BLUES REACH THE FINISH AND A HALF LENGTHS AHEAD

Failed to put an end to the sequence of successes which their rivals—Cambridge—have enjoyed in the Boat Race for the last eleven years. The Light Blues retained favour and won easily by over four lengths.

None in these post-war years have the Dark Blues been successful, and that was in 1923. The encounters were resumed following the war in 1920 and the first two races were won by the Light Blues, and following Oxford's one victory, all the rest have gone to them.

Cambridge took the lead from the start and Oxford never came within a hair's breadth of catching up. The winners were the better crew, rowing together well, while Oxford, apart from their stroke, were very ragged their work.

SIGNOR MUSSOLINI WORKING ON CONCRETE PROPOSALS

Desires One Realistic Plan

FEARS OF GERMAN INTENTIONS EQUAL TO THOSE OF ABYSSINIA

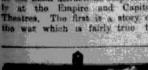

the part of the writer. Replying to a suggestion that he only obtained the passport on registering himself to be 17 years of age as the time of issue, defendant stated that he had told the truth to the person filling up his application form. He had not had the inaccurate passport noted during the past five years as he had had no occasion to refer to it. Questioned as to the justification for stating his age to be 18 years signed by him on an order at Mombasa, defendant said that the particulars therein had been taken from his passport by the Immigration officials at Telling Point. On being reminded that the forms in question were filled in by immigrants on board the vessel before its arrival at Mombasa, defendant stated that it was a long time ago and he did not remember clearly.

He had come to Kenya accompanied by Jagan Singh, Jagan defendant, and that the particulars on the immigration declaration form were taken from his passport and he signed the form accordingly. He stated that he had been in the country for some time and he had not been asked to produce his passport. The result is undoubtedly a disadvantage to the National Societies who expected a sweeping victory. The official result will be announced at once.

EAST AFRICAN UNION

The Editor, "E. A. Standard," Sir—In a letter appearing in your issue of April 5, Mr. Thomas O'Shea very rightly endorses the views thought among the public as to the question of Colonization among British East African territories. The letter is interesting and not devoid of facts, but the interrogatories serve to indicate how serious the position may become if the scheme of Mr. O'Shea is not given effect.

I cannot agree with Mr. O'Shea that any action is taken in the large group of territories which, all the facts brought to light and a thorough study of the facts made. One cannot forget the outposts who stopped to think which leg to step forward first, with the result that he never moved again. There certainly should be an examination of the broad issues involved, but this has been done over a long period. The Rt. Hon. L. S. Amey, P.C., M.P., in "Eastern Africa today and tomorrow" (1929) says: "No doubts have been cast upon our right to do this" (federation) "or even complete unification" (even upon the permanency of our occupation of Tanganyika under the terms of our constitution). But the undertaking is not a tenure from the League of Nations. It is only an undertaking on our part towards the League as to the lines on which we have decided to proceed. One of the territories surrendered one of the territories surrendered one of the territories surrendered and all by Germany and divided equally by the Allied and Associated powers. Beyond that understanding we have no obligations towards the League, and are free to do anything we like. At the same time, in order to make our inherent right more explicit, the following clause was actually inserted in the Tanganyika mandate by Lord Milner:

"The Mandatory shall be authorized to constitute the territory into a customs, fiscal and administrative union or federation with the adjacent territories under his own sovereignty or control, provided always that the measures adopted to that end do not infringe the provisions of the mandate. Nothing could well be more explicit," continues Mr. Amey, "than this clause. The object is I think I should know, having read actual writings—was to prepare for a federative complete unification of the three territories."

So much for the underlying issue, but Mr. O'Shea has not been adequately considered. We should start on the right lines. The history of the case shows that it has been very fully considered at great expense for more than a decade. That of the (Ormsby-Gore) Commission (1924) and the (Tudor) Conference (1924) and (1925), Livingston (1926) and (1927), the Hilton Young Commission (1927-1928), Sir Samuel Wilson's Mission (1929), Sir Edward Grey's Report (1930), and the Joint Select Committee of both Houses of Parliament (1931) and the Joint Select Committee of the Convention of Associates.

It is difficult to contemplate the return of Tanganyika to the British Empire with any equanimity from the points of view of the British, British and African in that territory, of Kenya, Uganda, and the Rhodesia of the Empire at large, including India, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, and the Far East. It seems to be our duty to press upon the Imperial Government the fact of being Tanganyika is not necessarily for the benefit of the British Empire. At present Germany has complete freedom of trade, settlement, and immigration, and the union would not deprive her of these advantages, especially if it were a member of the League of Nations.

I am surprised at Mr. O'Shea's statement that the Government of South Africa supports Germany's claim. It is referring only to Mr. O'Shea's recent "corrective" speech? His statement that Germany supports the claim is also very surprising. Can Mr. O'Shea give his authority for that? If so, right the position is the more serious. It does not seem probable that the Imperial British and South African Governments, with the East African territories, would ever be able to deal with any "Eastern African" that may turn up (provided that they occupied East Africa, India, and the rest of the world) as the assistance of Germany in the saddle Tanganyika.

Lastly, Sir, this is not a "heated rejoinder" from one still living in the "backwoods" of the "backwoods" (1914) but from one who only desires to advance the conversation so rightly demanded by Mr. O'Shea, but who, especially in the present day, especially in Europe, does not think we should take more risk than we need in East Africa.

The bronze medal has been granted to keepers only seven times before in the history of the society, and the last award having been made in 1927 to keeper Howman in connection with the successful rearing of a young hippopotamus. A money award has also been bestowed on Shesley and to A. S. Budge, his assistant.

The two keepers had won the complete confidence of the chimpanzee, and attended it by day and night with the best care expected and for some days afterwards.

INDIAN CLAIMS IN KENYA

To the Editor, "E. A. Standard," Sir—I noted with some regret the reference to the Indian claims from the British Colonies and to the Indian question in the Annual Reports of Lord Curzon, Sir John Peel, Sir James Scott, and Mr. Wigglesworth at the moment and in view of Mr. Handley's letter to the noble Lord, these references were unrolled first, and constitute a piece of gratuitous provocation to a community that would please. Since 1890 the Indian community has done nothing to get the extent of their rights, if it attacks have been made on their position and interests, they have come from Lord Curzon's side and if the British Members contacted them, it is to the task of real economic reconstruction. The Indian community will be glad to co-operate and give their best to Kenya.

It is not my duty to stir up peace and to economic reconstruction. And though ever so powerful and humble, nobody should be surprised if my people refuse persistently either to commit suicide or be a party to their own murder. The Indian community will not forge O'Connell, Bull, and their legal right to the Highlands, nor their privilege of equal representation as members of the British Commonwealth of Nations so long as they continue to be such and their right to their own culture, civilization and religion and social life, nor, Sir, their right to defend themselves as best they can in case of attacks, alone or with their allies wherever possible.

It is my to breathe a peaceful community, still to couple the fact that saved the British Empire as a whole with the Germans at the distance of time, but it is not so easy as it is supposed to bully a peaceful, submissive and silent people.

I do not believe in a White Kenya, but I believe in a Kenyan Kenya. And collaboration and co-operation from Indians is possible.

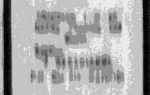

East African Governors in Conference

COMPETITIVE INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT IN THE DEPENDENCIES

A lengthy statement of the discussions by East African Governors at last week's Conference at Entebbe was issued for publication on Monday.

The Conference considered the whole question of the Customs Union in its relation to tariffs on the basis of reviews of the experiences of the last 18 months undertaken by the three Governments.

While no marked inequalities have so far emerged the Governors' Conference is of the opinion that a careful watch must be maintained on the tariff arrangements by means of tariffs of additional industries in the various territories.

The Conference also considered that obstacles should not be placed in the way of industrial development in any territory solely because it would threaten the interests of established industries in another territory and that each Government should have power to protect young industries from dumping by competitors elsewhere in East Africa.

A new series of research conferences has been planned covering agriculture, sleeping sickness and veterinary and medical questions. They will take place next year at Amani, Entebbe and Nairobi.

Unified time for East Africa is to be considered by the Conference.

The main part of the communique deals with transport policy and it was agreed that the various Governments should bring to the notice of the Conference, being the Transport Policy Board all questions affecting transport before taking independent action.

Two other questions of interest were central control of civil aviation and limitation of road passenger services to ascertained requirements.

Dar es Salaam Meeting in 1936

Following is the official communique of the Governors' Conference, which assembled on April 27th at Entebbe, adjourned on Saturday morning, April 6. During this session, the detailed review of the industry in one territory after another regarding the effect of the Customs tariffs, suspended before, etc. on the industrial territories, which has been undertaken by the Commissioners of Customs and Excise and the various territories concerned during the last 18 months, was considered by the Conference.

It was agreed that the free interchange of goods between the East African territories which resulted from the existing Customs arrangements constituted substantial benefits to East Africa as a whole and on each participating territory. It was further agreed that the present no marked inequalities in the various advantages to the industrial territories as a result of the Customs agreements as they stood should be maintained on the artificial no-marked inequalities in the various advantages to the industrial territories. he was living in a madhouse. A great attempt was made at Versailles to redraw the map of Europe and to allow direct access so far as they were concerned with shipping. War and just though it may have been, that attempt had not been accepted as such by all to whom the settlement was applied. We fought the war to make the world fit for democracy and the world is not fit for democracy, and all that that word means today.

Germany's Position

He had not lost hope yet in the limitation of armaments and would continue to argue with Germany on the subject until he declared that she would not have anything more to do with it. "That she or any other country will not consider these things or admit that the situation becomes far more difficult. "I would say this—this country does not want war and does not mean to have war, and if we can only be stopped by letting the aggressor know that war will not be permitted in Europe this country will play her part. I am confident with the rest of Europe to see that no aggression shall take place.

EAST AFRICAN GOVERNORS IN CONFERENCE

(Continued from Page 1).

Research Conferences

Reports of Conferences on the Co-ordination of Research in East Africa which were presented in the latter part of 1952 and in the early part of 1953, together with the comments on these reports by the technical advisers to the Secretary of State in England, were referred to contain many valuable recommendations, and the various Governments agreed to give effect to these recommendations so far as their financial positions allowed. Arrangements were made for a further Conference on the Co-ordination of Agricultural Research at Addis Ababa in February, 1953; a further Conference on Forests and Trypanosomiasis Research at Entebbe in the early part of 1953, and also a Conference on the Co-ordination of Veterinary and Medical Research in Nairobi in the early part of 1953.

Weather Service

Other questions discussed were the possibilities of permitting the free interchange of sea seed between the three East African Territories, and the organization and functions of the East African Meteorological Service. It was hoped that full proposals for the linking up of this Service with the other Empire Meteorological Services might be made during the forthcoming Empire Meteorological Conference in West Africa.

Unified Time

It was arranged that a proposal for a unified time in East Africa, which had been put forward by the Associated Chambers of Commerce, should be referred back to them asking what time they considered would be most suitable for the commercial communities in East Africa.

Sugar Industry

The rationalization of the sugar industry in East Africa was again discussed and the Conference considered that the Governments of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika should ascertain from the millers in East Africa whether they wished legislation introduced for the regulation of the industry in East Africa on certain suggested lines.

Transport Problems

The members of the Conference, in their capacity as a Transport

Policy Board, discussed the methods by which they thought they could best perform their duties as an East African Transport Policy Board to advise the Secretary of State on questions of rail, road, water-borne and aerial transport in the three territories, and considered that arrangements should be made so that transport questions likely to affect more than one territory should be brought to the Board as early as possible for preliminary scanning, with a view to increasing efficiency and economy. At the same time the Board was anxious to make it clear that it did not wish to interfere in any way in the execution of the work of an agreed policy.

In order that questions affecting transport in the three territories should be brought to the Board's notice, they requested the Governments and Administrations concerned to refer to the Board, before making any independent action, questions affecting co-ordination of control of the forms of transport, inland water, road or air in East Africa, and questions of new construction connected with these forms of transport which would affect neighbouring territories, major changes in railway policy likely to have repercussions in neighbouring territories, and other questions affecting or depending on transport services in East Africa as a whole. The Board considered that the General Managers of the Railways should meet at least once a year and discuss the progress made in the uniformity of methods of purchase of stores, standardization in equipment, etc., and simulation of rates for facilities for through booking, etc., and other points dealing with the question of co-ordination, and that they should submit an annual report to the Transport Policy Board.

Road Policy

As regards roads, the Board considered the Director of Public Works in each territory should correspond direct with each other on questions of road transport affecting, or likely to affect, other territories, and should meet at least once a year and submit to the Transport Policy Board a report on general road transport questions affecting East Africa as a whole.

In the Air

As regards air transport, the Board considered that a central control of Civil Aviation throughout East Africa was likely to be required in the near future, and requested the respective Governments to consider during the year questions connected with civil aviation which required early investigation such as ownership, control, licensing of aeroplanes, licensing and control of pilots, etc. with a view to attaining a uniform practice.

The Board hoped that the British Resident, Zanzibar, would frequently attend the meetings of the Transport Policy Board, and always when questions of policy affecting the ports of East Africa were concerned.

The Board discussed various questions connected with road transport costs and road passenger services, and as regards the latter matter considered that as in other parts of the world arrangements in certain areas were likely to be required in the near future to deal with passenger traffic for hire. They thought an appropriate way of dealing with the question of road passenger transport services would be to impose suitable licences and to restrict the number of licences for motor vehicles for hire running on any particular road to that number fully necessary to meet the requirements of the district.

The Next Meeting

It was agreed that the next meeting of the Conference should be held in Dar es Salaam in the early part of 1954.

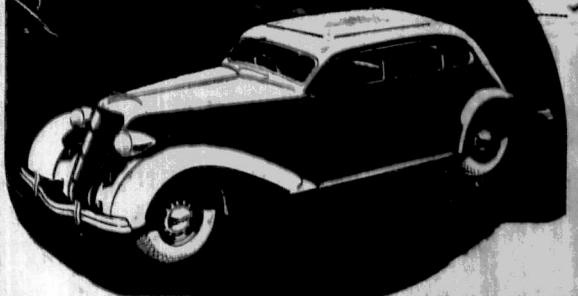

Fourth Driest Year on Record

OFFICIAL FIGURES

having an annual rainfall below the average of 29.7 inches.

March was a very dry month, only 0.65 being recorded.

April was also a dry month, 2.95 inches falling compared with the average of 8.25.

May with 1.35 inches exceeded the second lowest record for the month.

June and July were relatively poor months, 2.15 and 1.54 inches falling, respectively.

August and September were poor months, only 0.37 inches falling during the former.

The rainfall for October exceeded the average of 2.15 inches by half an inch.

November and December were both drier than the average.

The longest dry spell during the middle of October to the middle of October, a period of 65 days during which only a total of only 0.08 inches fell on four widely separated occasions.

THE RAT MENACE TO FARMERS

A Serious Problem in Cereal Districts

PREVENTATIVE METHODS

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]

Bogoa, April 1. From a farmer's point of view there is nothing to be said in favour of the rat, in fact anything that can be said is always derogatory and on the debit side.

The loss to agriculture is comparatively small throughout the world, and in spite of "rat weeks" in England, and similar outbreaks on the part of all who seek a livelihood from agriculture, the rat population rarely holds its own, or at any rate never seems to decrease.

In this country particularly, where the rat is not an alien, but in the shambas and veld, as well as under the floor of a store, the rat is a pest more difficult to handle than any other pest, but there is means whereby his pernicious activities can be brought almost to a complete standstill at any rate in a store. And with the view of preserving grain, sacks and other items which provide occupation if not food for them, the following method is one which can be wholeheartedly recommended. But the fact that the rat is also a disease carrier must not be lost sight of, and other means should be employed in combating their menace, by systematic trapping, encouragement of cats and possibly the judicious use of poison when this is a successful method.

A Successful Method

The following means of "rat-proofing" a store or crib has been used on Meyer Dodgson's farm for some years now, and has been an unqualified success. It is cheap and simple to erect, and apart from occasional baiting is fairly permanent. The materials required are 6 by 1 boards, three class timbering quite good enough, 1 inch mesh wire netting three feet square and gum or wattle poles to support the boards. First of all trench one foot deep and one foot wide round the outside of the crib and in line with the front of the crib, so that eventually the wire netting will form a complete and continuous line outside.

The roll of wire netting is then spread out with the bottom of the roll in the trench, and two feet standing up alongside the posts, secured to the material of the store or crib as made. The three foot mesh gates are then placed at suitable intervals and

the 6 by 1 boards laid on top of them, and up against the posts of the store. Thus as the boards are two feet above the ground level they will have the wire netting securely clamped between themselves and the post of the store, so that the wire netting is then fastened onto the back edge of the boards by means of the nails.

On top of the supporting posts and under the boards is placed a piece of 1/2 inch square galvanized iron, well secured to the posts with iron nails all round and to prevent the rats climbing up, the netting is so into the store. By this means, even if they climb up the wire netting, they are unable to negotiate the six inches of board which is parallel to the ground and so to obtain entrance this way and only by the wire netting remaining there they effect an upward ground entrance. The door of the crib is reinforced with another piece of the wire netting as it is set up, and stays up the crib for carrying sacks in or out.

Alternative System

Another way but slightly more expensive is to use 2 by 2 timber to the posts of the crib, two feet above the ground, with the wire netting stapled to the back of them as before, and the 6 by 1 boards nailed onto the timbers of the 2 by 2. This system is not so nearly as the former method desirable, if boys are likely to consider it a suitable place in which to rest their weary limbs while working at the store.

In this method the trench, one foot deep is dug to long the timber, without the wire netting. Also if thought most convenient the rat-proofing can be erected away from the store, but this again involves extra expense as more wattle poles are necessary to support the timber and wire.

A Simple Form

In the case of a crib with no floor, a simple form of door can be made by 1 board with the wire netting attached along its length as before is bolted onto the outside of the two boards of each corner up to the door, and their respective ends slightly raised to prevent the door from closing.

The wire netting also overlaps on the top of the door, so that when the door is shut, the ceiling is covered by a slab of wood, which is bolted to the posts. Thus the continuity of the netting is assured. To open the door, the slats and bolts are removed and the board with wire attached is just slipped out with the bottom of the board and shutting the door. As a matter of a moment or two the door is closed and the wire netting obstacle would greatly hinder the coming and going of boys carrying things into the store.

The Medical Officer of Health in Nairobi, Dr. H. J. Tilling, has submitted an interesting report to the Council of Nairobi's rainfall since last year.

Very little rain fell in Nairobi last year; in fact a continuous fourth lowest rainfall for the 38 years since records were kept.

The lowest record was in 1921 when 18.49 inches fell; the second lowest, 1903, with 22.68; and the third lowest, 1918, with 20.03. The fall last year totalled 25.12 inches.

Monthly Figures

The monthly falls were as follows: the figures being based on 5,700 falls at the Hill Station at August 2nd, January 0.14 inch; February 2.06, March 0.05; April 2.96; May 5.75; June 0.15; July 1.34; August 0.37; September 0.08; October 2.02; November 3.06; and December 1.81.

The average monthly rainfall for the year is 1.92 inches, compared with an average over 28 years of 2.90 inches. The average fall of rain per day for 1934 was 0.246 inches compared with an average over 27 years of 0.282 inches.

The rainfall was distributed through the seasons of the year as follows, the first total being in respect of last year and the second figure representing the average for the year.

Short dry season (January, February, 2.20; 3.80). Long rain (March, April, May) 9.35; 11.81.

Long dry season (June to September), 4.09; 4.34. Short rains (October, November, December), 7.49; 6.02.

Short rains (October, November, December), 7.49; 6.02. Taking the rainfall by seasons, it will be noted that while all the seasons were below the average.

The greatest deficiency occurred during the long rains when there was a deficiency of 49 per cent, and during the short rains when there was a deficiency of 23 per cent, the short dry season had a deficiency of 42 per cent, and the long dry season was about 6 per cent below the average.

January, with 0.14 inches against an average of 1.71, constituted the month's lowest record for the month. Previous low falls for January occurred in 1908, 1915, 1916, 1924 and 1930, all these years with the exception of 1911

Sir—At a meeting of the Nyandarua District Council held yesterday, the following resolution was passed:

Resolved "That this Council views with considerable alarm Government's proposal to borrow money from the Colonial Development Fund for the purpose of re-constructing the Lumbru-Kericho and the Kisumu-Kamba Roads especially in view of the heavy financial commitments of the Colony already undertaken with the Economic Committee, now sitting in Nairobi, in considering its scheme to reduce the expenditure side of the budget, and if it were in obtaining their object their valuable work to be considerably impeded on account of Government proposing to borrow the large sum of between 500,000 to 1,000,000 for the construction of roads in the above areas."

We have heard no further from the Elected Members so in all probability they fully approve the Elected Members were returned to Legislature Council on the above understanding that they were strongly to oppose any extra-ordinary expenditure. No matter on what terms this money can be borrowed favourable or otherwise, it is definitely wrong. The position of the Colony from the financial point of view is that it is not possible to carry any further loan facilities.

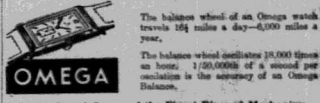

Parliament Hears Review of European Talks

JOHN SIMON DISAPPOINTED WITH GERMANY

Difficulties of Agreement Hitler's Significant Reference to Return of Colonies

British Foreign Secretary in the course of a statement to the House of Commons dealing with the recent tour of the European capitals revealed that he had been greatly disappointed at the difficulties which had been caused by Germany in the way of an agreement.

Hitler if he declared that Germany would not return Geneva if he continued to remain in an inferior position and that the position of inferiority would not be moved unless her former colonies were returned to her.

His proposals in regard to future European relations are not acceptable to France, but in Berlin Sir John Simon's speech is generally welcomed.

Minister's Warning

An agreement involving super-visions if it was applied to all Powers equally Germany favored the suggestion an Axis Pact between the League Powers.

The Foreign Minister said that Herr Hitler referred the statement to Germany would not continue to participate in the League if she remained in an inferior position and that Herr Hitler declared that Germany was an inferior position without colonies.

Interest in Europe

Unofficial French and German Views

Paris, April 9.

Sir John Simon's statement in the House of Commons this afternoon was awaited with intense interest by observers in Europe.

The French Cabinet met at 3.30 p.m. to examine the questions to be submitted to the Swiss Conference and the League of Nations and remained in session for three hours until it received and considered the report of Sir John Simon's speech.

Not Acceptable

Sir John Simon's disclosures in regard to Germany's attitude are welcomed by high authority in Paris as corroborating the recent French Government's policy of non-acceptance of opinion but satisfaction of Germany's proposals are not acceptable to France.

The question of the Colonies is held not to be a condition of Germany's return to the League, it is regarded as not negotiable.

Tropical Sun and Altitude

AN INVESTIGATION INTO SOLAR RADIATION

Scientist's Work in Kenya

OBSERVATIONS WHICH MAY ANSWER MANY QUESTIONS

The exact effects upon Europeans of Kenya's altitude and geographical position have been the subject of many observations, of which perhaps more have been hasty than scientific. During recent months, however, a series of careful observations, with the object partly of enabling the physiological effects to be accurately determined, have been made near Nairobi and in other parts of the country, by a experienced scientific observer.

She is Miss Gertrud Riemerschmid, one of the technical assistants at the Institute of Physical Therapeutics, Jena, Germany. She has made investigations of solar radiation in different parts of the earth and since December she has been working in co-operation with the British East African Meteorological Service.

On Tuesday night, at the Coryndon Memorial Museum, she addressed a joint meeting of the Kenya Society for the Study of Race Improvement and the Natural History Society on the meaning and value of her work, giving an account of some of the preliminary results obtained.

A Nairobi Lecture

The first scientist to investigate the effects of solar radiation, was Miss Riemerschmid, was Professor Doro of Davos, Switzerland, who founded a new branch of science, bio-climatology, which means the study of the meteorological factors and weather conditions of a place together with all factors likely to produce physiological reactions.

(During the last few years Miss Riemerschmid has been lecturing on this subject.)

PROPOSAL FOR BOARD IN LONDON REJECTED

Governors' Conference to Advise

APPEAL TO COLONIAL OFFICE IN CASES OF TERRITORIAL DISPUTE

The High Commissioner for Transport, Kenya and Uganda, has issued for publication an important Despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies announcing his decisions regarding the Gibb Report.

His suggestion is that the Governors' Conference acting as an East African Policy Board should exercise the functions of an advisory organisation on East African transport questions. No Government would be bound by its conclusions and an appeal lies to the Secretary of State.

The future of the office of High Commissioner for Transport is still undecided. A proposal is being considered that the Governors of Kenya and Uganda should act as Joint Commissioners.

An important part of the Despatch rejects the suggestion that a portion of the Tangia line should be destroyed and the remainder operated as a private concern. This suggestion made in the Gibb Report was strongly opposed in Tanganyika.

Further sections of the Despatch deal with divisions of revenue between the two systems and lay down the principles of financial policy for the territories. Another part relates to the position of the two General Managers as members of Legislative Council.

Position of General Managers

As promised to the Governors' Conference I have held the meetings in January this year, the Secretary of State for the Colonies has issued a special despatch on the subject of the Gibb Report.

The Despatch reads as follows: During the year, 1934, I have had the honour to inform you that I have now given final consideration to the important questions raised in the report by Mr. Edgar Gibb on the points of connection in Kenya, Uganda, and the Tanganyika Territory. I must say my regret that it has not been possible for me to address you in the matter at an earlier date.

In considering these questions I have had the advantage of being able to consult the detailed statements prepared by the several Governments on the points of connection and I have been informed of the discussions at the Governors' Conference in October, 1933 and again in May, 1934. I desire to do so as an appreciation of the

thoroughness and care which have been devoted to the examination of these difficult questions by all concerned in East Africa. In the following paragraphs I propose to set out the conclusions to which I have reached in regard to the main recommendations put forward by Mr. Gibb.

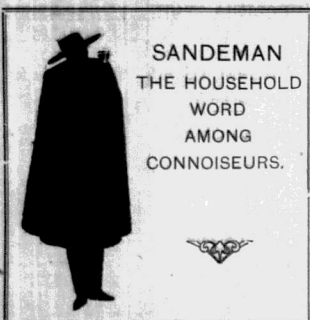
