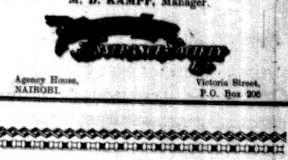

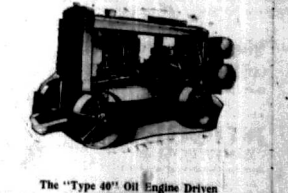

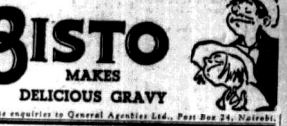

An Innovation in Dairy Practice

LOWER CAPITAL COSTS

A SURVEY OF PRACTICAL RESULTS

(By James Macintosh of the National Institute for Research in Dairying in the Journal of the Royal Agricultural Society of England.)

During the last fifty years there has been a marked increase in the number of farms taking up the practice of milk production. The systems of management and housing adopted on the majority of these farms have been those which were followed on other milk producing farms in the respective districts, and it was only in rare instances that any really new development was introduced. During the last ten years, however, a new system of open air management has been devised and put into practice in a number of counties. The inauguration of this system is mainly due to Mr. A. J. Baker of Westmorland in England, and his methods have been described in several publications. Farmers in other countries have taken up the system. Dairy and Member of the Agricultural Research Institute at Oxford, have made a survey of these farms and published a report on their findings. Records were obtained from 96 farms distributed over 17 counties, and details are given on numerous points of practical interest to those following this system.

The method used in the survey was predominantly of Shortland type and almost half the 96 other farms were of Irish origin, but there were also several farms of Ayrshire and a few of (Normandy, Friesian and other breeds. Half of the farms could be divided into two groups according to the owners method of shifting cows out of the system. The group comprised the bail system in the selection of down-crawlers after one, two or three lactations, and in other groups the cows were kept until they were at full udder as in milkers. In the first group the herd was most frequently reared by the producer, and in the second group by the contractor or boarder. In respect of health there was a general opinion that the bail herd had higher health standards than those of



herds, but in this connection it is necessary to remember that ailments in the early stages of the lactation are likely to be detected by the bail system. The need for an interested and conscientious owner is at least as great under bail as under ordinary conditions. Particulars of the average milk yields were obtained from 18 herds; for 10 herds replenished by purchase of heifers, the average yield is given as 429 gallons, and for 8 herds replenished mainly by home-bred heifers it is 403 gallons. These averages must be taken with a grain of salt, as the method by which they were obtained was not uniform. The total quantity of milk produced by each herd in a year is given in the report, and it may be seen that where the system has been adopted in order to avoid carrying them through dry periods, the yield average is higher than on the other method. WORMS IN PIGS

The damage caused by parasites to the pig industry cannot be gauged exactly, but it must amount to a considerable sum every year. 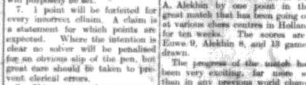

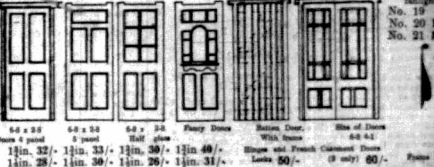

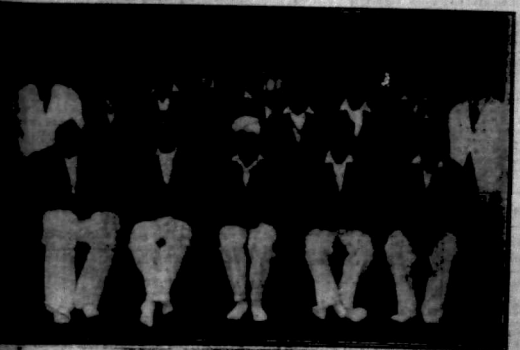

INTERIM REPORT BY THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Scheme for Short Term Needs

MACHINERY TO DEAL WITH DEBTORS' DIFFICULTIES ON VOLUNTARY BASIS

The Committee appointed by the Government of Kenya in September to report upon the possibility of lightening the burden of agricultural indebtedness has issued an interim report the purpose of which is to emphasize the urgent need for the early introduction of a scheme of short term credit.

The Committee recommends that from the proposed £500,000 addition to the Land Bank capital, £200,000 should be earmarked to provide this short term assistance to farmers and planters who apply for it.

Details of the machinery for dealing with these applications are given and include the establishment of local committees and a Central Conciliation Board.

A note of dissent is added to the report by Mr. J. Northington, who feels that a voluntary scheme is inadequate and that full powers should be given to the Conciliation Board to make a settlement, as is the case in New Zealand from where most of the ideas have been taken.

Long Term Problem Postponed

The Kenya Government laid stress on the importance to be attached to the table of Legislative Orders of an economically sound basis on Tuesday afternoon in the House of Representatives. The Committee on Agriculture, which was set up on October 27 to explore the possibilities of lightening the burden of agricultural indebtedness, has issued its interim report. The Attorney-General (Chancellor) and the Treasurer, and four unofficial Members, Messrs. W. Evans, J. Northington, J. C. Muriuki, and C. Hunter, with Mr. T. E. Haskley, Assistant Secretary of the Land Bank as Secretary, were present.

The Committee was of the opinion that the danger of deserting farmers having mortgages and stock sold up by irresponsible creditors and the Committee, therefore, urged the enactment of legislation to protect such livestock and instruments of husbandry as may be necessary to enable a farmer to crop his landlock up to a value of £500, and agricultural produce up to a value of £250. This legislation was passed last night on November 29.

The Bond Scheme

The Committee examined at length a proposal to allow farmers to hypothecate mortgages debt but consider they cannot express an opinion on it at present. The scheme "which to the best of the Committee's knowledge is not dependent, without an assurance that such scheme or modification thereof would meet with the approval of the Secretary of State." The report recommends that the draft proposal for a loan issue be submitted to the Secretary of State for examination by a financial expert, and if the scheme is considered feasible or possible we shall then make a recommendation for its particular application to the Kenya Colony." Since the report was presented to the Committee a detailed statement from the Secretary, Colonel Vignoles, giving a full account of the various objections and the amendments will accompany the report.

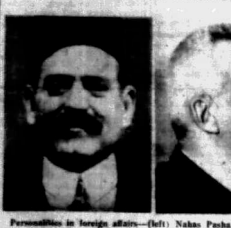

THE CEREAL MARKET

Heavier Consumption of Maize

The following is the weekly cereal market report, dated January 8, issued by the Kenya Farmers' Association (Kenya) Ltd.:-

Maize

Continued progress is being made by the Argentine in having an effective export office on the market and from there about a tendency to rise, showing conditions in the Argentine have been ideal up to the present and the new crop maintains excellent profits. However, there is some opposition of barley and rye, on the Continent, having an influence on the market. Demand remains in excess of supply on the market in very large quantities.

The price of maize throughout the world is undoubtedly increasing on account of the low price. World shipments during the week have amounted to over 1,000,000 quarters, as compared with 600,000 quarters for the corresponding period last year. This year's lowest consumption is a promising sign as it will mean that the heavy crop in Italy will be absorbed more rapidly than was previously expected, and the future position gives indication of a better price.

The latest figures of the South African Government estimates show that there are 2,000,000 bush for last year's crop that were previously estimated. Parts of South Africa have suffered from drought, however, certain of the maize districts have had further good rains and that has improved the position materially.

MEASURING INTENSITY OF LIGHT

Austria Scientists in Kenya

PLANT LIFE RESEARCH

Measuring the intensity of light (by means of a newly-invented scientific instrument) and observing its effect upon plant life, is the absorbingly interesting task before an Austrian scientific expedition that is at present in Kenya. The expedition is a private venture, although some financial assistance has been given by the University of Vienna, and consists of Professor Shear of Vienna University, the scientific leader, Herr Josef Bohner (technical leader) and Frau Hilda Bohner, and Herr Kurt Klomn, Ludwig Knebel and Eugen Schatz. It is a certain, unassisted and carries all its camping and working equipment and scientific instruments on three motor-cycles and several outfits of African mammals and birds. The members themselves are particularly interesting. They are "Pats", 200 x 2.5 vertical type, two-stroke, fitted with additional tanks, and each with a substantial and heavy oil-burner each suit accommodating two members of the expedition and their gear.

Up Africa

Leaving Vienna on August 25, the expedition sailed for the Horn in the "Marian" (a Cape Italian boat) and from the Cape sailed in May to Kenya by the steamer of the U.S.A., the Blue Anchor and Tanganyika. The journey was uneventful. The members of the expedition reported some slight trouble in Northern Rhodesia, owing to rain-flooded roads, and between Mombasa and Nairobi they stuck for three days in a swampy near Longido. All ordinary members of the expedition treated in the rainy season. Only about a fortnight is available for the expedition's field-work in Kenya and which is hoped to visit the vicinity of the Mountain, a climb is not thought possible in the time at the party's disposal. Observations of the Longman water will also be made. From Kenya they will continue to Europe by sea, travel by road as far as Mombasa and there, collecting their machines and equipment.

As all the work in connection with the meteorological and geographical observations requires careful observation, it is in the line of use to agricultural and other fields in Austria and elsewhere. Extensive field records are kept and data collected which will be followed by all scientific details sent to the University of Vienna at a subsequent date. Over 2,000 photographs have already been taken and many other important recordings of light intensity and other phenomena made. All such scientific details will be forwarded by the expedition, as well as monthly "investigations" of the intensity of light in various parts of the African Meteorological Institute at Vienna, will now be required with available information, as well, particularly at the "Kilim Meteorological Department. Tables of association between Africa and the African mountains will be compiled.

Mountain Climbs

The expedition's first important task, apart from observations taken at sea en route, was carried out during a fortnight spent in climbing many of the higher peaks of the Kilimanjaro Mountains in the Utes. (All the party are experienced mountain climbers) and later time was spent on and around Mount Kilimanjaro. The expedition was led by Professor Shear, who is a member of the expedition the climb to the top of Kilim (19,340 feet), and Herr Knebel and Herr Shear climbed Mombasa (17,000 feet) which is the highest of the peaks of Kilimanjaro and much more difficult of ascent than Kilim (19,340 feet). Blue was a magnificent photograph were taken additional observations of light intensity made. One particularly fine feature was observed at 11,000 feet, showing a wonderful cloud formation some 5,000 feet below.

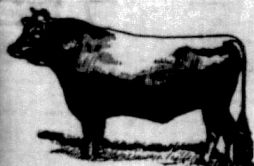

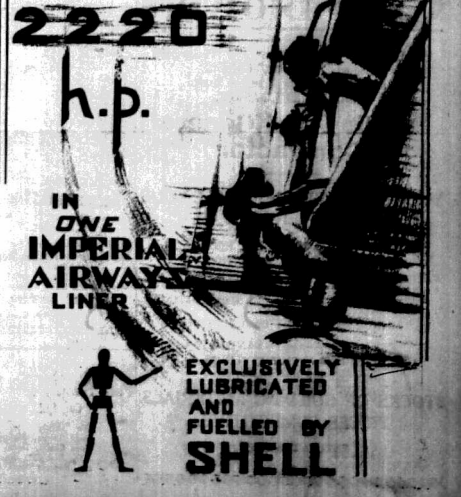

the discipline which is essential to the war worth far more than could ever be imagined by people who only look at a soldier's uniform. The maintenance of the force on its present basis was the greatest importance to the main consideration with reference to its constitution was the maintenance of its discipline.

It did not take the time but some who are committee members should be appreciated to make recommendations on what was required for its future well-being. The proposals could not be estimated in terms of their cost. They are of Government to accept the invitation.

"Secret Reserve"
The Colonial Secretary said he was in the happy position of having to take up with regard to everything that has been said, but pointed out that if the force had been enlarged in the past through sheer necessity, the solution of the Kenya Defence Force was not quite so easy as it seemed. It was not merely a question of the force's organization, training and equipment. It also involved a considerable financial problem.

One of the most important questions was the future of the force. The decision given by the Kenya Defence Force Veterans' League on this point, Government knew that the Colony's own power was magnificent—perhaps better than in any other British colony in the world. There were many different considerations which had to be taken into mind.

There was the question of providing security for people residing in family farms, and the question of security in the towns. In the latter connection he did not suggest that there was a likelihood of a riot in Nairobi or Mombasa or any other town, but Government were bound to provide for such a contingency. Moreover, there was the question of the possibility of external aggression and the particularly concerned Mombasa.

Training Officers
Another consideration was whether the Colony's magnificent power could not be trained as officers, because if the country itself were to be able to supply the better trained to manning the force in the country then officers imported from other countries. ready for formulation. There was every prospect, he understood, that the committee to deal with these matters would be appointed in the very near future and he could give the assurance that his duties would include examination of the needs of the K.D.F. and the means of securing its maintenance. All who went through the war knew perfectly well the part played by the Africans and who had seen the value of the advice of all other British subjects who had fought, but this did not shake him, he believed that it was necessary to be prepared and not merely to react to events.

In view of the assurance given by the Colonial Secretary that a committee was to be appointed to investigate the matters raised by him, he proposed to withdraw his motion. With the leave of the House this was done.
