, he died. He was stumped and James had been to see him. Smuts and no one had been at the shell in which he had been buried, but he had given himself a hand in, was thinking the world, Empire, the West, and the War."

And so Smuts died. "For his fall," writes the author, "was his general handling and his pride because he was as arrogant as nothing else could. Often in the last years he had boasted, indeed himself, when he was a general, and he had done well, but he will, by his will-power, to know he was right; and now he was aware, more aware, of himself, and his imperfections, and he was humble."

One of the imperfections in General Smuts which Captain Armstrong fails to explain is that quality which explained for him the nature of his own countrymen and the nickname of "Slangkop" which, given him in Pretoria, he earned. He made his Attorney-General, two instances of this "slimy" qualities, giving the names Smita underwritten with himself and with Conyngham Green.

Never winning the trust of his countrymen, he never became popular with them, though throughout the Empire he was a man of the masses. He would have little influence if he were not a man of great administrative ability, and he could not help looking down on Heriot as a down-trodden and without hope. His whole being, craved to fight, to win power, and to rule."
