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
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KENYA LAWN TENNIS CHAMPIONSHIP

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Austro-German Agreement Reached

SIMULTANEOUS ANNOUNCEMENT FROM TWO CAPITALS

No Internal Interference

SOVEREIGNTY OF AUSTRIA TO BE RECOGNISED IN BERLIN

[TERENCE BARTON'S ADDRESS.]

London, July 11.

Dr Goebels at Berlin and Dr Schuschnigg at Vienna simultaneously broadcast news of an Austro-German agreement, which was preceded by a statement that the agreement would tend to pacification in Europe. The principal points were, first, that Germany recognises the full sovereignty of Austria;

Secondly, that both parties undertake not to interfere with each other's internal affairs, including Austrian National Socialism;

Thirdly, that Austrian policy will be framed on the fundamental assumption that it is a German state, and the Rhenish provinces of 1866, and the Sudetenland in 1938 as well as the position of Austria, Italy and Hungary as partners to it, will not be disturbed.

In addition the amnesty problem has been arranged to the satisfaction. The terms of each country will be adhered to in the political and economic arrangements will be made, chiefly based on law.

Mussolini's Good Wishes

[TERENCE BARTON'S ADDRESS.]

London, July 11. The news of important steps towards the final settlement of the Austro-German relations is likely to be received with pleasure in Britain. The Nazi Flag may be shown in Austria.

The Nazi Government will not touch upon so being of imminent importance, although Germany in return does not accept the cancellation of the Anschluss.

Italy's Blessing

London, July 11.

De Schulenburger himself will have had a hand in the arrangement, which, it is really believed, will provide for German acknowledgement of the autonomy of the Austrian Legion in Germany, and the abandonment of Nazi policy towards the latter. The Italian Foreign Minister signed the Austro-German agreement.

The selection of the thousand men to form the Legion is going to be a difficult task. The Foreign Minister replied that the agreement must be granted in view of the fact that the Nazis had at heart the cause of peace, namely the Patriotic Front, and therefore they have no right to

re-militarisation.

“BRITANNIA”

King George's Yacht Scuttled

London, July 11.

King George's famous old sailing cutter "Britannia" was scuttled off the coast of the Solent this morning. She was scuttled off her Patriotic Fleet late at night, in the early hours of yesterday morning under cover of darkness, and in conditions of secrecy, as was the late King's own British Official Yacht service.

FAMOUS INN CLOSED

[TERENCE BARTON'S ADDRESS.]

London, July 11. A famous inn, 800 years old, was demolished this morning. It had stood in Wapping High Street, and was once the house of pirates. One owner was Sir Edward Coke, another was the author of "The Merchant of Venice". In the past, millions about to be hanged were forced to stop there and drink beer before their execution at Oxford he entered the Admiralty in 1607.

TWO BRITISH SOLDIERS WOUNDED

AGAINST GERMANY

U.S. Imposes Additional Import Duties

[TERENCE BARTON'S ADDRESS.]

Washington, July 12.

In order to control the effect of the German Government's exports subsidies the United States has imposed additional import duties, ranging from 22½ to 56 per cent, which would be imposed on certain German exports from July 1st. The new duties were introduced by President Roosevelt on the ground that Germany had discriminated against American goods with the result that there had been a loss of one million sterling per annum.

The German commercial delegation which had been negotiating unsuccessfully here for a trade deal with America are going home immediately.

SIR SIDNEY BARTON

Rugby, July 11.

The King at Buckingham Palace has appointed Sir Sidney Barton, the British Minister at Addis Ababa, with the rank of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary of the Order of the British Empire—British Official Wireless Service.

BROADCASTING IN ADDIS ABABA

Only Italian Allowed?

Rugby, July 11.

With regard to the announcement that General Grasiani has issued an order forbidding the use of all save Italian Government wireless stations in Addis Ababa, no objection is apparent. The only question is the competence of Legation wireless stations to receive messages, but there is a question of fifteen days' notice.

So far as the British Legation is concerned, the station is being taken over by the Royal Engineers. It was 60 years old and after the war was handed over to the Admiralty and now stands at Oxford as the Admiralty in 1938.

It would be able to go through at all. The only trouble is that the roads are not dried quickly enough, so the one I have just mentioned.

Kenyas Motor Taxation
Now to look at the other side of the coin. If the road is closed to heavy transport, there is no problem, it will be considerable when no roads are available, when many roads that will stand the heavy traffic. The taxation of roads in East Africa increases as follows: Taking from 1928 £300,000.00. In 1930 £300,000.00. In 1931, in the neighbourhood of £100,000.00 which all goes with the roads. No Nazi Ideas for Austrian Government

STRONG MEASURES AGAINST PROPAGANDA

To Protect Independence

EFFECT UPON ITALY OF AGREEMENT WITH BERLIN

[THROUGH BRITISH'S AGENCEY]

London, July 12.—Notwithstanding Austro-German agreement, the Austrian government continues to take strong measures against Nazi propaganda, as it is determined to prevent any political party undermining the State.

According to Austrian official circles in London a law for the protection of the State will be introduced shortly, making illegal certain forms of Nazi propaganda and the continued existence of independent Austria and forbidding propaganda in favour of an "Anschluss." Moreover, the Austrian government has no intention of allowing the country's internal development to be modified by Nazi ideas in regard to such matters as the racial question.

Fox comment in the European capitals refers to the significance of the agreement in connexion with the relation between Italy and Germany, and in Rome the suggestion has been heard that the pre-war Triple Alliance might be revived, with Italy no longer the junior partner.

"Triple Alliance" Revived?

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EMPIRE FRUIT PRODUCERS

Important London Conference

Increased Output

LORD ELLENBOROUGH AND CONFEDERATION

“Strikes” compensation, London, June 18.

A resolution of Empire fruit producers, called today to discuss the question of increasing the working day in the industry, was passed in relation to the strikes that took place in the British Isles last week. The resolution, which was moved by Lord Ellenborough, president of the Imperial Fruit Producers' Association, said it was the intention of the association to increase the working day in the British Isles, had been held, with representatives of organized fruit producers in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, the West Indies, and South America. He recalled a conference he opened 15 years ago when fruit growers and exporters from all parts of the Empire were then only just met to consider what they could do with that important industry when that illustrious body from Australia were granted all their demands in general.

Organisation

They were all concerned in supporting a national organization and mutual agreement in all sections of Empire in order that the whole of all branches of primary production were essential to the efficacy and efficiency of any business trade dealing with the products of the various Governments in British Isles. From then we received a wide range of information, which could not be produced at home and many of whom were in competition with each other. That competition was bound to become more intense as time went on. We were developing more efficient methods of production, which would shorten the season and lengthened the season during which fresh fruits were available.

Oversupply was already considerable and would be more so. Good quality producers were continually growing. Our Government assist their industry, but the field of development action was extensive. We must be prepared to meet those that must be ready and able to fall into line with the policies of Government and rely to a large extent upon our own, which which was the essence of a previous rural community.

Industrial Consumption

In the production of fruit this country could not be self-supporting throughout the year, and so the market for fruit comes from the Empire as far as possible. Our own Government is watching closely the production of the colonies they had already given, and which had resulted to the benefit of other Empire countries. They also are watching the effect of other producers who were dependent upon export.

The consumption of fruit in Great Britain has increased by nearly 50 per cent since the War. There was therefore no cause for alarm in the minds of the delegates. They were among those who would welcome any excuse to withdraw the advantage that had already been gained.

An average of 10 per cent of any one fruit on the home market, due to speculation or any other cause, would be a serious cause, and as far as the home producer was concerned it did not mean that there was any loss of Empire or foreign market, but his financial position was therefore

Home Competition

Mr. Ernest Lethbridge, representing the Farmers' Union, in thanking Lord Ellenborough, said that agriculture was a vital industry and that a progressive agriculture was the best guarantee of a strong and healthy Empire.

He said that agriculture was the most important factor in the life of the country. It was there that the people were born, grew up, married, died, and were buried.

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The conference was continued in private.

IMPORTS UP

£90,000 Increase in March Consumption

The statement compiled by H.M. Trade Commissioner in East Africa from figures quoted in the latest issue of Customs and Excise shows that in the month of March last the net home consumption imports into Kenya and Uganda amounted to £1,000,000, while in the three months of 1936 as compared with £1,275,000 in the corresponding period of last year.

The statement also shows that during this year's period were United Kingdom with 37 per cent, Germany eight per cent, Holland, four per cent, India, one per cent, United States eight per cent. Japan's percentage of 20 was more than the figure for 1935.

The latest figures for 1936 imports do not include Government imports, which were £120,000 in March, £130,000 for this year's and last year's periods, nor produce of the Tanganyika Territory imported and sold after the withdrawal of protection, which in 1935 amounted to £173,823 and in 1936 to £205,064.

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No Bartering of Territories

CONSERVATIVE AND SOCIALIST SPOKESMEN AGREE

"Equality of Opportunity"

IMPOSSIBLE AND UNDESIRABLE STATES
MR. L. S. AMERY

Conservative and Socialist views on the Colonial question, presented respectively by the Rt. Hon. L. S. Amery and the Rt. Hon. Arthur Greenwood were recently published in the London "Evening Standard."

"Labour does not believe that colonial territories and provinces can be bartered about between one Imperial Power and another," said Mr. Greenwood.

He gave the Labour policy as equal access to raw materials as a principle of the "Open Door" and a demand that the control of the existing mandates in accordance with the policy, together with a stronger supervision of the Mandates by the League.

Mr. Amery welcomed the Labour conciliation with regard to "bartering territories" and remarks "We can discuss the idea of territorial cession as outside practical politics."

The world needs to-day" he says, "is not 'equality of opportunity,' the impossible attempt to return to the unenlightened Free Trade of the last century, but to work out definite arrangements between countries which are co-operating in not whose resources are discriminatory in each other."

Liberals and Open Door

In the House of Commons on July 6, Mr. Greenwood, the Leader of the House, and Mr. H. H. Asquith, the Leader of the Liberal Party, both supported the Labour Party's policy of non-recognition of mandates.

Mr. Greenwood said that the Labour Party had always been, like all parties of Imperialism, in favour of self-governing dominions. Cross-appointed members of the mandatary territories did not sit upon a committee of enquiry of the mandate of territory, either with the mandate or with the people who inhabit it.

The Labour government, however, was determined to make the self-governing dominions cross-appointed territories in the same manner as they do now.

Mr. Asquith said that the Labour government was in favour of the foundations of the British Empire, but that the Empire was not a collection of mandates, but a collection of territories, or groups of territories, or groups of territories to administer.

Mr. Greenwood said that the Labour Party was in favour of doing away with mandates, but that the Labour Party was in favour of giving up of mandates without any loss of democracy and of British democracy.

"What then does the Labour Party propose?"

"FRANTIC" MILITARY PREPARATIONS BEING MADE BY CANTON COUNCIL

Nanking, July 15.

The threat of civil war is intensifying. The Central Government has announced its determination virtually to subordinate the recalcitrant South-Western authorities.

It is semi-officially stated that the Nanking troops will support General Yu Hanmou if the Southern general seriously resists his advance southwards to assume the chief military control at the behest of Nanking.

Meanwhile General Chen-chi-Tang's forces have taken up strongly fortified positions southwards from Shikuan with orders to resist if attacked.

Franz military precautions are being taken in Canton to stem General Yu Hanmou's advance and the South-West Council which refused to recognize their dissolution by the Central Executive and have decided to form an anti-Japanese allied army of Kwantung and Kwangsi troops under the command of General Chen-chi-Tang.

BASTILLE CELEBRATION MELEE

the wise Imperial statute, building over the yester hill seems to have been Dalmatian Avenue and in order to make public recognition of the rights of the Nairobi newspaper we shall have to see that the Municipalities Ordinance is amended so as to bring about the occupation of the Deputy Mayor's chair, as well as that of the other members of the Council.

It is an open secret that the Empire has been built up by the use of the native's property and I am certain that the framers of the Nairobi Ordinance did not visualize such a possibility arising. If it is our contention that even in Municipal affairs a "sense of the times" is to be observed, then the ordinance must be brought to drag in politics.

The very fact that a native newspaper, which is not even a regular feature is held not by the members of the various interests, makes me believe that only one section of the community who happen to enjoy a majority in the city, are the author of such an amendment in the Ordinance as suggested above. I fully realize that the Government, the British Government, concerned, based on fair play and justice, will never allow the minority's cause to suffer unrepresented.

To the Editor: E.A. Standard.—
Sir:—I am enclosing herewith a copy of two points in my report to the Defense Minister's letter on "Ocean Levels."

First point: That "there is never a moment when the whole world is not at low water or at high tide, or low water or high tide." Therefore, any comparison between levels of Oceans is impossible. Can you tell me what is the level of the Pacific Ocean at Panama at low-water of Port of Spain at the same time as the level of the Atlantic Ocean at Colón or the same state of tide?

Second point: "There is no method yet devised for measuring their levels in mid-ocean. The world's oceans are not yet mapped with other things, ships, etc., having to be used when taking the 'tide'." This is true. At the same level gives one a comparison to the position of the sun, moon and Earth. Less Kenya Crime Last Year

FEWER CONVICTIONS RECORDED IN 1935 REPORT

Courts Revenue Drops

According to the 1935 report of the Kenya Judicial Department, there were nearly less crime in that year than in the year before. The number of convictions for murder was 15—less than a third of that of 1934, and less than any of the previous four years. Supreme Court convictions were fewer, as were the number of cases committed for trial to the Supreme Court.

The revenue collected by the Supreme Court and Magistrates' Courts was very much less than in any of the preceding four years, and the number of cases committed for trial to the Supreme Court in 1935 was 20, as compared with 1934. The decrease was accounted for by European and Native cases.

Another reduction was in the percentage of charges where whipping was ordered. This dropped to a figure lower than it had been for years.

Murder Sentences Decrease

That there were considerably fewer Supreme Court convictions for murder last year than in any one of the preceding four years is also shown in the Standing Committee's annual report for 1935.

In 1934 the total was 15, while in 1933 it was 15, in 1932 it was 8, in 1931 it was 10, and in 1930 it was 11. Therefore, any comparison between levels of Oceans is impossible.
