BIG UNOFFICIAL CONFERENCE AT ARUSHA

To Start on March 15

REPRESENTATIVES FROM RHODESIA AND NYSALAND TO ATTEND

What promises to be one of the most important Unofficial Conferences ever held in East Africa will open at Arusha on March 15.

Its main purpose is to consider what can be done to bring about an effective Union of East Africa and the Conference is expected to carry the proposals for Union a definite step further.

In addition to delegates from the East African Territories it is expected that representatives from the Rhodesias and Nyasaland will be present.

A Vital Issue

STANDARD GOVERNMENT

Arusha, Feb. 27.—Representatives from the East African Territories and Rhodesia and Nyasaland are expected to attend a big unofficial conference on March 15 under the auspices of the British Union of East Africa (Northern Province).

It has been a matter of considerable difficulty to find a date that would suit representatives from all the territories. The Southern Rhodesias, from the last that has been invited, have been received to the invitation already issued, this difficulty would now seem to have been overcome, and the idea of such a Conference is apparently welcomed in many quarters.

WEEK-END CELEBRATIONS THROUGHOUT FATHERLAND

(THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.)
London, Feb. 28.—Mr. Geoffrey Knox, the late Chairman of the Saar Governing Commission, has been appointed Knight of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Mr. Geoffrey Knox formally relinquished his duties this afternoon at Bonn on behalf of the League of Nations. Speaking for his services.

Throughout the afternoon uniformed German police who had been patrolling the streets since noon are the only outward sign in the territory of the return which will be temporarily retained throughout the Fatherland tomorrow and the week-end.

All Night Festivities

The celebrations include great torchlight processions, the general lighting of flags at the present time and fireworks by leading Saars, while all night there will be feasting at all times and restaurants.

Bonn, Alsace, will be interim President of the Commission until 3.30 a.m. tomorrow when he will transfer his authority to the Reich Minister. Herr Frick who in turn will entrust to the District Leader, Herr Heubrich, the administration of the Saar in the presence of the highest Nazi officials.

At An Assembly

Berlin, Feb. 28.—To mark Germany's joy at the return of the Saar Herr Hitler has presided on the evening of the 28th at an assembly of 200,000 people in the Reichstag.

The speeches of last year and the current year would enable Germany to be made of 210 lakhs for the earthquake, 100 lakhs for a new securing grant to the Province for economic development of rural areas, 40 lakhs for road development, particularly in Assam, 25 lakhs for road construction in the tribal areas of the N. W. Frontier, 25 lakhs for broadcasting services, and 120 lakhs for civil aviation and the Institute of Agriculture.

The balance of 75 lakhs would be an additional allotment for the reduction of the debt-burdening programme which was estimated at 25 crores.

HALF DUTY TO STAY?

Economic Development of Rural Areas

(THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.)
New Delhi, Feb. 28.—The Budget presented to the Assembly today by Sir James Finlay, Finance Minister of the Government shows a surplus of 150 lakhs of rupees for the coming year.

Sir James Finlay said it was proposed to abolish from April 1 the export duty on raw silk costing more than Rs. 100 lakhs which would be used for the reduction of taxes on income leaving a quarterly surplus of 6 lakhs.

He also announced the immediate reduction of silver duty from 2 to 2 annas per ounce with a view to preventing smuggling. The additional import duty on salt would be continued for another year unless the Assembly voted for its immediate removal, which Sir James Finlay said he would accept.

Paul Cezanne who is a professional picture dealer was similarly punished for selling a picture which was sent to prison with the help of the Paris Tribunal and the State.

The Decline in Value of Sterling

ANXIETY EXPRESSED IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

Government's Measures

CHANCELLOR UNABLE TO DIVULGE STEPS TO BE TAKEN

Anxiety was expressed in the House of Commons on Thursday in regard to the recent fall in the value of sterling, and the adjournment was moved in order to call attention to the position.

Mr. Neville Chamberlain pointed out that the fall in the external value of sterling was a different thing from the internal purchasing power of the pound.

He was unable, for reasons of public policy, to give information as to Government's steps to meet the situation.

Adjournment Moved

(THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.)
London, Feb. 28.—References to the recent fall in sterling were made in the House of Commons today by Mr. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer during question time.

He said that he was aware of the fall in the external value of sterling which was a different thing from the internal purchasing power of the pound.

He was unable to publish information in regard to the Government's steps to meet the fall in the value of sterling. Similarity he declined to give information about the operation of the Exchange Equalisation Fund.

The matter may be raised during the financial debate on Monday when Mr. Neville Chamberlain will be given an opportunity to make a statement.

TO LEAVE AUSTRALIA

German Writer and Language Test

(THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.)
Melbourne, Feb. 28.—An agreement has been reached permitting Egon Kisch, the German writer to leave Australia as an uncontracted passenger. It is said that he is participating in a so-called light release procession. He has secured a sum of money from the Crown in full satisfaction in respect of costs in the abortive appeal to the Supreme Court.

Egon Kisch was recently sentenced to three months imprisonment for being a prohibited immigrant on the grounds that he could not pass the language test which in this case was Scottish Gaelic. He jumped ashore from the ship, however, as a result of which he was injured. On appeal, the South Wales Supreme Court quashed the conviction, holding that Scottish Gaelic was not a European language within the meaning of the act. The Government gave notice of its refusal to appeal, and Kisch was released pending the hearing.

THE AFRICAN DIPLOME

Peaceful Settlement Expected

(THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.)
London, Feb. 28.—It is specifically expected in British diplomatic circles that there will shortly be a peaceful settlement of the Italo-Abyssinian differences in regard to the empire most of non-Abyssinians in the Joint Commission to delimitate the frontier zone. Italy had previously registered an objection to this proposal.

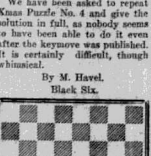

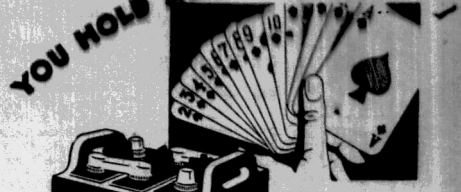

MONOPOLY THE ONLY MEANS OF SAVING THE CLOVE INDUSTRY

The Indian "Agriculturists"

"TO ZANZIBAR INDIAN A PLANTATION IS MERELY A MILCH-COW"

The Government of Zanzibar in a detailed reply to the criticisms made by Mr. P. K. S. Menon on the recent clove legislation, rejects his contention that the Cloves Growers Association and the control of clove exporters are harmful to Indian interests or likely to squeeze them out.

In the opinion of Government these Decrees are necessary to the welfare of the Protectorate and already Indian growers and Indian losses of crops are being the Association.

There is a vigorous denial of the claim that Indians are agriculturists. The official view is that the Indian regards the plantation as a milch cow and that the spiritless Africans and Arab tenantry who make the profits are in danger of becoming little better than slaves exposed to a rack-renting system.

It is pointed out that in the past eight years the Indian money-lender's grip over land and clove trees has very considerably increased.

Essentially a Racial Problem

The contents of the Government of Zanzibar on the Report made by Mr. K. P. S. Menon to the Government of India on the position of Indians under the new Clove Industry Legislation published together with Mr. Menon's own Report. Extracts from his Report were given in the East African Standard yesterday. There now follows the Zanzibar Government's reply to his criticisms.

Mr. Menon considered that Indians in Zanzibar had just ground for complaint that the legislation was sprung upon them. The Government's answer is that in the circumstances it was not possible to give long notice of the aspects of the legislation which had been adopted. In the case of the Land Alienation Decree, the giving of longer notice would have precipitated a riot by the general public for obtaining possession of mortgaged land, thereby aggravating the evil which the legislation was designed to remedy. In the case of the Clove legislation it was necessary to bring the new law into effect from July 1 to deal with the new season's crop, and to give notice for another year. The position of the Clove Industry had become so serious that the placing of the industry on a sound basis was, as is regarded by the Government (states the reply), an essential first step in restoring prosperity to the Protectorate. Agricultural indebtedness, which had been greatly alleviated by a general appreciation in the values of clove, and therefore of clove land, had many estates hitherto insolvent which would have to be reorganised. The situation of the industry demanded early action and postponement of the clove legislation would have been contrary to the public interest. Another consideration was the opportunity which would have been provided for speculation in stocks, which would have increased the difficulties and dangers.

The Indian Agriculturist

DARE DEVIL FLIERS

1,400 Miles in a Makashit Machine

Australia's Government is concerned with the reckless feats of young aviators, who, while taking their own lives, may cause danger to others as well as expense to the public. Last month two young aviators named Roy C. Whittaker and Eric Shickel, defied authority by logging off into Sydney for a hot-air balloon over the Tasman Sea. Whittaker, a distance of about 1,400 miles. For a time they were given up for lost, but they were found in an uninhabited part of the New Zealand coast the Monday evening at a township. They were not at all single-mindedly, which had been assumed, but on the ground that it was not strictly.

Never before in such a flight, probably, has such makeshift equipment been used. The oil pipe was merely a length of hemp rope, fed with tin funnel when oil was required. A plug of wood was used for a stopper, and a quart of oil was poured down the pipe every hour. No risks were taken with the petrol supply and a double system of fueling was used. For navigation the fliers relied almost solely on the ordinary, simple, sextant. No safety devices of any kind were carried. Explaining the absence of radio, Whittaker said that if they had spent down half-way across some middle would not have got a ship in time. It was also doubtful whether anyone would have been easy enough to fly a makashit in the ocean.

Australian admirals took like and the young fliers have been fined a good money share. But the Government proposes to prosecute them, as a general deterrent.

Durban, Feb. 24. (By Mail.)

A "CURSE" ON KENYA

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—May I take up the cudgils in behalf of Kenya? It is the reason why no one else has refuted Mrs. Florence Hiddell's assertion so far is because a residence of four years in any country does not permit any one, no matter how thick their perceptions, to give a decided, dogmatic, downright dictum on the "Kisumu" of that particular country.

If Kenya were secured (which it is not) it is a peninsula such as that displayed by Kenya's seacoast, which might bring about such a condition of affairs.

True, Kenya like every other country, has been through a rather rough time, but then so has England, so has America, and any other country where Mrs. Hiddell might choose to go. Wondering, I could mention a few countries where if the lady passed such an opinion on it, after a four years stay, she would not stand on the order of her going but go wandering unconsciously quickly and as far away as she could comfortably go, after her verdict!

It is as much as though an infant of four, dictated to its mother, the hour she should go to bed, and if the surroundings displeased it imperatively desire a change of residence. If outsiders will only let Kenya alone, she will

worry through all right in spite of all the malcontents, with which Mrs. Hiddell strives to saddle her. I have lived in Kenya close on 21 years, and I hope, know something about the subject on which I am talking.

May I please take up a little of your space, in order to make known something of the justification I have received for my "abuse" against in Kenya "the accused"? When I landed in Mombasa over 20 years ago, I took the first breath I had taken for over 20 years, and there and then I decided that the breathing to be derived from living in such a country was good enough for me. That it does not suit all, is no fault of Kenya and I do not think it should be denounced on that account. Picture an unfortunate individual going about with her head wrapped in a shawl if she should go out at all, a continuous fever her mouth, a cross between a tea-strainer and a dirty hospital bandage (I will retain it as a memento, incidentally) and accompanied by a woman that would have done credit to many an orchestra-company it with the same individual to-day, who has no hesitation in saying she can give points to many young girls who are "righteous." I almost forgot what the instrument of torture was called—"respiration" I think (my forgetfulness is no doubt due to the ultra-violet rays) but in about another quarter of a century I am going to present to the Museum with footnotes as to the uses in which it might be put, (an eye which for me) with a recommendation to all who suffer from distorted vision, so that the apparatus come under which Kenya labours, may be obliterated, and dispelled.

I give the interview with the lady in question, who in those days, was (I believe) teaching the young Kenya girls. In those days I know I bought a copy of her first novel and read a little, then stuffed it into an old cover of "Gibbons Decline and Fall of Rome," "The Life History of the Magarinos" or perhaps "Why less buzz," would do equally well!

Perhaps Mrs. Hiddell can provide statistics as to how many workings are due to the non-wearing of hats. Personally I am out in my garden the whole day long, and never with a hat, either here or at Mombasa, in spite of those sought ultra-violet rays. Now surely in Kenya, where I have lived, I have developed some little brain power, not necessarily of the nature that Mrs. Hiddell outlines, yet strangely my memory is seldom at fault. I never, never made a list of my multitudinous requirements, when I go into Nairobi to do my shopping. I am sure that I should seldom do I return without all I require. My numerous friends will bear me out in this.

As to committing suicide, nothing is further from my thoughts! My life is far too strenuous for that and has been for the past 20 years!

Yet I have had as many experiences as most people but an Irish woman never knows when she is defeated, perhaps, I could mention a few instances a tendency that way? I certainly should if I went about imagining things as Mrs. Hiddell appears to do. A course of somebody's physical exercises might dispel the chimera. Let me remark to all newcomers, and there will be newcomers, in spite of the ultra-violet rays, to go into whatever they undertake, wholeheartedly, make up their minds to succeed, don't let boggy whether violet or any other colour frighten them, don't be afraid of a little hard work, I have

land plenty, and will have a blessing in disguise, take an opinion of pessimists, with pronounced views, who are in the habit of statements which they would find it hard to substantiate, and to the rising generation, who are in the habit of ignoring all outsiders, who talk about it which they know little of, and who are in the habit of hands to make or mar, and never for anything do I think that my will make for a worthy addition to the great Empire to which we all belong.

When a woman of well over seventy can say, that she can walk five miles in the heat of the day (and frequently does when she cannot command someone's husband to take her into Nairobi road, wife, embryo, get up at six o'clock, and walk all day, in spite of rain) in Kenya then there is a much wrong with the country and it should be ignored. This I think will be the wisest course, to pursue in the present instance. Forget the whole matter; it will do a natural debt and with regard to this which cannot be discussed publicly, let it die figuratively and literally.

I had just gone to bed when I saw a clock. My curious friends, never sleep to remind me that in spite of ultra-violet rays their appetites are the same yesterday, today and I hope, tomorrow. Yet Kenya, as well as my body, is sensitive and politicians will have to be alone.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT COSTS

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir—I enclose herewith copy of a letter sent this day to the Honorary Secretary of the Soy-Hoy's Bridge Farmers' Association, and shall be grateful if you will give the same publicity that was given to the letter written by the Honorary Secretary of that Association.

Kikparen Farmers' Association, P.O. Kikparen, 23rd February 1935. To the Honorary Secretary, Soy-Hoy's Bridge Farmers' Association, P.O. Soy-Hoy's Bridge, Dear Sir,

Cost of Local Government

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter relating to the above subject. The subject of the resolution passed by your Association has received the careful consideration of my Committee, and I am directed to inform you that they have arrived at the following conclusions:

(1) It is assumed that "the Local Government bodies" you mean the Eldoret Municipal Board and the Vain Gishu District Council. As farmers outside the Municipal Board have no control over the affairs of the Board, it is considered that any representations as to the alleged extravagance of the Board should be made in the manner asked for by the Leader of the Elected Members in a recent speech made in Eldoret, i.e. by submitting to the Economy Committee a memorandum on the subject.

(2) As three members represent the Soy-Hoy's Bridge area on the District Council, it is considered that the remedy for any alleged extravagant expenditure by this Council lies in your own hands, as an objection by your members to any wasteful expenditure would most certainly be supported by the Council as a whole.

(3) The three members who represent the Kikparen area on the District Council have detailed information of the economies which have been effected in the expenditure of the Council during the past few years, together with their proposals for further savings.

The information has convinced my Committee that there is no foundation for the statement to the effect that the Vain Gishu District Council is being conducted in a far more extravagant manner. On the contrary, my Committee consider that every possible effort has been made to administer the affairs of the Council in such manner as to ensure the proper maintenance of District roads at the lowest possible cost and with a minimum overhead and expenditure.

(4) There is no existing dual control of roads in the Vain Gishu district. A road is either under the control of the District Council or of the Public Works Department. It has been conclusively proved that the Vain Gishu District Council can build or maintain roads much more economically than the Public Works Department and as a result of representations made to Government on this subject, it was decided to allow the Nakuru District Council to maintain for a fixed period the roads formerly controlled by the P.W.D. in the Nakuru district. It is the opinion of my Committee that the forestry experiment should be continued for the allotted period, as any premature termination of the arrangement might nullify the experiment.

(5) In the opinion of my Committee the foregoing conclusions dispose of your charge of extravagance so far as the District Council is concerned, and whilst I am to thank you for your invitation to send two delegates to your meeting it is considered that no useful purpose could be served by their attendance and therefore no representatives of my Association will attend.

Finally, I am instructed to emphasize the statement, made in paragraph (2) of this letter, to the effect that any reasonable proposals made by your representatives for economies in the expenditure of the District Council would receive the careful consideration of the three members for Kikparen district.

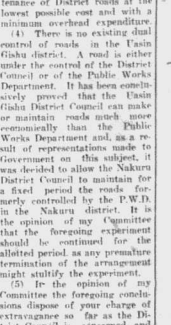

MUTHAIGA
To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—For the information of your readers, may I point out what really happened in regard to the matter of Muthaiga By-laws?
The attention of the General Purposes Committee of the Municipal Council was directed to the difficulties which were being experienced owing to the fact that only comparatively few of the Municipal By-laws apply to Muthaiga, and the Committee were invited to consider the advisability of extending the application of the By-laws to Muthaiga.
His Worship the Mayor said that before anything further was done in the matter, he, as the

representative of the Council of the Muthaiga residents, would like to have an opportunity of discussing with them. The matter was left in abeyance until a notice to attend Mr. Higgins an opportunity of doing so.
He then called a meeting of the Muthaiga residents at the outset, if it was considered desirable to discuss the proposed By-laws. Those of them who have taken an active interest in the past with regard to Muthaiga—in my opinion a very wise course, when you consider the difficulties of explaining in detail to a public meeting the intricacies of the subject under discussion.
Notwithstanding Mr. Howard's remarks about the proverbial "egg basket," it is impossible to say to so few of the By-laws being made applicable to Muthaiga.
Those which do not apply include, among many others, By-laws relating to Squatters; Storage and use of Callishes; objectionable buildings; street obstructions; parking of motor vehicles; grazing of cattle; lighting of electric cables, etc.; spilling in streets and in public service vehicles; keeping of dangerous animals; notification of births. None of the By-laws on these subjects apply to Muthaiga, and in the opinion of a great many people, they ought to be made applicable to Muthaiga as well as to the rest of the Municipal area.

UGANDA CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Question of Nominees to Township Authority
THE COFFEE BOARD

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]
Kampala, March 4.
The Uganda Chamber of Commerce met at 4.20 p.m. on Thursday last to clear up the business that had been left over from the last meeting. The Chamber will meet at the same time for the next six months as an experiment to see whether more members will be able to attend. There was quite a good attendance on Thursday which is encouraging for the future.

On representations from the Chamber the General Manager of the Railway agreed to retain the sailing in transit route of coffee from Bukhaka to be secured at Port Bell until the end of this year, when the question will be again revised.

Coffee Grading
A sub-committee was formed consisting of the standing Committee of the Chamber together with representatives of all members who were interested in the marketing of coffee, to enquire and report in the working of the Coffee Grading Commission and to make recommendations for amendments if thought necessary.

As regards membership of the Coffee Board, it was decided to ask Government to limit the appointment of unofficial members of the Board to two years and not leave it as an indefinite period, as at present.

A New Ferry
Government stated that it intended to establish a permanent ferry at Matanda. A ferry on the Nile, operated by the Public Works Department. The question of transferring to Atura the mechanical ferry formerly used at Jinja has been fully explored but this arrangement is impracticable in view of the strong current. The scale of charges has been reduced.

As regards the Chamber's nominations for unofficial members to the Township Authority the Chief Secretary replied stating that, according to Press reports the two nominees had bound themselves by some sort of undertaking which was likely to hamper them in the free exercise of their own judgment as representatives on the Board of the general public interest. He enquired what was the nature of this undertaking. It was agreed to reply that the nominees had agreed to support the views of the Chamber on major issues and to send a copy of the minutes of the last Chamber meeting on this point.

BRITISH ISRAELI NOTES

Isolation
"The People shall dwell alone."

Some time ago a prominent writer in the British press forecast that the British-Israeli belief was the road to safety for the British Empire, and, of course, to that of the whole world. The belief has spread by leaps and bounds. It has carried conviction and hope to vast populations.

Now a question has been put, and has found its way to Foreign Office. It demands an answer.
"Should Britain remain a member of the League of Nations?"
There are two ways of viewing the identity of the British people. It appears to go against the grain with some to be called "Israelites," a name associated for centuries, and strongly so, with the wandering Jews. Let those people recognize correctly that the old realities were British, that they were our own ancestors and had all our faiths and feelings, our laws and the governing institutions of our people, whether Saxon (law of the King), Norman, Danish, Angevin, Plantagenet, etc., perhaps they will see more clearly the reasons for joining up the two names.

Now in reply to the question now—we turn to many parts of the Bible, and many passages, with the help of the Almighty (when that and only that was asked for, Israel triumphed in the nation, success to their arms and assured prospects.)
But for a direct and perfect answer, a perusal of 2 Chronicles 16-18 is perhaps more convincing under the exact circumstances of our case than any other.

"Because thou hast relied on the King of Syria and not relied on the Lord thy God, the host of the King of Syria has escaped out of thy hand."
"The eyes of the Lord run and he throughout the whole earth to see himself strong on behalf of them, whose heart is perfect towards him."

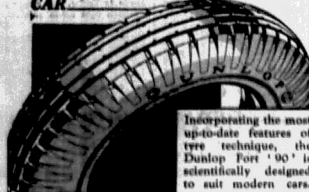
