COMPETITION OF EAST AFRICA

Recommendations by Arusha Conference

APPOINTMENT OF EXPERIENCED STATESMAN SUGGESTED

General Smuts as Collaborator

ANOTHER UNOFFICIAL MEETING TO BE HELD WITHIN FOUR MONTHS

An Unofficial Conference at Arusha which concluded on Saturday has unanimously agreed on the principle of complete union of Kenya and Tanganyika and expresses the hope that Uganda will agree to join.

The case rests on the grave misgivings in the two countries as to whether the methods of administration which have grown up will best implement the Imperial Government's responsibilities under the Tanganyika Mandate.

After the statement of the aims of the Conference has been submitted to the committee in Tanganyika and Kenya, steps will be taken to urge upon the Imperial Government the appointment of a statesman of wide administrative experience to initiate negotiations on the spot with Union as the object.

The Conference proposes that General Smuts should be invited to collaborate with this statesman in the task.

Francis Scott has been instructed to call another conference within four months from now to decide upon future action in the light of the Imperial Government's reception of the present proposals.

Memorandum for Secretary of State

Arusha, Saturday. The sessions of the Unofficial Conference held to discuss closer union of the East African territories, two days yesterday and today. Twenty-five delegates from Kenya and Tanganyika attended, including not only the leaders of the Elected and Nominated European Members of the Councils as well as leaders of opinion among the African members of the South African communities in Tanganyika and representatives of the African and European interests in both territories.

The Chairman of the British Union of Tanganyika (British Boy Scouts) in a brief speech cordially welcomed the delegates and was thereafter unanimously elected Chairman of the Conference. Outlining the views of the unofficial residents in the North-Western Province of Kenya, he pointed out that he was convinced that only through complete union could any real economy be effected in Government expenditure. "This Conference has been convened," he said, "to discuss the financial, customs and administrative union of Tanganyika with neighbouring territories as suggested in the results of the Commission set up by the Associated Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa of Mombasa." He was anxious to support that resolution but did not wish to move in the matter until the Commission of Kenya and Tanganyika had been set up and its report had been received.

This sense was unanimously adopted by the Union. As to the means of achieving this end an interesting series of proposals was put forward. Finally it was decided that the framing of a constitution for a Union of Eastern Africa was a task beyond the scope of such an assembly, an ad hoc committee of five members, consisting of Mr. Williams and Captain Eric Red (Tanganyika) and Major (General) Denton and Captain G. B. Anderson (Kenya) was appointed to frame recommendations with the object of placing before the committee of the territories concerned the advisability of the step desired.

A MEMORANDUM Reasons for Union Clearly Explained

Contrasting Federation with Union, the Chairman foresaw many difficulties which might arise. The functions of the Imperial Government and of the Local Governments under an system of federation, while the allocation of revenue to the Federated States and the responsibility for debts would lead to endless dispute. These difficulties would not arise under complete union. Federation, he continued, would not be economy. It would simply mean the superimposition of an expensive Central Government on the existing separate Local Governments.

Political Integrity. "I expect most of those present here today have read the proposals submitted to the Secretary of State for the Colonies made in the House of Commons. In that statement he promised sympathetic consideration of any proposals for union in East Africa and outlined the problem as being one of co-operation between the different colonies while preserving their individuality. We in this Province are convinced that nothing short of complete union could effect the maximum of co-operation and there is no need to be alarmed by the political integrity of the countries concerned."

Dagger Attacks at Mecca

Assassins Shot

DRAMATIC SCENE DURING RELIGIOUS EXERCISES

IBRAHIM BAKTER'S AGENCY. London, March 16. The Hajj Legation in London today said that an attempt was made to assassinate Ibn Saud at Mecca this morning. Men armed with daggers rushed at him as he was going round the Kaaba. All three assassins were shot dead by the King's bodyguard. They were Zaidia from the Yemen. A later message says Ibn Saud accompanied by the Crown Prince, the Emir Saud was circumambulating the Kaaba for the fourth time and had just reached the Black Stone when the leader of the assassins rushed towards him. The Emir Saud seized him and forced him away. Before he could approach the Kaaba he was shot down by a soldier of the King's bodyguard. In the meantime two other assassins attacked the Emir Saud but before their daggers could reach him they were knocked down by the bodyguard. The King and the Crown Prince then completed their circumambulation of the Kaaba as if nothing had happened. They are both at Mecca and spent the day as customarily receiving delegations which had come to congratulate them on the coronation of the Emir.

Herr Hitler's Latest Bombshell

CONSCRIPTION RE-INTRODUCED INTO GERMANY

Great New Army

The most sensational news of the week-end is Germany's official announcement of her intention to reintroduce conscription.

Herr Hitler in a proclamation justifies this gross breach of the Treaty Versailles on the ground of the alleged failure of other Powers to carry out disarmament as laid down by the Treaty. He proposes to create a peace army of 12 Army corps.

Blames the Allies

Dr. Goebbels stated that Herr Hitler, on his return from Bavaria where he had been recovering from the effects of his recent cold, held a Cabinet meeting at which the new laws and proclamation were approved.

Origin of the War

The proclamation read by Dr. Goebbels began with a reference to the world war which, it was declared, was "forced" upon an unwilling Germany. He said he was satisfied that Germany had completely fulfilled all her disarmament obligations. He said that in a meeting, he had announced the amount of reparations that Germany had been destroyed. He made a reference to Germany leaving the League of Nations as a consequence of the prolongation of the terms of French military service decided upon yesterday.

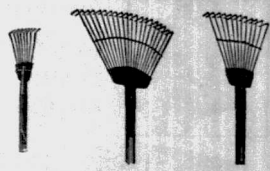
**Two Old Timers**

### JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard."  
Sir—May I use a little of your space to ventilate opinions I have frequently heard expressed during the past few days and to ask a few pertinent, or even impertinent, questions?

The Nairobi Rotary Club appears to be the prime mover in the collection of funds which, in my opinion and that of many of my friends, are to be displayed in a somewhat straggled manner and, unfortunately, on somewhat racial lines. Surely these celebrations, and, if the authorities must beg, the collection of funds, should be conducted on strictly non-racial lines by Government or, if it is to be a Civic celebration, by the Nairobi Municipality.

Would it not be sound and politic, if the Mayor and his Town Councilors took the lead in our local demonstrations, instead of that very select but non-representative body, the Nairobi Rotarians? It is His Worship's prerogative and, I submit very respectfully, his duty, I submit further that the present as early as possible and that another should be substituted therefor.

I note, for instance, that in the proposed programme for the present is entirely ignored. Why? Surely His Majesty's subjects be on an equal footing in this matter? I understand that a very suitable programme for our Natives, including a Searchlight Tattoo admitted to the Municipality by our Municipal Native Affairs Officer. What has become of it? Why has it been ignored?

I quite agree that suitably attractive programmes for Natives are difficult to arrange with Non-Native programmes, but as regards the latter, why this wretched herding of the

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard."  
Sir—I should like to know in what manner the Nairobi Rotarians were treated with authority to collect money and to organize the forthcoming Jubilee Celebrations in Nairobi. As I understand matters they are actually less representative of the community than any other body in Nairobi and have no official or public standing whatever. I am not questioning their motives, but the principle of wrong. Loyal celebrations of an Imperial character should be in the hands of a body elected by the citizens and not left to a more or less insignificant section of the populace.

In order to avoid the forthcoming jubilee developing into a farce, the Council should at once assume the duties of a "Jubilee Celebration Committee" and instead of a catalogue appeal for funds let the public feel the full participation of public funds. The recent procedure savours too much of spending for a Sunday School treat.

Kenya has been in the limelight recently as a land with a future. Let us not allow Nairobi to achieve unenviable notoriety as being the only Capital City in the Empire where a disaffection of the minds between "King" and "Empire" exists.

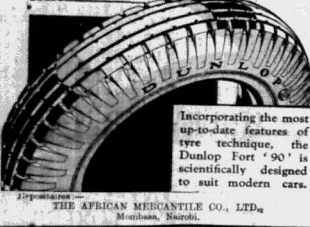

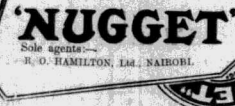

GERMANY STARTLES EUROPE

Effect of Decision to Enforce Conspiration

BRITAIN TAKEN COMPLETELY BY SURPRISE

New Situation Created

MINISTERS VISIT TO BERLIN NOW BEING RECONSIDERED

The decision by Germany to introduce, in spite of the terms of the Treaty of Versailles, general compulsory military service, has caused consternation throughout Europe, and Ministerial and diplomatic activity is taking place in the various capitals.

Britain was taken completely by surprise and a serious view is taken of the announcement. It is pointed out that Germany has not only ridden through the Treaty of Versailles, but has materially departed from the basis of recent negotiations.

Considerable significance is given to the issue of the proclamation on the eve of the visit of the British Ministers to Berlin. It is probable that the visit will be reconsidered in view of the new situation which has arisen.

Herr Hitler Explains

It is unofficially learned that London is in touch with Paris, Rome and other Versailles Treaty signatories. It is believed that among the topics discussed this morning were the desirability of any formal denunciation in reply to Herr Hitler's statement of the future trend of the disarmament discussions, and the new problems arising out of Sir John Simon's and Mr. Anthony Eden's projected visit to Berlin. Mr. Eden's subsequent visit to Warsaw and Moscow.

Similar ministerial and diplomatic activity prevails in other capitals and wires will be buzzing this week, while Europe's statesmen are reckoning themselves to the new situation.

Flags in Germany

France Favours Protest

Paris, March 16. In view of Germany's grave decision, France's diplomatic representatives in various foreign capitals have been telegraphically instructed to get into immediate contact with the Governments to which they are accredited.

Paris Press Opinion

Paris, March 17. Some newspapers, prevalent in Paris over the football match between France and Germany this afternoon at Antwerp, which is expected that 10,000 spectators will attend, including 6,000 Germans. It is feared that the Communists may prevent any incident liberating Germany from conditions against which all governments object.

Protest Imperative

There is reason to believe that there is strong official opinion in favour of bringing Germany's action before the League of Nations, though no decision has yet been reached. At the same time as the German population is considered to affect all other signatories of the Versailles Treaty, this opinion is expressed here that the most regular method of dealing with the matter would be through Geneva.

Intends Following Suit in the Autumn

Vienna, March 16. The Austrian Government last night ordered all newspapers to make moderate comments, although it allowed highly favourable remarks on Germany's action. Political circles in Vienna are of the opinion that the Government welcomes Germany's decision and intends following cooperation in Austria in the autumn.

Italy Watching Events

Rome, March 16. It is officially stated that the Government is getting into contact with the British and French Governments in regard to competition in Germany, and will make its attitude known subsequently.

ANOTHER "SCRAP OF PAPER"

Poland Doubts Germany's Sincerity

Warsaw, March 17. Germany's action has created little confidence in political circles, which it is considered to be the logical sequence of developments beginning with the French Declaration of February 18. It is pointed out that the declaration referred to the sum of the military clauses of the Versailles Treaty and Herr Hitler's intention was to prevent the Powers with fair agreement. It is believed that the Powers will find means to legalize Germany's action.

Nairobi Chamber Debates Air Mail Charges

WHY POSTAL RATES HAVE BEEN REDUCED IN THE UNION

Imperial Airways Concessions

POSTMASTER-GENERAL CHARGES COMPANY WITH INEQUALITY OF TREATMENT

The course of a statement during the debate on air mail charges at the last meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce.

The Postmaster-General asserted that Imperial Airways had not accorded East Africa equality of treatment with South Africa and that was the main reason why air mail postal rates from East Africa continued to be high.

The Postmaster-General described as contemptuous a reduction of new traffic from K.S. 10/- to 15/- per lb.

On behalf of Imperial Airways it was stated that developments which were being made in the service would not be practicable if rates were further reduced.

A debate revealed general dissatisfaction with the present charges.

Two Separate Issues

As Friday's meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce developed into a discussion on a question of air mail postal rates, the subject of the rate of air mail postage was being considered.

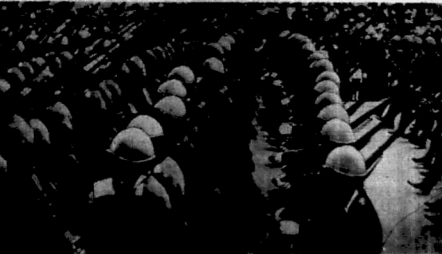

# ROAD COMPETITION WITH RAILWAY

## From Mombasa to Nairobi via Lamu

### CHAMBER DISCUSSION

The question of road and rail competition was one of the subjects that was considered at the last monthly general meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce on Friday, when Mr. K. E. Robinson, of the K. U. R. and H. administration, made a statement and reported to the Chamber for their active co-operation.

The subject was introduced by the reading of a letter, dated March 2, from the Superintendent of the Line in which reference was made to the growing traffic of high-valued goods conveyed by road motor transport from Mombasa to Nairobi, via Lamu and Meru. It was stated that for the period of three weeks prior to the writing of the letter over ten tons of high-valued goods had reached Nairobi via the road route and that losses were reported to be arriving daily exceeding from twenty to thirty packages each. It had also been stated that the majority of the Indian shopkeepers in Nairobi intended to postpone the route. The letter pointed out that the consideration of the Road Distribution Rates and a request was preferred that the Chamber would use its influence with the trading community to suppress the practice complained of.

Opening the debate Mr. T. A. Road stated that he was generally on the side of the Railway but that this was an exception. He considered that the Railway had never liked the Road Distribution Rates and that it was a poor game to "eat out their noses to spite their faces" and he did not think that it was worth while to support a profitless road traffic that was but a "troubling" nuisance" prevention of the total and not worth the expense of the Railway administration.

Mr. D. D. Puri stated that this was the first he had heard of the alleged road competition and doubted if the quantity of goods landed in Nairobi had been equalled to 10 tons. He did not think that a case existed to justify the threatened action of the Railway administration. Even transport on the Mombasa Road did not pay owing to the high proportion of break-bulk and he thought such break-bulk would be far greater on the Lamu-Meru route. He added that if the Railway brought the matter to the attention of the Indian Members' Chamber he would say that the matter was brought before and the danger of the possible loss of the Road Distribution Rate stressed.

**A Warning**  
Mr. Harwood expressed the opinion that the present situation, that had arisen as a result of the high Railway rates, could be regarded as the "betting on the red" and a warning that the time had come for an examination into the high rates charged, which, he felt, had resulted in the loss of the traffic from the Congo Basin.

Mr. R. E. Robinson, of the Railway administration, made a statement regarding the complaint contained in the Railway letter. The question of whether or not the Railway liked the Road Distribution Rates did not arise. The point at issue was not one of principle, but of fact. The complaint was the result of a serious defect in the road traffic and it was his opinion that the Railway should be asked to consider the possibility of a road route from Mombasa to Nairobi via Lamu and Meru. 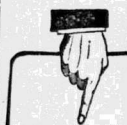

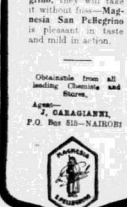

Mr. Fisher Dues proceeds to say that I know perfectly well that the sports and other functions will be separate for European and Indian.

May I be permitted to state that I attended the first meeting of the Mayor's Committee on the 14th inst. and was appointed only a week before to represent the Indian Merchants' Association before the Mayor's Committee—Mr. Abdul Wahid, Dr. De Souza and Mr. King Nanyo did not raise any objection to the sports etc. being separate for European and Indian children, and I naturally thought that these gentlemen, for various other good reasons in previous meetings, to this course. Hence I did not think it necessary to raise that question in the meeting I attended, neither did any other Indian member.

Incidentally, Sir, I do not remember having ever reported speech by Mr. Fisher Dues during the present co-ordination of European and Indian children in the present Empire on account of the education Department vote.

NEW REGULATIONS FOR MINING

Amended Method of Marking Claims

PEGGING COMPLAINTS

PROTECTION NOTICES AND EXPIRED CLAIMS

NEW Mining Regulations have been gazetted which will require careful study by those on the fields.

The new Regulations are cited in the Mining (Amendment Regulations) 1935 and are issued as a supplement to the Official Gazette.

The new Regulations do not come into force until April 15, thus enabling those interested to have time to study and understand them.

Protection Notices

The new clause referring to protection notices reads:— "3. The holder of a Prospecting Right may in any area open to prospecting himself post a notice to be called a Protection Notice."

"(1) shall follow as closely as possible Form No. 3 set out in the First Schedule (here) and

"(2) shall be carried on an upright vertical surface erected in a conspicuous and accessible place. All landward around such notice shall be cleared for a distance of 30 feet and the place shall be marked by a flag elevated 12 feet above the ground.

"The posting of such notice shall confer upon the holder the exclusive right of prospecting within an area of 300 yards measured horizontally from the notice in any direction (such area to be termed a "Protection Area") for a period of one month from the date of posting."

It will be seen that the word "himself" has been inserted which makes it clear that a "dummy" is not allowed, and at the request of the mines themselves a protection notice must now be marked

by a flag. It will also be noted that the area of 300 yards will now be measured "horizontally" from the notice so that it can be checked by a surveyor if necessary.

Development Certificates

Previously every application for renewal of locations had to be accompanied by a Certificate of Development. This procedure is now altered under the new regulation which reads:—

"(3) No application for a renewal shall be considered unless accompanied by the prescribed fees and statements of development for the current year duly counter-signed by an Inspector of Mines, as required under Regulation 98(1) (ii) of these Regulations."

(This Regulation 98 (1) (iii) now provides for the furnishing to the Inspector of Mines of a six-monthly statement of development commencing from the date of pegging in a simple form known as Form No. 14.)

Pegging Complaints

A major important amendment is that relating to complaints as to the validity of the pegging of any claims. The principal regulation (which permitted complaints up to a period of two years) has been amended to read:—

"No complaint shall be entertained as to the validity of the pegging of any claims on a location in respect of which a certificate of restriction has been in existence for not less than six months."

Another amendment which should be noted carefully amends original Regulation 23, which now reads as follows:—

"23 (1) The ground covered by a location which has expired shall not be covered by a Protection Notice or be open to prospecting or pegging until the completion of a period of thirty days from the date of such expiry."

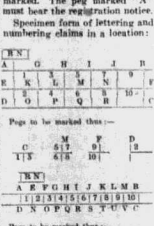
"Provided that the holder of a location which has expired shall not, unless authorized in that behalf by the Commissioners, directly or indirectly through an agent or by any means whatsoever re-peg or cover by a Protection Notice any portion of the expired location previously held by him until after the completion of a period of ninety days from the date of such expiry."

"(2) The Commissioners may, in his discretion, within thirty days after the date of expiry authorize the holder of a location that has expired to renew the whole or part of the area of such a location on payment of a penalty of Shs. 5 per claim in addition to the prescribed fee."

New Registration Notice

Another interesting point is the new specimen form of lettering and numbering claims. It does not affect claims previously marked. The peg marked "A" must bear the registration notice.

But the doctors, who are above the purely material outlook of the rest of the race, are not content to look upon an ounce of gold as something with which to buy something else.

Gold as a cure for rheumatism has been tried out with surprising success at the Royal Waterloo Hospital in London. One of the specialist physicians, in a report to the hospital committee, states that "many patients who were completely crippled are now walking about without any disability."

The treatment, which was generally unknown in this country before the present year, consists in giving a patient small injections of gold at intervals of five days. The gold is introduced in solution. Gold injections have for some time been extensively used in cases of tuberculosis.

# Nairobi's New Municipal Buildings

## HANDSOME AND IMPOSING STRUCTURE

### Excellent Appointments

#### VALUABLE ADDITION TO ARCHITECTURAL DEVELOPMENT OF TOWN

The new building for the Nairobi Municipal Council which is nearing completion will be a handsome and imposing structure and will be a valuable addition to the town's architectural development. The cost of construction is estimated at £25,000.

The original design was modified in order to effect economy, but the building as at present being constructed will lose in neither appearance nor utility, while extending to a great extent the original scheme is possible if found later to be desirable.

Three floors will be occupied by the various Municipal departments and offices, while a Council Chamber of large proportions has been provided for, special attention being paid to the acoustic properties.

### Description of Interior

The new offices for the Municipal Council, situated near the new Law Courts, will, when completed, constitute a handsome and imposing architectural and constructional achievement of which the capital may well feel proud. The architects, Messrs. Cobb and Archer, were commissioned to design the building as a result of submitting the winning design in a competition open to all architects in Eastern Africa, held some 18 months ago and judged by the late Mr. William Dunn.

The original design was based upon an estimated cost of £45,000, but circumstances made it necessary to revise costs and effect substantial economy, with the result that the present structure will be completed at a cost of £25,000. The building, however, loses nothing either in appearance or utility as a result of this decision. It is noteworthy that the design permits the extension of the scheme to its original dimensions should such a course be found desirable in the future, with the minimum outlay and a minimum of disturbance to both the structure and its official occupants.

### Building and Fittings

The building covers a total of 100 feet 6 ins. and the central wing extends back from the facade by 112 feet. The smaller wings being situated at

### A NEW FARMERS' ASSOCIATION

### Formed in Kinangop District

### THE INITIAL MEETING

KINANGOP, March 19. The first meeting of the newly formed Kinangop Farmers' Association was held at Gilgona on March 9. Capt. Fry, who is in the chair, and the majority of the farmers in the district, while letters were received from most of the remaining villages, the formation of the Association.

Close settlement and intensive dairying had brought the South Kinangop Dairy into being, and this had been followed by the formation of the Nairobi Dairy. The district was now being developed as a farming, dairying, and other district on the map. And it was the hope of the Government of Kenya to consider the district important in the future with a personal visit.

### Dairy Industry

Capt. Fry said that the district in common with most others, had been badly hit by the fall in dairy produce prices, but as he hoped that the early arrival of the rains would be a boon to the industry, he emphasized that the Association was a Farmers' Association, not a political debating society.

The meeting then discussed the proposed Dairy Control Bill. It was decided to ask the Director of Agriculture to see the Draft Bill, and to be allowed to give evidence before the committee considering the Bill. It was felt that if marketing control is established the growers' marketing may be hampered, and the Board's offer of agents unconsidered. The Association will therefore be in a position to advise the Government on this matter.

Other matters discussed were roads, fruit marketing, and the proposed Government growing by natives, and the fact that the Government is in the district. The roads which are now being laid out in the district will be a great benefit to the farmers.

BRITAIN'S AIR STRENGTH. London, March 19. ## RESULT OF CONTINUED WET WEATHER

### Most Districts Affected

Continued wet weather in Uganda has seriously affected the cotton crop, as a result of which the original estimate has had to be considerably reduced. Most of the districts have suffered from the untimely rain during February.

The rain did not abate during February and during the first half of March, and although there was subsequently fine weather, it is considered that the damage has already been done.

### Marketing Almost Completed

KAMPALA, March 18. The report of the Department of Agriculture on cotton (No. 9, 1934-35 crop) dated March 15, is a very pleasant reading. It is in no way unexpected, as the original estimate of 240,000 bales for the season but we were always hoping that it would be 'let up' for a little in order to give a better chance to the later planted cotton and a crop crop of the earlier plantings.

**London Conference of Parliaments**  
[“STANDARD” CORRESPONDENT.]  
London, March 17. (By Air Mail.)  
Neville before his so representative a delegation from the Empire Parliaments visited the United Kingdom as that which will assemble in London next July, at the invitation of the United Kingdom branch of the Empire Parliamentary Association.

The discussions will be informal and will provide opportunities for an interchange of views free from official restraint. At least three speakers will represent each Parliament.

Colonel the Hon. Denys Holt, the South African Minister of Agriculture, will head the delegation from the Union. The Canadian will include the Hon. J. Langstaff Bowman, Speaker of the House of Commons. The delegate from the Bahamas will be the Hon. Harcourt Malouin, whose 20th anniversary as Speaker in the House of Assembly was celebrated in February, 1934. Barbados will be represented by the newly elected Speaker, the Hon. H. B. G. Austin.

It is not known whether the Speaker of the Australian Commonwealth House of Representatives will be present, but one of the nominees of the Labour Party is the Hon. N. O. Martin, Speaker of the House from 1929-32.

**The Ground Floor**  
Immediately inside the vestibule is a circular, pillared vestibule, some 20 feet in diameter, on the west side of which the entrance Office is situated and on the east side the M. C. O. The general office, typists, etc. Behind the vestibule, in the central portion of the building, is a staircase hall, some 50 by 25 feet, and beyond this again (still in the same side) is a Reception Hall, some 50 by 50 feet, with a hard wood counter running from side to side. This hall is flanked by the offices of the Water Department, Superintendent's Office, and the offices of the Treasurer, Accountant and Auditor, etc. Access to the hall is provided by several entrances allowed to non-residents and natives and in the rear of the Reception Hall is an even smaller hall where the payments of license, etc. are effected.

The eastern portion of the main (to west) block is occupied by the Medical Officer of Health's Department including the office of the Medical Officer, Chief Sanitary Inspector, Sanitary Inspectors' Office, Food and Milk Office, Clinic and the office of the Lady M. O. H.

The western end contains the offices of the Building and Planning Inspectors, General Road Office, and a fire-resisting strong room, where provision has been made for the future installation of a document and ledger lift.

**The First Floor**  
The main staircase leads from the ground floor entrance hall to a locally made, wrought iron balustrade of exceptionally neat design (made by Mr. O. P. B.) with an oval hand rail and descender into a hall through which a corridor, above that on the ground floor, runs the length of the main block (east and west). The centre of the main block leads to the pediment of the portion containing the Mayor's Parlour and Committee Room, an air-spaced room some 20 by 17 feet, which has the Municipal Engineer's office and the Town Clerk's office on its west and east sides respectively.

**Council Chamber**  
Beyond the Mayor's Parlour, in the centre wing, is the ante-room to the Council Chamber. The Council Chamber is a high and airy room 60 feet by 34 feet, and a great deal of necessity has been displayed in its construction and layout. It consists of a large centre portion, at the north end of which is a raised dais supporting the Mayor's chair and, on either side of it, those of the Town Clerk and the Deputy Mayor. To preserve the proportions of the Chamber it is divided into a main portion, with aisles to east and west, by widely spaced Doric columns which support a cornice, above which are clerestory windows for the lighting of the main hall.

The main coffered ceiling is 23 feet high and that of the two aisles each 15 feet 6 ins. To assist acoustics, the main ceiling is suspended from the steel truss.

**Second Floor**  
The only Municipal Department that will not be accommodated in the new building is the Native Affairs Department. Drainage offices.

France Appeals to League of Nations

STRONGLY WORDED NOTE TO GERMANY

An Important Conference

BETWEEN BRITISH, FRENCH, AND ITALIAN STATESMEN

France has appealed to the League of Nations against Germany's arbitrary decision and has addressed a strongly worded Note to Germany on the subject.

Another important development is the calling of a conference in Paris between British, French and Italian statesmen, prior to Sir John Simon's visit to Berlin.

The French Government has decided to introduce legislation immediately authorizing greatly increased expenditure on arms and particularly on bombing planes.

Millions More for Arms

(FRANCIS SMITH'S AGENCY.) Paris, March 21. A meeting of French, British and Italian representatives in connection with Germany's rearmament is to be held in Paris before the week-end.

A decision to this effect was reached this morning by the Council of Ministers which also approved of the French Note of protest which is to be handed to the German Foreign Minister this afternoon.

The text is understood to be strongly worded in its insistence upon the necessity of maintaining the legality of international obligations.

The Note to Germany (says a later message) presents against the violation of the League of Nations of February 3 and of the international agreements which respect for international undertakings is an essential principle.

The Note affirms that no accession to the League of Nations is possible during the coming negotiations.

Reassuring Gesture

London, March 21. Mr. Anthony Eden will reply to the Italian ambassador, Signor Sforzini, Italy, at Saturday's meeting between representatives of Britain, France and Italy in Paris.

The decision to send Mr. Anthony Eden to contact with M. Laval and Signor Sforzini has succeeded calmed apprehensions arising from the past few days.

It is learned that the French Note to Britain on Sunday morning is an assurance to the League of Nations or other measures against German rearmament.

The fact that Britain did not reply but sent a Note to Germany, without prior discussion with France, caused irritation in France and there was much plain speaking during the discussion.

Though the British, French and Italian envoys, both the latter strongly urging consultation prior to the Berlin visit.

To See the Duce?

Following Sir John Simon's mission to Berlin further consultations will occur between Britain, France and Italy regarding the next step to be taken by Sir John Simon and Mr. Anthony Eden will see Signor Mussolini.

The French decision to appeal to Geneva is regarded by British political circles as a step towards the psychological expediency, though it is realised in London that the policy of rearmament would not constitute the raising of the matter at Geneva's door or later.

The Peace Treaty is unlikely and there is no sign of any peace talks under Article 10 of the Covenant.

Peace at Stako

M. Flaminio, addressing the Senate today, said that peace would be brought before the League of Nations.

IMPROVED RAIL REVENUE

Notable Increase in Exports

First Quarter's Figures

Administrator's Estimates Greatly Exceeded

There is a marked improvement in the Kenya and Uganda Railway and Harbours finances shown by the most recent official figures.

While due allowance must be made for the fact that the first quarter of each year is a peak period for exports, the actual improvement over the comparative period for 1934 is distinctly encouraging.

For example, Income from Traffic received at the Coast from January 1 to March 9, 1935, exceeded the estimated average by a sum of 27,381 tons, or 10.7 per cent, against the same period of 1934, which was 25,781 tons, or 9.7 per cent, below the estimate.

The total exports for the first three months of the year, 1935, amounted to 65,734 tons, compared with 57,381 tons for the corresponding period of 1934, an increase of 8,353 tons. Imports raised from 84,046 for the period January to February 28 amounted to 15,228 tons, an increase of 14,21 per cent, over those for the same period of 1934, which amounted to 13,233 tons.

Principal Exports

Among the principal export commodities received at the Coast for the period January 1 to March 9, 1935, were the following: In each case the figures in brackets represent the corresponding period of 1934: Cotton, 11,000 tons (8,100 tons); Cotton Seed, 10,000 tons (8,000 tons); Malt, 5,000 tons (4,000 tons); Steel, 20,000 tons (17,000 tons). It will be seen that the percentage increase in each case is as follows: Cotton, 35 per cent; Cotton Seed, 25 per cent; Malt, 25 per cent; Steel, 18 per cent.

Train mileage has increased by approximately 24.77 per cent, and the traffic passing through Nairobi during February 1935, was 100,000 tons, or 10 per cent, more than for any other period since May 1933.

New Traffic Record

A new traffic record was created during February when, on a given day, 3,193 gross tons of traffic passed through Nairobi, the previous best in the history of the railway being 3,400 tons for a given day in 1932.

It will thus be seen that not only are expectations being exceeded, but that the actual increase over the corresponding period of 1934 has also been exceeded. It must be realised, of course, that the figures quoted are approximate only and, as such, subject to revision. It can be seen, however, that the actual figures will vary by a very small margin only.

## CHAIRMAN OF IMPERIAL AIRWAYS LOOKS TO THE FUTURE

### Collaboration of Transport

#### TRANSATLANTIC SERVICE LIKELY IN TWO YEARS' TIME.

In view of the recent debate on air mail charges at the March meeting of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce special interest attached to important pronouncements on the probable collaboration between air, rail and sea services at a transport dinner in London.

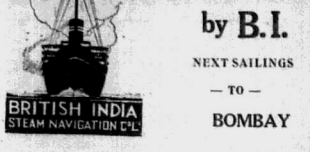
