### BRITISH LEGION STORAGE OF BUKOBA COFFEE IN NAIROBI

(Continued from page 5)

points raised. A copy of our reply and also a copy of the Burman and Valentine Memorandum was circulated among members of the Coffee Section.

The object of the Burman Valentine Memorandum was to endeavour to get the Rules governing the export of Bukoba Coffee amended by reducing the allowance for moisture content to permit of those coffees being stored in Nairobi in an effort to centralise this trade there.

#### "A Calculated Erratum"

The Coffee Section of this Chamber has endeavored to co-operate with the Bukoba Coffee Association of Kenya since its inception, and having regard to the fact that the marketing of Bukoba Coffee has always been centralized here, felt justified in the assumption that their views might have been ascertained at the time the proposals were put forward to the Director of Agriculture, Tanganyika Territory. This view was shown in the latter gentleman is proved by his prior reference in an earlier reply to Nairobi. It was felt by the Coffee Section that the reply of the Secretary of the Bukoba Coffee Association to our request for a copy of the memorandum, was unsatisfactory in that it suggested a calculated evasion with the apparent aim of keeping in the opinion of the proposer, still inoperative the native producers and the government marketing of the product. The Coffee Section has ever desired to co-operate in the progressive development of the Bukoba Coffee industry, and if proposals put forward by the Coffee Trade Association of Kenya were based on such premises then they could not fail to obtain our support.

As already reported in the Press, a meeting was held at Nairobi in the early part of the month, which demonstrated beyond all doubt that in that district, at any rate, the old way of export of coffee is still very much alive. To date no meeting has resulted in 50 new members joining the Legion. (Women's Section members not included in this total.)

There were 151 calls at the office during the month, and the Secretary had 85 outside interviews. Letters, etc., outward amounted to approximately 900 items, and inward mails showed a corresponding increase in volume. It is of interest to note that subscriptions paid during the month exceeded the previous record by nearly 50 per cent.

The Standing Sub-Committee met three times, Executive Committee twice, and Benevolent Committee, Jubilee Sub-Committee, Justice Section Sub-Committee and Sewing-Club Committee each met once, in addition to which there were several meetings of the Publicity Sub-Committee.

It has been decided that the duties of Organizer and Distributor for the British Legion Sweepstakes should be taken over by the Secretary. The draw for the next Sweepstake is to be known as the August Holiday Draw and will take place on July 31 next.

The British Legion and United Services Benevolent Fund made grants to 16 families at a total cost of Shs. 1,211.00, whilst an individual was assisted from the Central Fund at a cost of Shs. 110.00.

Grants from Water and Conservancy Fund amounted to Shs. 615.00.

Three pension cases were dealt with during the month, one referred to Legion Headquarters, and two cases of which is an instance cases referred to the Agent

#### Nothing to Fear

The Tanganyika viewpoint must be based on the advantage accruing to the producer, and if it can be established that the centralising of the marketing of Bukoba Coffee in Nairobi is in the best interests of the industry as a whole, then no arguments put forward by this Chamber or by other bodies can prevent what would be a natural economic development. Therefor, the Coffee Trade Association of Kenya have nothing to fear in co-operating with the Chamber of Commerce in this particular matter.

The Coffee Trade Association of Kenya is prepared to operate for the benefit of the whole of the coffee trade in the Territory, and should be above all suspicion of using its influence for the furtherance of the interests of Nairobi dealers only.

In the present instance the attitude of the Association is every more respectable as it concerned a crop produced outside Kenya, and in our dealings with neighbouring Territories, it is most convenient that we should be represented by a body which has the governing factor in our dealings.

#### A Strong Line

Mr. W. G. Stool thought that the Chamber ought to take a stronger line in this matter and said that if associations were formed by any industry and that association proposed making changes therein, it was incumbent upon them to get Members of Committee informed. The present attitude, therefore, constituted a precedent. He therefore proposed the following resolution:

This Chamber adopts the memorandum which has been prepared on the subject of Bukoba Coffee Sales by the Committee and the coffee Trade Association. The Chamber is requested to the Directors of Agriculture and the Coffee Trade Association, the Association of Chambers of Commerce of the Territory Africa, the Coffee Board of Kenya, and the Press.

This resolution, seconded by Mr. Leitch, was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

LOANERS OBLIGATIONS ENLIGHTENED

General, April 15. The League Council will meet privately tomorrow morning to discuss the French note on the League Council at Geneva.

Further Discussions (By WIRELESS) Today, April 16. The French memorandum on the German rearmament decree was the subject of private discussions yesterday between the delegates to the special session of the League Council at Geneva.

The private session summoned for this morning was, however, postponed to enable the conversation between the delegates to continue on the French memorandum.

Importance is attached in dispatches from Geneva by the re-iteration at Strass of the Anglo-Italian resolve definitely to carry out the obligations undertaken by the guarantors of the Locarno Treaty to its principals, namely, France, Belgium and Germany.

The text of the declaration is being formally communicated to two parties to the treaty, not representing a State.

The Times' correspondent at Geneva notes that the Locarno obligations include an undertaking to take immediate action if armed forces are assembled in a demilitarized zone.

Attention is also being directed to the reference in the Strass communiqué to the proposed air pact for Western Europe.

The Strass Powers agreed to continue an active study of the question with a view to drafting a treaty to be signed by five Powers mentioned in the declaration of London, and 12 other interested States.

German Reply to Swiss Note

REFUSAL TO HAND OVER A JOURNALIST

To be Tried as Traitor

Germany's reply to the firm Note from Switzerland requesting the return of a German journalist who it was suggested, had been abducted from Basel by Nazi agents is a refusal to comply with the demand.

The Berlin Government denies responsibility for the abduction but declares that the journalist who is described as "a traitor of the worst kind" must stand his trial.

Denial of Responsibility

**HEALTH OF NAIROBI IN 1934**

**HOW COMPANIES ARE FAIRING**

A Slight Increase in the Death Rate

More Notable Increases in Dividends

**BIRTH RATE FIGURES**

From a health point of view last year was not a good one for Nairobi, and deaths among persons normally resident in the hospital totalled 765, states the Medical Officer of Health for Nairobi, Dr. H. W. Tilling, in his annual report.

This is equivalent to a rounded death rate for all races of 14.86 per thousand persons, compared with 14.02 for the previous year, and 11.08 for 1932. The European death rate now stands at 8.5, the Asiatic at 15.1 and the Native at 15.9. Last year was the second consecutive year that the death rate for all races showed an increase and the third consecutive year that the European rate rose.

Of the 765 deaths among races 479 were of males and 287 were of females. There were 187 deaths of infants of one year or under. Among Europeans, there were 46 deaths, 32 male and 14 female, equivalent to a rate of 8.21 per thousand. Asiatic deaths totalled 228 representing 182 male and 46 female. This is equivalent to a rate of 15.39 per thousand. Deaths among Natives and others were unaccounted to 211, the total being composed of 224 males and 107 female. The rate is 15.53 per thousand.

The European death rate during the past five years declined to 85.9 per cent. below that for the previous five years. Over a similar period, the Asiatic death rate declined by 24.4 per cent. The Native rate declined by 11.6 per cent., and the rate for all races decreased by 39.3 per cent.

The European death rate for 1934 is above that of the average for the past five years to the extent of 1.0. The Asiatic rate for 1934 compared with a similar period, has improved by 0.5, and the Native rate is above the five years average by 1.5. The rate for all races shows an increase over the five years average of 0.9.

As in 1933, all the death rates show an appreciable increase over those for the previous year.

**Birth Rates**

Last year was the first year that it was possible to calculate birth rates, therefore no comparison with previous years can be made. During 1934, the rate per thousand married women between the ages 20 and 49 was estimated at 46.2 for Europeans and 97.9 for Asiatics.

The proportion of stillbirths to total births was again very high among the Indian communities, the percentage being 17.9 during 1934.

The infant mortality, although standing at a high figure, was somewhat less than in the previous year. The rate among Europeans was largely unaccounted, but that for Asiatics and Natives slightly decreased.

In two cases only were multiple births recorded— one European (both births being female and born alive) and the other Indian (both births being female and born alive).

Estimated on the number of women of all ages, the 60 births among Europeans gives a birth rate of 2.4 per cent.; the 188 births among Asiatic males a birth rate of 2.9 per cent. and the 216 births among Natives and others gives a birth rate of 5.2 per cent.

Calculated on the estimated number of married women between the ages of 20 and 40, the European birth rate works out at 46.2 (Continued in next column.)

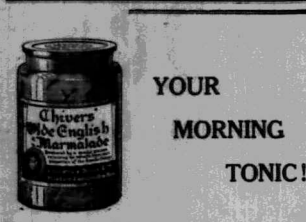

De Beer alleged that Newlin's evidence that he was 12 yards away when the second shot was fired was untrue, as he was secondly mistaken that he was deliberately shot. Accused said he shot where he saw the trigger.

There had been a misunderstanding, accused went on about his speaking to the police after the day of the shooting. He said he had not seen the trigger until the day after the shooting. He was frightened and thought that perhaps he had hit a man.

The Solicitor-General (Mr. T. D. H. Heenan): Did you not tell the Superintendent that you had not been out for two days because your child was ill?

"I said I had not been out on Saturday. I did that because I was frightened. After that the Superintendent told me to say what I had said in Court."

The Solicitor-General: "I put it to you that a duiker, once put up, runs a long way without stopping." "Out to open then that is so, but not in a maize shamba."

"How is it that a boy 5 ft. 6 in. tall was hit in the back?" "I did not see Wero. I shot at a buck."

"Then how did you know where they had said?" "The policeman told me that the natives had said was in the shamba."

"Had there been much testimony?" "No."

"Is it not a fact that knowledge came to you that there were trespassers in the shamba when you took the gun to look for them?" "No."

"When did you first know the boys had been wounded?" "Sunday when Capt. Cochrane told me."

His Honour: "You wanted most. You thought you had come on a printer when you fired. Why did you not take further steps to follow it up?" "My child was sick and I was expecting a visit from the doctor."

"What conclusion did you come to after shooting as to the further movements of the buck?" "I thought it had left the shamba entirely."

"As the result of your shot?"

"Yes. The buck went out of my mind when the shot appeared. I did not associate the notes with the movement I believed to be due to the buck's fall."

By the Jury: "After your first shot did you lose any more?" "No. I did not see any more."

### Medical Evidence

In the fourth day of the case, the doctor called there was not the least doubt as to the fact that the bullet was not in the time of the shooting and that she went to see it on the Sunday.

### Case for Defence

"Accused's story of his actions" he said, "was a natural and credible one. Had he gone to the shamba one day after, expressly, surely he would have noticed the hole of the horse and though boys who were so handy. No evidence had been produced to show that he had any reason to suppose there was a human being in the shamba; that every witness that he supposed there was a buck there."

"It may have been said to shoot at a trespasser, but accused is a man of poor education and his action is natural. His firing of the second shot was foolish, but for a man of his type understandable, and he fired low and did not aim at the boy."

"But we are not concerned with the second shot, for all evidence shows that it was the first shot that gave rise to this trial. It is quite understandable why accused, in the box and very naturally perturbed by his situation, found difficulty in explaining why he should go after the buck. Why did he do it? It was not vital. Though he wanted the meat, he was not starving."

"I say he was not guilty of murder and as regards manslaughter, it was unlawful to shoot at the buck when he did it. I say it was not. If you think it was, you will find him guilty of manslaughter. I say that Wero met his death, being where he was, as a trespasser, and by whose deed."

Accused was silly on Sunday, but he did not know he had hit anyone. Had he known, would he not have endeavoured to conceal his rifle before the police came?"

## Tanganyika

### THE MENACE OF A FOREIGN POWER

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard."  
Sir—Your correspondent Mr. T. O'Shea writes in his well known letter in your issue of the 2nd April. Unfortunately he is in his few random remarks, made use of a boomerang.

It is those very remarks which make the far-seeing Tanganyikan and other people who have the welfare of their Empire at heart are out to circumvent.

The Conference which took place in Arusha met for the object of complete Union, and not simply during two main issues.

First and foremost to make Eastern Africa an economical unit whereby large savings could be effected to the mutual advantage of the three territories. There is no need to go into the obvious factors that would make such economies effective. Such points have had wide publicity of late.

Secondly, it is with the object of avoiding Tanganyika being a pawn in the Political Game that the British and well-wishing communities are striving for complete Union.

I need only point out a few major reasons to show how essential it is that Tanganyika should never be handed over to a Foreign Power.

The menace to the All-British Empire, particularly in regard to aviation. A moment's thought will show how Tanganyika is the middle of the route.

Thinking a little further, it would be impossible to prevent a foreign Power having a network of aerodromes and aeroline bases throughout the Territory well equipped, that would become a menace to us. Nairobi would be less than an hour's flight from Arusha. Evident no more than two hours away. Mombasa, half an hour from Tanga. The railway can be carried to the lake from Kampala.

(3) The last East African Campaign was a lesson's example of a foreign Power in our midst, would be the swift annihilation of towns by air, and of men, women and children. There will be enough of this elsewhere without us.

(4) The matter of two well-protected and important harbours as a sea base must not be left slighted. I need only mention the "Bombing" which even after it was sunk, provided good fuel for the kind for that cost many a life and certainly prolonged the East African Campaign.

(5) The menace to all shipping by aerial and marine onslaught throughout the Indian Ocean, from such an important base, is frightful to contemplate. Supplies of food and munitions to Mombasa and along the sea coast would be endangered at all times. And what of submarines in Mombasa Bay? It does not need to be said that in the last few years, numerous very important harbours have been destroyed by such a machine of destruction as this.

all times as also the wherewithal to increase. Our lines of warfare apply in any circumstances and must be radically revolutionized.

(6) When Tanganyika is incorporated as a part of the British Empire, and British Empire, as it now is, the Mainland of the Empire, the necessity of constructing airfields on the East Coast of Africa and bringing them into the adequate and efficient capabilities of a foreign Power in our midst is unnecessary.

I would mention several other factors that have been considered in the administration of Tanganyika in relation to complete Union, but I think that those whom are sufficient for making Tanganyika an inseparable part of the Empire.

### THE KING'S JUBILEE

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard."

Sir—Apart from the fact that the only contributions to the King's Jubilee Fund may be largely attracted by the prevailing financial distress throughout the country, one who has a vivid recollection of Queen Victoria's Jubilee is conscious of an apparent reluctance or unwillingness to give freely and generously to the similar fund now before us. I am sure that it is not because His Majesty King George V, is less beloved by the loyal Empire, but I believe that the disappointments we have experienced at the hands of His Majesty's Ministers responsible for the Colonial Government of late years have ingrained a moral and anti-social disposition for that treatment. The attempts to collect in Nairobi have been rather pathetic. Some people think that the fund has not been handled as well as it might have been. Others say that do not consider, in those days, that the contributions should go up in an annual celebration of our nationality, while wholeheartedly deprecating the announcement of the children, would prefer to see something of a permanent character to celebrate His Majesty's Jubilee.

I think if Government, or the Municipality alienates a suitable plot or plots for permanent playing fields, most people would subscribe to the best of their ability to the contingent annuities and expense, necessary to bring these fields into being, etc.

Another His Majesty the King has had tremendous wrongs and responsibilities, extraordinary sacrifices and destruction of goods or mind during his 25 years reign. Some who have had much the same experience, in lesser degree, should show our loyalty and respect for him by contributing to whatever we are best able to, whatever means are decided upon to show our thanks for what we have bestowed just services, and troubles and that now we treat and believe that a better and more powerful future lies before us. I am sure of all our progress—and so many of them are entitled about the self-government of Kenya—yet we are better off than most other peoples, and should preserve it as we always did the Government or deserve. The time is propitious to start a new era of collective team work, tolerance, patience, and an earnest endeavour to succeed in making this country and the Empire, more happy and contented, more loyal in unity, with belief that these will all come, as they came in times past, with the confident knowledge and assurance that our responsible Ministers are taking steps as long as for the service of the Great Empire to which we belong. Lack of confidence is responsible for at

least half of our melancholy. Confidence in the King has never faltered. Loyalty to the Throne is a magnificent trait of our National Character. Standing firm for pride, which we glory in, and which causes proud, unadvisedly, but while there is shrewdly, patriotism and historic pride created by the memory of Britain's deeds, ever unconsciously present in our minds, let it not be forgotten that our people are in a pleasant a hill for long periods in the life of the nation, cannot keep so steadfastly alive that pride in our race which we have experienced up till now.

Keep England and the Empire great? Keep the Empire strong! Continue the administration of justice throughout the King's Dominion; relieve the grievances of the Empire, and prevent the petty trade bickerings which make one part of the people wealthy, and the other part poor. By this means, any tarnishing of the sanctities of the people will be redoubled by the goal inherent in their hearts.

At the risk of being blatant, I beg to remind all readers of the necessity of that great and inspiring verse:

"Long live the King!  
Don't you hear them shouting?  
The King goes by!  
Don't you hear them shouting?  
The King goes by!  
That's the song they sing,  
Long live the King, in the nation's glory cry."

#### Complaints Regarding Late Arrivals

Due to there not being any Imperial Airways officials at the airport to receive them, the late arrival of the air mail liner, and in the absence of any notice to effect arrangements for its arrival in certain instances, has caused persons who have gone out to the aerodrome to meet friends, or to witness a night landing, Complainants of this nature have been brought to the notice of the "E.A. Standard."

Such was the case on Sunday evening, when, unaware that the liner from South Africa would only arrive Saturday morning, a number of people waited patiently for hours to meet arrivals. There was nobody at the aerodrome able to give information that the liner was late, and no notice to avoid unnecessary delay.

Imperial Airways informed the "East African Standard" yesterday that their office in town was always open—even over the weekend—and that by merely putting through a telephone call persons could obtain the latest information regarding the expected time of arrival of a machine. By so doing an unnecessary trip to the aerodrome, or a waiting walk, could be avoided.

To assist persons who are not telephone subscribers, it was planned, air mail notices giving the latest information regarding the progress of a delayed machine were posted outside the General Post Office. An American newsreel machine on the mail service had it been the practice, it was noted, to bring the mail before a teleprinter board giving fuller details regarding the time of delay and the expected time of arrival.

In addition, when it is known in time that a machine will arrive late, the broadcasting authorities are advised and information given in the course of the evening programme.

The third part proposed that they take steps to examine what measures were appropriate and practicable to render the Covenant more effective in the organization of collective security and to provide incentives for the more effective observance of those international obligations on which world peace especially rested.

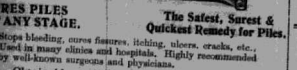

**FAMOUS JOCKEY DEAD**

Following injury to Spine  
The Late "Bill" Speck

ONE OF LEADING NATIONAL HUNT RIDERS

[THROUGH BUREAU'S AGENTS.]  
London, April 16.—Bill Speck, the famous jockey died at Cheltenham to-day following an injury received when riding the 2 to 1 favourite (twice) in the Leathers Neolithic on April 10. Speck was badly thrown, sustaining a fractured spine.

Speck rode throughout 17 in the (Grand National) a week or two ago. He was one of the leading professional jockeys under National Hunt Rules for several years, being particularly noted for his skill in starting in riding the hard pulling, dashingly type of jumper. There are few members of the profession who held a higher reputation amongst all sections of National Hunt followers than Bill Speck. 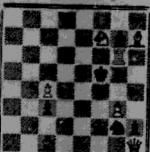

According to my information the Government Engineer says a really good transport road cannot be constructed over that stretch for less than £100,000. He should know because he has gone into the figures...

As one deeply interested in the new industry I warmly advocate a programme of road construction in the mining areas, but I am warmly advised that in the drawing up of such a programme our capacity to pay and not our eagerness to spend be the limiting factor...

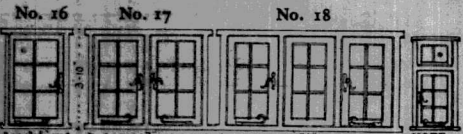

It was hoped that it might be possible to make some progress in timed butter which can be shipped as ordinary cargo, but here again in Europe, the Continental dairies are unwilling to sell at a price lower for timed butter than for fresh butter, even with the usual allowance for transport. We must allow for timing costs and cannot therefore sell except at a loss.

Key.—A special representative visited Egypt two or three years ago and submitted a report on a market which was considered to be not encouraging, but the case was not altogether bright. The trade requires an absolutely white butter, completely insulated that specific manufacturing required, and this coupled with the immemorial price makes the market unattractive.

Portuguese East Africa.—(Luzerne Marques). This town (with a few miles of South Africa) is one of the three big ports to place butter, e.g. export of produce. During the South African drought the price was taken of really getting into the trade. We are selling 100 lbs. of butter with indolence—1934, 177,000 lbs.

Madagascar.—There is no prospect of business owing to local conditions.

No. 3 THE SPOON SHOT

Do not move your hand up, down, or sideways, you can only help yourself by playing properly. One thing that is very necessary to remember in the spoon shot is to keep the club firmly on the ground. It may be desirable to remember that the spoon from a bad lie when one foot is on higher ground than the other. 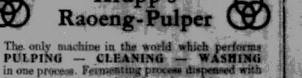

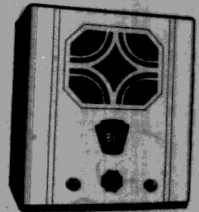

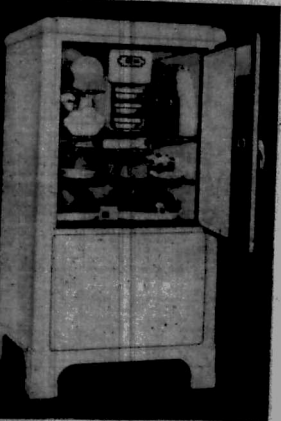

STRONG CONDEMNATION OF GERMANY'S REARMAMENT

Berlin Counter Charges

DECLARES FRANCE FAILED TO CARRY OUT DISARMAMENT PROMISE

The question of German repudiation of the Versailles Treaty was taken an important step further yesterday when the Council of the League of Nations met to consider a Note from the French Government asking the League to devise measures to remedy the situation and to prevent its recurrence.

France charges Germany with methodically pursuing a secret violation of the Treaty and asks whether it is worth while trying to establish non-aggression pacts if it is admitted that repudiation of treaties involves nothing more than moral reprobation.

The German Government in an official reply blames the failure for the race in armaments and charges France with failure to fulfil her pledge to disarm.

The Stresa Conference has been careful to avoid drafting an official declaration of the Allied Powers which would be agreed on the line of policy they will adopt.

United Allied Front

Geneva, April 14. The French Note to the League protesting against Germany's action states that the establishment of conscription in Germany and the evasion of military air force are an infringement of the fundamental clause of Part 6 of the Versailles Treaty.

The Note complains that the method of negotiation in international relations has been calculated by the method of *fait accompli*. It adds that if the method of unilateral denunciation of international engagements and recognition of their nullity will soon be no more for any other policy than that of force.

The Note asks the League to devise suitable measures for remedying the situation and preserving a recurrence of it.

Berlin's Reply

An official reply to the French Note declares that Germany is not in violation of the Versailles Treaty and that conscription was compelled by circumstances when the last hope of seeing the Versailles Treaty fulfilled by others had disappeared.

The League of Nations had looked on helplessly while other Powers secretly increased their armaments. Germany had observed its military obligations she assumed when she entered the League.

The Note is combated in very severe language throughout because Germany's announcement of conscription and the construction of military aviation "as the continuation of efforts for the maintenance of order and security."

For a long time secret violations of the fundamental clause of the Versailles Treaty could not be doubted; they were open and uncontentious. The League could not remain indifferent to the affirmation of political authority directly contrary to the principles upon which the League was founded.

The League had deliberately destroyed the one foundation of her collaboration with the League and had gravely compromised the success of international negotiations for the limitation of armaments pursued at Geneva.

The Note recalls French efforts in the cause of disarmament and asks the League to find a practical solution of international problems in conformity with the principles of the League of Nations.
