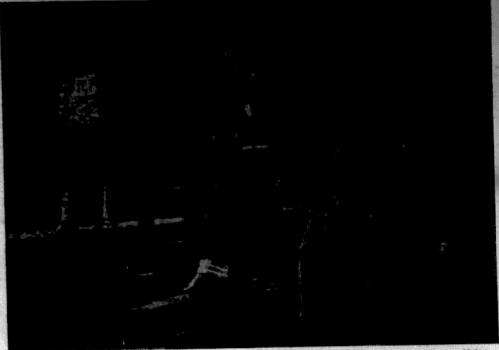
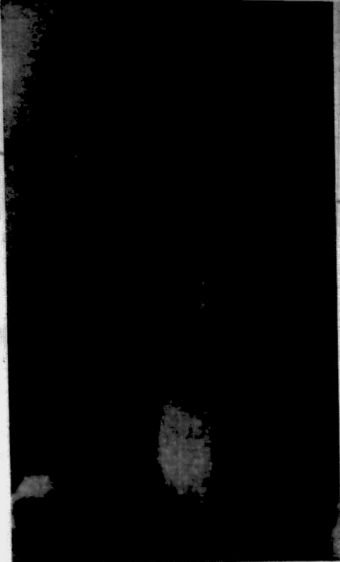

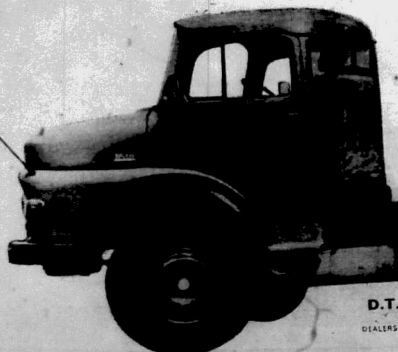

Banking and interest rates

The kind of misunderstanding that clouds so many issues in Kenya, which often become political because of half truths, surrounded a question asked in the National Assembly about interest rates charged by the commercial bank.

"Why do the banks give less than five per cent interest on the money banked by their customers and, in turn, loan ten per cent?" the questioner wanted to know. "How long has the present bank rate remained at this level?"

The inference from the first part of this double-barrelled attack is that private banks must be up to some mischief which they charge, compared with what they pay on money loaned which, after all, comes out of the savings deposited by customers. Following this line of argument, somewhere the banks must be taking a heavy cut out of their profits.

This is a false innuendo. In the first place, their liquidity is perilously low, out of a deliberate policy to ensure that they help development. In other words, the banks have far more money out on loan supporting individual enterprises than is acceptable for safety in banking practice generally in the world.

The Assistant Minister for Finance replied with the relevant figures, disproving the inference. Mr. Balala pointed out that the commercial banks are paying between three and four-and-a-half per cent interest on fixed and savings deposits. Loans are not charged at ten per cent but, as he said, "at a minimum effective rate of seven per cent for first-class credit risks and eight to nine per cent for normal advances."

If a business run on an overdraft fails, the bank takes the knock. Higher rates, Mr. Balala explained, must be charged for unsecured risks. The banks have to meet administrative costs and, compared with the current rates operating in other countries, he felt satisfied those charged in Kenya are very reasonable.

Those differences in rates of interest, together with charges levied for operating accounts, have frequently been criticised by unfortunates. Do they have any conception of the commitments the banks undertake? Buildings have to be erected and maintained, often small branches are out of the way places to cater for scattered communities, transport costs meet and staff paid.

Briefly, the Bank Rate is used as an instrument to control spending, thus the levels of unemployment. A low rate — cheap money — encourages spending tendencies; a high rate — dearer money — curbs borrowing and is supposed to be disinflationary.

The first series of "wobbles" occurred in the first year of the First World War, when there were eight changes, when the rate reached ten per cent, the highest recorded. For the decade 1940-50, despite the war, no change was made, and the rate remained at the lowest, two per cent.

The situation is particularly serious in the towns. In almost every country in the world people are moving out of rural areas to the cities to find a search for work or an easier life, and Kenya is no exception.

Nairobi has shanty villages on its outskirts, with thousands of people living in bad conditions, or housing overcrowding in relative homes in the centre of the city, crowds of people swarm outside building sites and hotels, vainly looking for jobs.

Kenya has a deep pride in the land and everyone's ambition is to own his own shamba. But as the population increases, the fathers will not have enough land to pass on to each of their many sons. The situation is even more complicated by the continuation of such practices as polygamy, by the irresponsible attitude of many men to their illegitimate children, and the fact that thousands of people are now living in the towns with no land of their own.

A few months ago, in a lecture at University College, an expert population forecaster said: "If Kenya's population goes on rising at its present rate, in 90 years it will be 164 million.

Imagine what that would mean. The country would be so crowded that instead of the vast stretches of the countryside on either side of the road, somebody travelling from Nairobi to Mombasa would be passing through closely-packed housing estates most of the way to Mombasa.

They would run even through the Tsavo game park area, because with so many people in the country all the animals would have been killed off long ago and there would be no room for game.

To many people that may not seem very important, but it would mean that tourism, one of Kenya's biggest industries, would be virtually wiped out.

Overcrowded conditions already exist in Britain and other European countries, but these countries rely on industry — from deposits of iron and other metals beneath their soil — to keep wealthy. Kenya has none of these, and at least 10 per cent of its people will have to rely on farming to keep them alive for as far ahead as we can see.

Kenya with a population of 144,000,000 there would not be enough land for them to live and work on.

All the same, Kenya is comparatively lucky compared with some other countries, and has more time to plan how to defeat these staggering problems.

Statistics show how grave a crisis man is facing on this planet. He has, indeed, it took all of recorded history until about the

year 1850 for the number of human beings in the world to reach one billion (1,000,000,000). But the second billion was reached in less than 100 years; and the third billion took less than 30 years.

The world's population is now estimated at 3,364,000,000. It is expected to reach 4,990,000,000 by 1975 and 7,000,000,000 by the year 2000, which would be double the figure in 1965.

Every day 180,000 babies are born in the world — 65,000,000 every year. Most of these are in India, China and Africa. India has the biggest increase of all. Seven out of every 30 people in the world are Indian. The country has a population of 226,000,000, and an Indian baby is born every one and a half seconds.

It has even been forecast that unless something is done there will be standing room only all over the world by the year 2056, when there will be eight times as many people as there are now.

While more babies are being born, old people are living longer — doctors think 150 may be a common age in the future. But experts agree that these figures may never come true. They fear a terrible catastrophe, through war or mass starvation, will cut down the multiplying world population.

In Kenya we have a chance to prevent this by developing plans to control the birthrate, and to use the land to the full to give the chance of a good life to a population which is bound to grow — but must not be allowed to become so big that everybody lives in poverty.

Next month's census is a first step towards doing this, and that is why the co-operation of all Kenyans is needed to make it a success.

Nairobi residents who drive a car have two main topics of conversation these days — the awfulness of other motorists, and the miseries of trying to park.

I am reliably informed that one driver's sole reaction to the latest motorists was to say wistfully: "At least when they get there they won't have trouble finding a space."

The great parking war is hotting up again with the baffled motorist on one side, and the City Council on the other — caught in the crossfire as usual — the police.

The police, it must be admitted, have shown a fair amount of tolerance for the motorist, but the threats about towing away offending vehicles are being made.

However, for any war it is essential to have a sound knowledge of the layout of the ground, so here, for the benefit of the motorist, is a run-down on existing official parking areas.

First the free ones — these can be found in the following places: outside the Law Courts (fully full most of the day); behind the G.P.O. and the I.C.I.'s office (full some space available); beside the Supermarket (well used, but a fair amount of flowing traffic); Jambanja Road, behind the Akiba Mosque (apparently unknown to the average motorist); between Uhuru Highway and Kileleshwa

Street (usually almost empty); Travin Road alongside the bus station (plenty of space); through Panath Street, near Globe Cinema (not well patronised); Fern Hall Road roundabout (not one of the best car parks, but still fairly empty); Bohra Road (busy).

In several of these parks, but are being built, which have raised the suspicion that they are to be made paying parks, but I understand that these are built for security guards only and there is no charge for them at present for parking.

Now the paying parks, in most of which I understand there are still spaces available for anybody willing to take out a season ticket. These are at: Kiriparam Road, between Kimathi and Mundi Abingi Streets; Victoria Street roundabout near Khola Mosque; behind the Municipal Market on Koinange Street; York Street behind City Hall; Sergeant Ellis Avenue, at the corner of Government Road.

This list does not include privately run paying car parks. It would seem that, for the motorist who has no alternative to know how to park, the area of open car parks considerably exceeds that of paying parks.

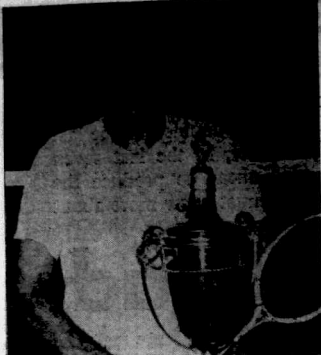
There are also several open spaces where parking is possible — except in heavy rain — close to the city centre.

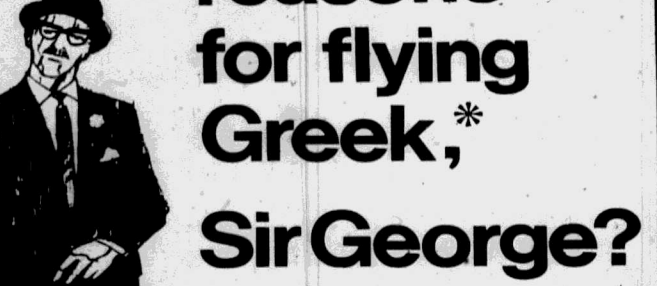

# Artists who have proved most popular this year

With the year half over, it is interesting to see which artists and groups have so far been dominating the charts. One of the more obvious trends is the continuing one that soloists are slowly making a come-back — and among them are some old timers.

Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin, for instance, have been among the two most successful recording artists this year, mainly on the strength of two very good records — *My Way* and *Gentle on My Mind*.

Although they are not so familiar here, Fleetwood Mac have proved to be the most popular artists this year, followed closely by the Beatles, who have had two chart-toppers, *Get Back* and *The Ballad of John and Yoko*. Also high in the popularity stakes are Herman's Hermits, the Foundations, Johnny Nash and Peter Sarstedt (whose *Forever Orange Juice* is currently lying 11th in the charts).

Quite low down in record sales so far are Tom Jones and Engelbert Humperdinck, who were dominating at this time last year. But they have both been busy with overseas tours, and we can expect releases later on which should put them right back on top.

Among the new discs to have just arrived in East Africa is the current No. 1 in Britain, *Something in the Air*, by Thunderclap Newman. There is a superficial resemblance to the Beatles in this record until you get to the raw piano solo in

the middle. The frequent changes of rhythm are used to Andy Thunderclap Newman himself, who is something of an improbability in the pop world.

Accustomed as we are to stars hitting the charts in a steady step after waiting, it is unusual to hear that Thunderclap is all of 46 years old, although the age of the group belongs to the more customary age group.

Another resemblance in *Something in the Air* is to the Beatles — and this is not surprising to hear that the number is produced by Peter Townsend of that group.

★ Almost certain of success in East Africa is the much publicised *Oh Happy Day*, which took the American charts by storm and had a lesser success in Britain.

The interesting blend of the Pop sound and Negro spiritual should be a successful one here.

But the number that I found most exciting was *Living on the Edge* with its throbbing insistent rhythms and earthy vocal giving it a haunting quality.

★ The record which will still be assured success here for reasons of its own, is *Love Man*, the latest from the Reading 4. It would make in the classic style characterised by insistent rhythm and ecstatic vocal.

★ The by now well-known *My Way*, by Frank Sinatra will probably go down as one of his greatest ever. It comprises the confession of a man who is looking back over his life, and in spite of failures, at least he was satisfied that he had done things his own way.

Such lily thoughts demand a longer record than usual, and Sinatra of the maestro's range of passion is well treated by the whole gang and tranquilly.

★ The new LP also included in Frank's LP are his versions of the Beatles classic *Yesterday* and the Simon and Garfunkel number *Mrs. Robinson*. They are both given the inimitable Sinatra treatment.

★ The news on the pop front overseas is that Tommy Roe has released his follow-up to *Daisy*, which recently occupied the No. 1 spot in the charts.

Called *Heather Honey*, it has the same drumming and key change gimmicks, but if anything the tune is more catchy.

Bob and Earl's latest, *Everybody Jerk* owes a lot to the twist era, and although it sounds a bit dated, their dynamic treatment makes it almost certain to be a hit.

★ The dance instructions are backed by a support of brass, strings and guitars.

★ Signs of the Zodiac are used as the basis of the latest from Diana Ross and the Supremes, *No Matter What Step You Are*. It is their most exhilarating release for some time, and has a strong melody, sensuous lyrics by Diana and an insistent beat.

★ *Since You Shared Me How To Be Happy*, is an attempt by Jackie Wilson to follow up the success of *Higher and Higher*, although in fact it was first released in 1967. The new one is just as gripping and rhythmic as before, but with a more controlled and mellow Jackie Wilson.

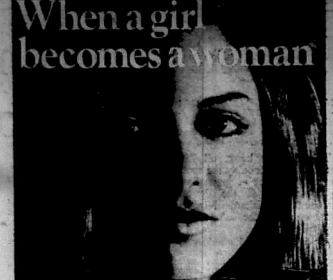

In the *Coq au vin*, which is a French dish of chicken pieces cooked in red wine, artichoke hearts give an interesting touch, and the Baked Alaska shows in a honeydew melon instead of on the usual sponge cake.

Even the first course — a small portion of prawns — has an unexpected touch in the *Angostura Bitters*.

**Prawn Creams**  
 Coq au Vin  
 Mixed Green Salad  
 Melon Alaska

**Prawn Creams**  
 1 knob butter  
 1 tablespoon flour  
 1 pt. milk  
 1 teaspoon celery salt  
 pinch pepper  
 juice 1 lemon  
 grated nutmeg

2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese  
 few drops Angostura aromatic bitters

1 kilo prawns  
 Cook and peel the prawns. Melt the butter and stir in flour, cook for two minutes without browning. Add the milk and continue cooking, stirring until the mixture thickens. Season with the celery salt and pepper, and stir in the grated cheese. Add the strained lemon juice and continue cooking until the cheese is melted.

Add the Angostura bitters and stir in the prawns, reserving a few whole for decoration. Serve very hot in small portions (quantity enough for 4). Decorate with whole prawns and a sprinkling of grated nutmeg.

 Two young roasting chickens (cut in quarters)  
 1 cup butter  
 2 tablespoons olive oil  
 1 kilo salt pork  
 1 doz. small onions

**Mushrooms**  
 12 artichoke hearts  
 Salt and pepper  
 2 small cloves, minced garlic  
 1 bottle red wine  
 Beef stock  
 Melt butter and olive oil and sauté salt pork. When golden, place pork in bottom of a casserole. Sauté chickens in the pork fat to gold colour and put in hot chicken.

In same fat, brown 12 small peeled onions, the artichoke hearts and mushrooms. Add to casserole salt and pepper and minced garlic. Pour on red wine and a little beef stock. Cover casserole and cook in even for 1 hour. To deepen colour of dish it may be necessary to add a little piece de viande or meat extract. Thicken if needed with 2 tablespoons arrowroot in three tablespoons cold wine.

**Melon Alaska**  
 Meringue:  
 4 egg whites  
 pinch salt  
 1 cup fine sugar  
 1 teaspoon vanilla

Beat egg whites with salt until stiff but not dry. Beat in cream of tartar.

Begin adding the sugar gradually about one tablespoon at a time, beating constantly, until 1 cup has been added and the resulting meringue is as thick and smooth as marshmallow. Stir or fold in remaining sugar and flavouring.

Discard seeds from half a honeydew or cantaloupe for each person and chill. Fill cavities with very hard frozen ice cream, piling it high in centre. Cover both cut surfaces of melon and ice cream with a thick topping of meringue.

Put melons in a shallow pan filled with crushed ice and bake in a very hot preheated oven (about 475 deg. F.) for three minutes or until meringue is delicately browned.

# Kenya still keeps aim on Mr. Mboya's target

Perhaps the finest tributes to Mr. Tom Mboya have come in the week following his sorrowful death on Rusting Island. As the hunt for his killer continued, there were repeated calls to all Kenyans to follow the late Minister's ideals and to ensure, by continuing his good work, that he did not die in vain.

Kenya, in a radio and television broadcast to the nation on Tuesday night, said that the death of the Minister for Economic Planning and Development must not be allowed to destroy the unity of the people of Kenya.

His death, said the President, should not be used as a reason, source of excuse for agitation but should rather be taken as a symbol to continue the good work accomplished by the Kenya people and Mr. Mboya.

If it had been humanly possible to declare physical war against the death which struck Mr. Mboya, President Kenyatta told the Kenya people, then he knew that every citizen of the country would have taken up arms and fought when the tragedy occurred.

"I know every one of you is sad, just like ourselves, but I appeal to you to be calm and peaceful and use your intelligence and common sense to do the good work which the late Minister has left behind and this should be done in utility, love and peace."

Mr. Pamela Mboya, who had borne the death of her husband so bravely in the nightmare days that followed his assassination, also called for peace and for Kenyans to take up the good work that he had started for the country. She spoke on Rusting Island where, amid scenes of unprecedented mourning, Tom Mboya was laid to rest last Friday.

When the National Assembly resumed this week, after a recess that was agreed by the House the day before, Mr. Mboya's killing, many members stood in silence to honour the memory of their departed colleague. They heard further words praising Mr. Mboya before the Assembly adjourned as a mark of respect.

The Speaker, Mr. Slade, said that Mr. Mboya knew the value of Parliament and tried to use it to the full. "A second virtue was his love of mankind, something that all Members of Parliament had to have if they were to give true service. There could be no Harbame otherwise."

"The finest memorial that we can erect to his memory, and surely the memorial that he would like best, is the completion in all its splendour of this office of constitutional order and national brotherhood to which he devoted so much of his life and labours."

Some of the pictures behind the killing emerged on Saturday, when the Vice-President and Minister for Home Affairs, Mr. Moi, told one of the biggest Press conferences held in Kenya for years that Mr.

Mboya's assassination had to be described as "a political execution — monstrously conceived but carefully planned and carried out."

He said the Government disowned theories that the crime was the responsibility of one whole country. "I am sure that the Powers were involved. Countries of the West would have much to lose and simply nothing to gain from any chaotic breakdown of stability and socio-economic development in Kenya."

Mr. Moi talked of an "international conspiracy aimed at destroying constitutional government particularly in the developing countries. This kind of 'subtle and pillious assault' — brought to a climax now by political murder" — was a possibility that the Government could not rule out, he said.

The Vice-President's statement drew comment from the Opposition Kenya People's Union, whose leader, Mr. Odinga, said that it was "futile to bring the Cold War into the case. The people of Kenya, he added, were not interested in the Cold War. What the nation demanded to know was who planned the assassination and who was the killer."

Mr. Moi, in reply to an adjournment motion on the killing in Parliament on Wednesday, pledged that the Government would leave no stone unturned in its determination to bring the murderer to justice in a spirit of law.

The police reported earlier calls from the vicinity of the murder scene when Mr. Mboya was gunned down on July 4, to come forward with information if they had not already done so. It was disarmed reports that witnesses who had seen the assassination had later been beaten up.

Three men who were questioned by police last Friday continued to help with the investigation throughout the week.

It became increasingly clear during the week that the assassination has had little or no effect on the confidence people overseas have in Kenya's political and economic stability.

Just the day before Mr. Mboya was shot, his Assistant Minister warned in Parliament that the slightest disturbance in Kenya would kill the country's tourist industry.

It is a tribute to the country's stability, so ably championed by Mr. Mboya, that there has been no significant drop in the number overseas visitors to Kenya since his death.

Thousands of mourners were on Rusting Island, the birthplace of Mr. Mboya, when the coffin bearing the body of the assassinated Minister was lowered gently into his grave at the end of last week.

# NEARLY READY FOR THE POPE'S VISIT

With only two weeks to go to the Pope's arrival in Uganda, preparations are now moving fast. The Pope will be especially delighted to see the Ugandan Martyrs' shrine, which the Pope will bless, arrived at the site at Namuganyu near Kampala, after being carried by road from Mombasa.

A party of expert steel erectors are now working to build the framework of the shrine before the Pope visits it.

Pope Paul also named another Ugandan bishop this week — Mr. Edward Bahagire, Bishop of Hoima. With three other Ugandan bishops named earlier this month, and another eight from other parts of Africa, he will be consecrated by the Pope in Kampala on August 1.

Uganda's Foreign Minister, Mr. Sam Okaka, returned from a quick trip to the Vatican with a personal message from the Pope replying to one which President Obote had sent to the Vatican at the weekend.

The United Arab Republic's Minister of National Guidance, Mr. Mohamed Fawky, brought a personal message from President Nasser to President Obote. He had earlier visited Kenya, Tanzania.

The Minister said that the Ugandan Government members on the opposition benches walked out after one member had been suspended for questioning the Speaker's ruling on a point of order. In the absence of the opposition members, Government members debated a motion expressing their concern at what they said was discredited and irresponsibility.

There were calls for the opposition members to be barred from the House on the ground that they had broached their responsibilities.

# Tanzanians get to know their 'Ombudsman'

Hundreds of complaints concerning alleged abuses in Tanzania, ranging from the humorous to the bizarre and notorious, were released to the public this week when the Permanent Commission of Enquiry published its annual report between July 1967 and June 1968.

The report, considered one of the most important documents published annually in Tanzania, was presented to Members of Parliament at the National Assembly in Dar es Salaam. For the first time since the commission's birth in 1966 it holds out high hopes that the general public, at last, beginning to know what the commission is all about.

Sometimes known as the "Nyarera Report" after the commission's chairman, Mr. Nyarera Mang'anya, the report is a 12-month review of the commission's work throughout Tanzania, which is the first country in Africa to have established a smoothly working "Ombudsman" modelled after its European, Australian and Israeli counterparts.

It shows that despite the fact that many Tanzanians still submit meaningless applications to the commission, there was in 1967-68 a growing awareness of the commission's true role and method of operating.

But the report also hits out at some Tanzanians officials who remain suspicious about the commission.

Commenting on the hundreds of cases it had reviewed over the past year — working conditions, land threat, detentions, oppression, corruption and the use of abusive language — the report states clearly that many Tanzanian officials have not yet grasped that the commission was not created to undermine authority but rather to balance the claims of authority and the rights of the individual.

# Fighting hazes along Suez

## SIX MiGs DOWNED

Fighting blazed yesterday on the ground and in the air along the Suez Canal and Israel claimed that at least six Egyptian MiGs had been shot down.

A military spokesman in Tel Aviv said the MiGs were brought down when Egyptian planes tried to strike at Israeli positions in Sinai less than two hours after Israeli planes hit Egyptian military installations in the Suez region.

As the air battle developed, anti-aircraft dual exploded between Egyptian and Israeli land forces along the northern sector of the Canal. Heavy guns, tanks and rockets were being used, according to an Egyptian military spokesman in Cairo.

Israel said the Egyptian forces refused to accept a ceasefire demand that would require the Egyptian military observers on the spot.

A military spokesman said United Nations observers proposed a ceasefire which Israel accepted on condition that "Egyptian forces observe a ceasefire all along the Suez Canal from the Gulf of Suez to the Red Sea."

"The Egyptians continued their aggression," said the spokesman. "The renewed fighting along the Canal came less than 24 hours after President Nasser stated in Cairo that Egyptian forces were now ready and able to strike back at Israel on a large scale."

In the first Israeli comment on President Nasser's speech, Gen. Moshe Dayan, warned yesterday that Egypt might bomb Tel Aviv in any renewal of the Middle East war, but he personally did not think such a renewal imminent.

A military spokesman in Tel Aviv said yesterday's strikes followed a continuous ceasefire violation by the Arab Socialist Union.

In his harsh-tongued speech in Cairo to the Arab Socialist Union, President Nasser said Egypt was ready to go to war to regain the Sinai territory occupied by Israel during the six-day war in June, 1967.

He said the "stage of liberation" had already begun and added: "We are ready for a long battle. The Arab world can never be repaid."

He attacked the United States and thanked the Arab Socialist Union for its continued help in the Sinai. He said the United States was "betraying" the Arab world by its policy in the Middle East.

# Astronauts in isolation after Pacific splashdown

The Apollo-11 Moon explorers splashed down in the Pacific Ocean yesterday, ending the eight-day adventure which took them to the surface of the Moon and back.

Their capsule landed 900 miles south-west of Hawaii about 35 degrees of balance, tilted in the water, but was promptly righted by its flotation coil.

The three astronauts, clad from head to foot in olive-green isolation suits, clambered into life rafts which were promptly righted by its flotation coil.

The spacecraft, from which Neil Armstrong and Col. Edwin Aldrin descended in their lunar module to the Moon's surface on Monday, parachuted from the water on Wednesday and exactly on target at 1649 G.M.T.

President Nixon, who spoke with the white House by radio with Armstrong and Aldrin during their 21-hour stay on the water on Monday, said the splashdown was "a triumph for the American people."

The third member of the crew, Michael Collins, reported that the crew were in excellent condition and told helicopter pilots.

Four rescue helicopters were sent to the site and the astronauts were picked up by the helicopter crew.

The splashdown time was 195 hours, 18 minutes and 21 seconds on Wednesday, last week was the original scheduled time for the splashdown.

The astronauts will be held in quarantine for at least 14 days, until August 11, when doctors will determine whether they have contracted any of the diseases which are known to be carried by the Moon.

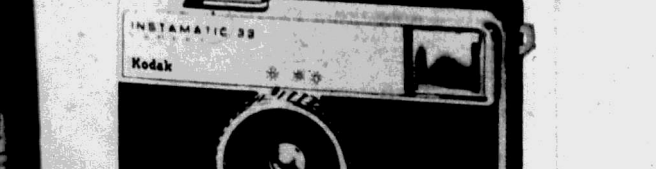

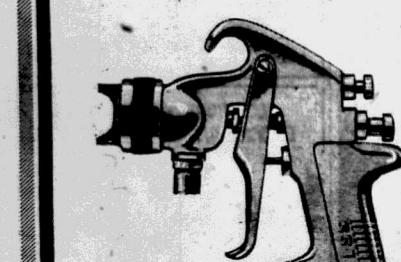

The booklet, illustrated with pictures of some of the more seriously handicapped children, outlined some of the problems facing the home. There was not enough room for all the children to occupy individual beds, they had to sleep two in a bed, one at the top and one at the bottom.

The appeal was accompanied by a film entitled *Heritage*, a documentary produced by the Round Table. The Rotary Club felt that it was pointless spending much-needed funds making a new film when a splendid example illustrating the home was already in existence.

The response to this international effort was very rewarding and the Nairobi South Rotarians, less than 40 in number, were able to put the project out to tender and the work began.

It is, however, work that is far from finished. The building is there but it must be equipped and a new Rotary project now requires further financial support to provide the tables and chairs, cooking and laundry equipment for the hall.

Half the battle waged at the centre is not against sickness or disease, but against rising costs. Wages, food and materials go up in price each year, but the various grants given to the centre are not always able to increase correspondingly.

Until just before independence the centre was maintained entirely by the Kiambu A.D.C. for the welfare of children from that district. Then Oxlam offered to help it expand, as long as the centre would serve the whole country.

The Kiambu Council still provides the centre with its biggest grant. It gives a grant of £5,300 but stipulates that 100 of the beds at the home be available for 100 children from Kiambu. The Nairobi City Council also provides indirect support by its grant to the Kenya Red Cross but this has dwindled because the council's G.E.T. revenues have been cut.

The total annual financial support, if one counts also the help of Good Samaritans who sponsor a child, amounts to about

£8,000 — half the estimated cost of running the home for a year. The remaining £3,000 is begged and borrowed over the year. The Rotarians, and other organisations such as the Round Table, War on Want and Oxlam, also help out in various ways. Dances and raffias, for instance, also bring in much-needed funds.

It is a tough struggle in a country where there are so many charitable organisations in need of support from the public, each one thinking that their's is the most deserving. There is little doubt, either, that all do deserve as much support as we can give.

Few people can leave the School for the Blind at Thika or the clinic for the physically disabled in Bohra Road, Nairobi, without feeling a sense of shame and a desire to help these handicapped boys and girls.

To see the Dagoretti Children's Centre is an equally moving experience and more people should visit the home and find out how they can help these youngsters to help themselves. The centre helps rehabilitate scores of children each year.

The crippled learn to walk with the aid of calipers or crutches. The deaf are taught to lip-read, speak, read and write thanks to a deaf-aid unit provided by the Round Table. Those with nutritional diseases or tuberculosis are treated and cured, where possible.

The centre is run by Sister Eileen Shaw who came to the home four years ago after a tour of duty with the Red Cross in Uganda where she worked on the refugee problem.

Sister Shaw says there is a constant need for old clothes and toys at the home. Contributions of all kinds — whether cash donations or the provision of necessary equipment — are always gratefully received.

Sponsorships of individual children are particularly warranted as the number of sponsors dropped considerably after the devaluation of sterling. It costs about £120 per year to maintain one child at the centre.

The children of the Dagoretti Centre, in common with the hundreds of sick, crippled, orphaned or handicapped children in dozens of homes around the country, can laugh at life when the more fortunate — with their good health and good jobs — are curing the minor problems of day-to-day living.

The smiling faces of the youngsters at Dagoretti, like the happy, brave smiles of the crippled of Joynton or the orphans of Eshvale, can teach us who are fit and healthy to be thankful and to give a little to those whose lives have not been so fortunate.

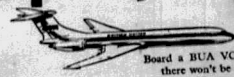

# The things you can do with a plain DC-3

A yellow-and-orange plane has been buzzing around Kenya skies this week, causing considerable interest wherever it has landed. It was not only the bright colours of this DC-3 Dakota that drew attention, however, but the aircraft's engines.

The "Turbo-Three" as the aircraft is called, has been modernised by the installation of turbo-prop, the familiar reciprocating engines having been replaced by Rolls-Royce Dart engines. The conversion was carried out earlier this year by the Conroy Aircraft Corporation in California.

Soon afterwards the president and founder of the company, Mr. "Jack" Conroy, flew the plane across the Atlantic to France where it proved a big success at the Paris Air Show last month.

Mr. Conroy, accompanied by a friend and fellow pilot, Capt. Herman "Fish" Salmon, was joined in Europe by his family and they all went on an extended tour of the Continent in the Dakota.

Mr. Conroy decided that as Africa was "just next door" to Europe, he would fly down to Kenya via the Middle East and Ethiopia. He arrived last weekend and joined up with the family who flew in by scheduled airline.

The trip — the Conroy's first to East Africa — was to give people here a look at the converted Dakota and to use the aircraft for a quick look at Kenya. They say, however, they have had too short a time to do this.

"I shall not have to come back," he told a colleague. "I just like the climate, the scenery and all the

animals. I think 'Fish' and I will be back in January to have a longer look at Kenya and to get a taste of the hunting here."

Mr. Conroy, who founded his company in 1902, is widely known as the developer of the Douglas Guppy and his successors, the Super and Mini Guppy aircraft.

These aircraft have been used to fly large and irregularly cargo and one of them carried the nose module of the Apollo-11 spacecraft from a West Coast factory to the Cape Kennedy launch site.

Capt. Salmon, who retired recently after 20 years as the Lockheed Aircraft Corporation's chief test pilot, is a personal friend of the three American astronauts who made this week's historic moon flight.

All astronauts spend a period as test pilots and "Fish" Salmon, who has an astronomical figure of flying hours behind him, has met most of them during his 29 years with Lockheed.

Whether their mission to Kenya results in East African Airways or the Kenya Police Air Wing converting their Dakotas, no one remains to be seen. The aircraft certainly achieved its purpose in creating interest.

A colleague who flew with the Conroys on their 40-minute flight down to Kiligani Lodge in Tavoy on Tuesday tells me that people wanted to look inside the aircraft wherever it touched down.

It got this treatment at Wilson Airport and at the Kiligani airstrip and when the plane landed at Hombaki to refuel it was immediately besieged by a number of H.O.A.C. pilots who just had to see the cockpit.

# Who has the right of way on Kenyatta Avenue?

Last Saturday evening at 10 I came across an accident on Nairobi's Kenyatta Avenue. There was nothing remarkable about this, except that it was the fourth similar collision in about a year, where I have either seen the impact, or arrived shortly afterwards.

In all cases it was after the point-duty policeman had left. One vehicle (A) was proceeding in the left-hand lane of the central carriageway, and the second (B) was entering from A's right, intending to either cross Kenyatta Avenue completely or to join the same lane as the first vehicle. In some cases there was a line of cars (X) stationary to the right of A and about to turn right, making it difficult for the drivers to see each other.

Examination of the lane markings indicates unbroken white lines across the paths of both vehicles. In the absence of a lane, should a car assume right of way and drive down the road, regardless of whether it is in the left-hand lane, and if source vice versa.

When crossing the Avenue, a driver (A) must slow down and check his left. In my case, I was coming in last. Finally, turning left into the main carriageway was a sharp bend to the right at each intersection. It is essential, just in case Mr. B happens to be crossing my path.

On the subject of road safety, the winner of this year's Indianapolis "500", Mario Andretti (at a record average speed of 150.87 m.p.h. on Firestone tyres), has expressed definite views.

He says young people, among which he still considers himself, like high-speed performance in motor cars, as there is a great thrill in making a finely engineered machine perform as it should, but this should be done only on a properly supervised track rather than the streets or highways. He was not criticizing people who speed away from lights, weave in and out of traffic and drive erratically, and give them a lesson on the dangers of those juvenile policies.

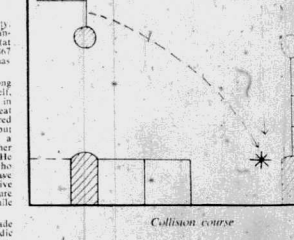
He thinks people should be made aware of the necessity of periodic checking of important components.

such as steering, brakes and tyres, but in addition to this, good driving habits, adherence to traffic regulations and careful handling of a vehicle are essential, which, of course, are only common sense.

He claims that "young" drivers (as age specified) have peak coordination, and are potentially good at handling cars, but often lack of judgment and tend to show off, neither of which please the insurance companies.

He mentions the local drag strips they have in America where people can take their cars and bikes to let off steam. How our motoring organisations, traffic police, or civic bodies thought of starting some sort of drag-strip for all comers, which will cater for "young" drivers. They will not feel no more need to speed and round the bends, and of our best known figures.

The Ministry of Transport has issued a comprehensive booklet, "Traffic Rules". It gives maximum speeds and loadings for motor vehicles, and also details of penalties for offences. There are 20 pages of diagrams illustrating great interest to all motorists.

of the difficulties you have had, I remembered the difficulties which I had to overcome as chairman of the Bavarian Youth-Hostels Association. It is everywhere the same — there are only a few people being really active but many people who give benevolent advice. However, I do not want to belong to those people just giving advice — I want to help you to realise the project.

Trust in Sir Walter Coull, a former Chief Secretary of Kenya and Governor of Uganda. He has written a sympathetic reply, asking for further details and wanting to know how big a part Africans are playing in hostelling in Kenya. Mrs. Thomson has replied that although at the moment more non-Africans are visiting the hotels, the emphasis is changing and that the facilities will be used mostly by Africans in the very near future. She has also pointed out that it is essential to obtain new premises in Nairobi as the present hostel right outside the city (at Kabete) and is not of sufficiently high standard and a proper hostel and headquarters are needed in the city centre.

Things are snowballing so much now that Mrs. Thomson has written to the president of the International Youth Hostel Federation, Dr. Anton Grass, in Germany, asking that it send out an international adviser to Kenya to help with and co-ordinate its activities.

In addition the K.Y.H.A. has decided to send a representative to the movement's annual international conference to be held in Europe early next year. He will be a young African, George Omonyi, a keen hosteller and a former head boy of Jamhuri School, Nairobi. At the same time will last two-month course in school to enable him to be trained in the administration of youth hostels. This training will be paid for by Unesco.

There are now some 4,000 youth hostels in the 46 countries in which the movement has spread. In nearly all these hostelling is expanding rapidly. The K.Y.H.A. committee members feel that hostelling in Kenya

has been waiting for too long but that they are about to make the break-through and that in time they will have a chain of hostels throughout the country in which local youngsters and visitors from overseas can meet and get to know each other, while seeing the many attractions that Kenya has to offer.

The annual report of the International Youth Hostel Federation makes an interesting comment on the hostels in Kenya. It says: "As the hostels are rather small and the facilities limited, we find a unique pattern of life emerging. Out of their necessity various people have to come together and really begin to know each other. One day no less than seven different nationalities were served to be cooking one meal in the same pot at the Nairobi hostel."

## THE EARLY DAYS OF YOUTH HOSTELS

As usual with most successful enterprises the Youth Hostel movement began in a very small way. In 1885 Guido Ritter, an Austrian industrialist, established the first students' and scholars' hostel at Hohenheim in Bohemia.

This was followed by a limited number of hostels in Austria and Germany. They were open to male students of secondary schools and the university. This meant that the means of introducing young people to the beauty of the countryside was restricted to a small class of people.

In 1901 Karl Fischer, a senior pupil at the Steglitz Secondary School in Berlin, founded a movement which was to have far-reaching effects. The Wandervogel, or "birds of passage," were groups of students and other people who set out from the cities to study nature in adventurous and often travels in mountain areas that had been neglected.

One of the young leaders who took his class on mountain walks was Richard Schirrmann (1874-1961). He was so hampered by the lack of accommodation in the mountain areas that he conceived the idea of the Youth Hostel. He can be said to be the founder of the movement as it is known today.

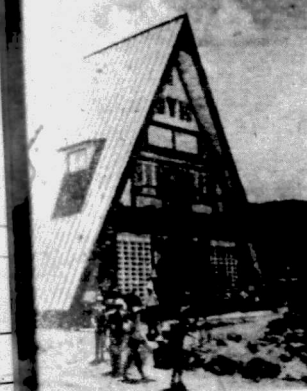
The young travellers soon established a free comradeship between the sexes and rediscovered the old folk songs of the countryside. They found their night's lodging in barns or in the open air. With the issue in 1906 of Breuer's *Zugführerhand* a full collection of their songs, the *Wandervogel* reached the maturity of a widespread youth movement. But as its numbers increased its strength purpose and basic ideals were lost, but destroyed by the coming of the First World War.

Several years after the end of the war the movement began to spread outside Germany. In 1925 a Swiss Youth Hostel organisation was founded, covering the German-speaking areas at first but eventually covering the whole of Europe.

In 1927 the Polish department charged with the development of hostels for school parties by 1930 many other European countries had hostel movements under way. These included Denmark, the Netherlands, Britain, France and Norway.

In every case the initial impetus came from people who had visited hostels in Germany and had returned to their own countries with glowing reports. The rise of National Socialism in Germany and the Second World War meant, for the Germans, the erosion of the original concept. Membership of the movement acquired a military tone even before the actual start of the war.

Following the war there came the period of reconstruction and now, in the sixties, the movement is known throughout the world and even young people from the Iron Curtain countries are making trips to hostels in the West.

Mr. MATHEWS sporting magazine, *Field and Stream*.

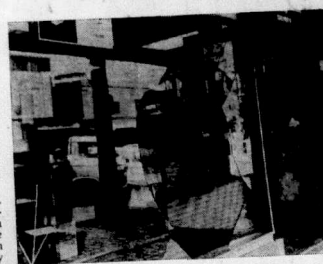

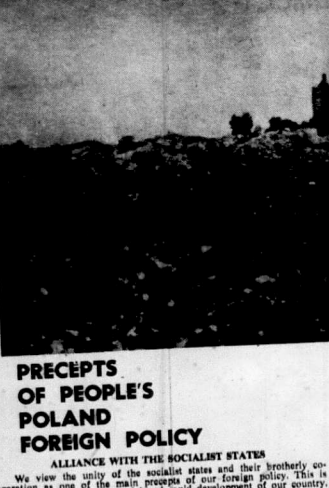

## POLAND'S FOREIGN POLICY IS GUIDED BY THREE MAIN PRECEPTS:

- Unity, friendship and brotherly co-operation in the relations with the socialist countries;
- solidarity and assistance in the relations with the newly liberated states and people's struggling for consolidation of their sovereignty and social progress;
- peaceful co-existence in the relations with states of different socio-economic systems.

### PEACEFUL CO-EXISTENCE

The third basic precept of Polish foreign policy is the peaceful co-existence in relations with states of different socio-economic systems. Peaceful co-existence means the assumption of a possibility and need to solve all international conflict situations through negotiations, on the basis of equal rights and mutual benefit. The Polish people with complete and active support of the whole nation, the Polish people are deeply convinced in their conviction on the need for active participation in the struggle for peace.

Poland is one of the 51 original founder members of the United Nations Organisation. In signing the U.N. Charter the Polish Government stated that it "fully recognises the system of collective security provided for in the U.N. Charter and it is willing, as well as its abilities will permit, to cooperate with other members of that organisation to preserve world peace and reconstruct the well-being and welfare of nations."

This declaration was also scrupulously realised by the Polish People's Republic over the whole quarter of a century. Our country's peace and reconstruction in the international arena for peace and security.

Poland was particularly active in the field of disarmament. In October, 1957, Poland presented the United Nations with a plan for the establishment of a nuclear-free zone, and at the 15th Session of the General Assembly the fact that our proposals were not adopted the arms race. Despite the fact that our proposals were not adopted they contributed to an enrichment of contemporary political thinking, and provided the impetus for, or lay at base of, numerous disarmament steps, such as the Resolution that Africa and the Antarctic are nuclear-free zones, etc.

Poland does not treat its participation in international organisations as a formality. Its participation in those organisations marked by activities. It takes an active part in the work of E.C.O.S.O.C., the Disarmament Committee of the Eighteen, the International Atomic Energy Agency, the U.N. Conference on Trade and Development, the Inter-Agency, the U.N. Conference on Health, the U.N. Economic and Social Council, the World Health Organisation, the Food and Agricultural Organisation.

Poland is a member of 11 out of 15 U.N. specialised agencies, and its representatives hold high posts in these agencies. At present

Poland is a member of no less than 41 intergovernmental organisations. Among these we are particularly interested in mass democratic organisations, such as the World Federation of Trade Unions, the Democratic World Federation of Women, the World Peace Council, the International Student Union and the World Peace Council. Polish socialist organisations, the peace movement, were active in establishing these organisations and take an active part in their work. Representatives of the Youth Organisation of the Polish People's Republic participate in the work of that organisation which associates parliamentarians of many countries and works for consolidating peace and international co-operation.

An important step in Polish foreign policy is held by the problem of establishing an effective system of security in Europe, following the assumption that it is based on the power relationships which were shaped as the result of World War II.

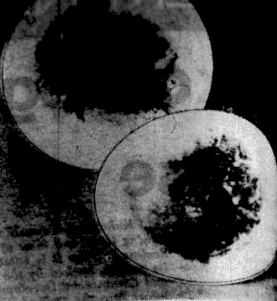

It was pleasant to see a glimmer of sunshine after the dull weather in Nairobi, and we sat outside for our tea watching several species of game in the distance. To the right of the main building we could see the swimming pool in which several visitors were relaxing after a day's game viewing.

Tourists, I thought as I listened to a group not far from us, are strange animals indeed.

"Well, I got me a couple of Masai people," one bush-jacketed fellow announced with pride, "and what do you think I had written on my hat here on — Made in Sheffield." His American pals laughed heartily at that one.

A busman woman at the same table jumped up at the sight of a

head-decorated Masai who had been hanging around the lodge in hope of earning money.

"Right, Jack! take a picture of that fellow," she instructed as she put a large arm round the misadventured youth's shoulders.

"Don't get those buildings in the background now will you?" she warned as she shifted her position to look as though she had just found a real live Masai out in the African bush. The boy accepted her generous tip without comment and passed on to find other picture seekers.

All Saturday was spent game viewing in the Mara. The game reserves cover about 700 square miles and is situated in the south-west of Kenya close to the Tanzania border on the northern boundary of the Serengeti National Park.

*Spring Chicken in five herbs*  
*Baked Peach Custard*

**Mexican Avocado Appetizer:** 2 ripe avocado pears, 1 clove garlic, 2 tomatoes, peeled, seeded and coarsely chopped. 1 Spanish onion, finely chopped, 1 tablespoon coriander (cilantro) leaves, finely chopped, 2 tablespoons olive oil, juice of one lemon, salt and pepper.

Put and mash avocados lightly with wooden spoon. Add all the ingredients and stir well. Serve with hot crusty wedges of toast.

**Spring Chicken in five herbs:** 2 spring chickens, 250g butter, lemon juice, 1 pint spring water, 1 tablespoon each of parsley, dill and mint, pepper, salt and paprika powder.

Heat a sauce pan, drop in herb stalks with pared, rinsed and halved chicken, and one egg, and simmer. Cook for about 30 minutes over moderate heat, shaking from time to time to prevent sticking.

Strain the liquid into a bowl and arrange in a fireproof dish. Strain the chicken into a pan and thicken with a little roux made from a teaspoon of flour and fat.

Bring to the boil and let it simmer. Sprinkle the surface of the chicken with lemon juice, salt and 1 little sugar, together with a dusting of black pepper and paprika. Spoon or brush over a little melted butter or olive oil, and place under the grill until the surface becomes crisp and brown.

Serve chickens on dish surrounded by rice, garnish with watercress or parsley. Spoon a little of the sauce over the chicken and the rest in a sauce boat. Serve with green salad.

**Baked Peach Custard:** 1 cup peaches (small tin), 2 eggs, 2oz sugar, 1pt milk, 1 carton whipping cream, 1 tin peach slices for decoration.

Put peaches in the goblet of the Kenwood Chef food mixer and puree. Place in a Pyrex pie dish. Beat the eggs with the sugar and the milk. Strain over the puree. Stand the pie dish in a baking sheet with water and bake for about 1 hour at 200 degrees F. Cool to room temperature and then chill in refrigerator.

Cover the cream and decorate with peach slices.

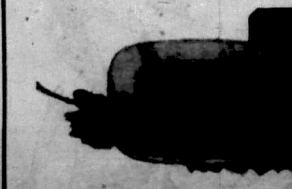

# Wilken's £376,000 sales record

A walk around the hangars of Wilken Aviation Ltd., at Wilson Airport, Nairobi, leaves nobody in any doubt that aviation and the supply of aircraft in East Africa is big business.

Even more impressive is the growth rate of the company and its associates since Wilken Air Services was formed in March, 1960. For example, the sales record for 1966 shows receipts of more than £205,000, for 1967 the figure went up to more than £335,000, in 1968 it dropped to £282,000 but then this last financial year it has soared to more than £376,000.

To back up such sales an efficient and large maintenance system has to exist and Wilken Aviation carries stocks of spares worth at least £100,000.

When an aircraft arrives for repair or routine servicing it is put in the hands of qualified engineers who, with the backing of a large number of trainees and assistants, can handle any defect.

Special workshops handle Lycoming engine and Hartzell propeller work and the approved engine overhaul shop includes sections dealing with propellers, carburetors and ignition systems, electrical—in fact every Piper aircraft item except instruments.

A subsidiary of Wilken Ltd., Wilken Telecommunications Ltd., handles aircraft radio sales, installation and maintenance.

This is a far cry indeed from the days in 1960 when the first company had two Triacers and one Comanche and one hangar.

Today the flying school alone has six aircraft and seven instructors completing more than 500 flying

hours' instruction each month. Pupils are taught up to commercial licence standard under the watchful eye of Capt. Ken Rawlin, Bruce Cole and Neville Chertinton.

The year 1961 could probably be said to be the time when Wilken Aviation began to take on its present shape. Then a Piper Dealership was obtained. It was three years later that a full distributorship was granted for Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, Rwanda, Burundi, Ethiopia and the Sudan.

With charter work growing quickly it was decided in 1966 to split Wilken Air Services into Wilken Aviation and Wilkenair, the latter becoming a new company.

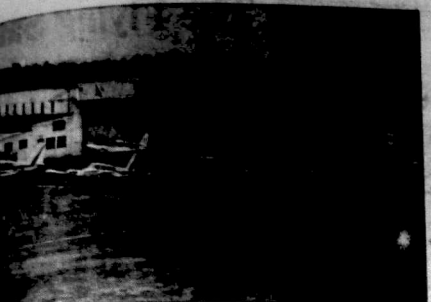
Wilkenair Ltd. has the Kenya Tourist Development Corporation as a shareholder along with United Transport Overseas, Liondard Travel of New York and Wilken Aviation.

The Piper range of aircraft covers a full range of single-engine aircraft up to the medium-size twin and the executive-style Navajo, which is the pride of the Wilken stable.

Popularity of the Navajo with business people booking charters from Kenya to Zambia and other countries neighbouring East Africa has been increasing steadily since the first of this type was brought to Nairobi.

"I looked under my seat but there was no gold. It was too much money for me to worry too much but still I was no very happy. Fortunately in a few minutes a message came through that Mbeya had forgotten to put the box under my seat."

In those days, without any navigational aids and nothing in the way of sophisticated equipment, Mrs. Wilson and her pilot, Capt. Mostert, had to rely on simple navigation. One of their longest hops was between Entebbe and Stanleyville, a distance of 310 miles over jungle, with no air strips and little prospect of aid if they crashed.

Capt. Mostert was full of praise for Shell after their flight. At the whole of East Africa."

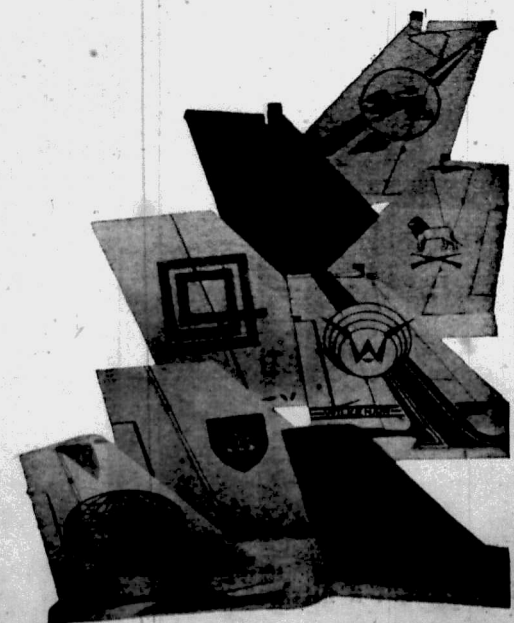

# Shell leads the way in East Africa

Aviation in East Africa, and indeed throughout the African continent, would not have developed so quickly and efficiently if it had not been for the services provided by the Shell Company.

## New group with wide experience

One of the newest groupings on Wilson Airport is that of Airspray Ltd. and Aviation Maintenance (E.A.) Ltd.

Airspray is, of course, a name which is synonymous with crop spraying in East Africa and Alex Noon, the firm's managing director, is a man who has had a long experience with aviation in East Africa.

Towards the end of last year, Alex Noon, John Falconer-Taylor and Alan Hard got together and decided to form a company for the jointing and repair of aircraft. From this beginning, the company has grown and now has a staff of 150 men and expert agricultural services.

John Falconer-Taylor is no stranger in Kenya flying and his company, Kenya Air Charters, at present has three aircraft at its disposal, a Cessna 401, Cessna 300 and a Cessna 302. It is hoped by September that the firm, which has an application before the Civil Aviation Board for increased seats, will have two more aircraft, namely a Cessna 182 and a five-passenger twin.

On the maintenance side, Alan Hard has gathered together a group of seven fully licensed engineers, three of whom are also commercial pilots. They work for Aviation Maintenance but are available to the partner firm.

The maintenance company has three first-class fabric workers and specialists in fabric-covered aircraft such as Parnaves and Super Cub, apart from looking after the crop-spraying aircraft owned by Airspray and those of Kenya Air Charters and a large number of private owners who have brought in work.

Alan Hard was born in Kenya and is a former Prince of Wales pupil. He learned to fly at the Aero Club of East Africa and apart from some time in Australia as a charter pilot, instructor and engineer and with Coppersell Air Services in Zambia on maintenance has been in Nairobi all his working life.

Airspray is too well known in Africa to have too much said again about its work. But one man who works for the firm and who has never had much of the limelight popped up the other day.

David Tiso, chief merchandise of the firm, began with Noon and Pearce away back in 1949 as an assistant storekeeper and is still with Alex Noon today. # Story of progress which has put E.A.A. on the map

Twenty-six years ago when the world was still at war and the Commonwealth heavily engaged in many spheres, a committee set down in East Africa to decide the future of civil aviation when the war was over.

Wilson Airways, East Africa's first airline, was founded but it was realised that air travel would be vital over the vast areas of East Africa.

The committee had little doubt that to succeed a policy of advance was necessary — at a pace probably faster than was anticipated under a colonial administration.

They said: "It is apparent both from general experience and the estimates... that no air transport undertaking in East Africa can expect to be remunerative. It is, in fact, bound to require outside subsidies from the East African Government to bring the pay return expended under a colonial administration.

The committee attached importance to the "most important" between B.O.A.C. and the local operators... the most important... the most important...

Two schemes were suggested by the committee... the most important... the most important...

Annual expenditure was estimated at £150,000 for the first scheme... the most important... the most important...

The estimated deficit was based on an annual mileage of 900,000... the most important... the most important...

The committee "had no hesitation in recommending that the governments agree to the subsidies... the most important... the most important...

The four governments agreed in 1945 to found the Corporation... the most important... the most important...

East African Airways formally started in business at Eastleigh... the most important... the most important...

East African Airways faced a host of complex problems in the early years... the most important... the most important...

But, with the assistance of several experienced personnel from B.O.A.C., the six planes

Sir Melville Sorbie, who had joined E.A.A. as general manager in 1947, wrote in his annual report of the need for suitable replacement aircraft but cautioned that with aircraft prices soaring, services outside East Africa would have to be operated to justify expenditure. The era of expansion was beginning.

During 1967 the capital available to the Corporation was increased from £300,000 to £221,000. Kenya paid £150,000, Uganda £50,000, Tanganyika £20,000 and Zambia £15,000. Overseas facilities for £230,000 were guaranteed by Tanganyika and Uganda.

The Corporation was able to meet its commitments and made 36 central Passengers rose from 26,898 to 36,132 and revenue to £473,144.

The bigger Lodestars and newly acquired Dakotas proved successful operations from Eastleigh were closed in May of that year and Nairobi West became the base. The Corporation was fortunate in purchasing equipment at B.O.A.C.'s Cairo prices when it was dismantled.

By now, East African Airways was carrying more passengers on international routes than any other airline in Africa except British Airways.

But the airport facilities throughout East Africa, with the possible exception of Entebbe and Zanzibar, were inadequate for traffic loads, but to build a new airport in Nairobi was out of the question at the time. The cost was estimated at around £1,000,000.

In 1950 passenger load increased revenue was up by nearly £200,000. There was a loss, due to rising costs of £15,647. The Mecon pilgrim flights began and services were run to the South. The Corporation had 14 Lodestars, three Dakotas, five Dominions and three Doves.

There was a deficit of £7,612 in 1951. The fleet had changed and later in the year the Lodestars were sold and six more Dakotas bought at bargain prices from the British Air Ministry.

Towards the end of 1952 E.A.A. were engaged for a large number of charters for the film *Mogambo* starring Clark Gable, Ava Gardner and Grace Kelly. The main location was at Kagera, North-West Tanganyika, the only being that there was no airport.

Capt. P. A. Travers flew to Bakoba in a Catalina flying boat, swam ashore and a landing strip was made ready in six days. The perennial Archie Watkins, then chief engineer, was asked to fly a job to blow Grace Kelly into the arms of Clark Gable. He rigged up six "un-expected Cyclone

engines and flew them both into the river. The airport problem was still acute. E.A.A. and B.O.A.C. were bypassing Nairobi with their aircraft, owing to the inadequacy of the runways. The annual report commented: "It is inevitable that Nairobi will disappear from the trunk airline routes of the world."

The next few years were of considerable success with moves being made towards an international route but difficult arising over the delivery of aircraft. The Argentinians who were to be bought from B.O.A.C. were delayed.

Eastleigh was handling more than 100,000 passengers in 1956 under great strain. The runway, a wet streak of mud during the rains, was described as "an approach to Kenya" by one local newspaper. Many larger aircraft had direct routes because of the state of the runway.

In early 1957 the first Canadian arrived at Eastleigh and went into inter-territorial use. "Fly there from Nairobi," said the slogan. E.A.A. from September when the airline's own crew took over to United Kingdom run and that to India and Pakistan.

The Corporation was moving ahead. During 1958 a Britannia arrived in East Africa and at the end of the year two Comet 4s had been ordered. B.O.A.C. made a purchase of the Comet 4s (about £100,000) and made a loan of £100,000.

Probably an item equally as important as the Comet order in 1958 was the purchase of Embankment Airport. The move from Eastleigh to Eastleigh West was made smoothly and E.A.A. had found a permanent home at last.

The airline continued to show a profit, if only small, despite the heavy subsidy payments from the governments for unprofitable services had not been paid for four years.

So, in September, 1960, E.A.A. became the first Commonwealth airline outside Britain to buy the Comet 4 and the airline was in the air.

The crews for the Comets spent several weeks in training at the B.O.A.C. Training Centre, Fyling with B.O.A.C. planes and then on the E.A.A. Comets at Shannon, Ireland. On September 17 the first scheduled flight left London for East Africa.

The year was a record one in more ways than one with the operating profit of £460,683 representing ten per cent of the total turnover. A major objective was met in 1961 for the purchase of three Fokker Friendship to replace the Canadian.

Lack of adequate capital was a problem and because of this it became necessary for earnings to be committed to fleet replacement, an item becoming more and more important as the corporation grew.

Further finance was guaranteed by the East African Governments in 1961 for the purchase of three Fokker Friendships to replace the Canadian.

Operating through subsidiaries Wilkenair (Mombasa) Ltd., Wilkenair (Malindi) Ltd., Wilkenair (Nanyuki) Ltd., and of course the main headquarters at Wilson Airport, Nairobi, more than 30 aircraft are available for charter work.

A wider choice would be nearly impossible to find, ranging from the single Comanche through the medium-size twins to the elegant and powerful Navajo. Twenty pilots with full experience of East Africa and flying conditions likely to be encountered are employed at the four bases.

Largest shareholders in Wilkenair are now the Kenya Tourist Development Corporation, who saw Wilkenair as a natural addition to tourism promotion.

Some of East Africa's beauty spots are places of interest are nearly impossible to get to other than by air and in this respect Wilkenair's reach serves to Lamu is a fine example.

Earlier this year I paid a day visit with Wilkenair from their Malindi base to the island in the company of three overseas tourists. The year 1962 brought the third Comet and the Prinsesskone, more crew and staff and a crop of problems, as services to the United Kingdom, India and Pakistan were increased. Traffic revenue rose to nearly £6,000,000 and the profit was £312,000.

E.A.A. went ahead strongly and at the end of 1963 would report a record profit of £461,071, despite the ending of the quadrilateral between the Comets, B.O.A.C., Central African Airways and South African Airways due to the political situation in South Africa. A new pooling agreement was signed between B.O.A.C. and E.A.A.

The management was fully aware, though, of the continued need for finance, and commented that the profit would not pay for a fifth of the cost of one of the big jets needed in a short time to replace the Comets.

To receive competitive airfare was faced with the prospect of buying even bigger aircraft, by the end of 1964 the estimate had risen to £11,000,000.

A technical committee was appointed to investigate suitable aircraft and three were named, the DC8 Jet Trader, the Super VC10 and the Boeing 747.

In May of 1965 E.A.A. signed an agreement to buy three Super VC10s and two Boeing 747s for a total cost of £11,000,000. The VC10 was chosen for its performance on this route and its design, the latter being the committee's choice for its future development.

The decision to buy any large aircraft was one which required courage and confidence, but the board of E.A.A. was fully aware that the international services of the airline were the pre-eminence in 1964 the international services accounted for 78.2 per cent of total traffic revenue, with a profit of £678,000, and the internal flights 20.8 per cent with a loss of £368,000.

In other words, with B.O.A.C. and B.U.A. operating VC10s into the territories, E.A.A. had to introduce an aircraft with the appeal to passengers that the Comet, however worthy, no longer had.

In 1965 the final payment was made on the Comet and an extensive programme of preparation for the Super VC10s was begun. On February 26, 1965, E.A.A.'s two-millionth passenger was carried. It was 14 years before the millionth passenger was carried, but only five years more to reach the new figure. A state of progress indeed.

The story of the corporation is one of continuous growth and success and one of which the 1967 committee could be justly proud.

The future picture must be one of further advance. It must also be one of even greater expense. The advent of the jumbo-jet and the supersonic Concorde will mean another enormous step forward in air travel.

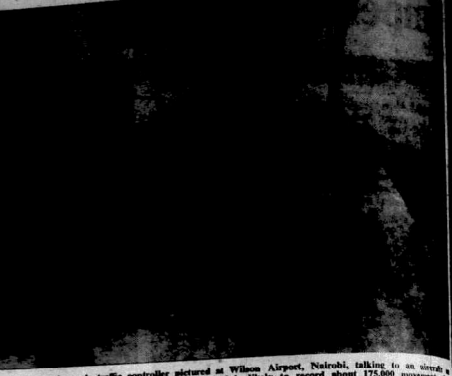

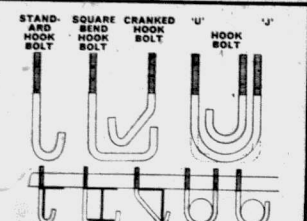
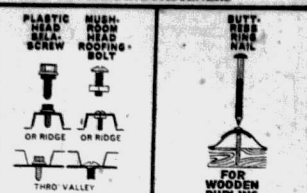

Eight years which prepared the Martyrs for death

Eight years after the introduction of Christianity to Uganda people there were prepared to die for it. This is one of the points emphasized in this modestly priced but excellently written book, which is well packed with incidents with the pilgrimage of the Pope.

A HAMLET IN THE AFRICAN STYLE

RETURN TO THE SHADOWS by Robert Serumaga. Heinemann; hardback 25s. Soon available in paperback in the African Writers' Series.

Robert Serumaga, an actor and playwright at the Uganda National Theatre, takes as the theme for his first novel the story of Uganda's political upheavals of a few years ago. His book is set in an East African country called Adagwa (try spelling it backwards) where military coups and civil violence are the order of the day.

His central character, Joe Musali, is a disillusioned political lawyer. At the book's start he is running away from his home town to join his mother in the country. He justifies his action in this way: "One's duty is to seek a little comfort, but not be sacrificed on the altar of idealism."

But the journey proves fruitless. First his car is stolen. Then he is nearly killed by a platoon of soldiers. Eventually, when he reaches his mother's home he finds that she has been raped and the children in her care murdered. Joe decides to return to his home town to combat the corrupt and violent system in power.

The story, then, is largely concerned with Joe's soul-searching as he ponders what, if anything, he can do about the situation. He swings from flight to action, from disillusion to disillusion to a crazy kind of courage. Not that this will achieve anything very much, except possibly a return of his own self-respect; for all that is left for him to do is to take up guerrilla

warfare secretly after dusk. The temptations of a comfortable (and probably corrupt) life are always there, beckoning from the shadows.

The hero of this very well-written book is, in fact, a brooding Hamlet. His problem is whether or not to take up arms against a sea of troubles, and by opposing to oppose them. The book is primarily a description of a psychological state and the role in society of the educated African who does not have political power.

This is a powerful and thought-provoking book. It is also exceptionally readable, written as it is by a playwright who knows how to extract the maximum in drama from his fictional situations. I did wonder, though, if he had not exaggerated the horrors of Uganda during its civil disturbances.

Uganda during its civil disturbances and how much of the book was intended as fact, and how much fiction. Perhaps the novel should be regarded not as history, but as a kind of prophetic warning. In Biafra, this seems highly probable. But the book does have a certain graphic reminiscence and violent action. Some of the conversations between Joe and his servant are much too high-brow to seem real.

Uganda's political coups, surely it is already out of date. The publishers and author evidently think not, for Robert Serumaga has been signing copies of his novel in Kampala throughout this week.

Mr. Serumaga is a post-graduate student at Makerere University College and the son of a noted historian, Mr. Michael Naimbe. His book is strongly recommended to all those who want to know more about the great chapter in Uganda's history which the novel brings the Pope to Nampagar to bless the martyrs' shrine.

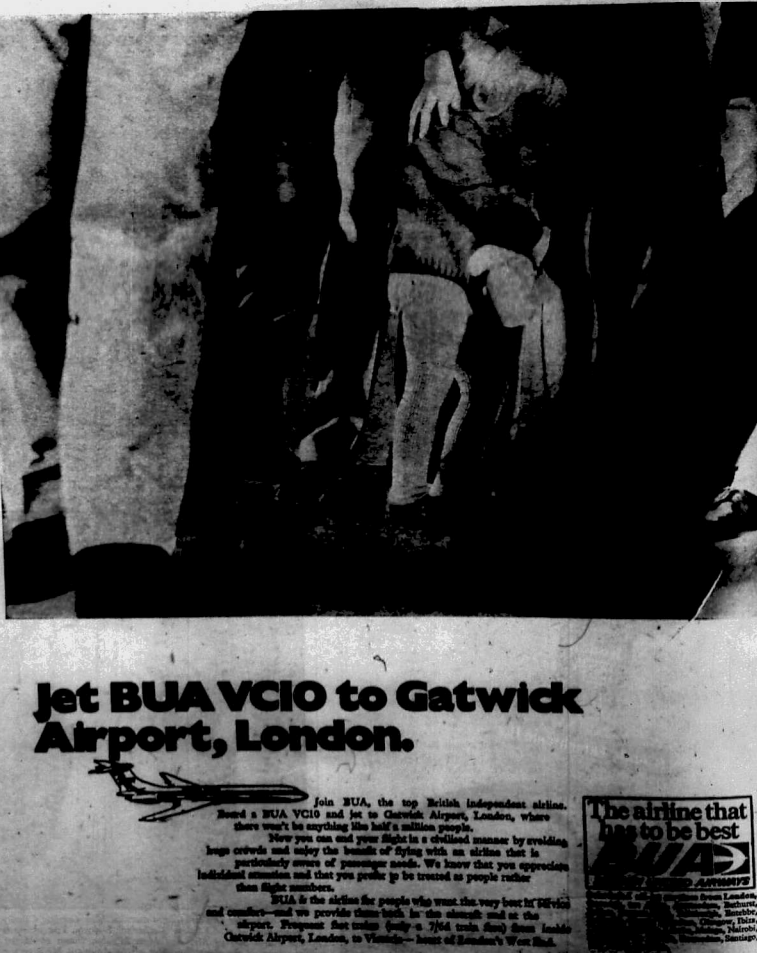

THE SMILING GENERAL

By G. O. Rooder. Price U.S. \$5.00.

The second part reviews Soekarno's early life, and the third pinpoints some of the problems which have arisen in his troubled country.
