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ETHIOPIA TO TRAIN KENYA FORCES

Joint pledge to end border killings

The Ethiopian Government has agreed to make training facilities available to Kenya's armed forces, the Prime Minister, Mr. Kenyatta, told a massed gathering of M.P.s, Senators and members of the diplomatic corps in the House of Representatives yesterday.

At the Imperial Majesty, Emperor Haile Selassie I of Ethiopia, and Mr. Kenyatta say it had been agreed that there would be co-operation between the two Governments to end the killing people who live on their frontiers. [Full text of the Emperor's speech on Page 6.]

Mr. Kenyatta said that a different treaty, which provided for the two countries to give each other help, had already been signed; "We have agreed that every effort must be made to control border raiding and to have an atmosphere of security to me and my people," Mr. Kenyatta said.

Territorial expansion denounced

"Very innocent lives have been lost. Both Governments of Ethiopia and Kenya will do all that is within their power to end this killing," he declared. "We have tried to persuade the inhabitants of the frontier areas to live in peace with their neighbors." He denounced "those possessors with unfeeling hearts."

The occasion was a great one, said Mr. Kenyatta. The Emperor was the first Head of State to visit Kenya since independence. "Kenya and Ethiopia are two countries who have a common boundary, our economies are primarily agricultural and pastoral; we need to improve the basic living standards of our people."

"Above all, we must root out corruption, crime and illiteracy," he said.

With Mr. MacDonald and Mr. Kenyatta, the Emperor had a long conference, and had been greeted by a large delegation from both the civil service and the armed forces.

Afterwards, the Emperor had a short walk around Nairobi and the "wonderful country" he had understood with such admiration.

On his arrival at Parliament Buildings, the Emperor, the Prime Minister, Mr. Kenyatta, and other members of the Kenyan Cabinet, Commander of the Kenya Army, General Sir John Hinde, and Mr. Macdonald.

These problems could only be solved by hard and patient toil, by the use of the best available resources and by mutual cooperation between the two countries.

After the meeting, the Emperor returned to his own residence, the Royal Palace, where he was entertained by the Prime Minister, followed by a dinner at the Hotel Eldorado.

From the Palace, the Emperor was driven by Mr. Macdonald and the Prime Minister to the Chamber.

The Chamber was packed almost to capacity, and the Emperor was received in addition to its usual occupants, by the Speaker, Mr. J. G. M. Githae, and the members of the diplomatic corps were present.

The official ceremony was followed by a reception in the hall of Parliament Buildings.

Afterwards, the Emperor and Mr. Macdonald paid a courtesy call on the Prime Minister, Mr. Kenyatta, and the Emperor was invited to have tea with him in a vacant room.

The right in the Court was given to the Emperor, and the Prime Minister and other members of the Cabinet sat on the left.

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

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
