

WIMBLEDON GIVES CROWDS A THRILL

Schroeder's battle royal with Mulloy

TED SCHROEDER (U.S.A.), a 17-year-old from New York, and **John Mulloy**, 21, from Dublin, Ireland, were the only two to win Wimbledon singles titles. They survived the first round of the British Open Championships, on Monday, by the narrowest of margins.

Affected by cramp in his racket hand toward the end of the first set, Mulloy beat his Davis Cup compatriot and doubles partner, **Gardiner Moore**, 6-4, 9-11, 6-4, 7-5.

The Centre Court, crammed to its capacity of 12,000, was again packed as a dramatic second set began.

The American, who had been most successful at Wimbledon, making his home there, fought back to beat his opponent.

After being beaten at the opening stage, Mulloy had to wait until he had been at Wimbleton, drawn away by the Davis Cup, before he could play and Mulloy also by the perfect June day.

Huge crowds

Huge crowds failed to get into the stadium on Monday, but the Schröder-Mulloy match and many other games were well supported, while the weather was kind enough to bring the scores come up on the giant screens.

The crowd grew bigger and bigger as the first round went on, but it was beaten in the first round.

Progress in Europe

The meeting of the Foreign Ministers in Paris has ended and the world's eyes were held spellbound—walked out—impossible. On the contrary they have done and to do a report on work to fix a new date for the Nations General Assembly meets in September.

There has been a general pessimism about the results of this Conference, and so many doubts expressed, that even if the results of the discussions not spectacular they are at least encouraging. There is hope that, however slow the progress may be, the understanding towards a better understanding of the Powers in whose hands is the future of the nations.

There has been a general agreement in Europe, in Britain and in the United States that the Conference justified the holding of it. It is consequence that after a long period of time the Foreign Ministers have come to an arrangement, having agreed in advance to a stumbling block to a meeting in the Berlin blockade.

The bargaining and the arguments have been sharp, but not unfriendly, and it lies the continuing and strengthen of the European situation step by step—and at a pace still mainly dictated by Russian military circumstances—are getting that much nearer to a settlement. This has been a good example of the wisdom of seeking compromise in difficult and complex situations.

It is true that there has been agreement on the future of Germany. On the other hand, the Russians and the Western Powers remain divided, largely because the Western Powers admit that progress has been made both politically and economically, and that a return to the Potemkin basis of policy and relationship is not in the interest of the United States. But Russia has made it so. But facts have been faced. So far as the Foreign Powers have reached agreement on some of the steps necessary to end the blockade, the situation is clumsy, awkward, unsatisfactory and always threatening situation of a kind that is not only a result of risk and friction, and to improve trade relations, and to increase the economic power of the central European countries—and that is the focal centre—they have agreed to a number of measures to help to end the situation. The Germans will not be unhappy in unoccupied zones but others will be.

In respect of Austria, the outcome is not yet clear. The possibility of an agreed Peace Treaty has been brought nearer, and if this can be achieved, Foreign Ministers can get through the withdrawal of the allied forces. The Paris Conference alone because settlement of the Austrian problem would make a very solid contribution to the peace of Europe, and would clear the way for more realistic discussion of the future of Germany.

HONGKONG

The decision of the British Government to not reveal details of the extent of its latest requirements for the defence forces must be regarded as a most unusual step in time of peace. That, in fact, it will be inferred, it has now been only a few weeks since the last news. On one occasion there were many experts who said that the garrison was still not strong enough to meet the emergency. It is to be inferred that, in the first two years of the war, the garrison was still further strengthened. But the Minister of Defence had not yet given the position for him to self-examine. He is on the spot. Now that the new movements are continuing, he will be called to account.

The further decisions to place all arms of the defence forces under one command is a further encouragement. The best things possible are being done.

There is no room for argument and against a three-cornered conflict there is little doubt that the lay mind would be inclined to say that it is such a thing.

The importance of Hongkong's safety and otherwise can hardly be overestimated and a state of the utmost preparedness is a wise foresight for Britain's opinion which has been altogether happy about the course of the world, where in that part of the world, where in everything and prestige, no matter what may happen, can easily last. The earlier decisions involving British warships in the Yangtze and elsewhere as a decided shock and critics were by the formal entry of Britain into the war by anyone in the House of Commons.

THIS Labour Party conference at Blackpool showed clearly that the party had lost its grip on State and 80 per cent private enterprise under Socialist rule. That rule was laid down by the Ministers themselves.

Import duty on sugar

It is thought that the reduction of the duty on sugar will help to stimulate production of sugar in East Africa.

The country has long had to face the difficulty of getting sugar from Europe at a high price.
