THE CEREAL MARKET

Cause of Depression in Maize Futures

Following is the weekly market report issued by the Kenya Farmers' Association:—

Maize
The continued progress of the Argentine crop is the main cause of the present depression in maize futures. During the past week the re-European demand for all classes of maize has been disappointing and practically no business has taken place.

South Africa is pushing to sell and African Two has been sold at 19/4 1/2. Forward prices indicate African Two at 17/6 from May to July, with Plate maize at 16/4 1/2.

Wheat
There has been a fair demand during the past week for Manitoba and Plate wheats. Manitoba Two was quoted at 29/6, Australian 25/6, with 64 lbs. Bona at 22/6 1/2.

French Wheat is again stronger in the feed market and the French Government has granted permits for an export of a further 50,000 tons, 20,000 of this has already been sold in Great Britain and this is having a serious effect on the feed market as well as milling wheat prices. Some of the French devalued wheat has been sold at as low as 1s. per quarter.

Oats remain cheap. Good Whites worth 17/6 1/2. Buckwheat: The market is depressed and Manchuria is offering 47/- March April shipment. Peas, Japanese 41/-, Dutch Marrowfat 14/4.

PEACEMAKER KILLED

Hit Over Head During a Fight

Sentence of two years imprisonment with hard labour was passed at the criminal sessions yesterday on a Mombasa man named Muthaba, who was charged before Mr. Acting Justice Gurney with three Native associates with the death of Rifana, a Nyanja of Matungulu on March 1, last.

The Crown allegation was that a fight took place and that while the deceased was attempting to get away from the spot where he was hit over the head with a heavy stick by the accused. He died as a result of the blow which fractured the skull.

Asked to plead the accused said: "We had a fight and during the fight I killed him. I was very drunk."

Two of the deceased's relatives gave evidence as to identification of the body. In each case the accused was asked whether he wished to put any questions to be replied to and in each case he formed that he did not wish to pay legal money. He was informed that that was no concern of the court.

The accused was not represented. Mr. J. A. Bennett appeared for the Crown. The witnesses all expressed the view that the accused had done wrong.

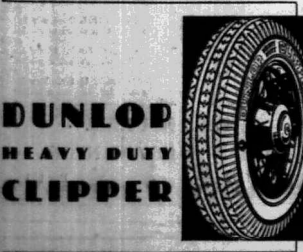

Investigation by Special Committee

WIDE POWERS

Efforts to Obtain Biggest

[BY WIRELESS.] Rugby, April 4.—In the House of Commons last night the proposal was debated for the planning of industrial reorganisations and revival of the nation for the appointment of a committee with very wide powers to investigate, among other matters, the incidence of taxation upon industrial development and the alleged excessive cost of distribution, with a view to increasing purchasing power by effecting a fall in retail prices accompanied by dislocation in production.

Replying on the debate, the President of the Board of Trade Mr. Walter Runciman, suggested that the planners had not faced many awkward problems of wages, of displacement of men by machines, of the necessity for keeping money cheap, of the pull between the necessity of raising prices and the necessity of improving the standard of living. Profits could be obtained by lower prices, but lower prices could not be obtained by any universal price control.

Much had already been done in different ways by different industries with active stimulation by the Government. He instanced the tramp shipping industry and the national open market. The Government's guarantee of part compensation for the extra costs now approved by a large majority in the cotton industry for the selling of 200,000 redundant spindles. Progress in the iron and steel trade under Government pressure was also referred to and the fostering of reconstruction in regard to electricity and agriculture. He hoped soon that unification of railway royalties might be achieved.

National organisation of industries with some measure of Government assistance and control had, he said, been proposed in particular cases and would continue to be encouraged but that more was not necessarily of general value and would always be subject to the approval of the Government by strict conditions.—British Official Wireless Service.

Drastic Proposals for Taxation

ARMS INDUSTRY DURING WAR PERIODS

[BY WIRELESS.] Washington, April 3.—One of the most spectacular and most dramatic tax proposals has been published by the Senate Arms Trade Committee in the form of a draft bill imposing throughout the industry during a period of war a 50 per cent. tax on profits of six per cent. or less and 100 per cent. on profits exceeding six per cent.

It establishes for individuals a tax of six per cent. on all non-exempted earnings and a 10 per cent. surtax on earnings in excess of 10,000 dollars.

The proposal directly challenges the Administration's moderate McSwain Bill and foreshadows a major controversy in Congress.

CIVIL WAR IN CHINA

Communists Advancing in the South

First Part of Group Hospital Scheme

IMPROVED ACCOMMODATION FOR AFRICANS & ASIANS

Instead of Central Offices

BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED NEAR MEDICAL LABORATORIES

It is probable that a beginning will be made in the near future with the carrying into effect of the Group Hospital Scheme.

The first objective will be the provision of new separate hospital accommodation for the African and Asian communities.

An Early Start

The "East African Standard" learns that the Government of Kenya is considering a re-organisation of the present Central Offices which should be carried out for the present.

After allocating an adequate portion of existing loan balances to provide the working capital of the Administration, it is proposed that an amount (probably in the neighbourhood of £100,000) will be made available for the improvement of health services, mainly in connection with the Group Hospital Scheme which has been under consideration for two years.

It is understood that in the first instance the scheme provides for the erection of a Native Civil Hospital on modern lines with between 200 and 800 beds.

Therefore, or simultaneously, that a beginning be made with the erection of a Native Civil Hospital for the Asian community.

The present Native Civil Hospital has long ago outlived its usefulness and the provision of hospital facilities for the Asian community has been recognised for some time to be a matter of emergency.

It will be recalled that the site selected for a group of hospital buildings is that on the Aerodrome Road where the modern and standard Method Laboratories were built some time ago. It was considered that the efficiency of the hospital services would be increased by centralisation round the laboratories.

The "East African Standard" believes that these proposals are now in front of Government, emanating from the Long Committee, and that a Government statement may shortly be expected.

Zanzibar, March 31. According to a report by the Commissioner of Police, the "pussing out" tests of the latest squad of recruits for the Zanzibar government in the type of applicants for enlistment in the force. The squad consisted of twenty natives of whom seventeen were from Zanzibar, two from the Seychelles and one from Tanganyika.

Their attainments included the following: one was able to write another language; seven were strong swimmers; six could swim and eight row a boat. The standard of military fitness, was particularly good. Personal Souvenir To be Awarded by Selection

The following official announcement was issued by the Government of Kenya yesterday:

The King has approved the issue of a Silver Medal in commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of His Majesty's accession to the Throne.

The medal will be struck for issue as a personal souvenir from His Majesty to persons in the Crown Service in Kenya today and in other parts of the Empire.

The following is a description of the medal, which will be designed by Sir William Gombell, J.B.S.

The medal will be worn suspended from a ribbon of red, white and blue, with a red centre stripe of equal width on either side.

The King's Silver Jubilee Medal is classified as an official medal, and on all occasions with other decorations and medals worn on the left breast.

The other commemorative medal, which has been prepared by the Royal Mint as the King's Commemorative Medal for the Jubilee, will not be worn.

It is also notified that any medals manufactured commercially for sale on the occasion of the Jubilee should not be worn in such a manner that they might be confused with His Majesty's Medal.

ROAD AND WEATHER REPORT

Mr. Colton-Press writes as follows:—
 The weather report this week is anything but encouraging and it will have to continue in a woe for East Africa, excepting the southern, Tanganyika highlands. I still have faith, however, that we will get more of the same future.

In Kenya the wettest place this week was Nairobi with .96 of an inch, followed by Sombera .60 and Nyeri .50 of an inch. Practically all the reporting stations show a fall return. The roads are in fair to good condition, and the improvement which has been made on the road running through the Kabung Valley is simply marvellous. A great improvement has also been made on the Nairobi-Lelington road which was getting very badly out of it.

In Tanganyika the roads are in fair to good condition, and one can motor up the whole way from the Thomson border, although parts of the road are of course very rough.

In Uganda they have had several fairly heavy showers, but road work is in excellent condition, as all rain just simply drains away.

Cordial Exchanges

Birney, D.S.O., lately General Manager, Ribblesdale Hallways, now Commissioner for Development, Boy Scouts, Imperial Headquarters, stated in his address that there were now nearly a million Boy Scouts enrolled from forty-two different countries and Colonies. He added that at the recent Australian Jubilee, the Indian contingents consisting of varying nationalities, races and languages, all sang and ate together—a lesson of more than political interest for some of our politicians.

Mr. R. S. Cole, Honorary Secretary for Overseas Units, Church Lads Brigade, told of how the British Naval Company, C.L.B. had helped in the starting of a Newfoundland Naval Company of the coming visit to the United Kingdom of a detachment from British Royal Marines, which had been exchanged between and common interests that bound together the Newfoundland Regiment, Australia and the Cape; and how he was just opening up in the depressed areas, and of work done by coloured people in South Africa since some of their own people from becoming demoralized and to win their self-respect.

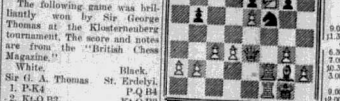

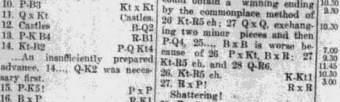

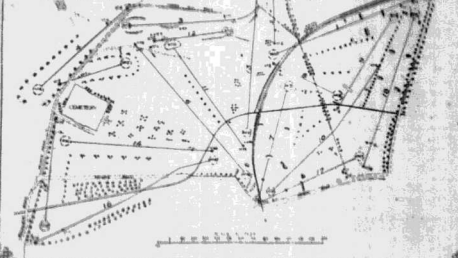

ALTERATIONS AND IMPROVEMENTS TO THE COURSE

The New Layout

STRIKING FEATURES OF SOME OF THE HOLES

Since the inception of the Railway Golf Club in 1921 the course has undergone many alterations and improvements and in 1934 ambitious work was done and the full 18 hole course was opened with a match against the Kenya Golfing Society.

The layout of the holes as they planned did not conform to the common practice in Kenya, where the 18 holes radiate from a central clubhouse.

The H.O. layout was responsible for a certain amount of confusion, and on competition days the delay in getting off the first tee was quite noticeable. Provision had also to be made for the thirty carts at a half way house built near the 9th hole.

The diagram shows the new layout and it will be agreed, by those who know the course, that full advantage has been taken of the land available. In fact many people find it difficult to realize that an 18 hole course exists in such a small area. The length of the course is now 6,142 yards, or 4 1/2 miles up the scale for length in Kenya.

Some of the principal reasons for the recent alterations were to provide two separate 9 holes, starting and finishing at the clubhouse, and to level some of the mountainous land between the 12th and 13th holes.

This has been achieved by constructing one new hole (the 9th), and rearranging the order of play over the other holes. The older members will appreciate the new layout as they have negotiated the climb at the second hole there is no more climbing; there is nothing in the second 9 holes which can be called a climb.

An attractive feature of the new layout is the diversity of the holes and variety of outlook from every well divided set of tees. No two consecutive holes run parallel to each other. The course is well divided into short and long holes, all calling for good golf if the correct figures for the holes are to be obtained. Below is the table of distances, and the 18 is 623 yds. being to be easily broken.

Features of the Course

The course is perfectly situated within the confines of Whitehouse Road and Lower Hill Road, the main line of country and the main artery of the country to live up to the title of the Railway Golf Club it has to have a railway track going through the middle of it.

No. 6, the provision of a magnificent view of Kenya mountains, and the view of Nairobi, makes a highly credit of the tee. No. 8, a good one shorter of 200 yards through a gap in the trees. No. 6 brings you to the clubhouse and a welcome refreshment.

No. 11 is the old 4th and one of the best holes on the course; No. 12, the old 12th is also a very good hole with its approach to the green controlled by the canal and trees on either side of the fairway. No. 16 is a very good "dog leg" hole, though on a view of trees. No. 18—a good finishing hole with a good view of the 16th, which were people consider the best hole of the lot.

THE ROYAL JUBILEE

THE COMPLETE LONDON PROGRAMME

Detailed plans for the King's Jubilee celebrations in London were announced by the London County Council on Saturday, writes the London correspondent of the East African Standard. In an air mail letter dated March 19. The estimated cost of the whole of the proposals, which have been prepared by the General Purposes Committee, and will be submitted to the Council on Tuesday, amounts to £21,700. On Friday, May 21st, the King and Queen will attend a civic reception at the County Hall, where they will be received by Lord Bess, Chairman of the Council. About £21,000 will be spent on entertainments for school children, the King and Queen will be present at a banquet, and inmates of the Council's hospitals and institutions. A day's holiday, with pay, for all the Council staff on May 10th, or another day in lieu, is also recommended. Where the exigencies of the public services make it impossible for the day's holiday to be taken at additional day's pay will be given.

Dare for School Children

An exhibition open to the public will be held in the County Hall illustrating the progress of local government in the County of London during the King's reign. The entertainment details include—Additional band performances, and open spaces on May 6, and at Victoria Embankment Gardens, on each day of the week beginning on that date, at a cost of about £200. Facilities for dance, tennis, and other sports are planned for the afternoon, and evening at additional fee and tobacco and cigarettes will be issued in the evening. The Council's bridges and buildings on the Royal routes are to be illuminated. Two extra half-day holidays and an open day for parents will be given at the Schools, and 7000 children whose homes are not near the Jubilee route will be taken to the County Hall to view the procession on May 11. A pamphlet illustrating the outstanding events and national progress during the King's reign will be distributed throughout the schools.

B.B.C. Plans

Full details of the B.B.C. plans are reserved for a later date. For among the events already fixed for the Jubilee is the broadcast by the Prince of Wales on behalf of His Majesty King George VI on May 3 at 8 p.m. This will be preceded by a special service, the music to be composed by Gustav Holst, who the producer will be the Archbishop of Dublin, Primate of All Ireland, the Bishop of London, the Bishop of Exeter, the Archbishop and Dr. H. H. Hughes, Moderator of the Federal Synod of the Church of Scotland, who will take part in the service.

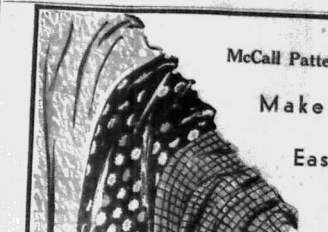

This article deals with part of the training of a sheep-dog, and is based on notes of my own work. I have to confess that I know very little of the training of a sheep-dog, but I have been able to get some information from the following sources:—(1) "The Sheep-dog" by M. P. Leitch, who is a well-known authority on the subject, and (2) the training notes of a well-known sheep-dog trainer, which I have seen in the course of my work.

Having found the puppy right away by gaining the belly of the dog, and then, a very important preliminary. The puppy being almost three months old, I left in the kitchen or kennel. Many trainers educate the latter just as then the youngster will associate his lessons with the joy of getting his freedom, and improve the person who led him out will be loved and feared. No one has his owner and mother should ever be permitted to let him out or brush and feed him. Sheep on Hay Making
 I cannot think this article with any of the other articles, so I have written a few words about hay, which are of great value for sheep-breeding, but it is very important to emphasize the fact that however much hay one can make, and however high its value it must be supplemented by some succulent food during the dry season, to maintain high production.

Green Fodder Crops
 The next problem is that of crop that can be used for green feeding during the dry season. For the high altitude, the Kales, both Marroonstem and Thousand head, they are of particular value for the few fortunate farmers who produce milk for liquid sale, for they impart a very pleasing colour to the milk, giving it an appearance of great richness. I do not consider, however, that the Turp-Soos and Mangold are likely to prove of great value in this country, on account of the relatively high cost of cultivation, and further, the incidence in the case of the two former of some damage in the early stages, which will wipe out the crop completely in many areas.

There still remains for farmers at lower altitudes a wide range of suitable green fodder crops, which I have shown that the problem of increasing milk production by the use of the resources available on the farm, can be approached by the improvement of the grazing in one of three ways: improvement of the natural sward with certain severe limitations. The sward of natural grass, seeds mixtures, but in spite of this one must inevitably face adverse periods when it is necessary to supplement even this improved grazing. However, we have in this country an excellent range of foreign crops, suitable either for conversion into hay for winter-feeding green, which will serve this purpose.

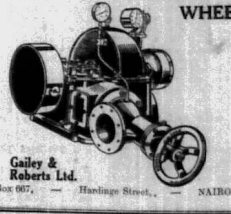

GROWTH OF MOTOR INDUSTRY

Improvement in After Sales Service

UP-TO-DATE METHODS

Trade's Part in Developing Country

IMPORTANCE OF GOOD ROADS

The growth of the motor industry in Kenya is one of the really remarkable things in this country's history. To a trader years ago the number of motor cars in Nairobi, and indeed, in the country as a whole, was less than one hundred to-day they have increased one hundred fold and more. The development of the Colony has been primarily based on the motor, with the result that if the car was to expand so had the other. As the various districts were opened up, the rate of motor increase was on an increasing scale.

And just as the sale of cars has increased steadily in proportion, so has the after-sales service improved. It is not so many years ago that garages were few and far between; the expansion in this direction was hardly in keeping with the expansion of the sales. Squares were difficult to obtain, and repairs a considerable time in being effected. To-day that has been swiftly remedied. Every big distributing firm has its efficient garage. It is a primary part of the trade, and as the importance of a good after-sales service became recognized, it was not long before the expansion in this regard was in keeping with the needs.

Latest Appliances

Every important garage today is possessed with the latest appliances for servicing the car. Three or four years ago selling and growing a car was a laborious job; to-day, through the employment of special plant the labor involved has been decreased by 75 per cent, and the efficiency gain up by one hundred per cent.

And, there are few service stations which do not have a complete staff of highly trained and highly efficient mechanics.

Repairs are thoroughly looked before the car owner there is passed out to the owner. These services have all come through a general recognition of the fact that the mere selling of a car to a customer was not everything; there had to be some reasonable degree of assurance that if anything did go wrong that it could be put to rights in the shortest possible time.

Service

As a result in the production of the motor car has progressed or has it helped in the way of fitting service. All of the larger concerns are now equipped with the most modern plant essential for the purpose.

Within the past two years a further step has been taken in regard to marketing, and that was the introduction of buses to Nairobi. Without a doubt they have opened their own and their own. From a station service it has steadily grown until such a time that it has gradually improved in the number of buses, and the shortening of the intervals of running time.

Postal stations have also improved and increased. Several of these are small garages, while others have very complete repair stations and oiling and greasing fittings.

The Road Question

But perhaps the greatest improvement of all has been in the road building. Good roads are essential in a country whose future is intimately bound up with the motor industry. It is not so very long ago that Nairobi, possessed but one macadamized road; there is now not one principal thoroughfare which has not been macadamized. This is not only the

case in Nairobi, however, but in other parts of the Colony as well. Gradually the macadamized parts are extending, while the murrum surfaces are also being improved. All-weather roads are to be constructed almost throughout the whole of the country. In and around the larger centres the improvement to the surfaces is the more noticeable, but even in the less populated areas and districts increased attention is being paid to roads, an essential thing if the districts are to be encouraged to be opened up to the greatest extent.

When the history of Kenya comes to be written it will be found that right through the whole of the motor industry and the parts it played will be set down in big letters. It has played a big and important part in opening up and developing the country.

60 M.P.H. OVER 6IN. RAIL SPIKES

A Remarkable Demonstration

One of the features of the Austin range for this year is that where some of the models are concerned alternative engine sizes are offered. There is a great deal to be said for this system; for the body and the frame in question are perfectly well suited to engines of different powers, and the buyer has free scope for his preferences in the matter of number of cylinders and the horse power which he is prepared to have. Thus in the one chassis there is obtainable on 14 h.p. four-cylinder, a 15.8 h.p. six-cylinder, or a 15.9 h.p. six-cylinder. With a comparatively big engine, such as the 15.9 h.p. six-cylinder, in a car which otherwise is identical with that propelled by the 11.9 h.p. four-cylinder unit, a good power-to-weight ratio is obtainable, which is of considerable importance as regards acceleration.

The "Acad" Saloon

This can be said of the "Acad" saloon fitted with the larger six-cylinder engine. It has ample power to drive a fairly light car at a good speed and to give it useful acceleration. One of the things to be noted during the test run was that the car could be tested under low speed conditions owing to the fact that the car had only one

motor of three or four units with the result that the engine was far from being knocked up. Still, it was possible to gauge what the car could do once the initial tightness had gone, and the engine became freer.

It is an engine which is simple and quiet in its running, and a good name on top gear. The gear ratios are well suited to everyday conditions, while the first is sufficiently low to take the car up any gradient. It is not the sort of an engine you so flexible as the engine. Synchromesh is fitted to the second, third and top, facilitating changing under any conditions. The change can be made just as with most engines, and it will be found to respond either.

The Engine

The engine is possessed of pleasing notes in all gears, never at any time becoming harsh. Again it is remarkably free from vibration; it takes the most cramped getroads easily, and little motion can be felt—a tribute to the excellent springing and the road-holding capabilities of the car. Control of the steering requiring only the slightest pressure on the wheel. It is accurate and light in maneuvering. The brakes are responsive in their action and have plenty of power.

The equipment is a very complete including a twelve volt lighting and starting system with a hand starter switch on the dashboard, horn, and compressed vapour for the dynamo. It is well finished, leather upholstery of obvious good quality being used, a very restrained board is there, a conspicuous body bolt, traffic apparatus controlled from the centre of the steering wheel, the signals being of the type which return automatically. A wiper blade wiper screen wiper is fitted.

As regards the power unit itself

the carburetor is easily got at while under the bonnet is a locker, offering a very full range of tools. It is a car possessed of very distinctive lines, with a long bonnet which enhances the appearance. Flowing lines and wings give it a very attractive exterior.

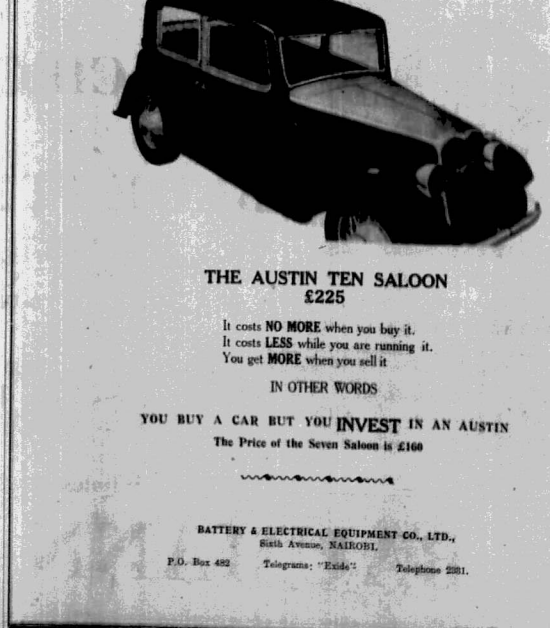

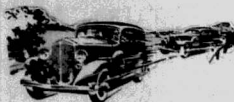

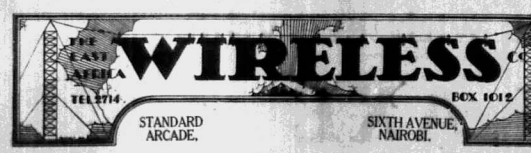

Revised Laws for Contract

NEW RULES TO OPERATE UNTIL 1940

International Agreement

New laws of contract bridge to be in force early in 1940, have been agreed upon by the Portland Club, the White Club of New York, and the Commission Française du Bridge, several to an announcement received by air mail.

Particulars of the alterations made by the new laws are given in the following statement issued by the Portland Club:

Three years ago the difference between the laws of contract bridge as played in Europe and America were enormous, and a code of international bridge law was promulgated by the Portland Club of London, the White Club of New York and the Commission Française du Bridge of Paris. During these three years in course of which we have had more or less of the three, including those which require alteration or improvement in the latter, and which have been for some time being discussed in the matter, and arrived at certain conclusions.

A Preliminary Conference

In the nature of things these conclusions were not identical and the card committees of the English and French parties to the international agreement therefore appointed Mr. A. Noel as chairman of the Portland Club and Mr. H. R. Wood as chairman of the French committee, to confer with Mr. Harold S. Wood, chairman of the American committee on the subject of the new laws.

The result of a new and simple code of the contract bridge laws, to come into operation on January 1, 1940, will remain in force unchanged at least until January 1, 1941.

The Chief Changes

The most important difference between the new code and the one in force at the present time is in the scoring. "No trump" becomes forty for the first odd trick, and thirty each for all subsequent tricks. Trick tricks not vulnerable remain at fifty each, and vulnerable they will now follow the same principle and be 100 each.

All gradations in the under-trick penalties when doubled also disappear, save that when not vulnerable the first under-trick penalty will be 20, and all subsequent under-tricks 200 each. Vulnerable the first under-trick will be 200, and all subsequent under-tricks 200 each. The little bonus is retained at present 500 not vulnerable and 750 vulnerable. The grand slam bonus is retained to 1,000 not vulnerable and 1,500 vulnerable.

Laws and Properties

The laws and properties are divided into five periods—the period of the preliminary to the rubber, the period of the shuffle, the cut and the deal, the period of the auction, the period of the play, and the period of the score. The laws of the one do not apply to those of another period, and it is therefore only necessary in the event of a change of period to change the laws which apply to that period. There are sub-laws in each period, and the laws are so arranged that an index is unnecessary and reference in the headings of the laws will enable a player to find quickly to look up.

In the preliminary period one change of compulsory new deal if any player looks at his cards before the deal, or if he looks at another player's cards. Another change is the abolition

of the "seven" table. Any club which wished to do so could continue to play the "seven" table, but officially it is left to each club to decide whether to play it or not. Censorship of Films in Uganda CRITICISMS OF THE PRESENT SYSTEM

Petition to the Governor

THE present system of film censorship in Uganda under which films which may not be entirely suitable for exhibition to Africans are banned entirely from exhibition in the Protectorate, has resulted in a petition being drawn up by the European community for presentation to the Governor.

The petition states that the banning of these films adversely affects the Europeans who are denied reasonable enjoyment and relaxation, while financial loss is caused to the proprietors of cinema halls.

It is suggested that the present Ordinance be amended so as to provide for the classification of films for universal exhibition and for non-universal exhibition only. It also suggests that the certificates of the British Board of Film Censors and those of the Kenya Censor Board be accepted.

A Difficult Problem

THE system of censoring films in Uganda has been the subject of criticism lately and has been translated into action by means of a petition which was presented to His Excellency the Governor. There are many reasons for a question of the personal of the Censor Board coming within that category of work. The present principle of censorship, as applied to the cinema, is that there is no doubt that it is a problem involving difficulties and one which cannot be solved by the usual means.

The banning of a film may mean the loss of a number of Asiatic dollars and the loss of a number of jobs, yet they therefore insist upon their own language or their own culture. He has very few of the amenities of life in this country and the cinema is a safe relaxation to which he looks forward as his past time after a week's work. He expects the film to be an entirely different thing from what he has seen in his own country. It is mainly for the European audience that these films are shown and he has no objection to their being shown to him.

As the present regulations seem to be too strict, it is suggested that the months of the ban should be extended to six months. It is also suggested that some alteration be made. There should be no more of the same kind of films. Forms of Relief

RENT SUBSIDIES, WRITING-OFF OF DEBTS AND REVALUATION OF LAND

The Commission appointed by the Government of the Union of South Africa to enquire into the question of the granting of relief to settlers on the land, who have been passing through a very difficult period, has now completed its report.

The recommendations include a subsidy of 11 per cent. on the rent or interest paid by settlers on mortgages, a substantial writing-off of principal debts owed to Government, and the revaluation of land in circumstances where the land has depreciated in value owing to soil erosion or other causes.

The terms of reference of the Commission were very wide, and included all factors of the position of the original Land Settlement Act.

Rectifying Earlier Mistakes

The only other murder case heard by the House of Lords, was in December 1919.

BLIND MAN WHO GOT HIS SIGHT BACK

Disappointed With What He Sees

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT]
London, March 26.
(By Air Mail).
For nearly 20 years—since he was two—Mr. David Williams, whose home is in the Carnarvonshire hills, has been blind. But now he can see.

He has been miraculously operated on by Mr. Arthur Thomas, the London eye specialist, and he is in London, seeing life as it is today for the first time. And he is disappointed—disappointed in human fate.

"My Ideal Too High"
"Mr. Williams is remaining under observation at the London School for the Blind at 5, Seville Cottages and in a letter written in Braille to Miss Leonora Davis, a tutor to the North Wales Society for the Blind, she would hit his case to the notice of Mr. Thomas, she says.

"Now I am beginning to make out faces of people, and I am able to make out the outlines of pictures of St. George."
"I have been for plenty of walks round London, and I have had a great disappointment in seeing human faces."
"My ideal was far too high, and in a way I have had to go down a lot."

"What I Imagined—"
"I will give you what I imagine a human being was. I like for 'example' a tall, well-proportioned man, I thought he was big from the ground up, and that his sides were something cylindrical like a walking stick."

"A man who was 'broad' I imagined was the same shape as a cricket bat, and that all faces were peaceful."
"Perhaps you would like me to say what I imagined your sex looked like. If you want to I will send you a drawing of your next letter."

" Hoping to see an Artist"
"Yesterday my doctor gave me lengthy tests in sight, touch and hearing. It is over so interesting. In a short time I hope to write a letter and to surprise you."

"Some day I hope to be able to write an article on sight, but every time I try to start my article I see something new and my mind is puzzled."
"When I see fully I hope to be an artist, so that I can draw the faces of human beings as I imagined them to be when I was blind."

BRITISH MEMORIAL TO MRS. CURIE

Hospital to be Built at Hampstead

APPEAL FOR FUNDS

Scientists, surgeons and politicians listened recently to a speech by the younger daughter of Mrs. Curie, the discoverer of radium, at a luncheon at Clarendon House for the funds of the British Memorial to Mrs. Curie, the Marie Curie Hospital, at Hampstead.

The hospital is appealing for £50,000 for endowment and £20,000 a year for maintenance. Mr. Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, who presided, announced that the result of the table collection at the luncheon was £3,875.

The principal guests included Lord Rutherford, Sir William Bragg, Mary Curie, Mrs. Curie, Lord Hawley, Lord Macmillan, the Spanish Ambassador, Mr. Howells and many famous women doctors.

DISTINGUISHED ENGINEER DEAD

Dr. J. M. MacLaren

"The Times" reports the death of Dr. James MacLaren MacLaren at his home in Cornwall at the age of 69. The "Mining Journal" on a long obituary notice says of him:—

The son of the second engineer for the Transvaal mines in New Zealand, he was, so to speak, born in the mining industry, and his marriage was associated with the old Cornish mining and smelting families of the Williams and Bellows. He was trained under Professor Park at the Thomas Baskerville School of Mines, here graduated at Otago University. He accepted a post with the Mines Department and one of his earliest projects dealt with the prospects in Charters Towers and North Queensland. After several years in London he accepted the post of mining specialist in the Geological Survey of India. In his travels he visited the Shan States and was largely instrumental in securing adequate capital for the development of the old workings at Bowdoin, now the Barrina Corporation mines, one of the greatest single mines in the world.

After leaving India he returned to England, and in the earlier period of his consulting career he was largely associated with Messrs. Bewick, Mossing and Co. Shortly after the War he went to Western Australia, where his conclusions governed the policy of the chief companies for many years. It was only in recent years that Dr. MacLaren has been extraordinarily successful in the result. The great enterprise which the Consolidated Goldfields had been acquiring a chain of claims on the extension of the Rand westwards from the Bonfontein, which have been included in the formation of the West Virginia group of interests, was finally approved, largely on his recommendations.

Possibly there was no part of the world other than Russia where Dr. MacLaren had not done extensive work. The upper districts of Alaska, the tin mines of Bolivia, the rubber lands of Colombia, Nevada, Mexico, Korea, the Sudan, Persia, the oilfields of North Africa, the late and important operations of Captain's Plan in New South Wales are fields whose development have the impress of his personality. Though he preferred to see his work "done" which his "Mining Journal" published in 1928, it is the classic work of his kind. He is survived by his widow and four children.

It was a "bombardment of a fluorescent screen in a dark room" that was a woman there with a particularly fine physique, and we watched with admiration the one stone after another glow as the biggest came into contact with it. But when we got to the mildest and best of all, it was a bluish-grey and the lights were turned on as quickly as possible (laughter).

"There are no national frontiers for science. We shared Pasteur and Curie," he concluded in his appeal for the Marie Curie Hospital "staffed by women and run for the benefit of women."
Lord Macmillan said that the Marie Curie Hospital suffered from an unbalanced budget. It was a great memorial to a great woman. "There are only 20 beds for the treatment of women suffering from cancer," he said.

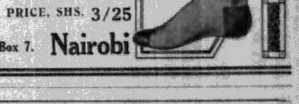

ZANZIBAR WATER SUPPLY

Opening of New High Pressure Scheme Expressed by Zanzibar Arabs to Resident

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT, Zanzibar, March 26.]

On March 25, His Highness the Sultan of Zanzibar opened the new high pressure water mains. Zanzibar town and named it the Burghash water supply, after Sultan Sayid Barghash who first brought a pure supply of water to Zanzibar from the Chief of Sogata.

The plant consists of three Lovanovna centrifugal pumps driven by electric motors manufactured by Messrs. Motter and Platt. One pump is capable of a continuous flow of 400 gallons per hour and the other two of 20,000 gallons per hour each. As a standby, two Campbell oil engines and two Campbell three pumps have also been installed. These are also capable of pumping 20,000 gallons per hour.

Water is pumped up to a 100,000-gallon elevated tank 80 feet above ground level. This tank was manufactured by Messrs. Motter and Platt. Water flows from the tank direct to the town and is sufficient pressure to reach even the highest houses. All house pumps will be cut out, thereby only saving householders the cost of pumping, but also preventing the water from pollution which might occur owing to negative pressure in the main.

The percentage of locally-acquired infections was high in 1933 and reached the considerable total of 192.4. The percentage acquired outside the Municipality showed a big decrease. There was an exceedingly small percentage of malaria in 1931 and 1932, but this was due to the fact that more accurate information was given on the notification form.

Elected Members and Public Questions

(Continued from page 7).

We must be on the alert to see whether local politics up and down the country are being run in the spirit of the law. Mr. Panyia raised this question in his speech at the Indian Congress. I warned him that if he raised it again, we would be just as ready to fight him. Mr. Panyia wrote and said that he had said nothing to justify these remarks. It is a question once again of the reservation of the highlands etc. all that we have fought for.

Local Government

"I feel it is a pity that in this part of the world it is continued," "you refuse to shoulder the responsibility of self-government. I hope that some of you will take up the question, and see if you can get it on this area. If we are to ask for further control in the finances and affairs of this country, we must be prepared to shoulder the responsibilities and finances of our own particular district. I hope that you will go into this question carefully."

The Araba Conference

Turning to the Arab Union, he said: "At a meeting at Araba, nine representatives from Kenya and many others representing the colonies attended. This was very good. In fact, it almost looked like the League of Nations. They were unanimous in wanting Tanganyika to be joined up with Kenya. The only ones not represented were the Germans and the Italians. South Africans, Dutch, Greeks, Danes, Swedes and Italians were all there. They all agreed that a very strong peaceful penetration is being carried out by the Germans today. I was interested to hear how far it had gone in the Northern Province. They have squeezed out all other people from Kenya. Large ships have had to close down, being unable to carry on business. I feel it is a matter of time before the German and Italian Dominion and I believe that if we really join on a basis of that sort we would be in a much stronger position. There was no representative from Uganda. They have no real political affinity with us and they are very suspicious of anything which comes from Kenya. If Tanganyika Territory and Kenya wish to go together Uganda would be bound to come in, but we do not wish to bring pressure to bear."

An Appeal

"Even when you discuss what we are doing, try to keep our ranks united. Don't give anything away to the enemy, and try to support your elected representatives. I can assure you that we are doing our very best to serve the interests of this country, and also our very best to take a long view. We are not always right, but then, who is? We are having a long fight to carry on, and there are many obstacles. I do ask you to support us as much as you can" (Applause).

Member for Aberdare

In the course of his speech, the Hon. Mr. E. H. Wright, member for the district said: "One gets used to surprises when one picks up a paper and reads that in a depression over Ireland one is inclined to believe that this depression may have switched to Timor, North Kenya. That is what I believe is called 'convection' in meteorology. I have known a great depression over your Member-

Lord Francis Scott, our Leader, has put me in a dilemma. While I am a member of the Executive, I am also addressing politics in Kenya, he was at the same time delivering a little lesson to your Member. (Laughter and "No") from Lord Francis Scott. I know that no one so gallant can do that so well or in such a gentlemanly fashion. I accept the noble and commendable and feel honored. As many of you know, I am fairly outspoken. When Lord Francis speaks of passive resistance and the faculty of it, his arguments are most reasonable but I want to come to identify myself with those who believe we made a mistake in accepting an Economy Committee whose deliberations are unduly protracted and feel that Government is thereby merely playing for time. (Heat, hoar). Having achieved a position of ascendancy over Government, notably in the Budget Session, when Lord Francis and our own so ably, we seem now to have lost it. Our power as Elected Members has definitely waned during the last three months. I have a sincere hope and believe that we shall soon regain it. In the matter of passive resistance I have a simple solution, this that to people in the Colony should be asked to suffer at the hands of the Government. The Government should take to itself for the Elected Members to go in just what they should do when the longer to elect the Government. Believing firmly in the spirit of justice, I cannot believe Elected Members should be allowed to remain incarcerated if for more than 24 hours. (Cheer). I was therefore prepared to take the risk of unconstitutional methods. When I hear a scold with a few records and a very gallant gentleman state that he wants to make sure that he is going to win before he begins fighting. I think it is true to say something.

Tired of Bargaining

"I am in a difficult position today. I feel tired because I am very tired and a broken member of the Elected Eleven. I'm feeling about things going stronger and I cannot give way. I am tired of bargaining. We invariably get double-crossed and we all know it. Today I feel tired of politics, which has been aptly defined as 'the last remnant of human folly. Year by year we seem to gain nothing, but give ground all the time. The Indian question is coming up again."

This is a gang

"This is a gang to be one of the biggest problems. There must be no halfway in this issue. The people of Kenya must make it quite clear now that ours is a Western culture and a far higher political destiny than theirs, and that the absurd political pretensions on the part of Indians in Kenya must cease forthwith. The fact that by political bargaining at Home, the position in India has developed into a nasty mess, cannot be held as justification for a repetition of the same old blunder in this our Kenya. (Applause.) That's what we must have in heartily in accord with Lord Francis Scott when he takes the line that we must get the Carter Commission findings implemented in respect of our highlands."

Grading Tests

"With reference to grading tests as shown on your agenda, I was astonished to hear that the pass is far bigger than that. It is a matter of a new proposition from that body called the Land Advisory Board. You know my views about the constitution of this Board, but I want to pay special tribute to one member, Mr. Conroy. (Applause). He has fought like a tiger for the settler in the matter

of these matters and has staunchly supported me in all the cases I have mentioned in this report. There is at least one Elected Member who has kept his end up very well. I am not aware of the new proposition as that settles in general terms shall constitute the new proposal and I accept a few years' lease. One of the first things I did when I became a Member was to read a declaration to that effect to the Land Advisory Board. I am not sure that I have always prompt in replying to you letters, but I am not sure that I have not done so at all. I asked for remission of rent; why should that involve the question of extension of rents? You have to be very careful before relinquishing a lease of 99 or 999 years, one of 50. Incidentally I want to say that I am going to pay the registration fee, stamp duty etc. etc. What is the occasion for a change of title of all White property within the rights of a grazing lease? To revert to the former lease, why not a simple extension of the present title? I cannot see the slightest justification requiring anyone to hand in titles in exchange for another not so strong or better title. Reverting finally to politics again, Mr. Wright said: "We have lost our hold over Government by accepting that long-run Committee, the Committee appointed to advise on the constitution of the Government." It might have been effective if they had achieved those results which we have only in Kenya are getting restless and some people in Nairobi do not generally seem to understand how the settlers feel about it all. Settlers generally do not feel the elected members might be liable to those described in a little couplet:—"They glared beneath the sunlight. They stared beneath the sun. They dreamt a life of going to do."

"But did with nothing done" (Applause).

QUESTIONS

The big interest taken in the meeting was fully apparent at the end of the speeches when a large number of questions were asked.

Captain Vaughan Kennedy asked:

(1) Why is there no water legislation in being?
(2) Why have we no concession in this country?
(3) When it was suggested that 414000 could be saved why was Government not asked to do so and Government to find out themselves how this was to be effected?
(4) When are we likely to have a report from the £100,000 Economy Committee?
(5) What is being done about the Dairy Control Bill?
Lord Francis Scott replied:—

(1) I have been working on the Water Ordinance for a very long time. It has now been approved by Government and I am expecting it to be put into force any day now.
(2) This question has never come up. We have been trying to deal with industries individually.
(3) There is a meeting on Monday morning and I hope that members will thus be able to give

me some idea of when the report will come out.
(4) I am doing everything I can to get the Dairy Control Bill through. I am not sure that it is desired by the people in the industry themselves by asking for milk and cheese to be included as well.

Dairy Control

Major Herbert Walker said in New York they have a Control Board such as would come in Kenya. In their Ordinance they made arrangements for different grades of milk, so that the efficient farmer would get the highest percentage of butterfat for the paid for at a higher price.
Lord Francis Scott: Yes this is a point which will come up.

An Assurance

Mr. W. K. Baniadi: Supporting this Elected Member's proposition, I would like to have an assurance from you, Lord Francis Scott, that you will give me a report on the results as they are produced. Everything has been taken from us and we have only this one promise left and we must see it carried out.
Lord Francis Scott: I give this assurance gladly.

Currency Policy

Capt. Cotter: Lord Francis Scott in favour of any form of inflation or devaluation of our currency?
Lord Francis Scott: I have gone into this question very carefully. Being a farmer myself, the more I go into the question, the more I come to the conclusion that it would not do any good at all. All charges would go up and certainly the Railway would increase their charges. I conclude that it is not a feasible move in the state of the Colony today.

Land Bank

Mr. Focke: Has any money been voted for the Land Bank?
Lord Francis Scott: I hope it will be forthcoming. As to what will happen, I cannot give a definite answer.
Mr. Focke: How long are we to go on swallowing the Government's line? (Heat, hoar). We cannot get on. We are completely "choked" speak as a foreigner. The Indians, Irish, and all those people get away with it, why not us?

Northern Frontier

Colonel Aisley: Has anything been done by the Elected Members to draw attention to the tremendous burden of the Northern Frontier?
Lord Francis Scott: It has been brought forward for many years. There is now a scheme for re-organization, but I can tell you nothing about that.

Capt. Cotter: Does Lord Francis Scott consider that he is achieving anything by this "peace at any price" policy?
Lord Francis Scott: I do not think that he has adopted a peace-at-any-price policy.
Economy Committee: According to a report in the paper, if anything unconstitutional should be suggested, then you must find another leader.
Lord Francis Scott: I said that three years ago.
