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TERRIBLE ORDEALS

Man Wedged in a Tree Trunk

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT] London, April 26. (By Air Mail.)

Two people in this country have had terrible and unnecessary ordeals. A man living near Gloucester was imprisoned for 48 hours in the trunk of a living tree, into which he had fallen while climbing. He was held fast in a vine. After suffering agony, he at last made his escape, but was so tired, exhausted and famished, with a set of black-locking teeth. The man is William Southwell of Overton, near St. As. At first he was one hand behind his back. The tree is in an isolated part of a moorland, but in the evening of the first day of his imprisonment a boy who had been picking sticks nearby reported that he had been secured by ropes in the tree. It was thought that the boy had heard an owl.

In the afternoon of the 11th the Mr. George Webb, of Higher Farm, Massachusetts, heard some coming from the tree and then a voice say "I'm in the tree and can't get out." Mr. Webb climbed the tree and saw Southwell, who could do little to help him. Mr. Webb got the assistance of two salmon fishermen, Mr. Mark May and Mr. William Parker, who fished a set of black-locking teeth. This was attached to Southwell, whose clothes were torn from him as he was hoisted out.

Tell from Train A 70-year-old man, after falling from a train in Hong Kong and lying unconscious for 14 hours, recovered sufficiently to move. He got up, but was knocked down by a train. This theory was advanced at Chamberlain yesterday on Benjamin Freeman Newton, an incorporated accountant, of Avenue Road, Anley. A verdict that he inadvertently fell from a carriage was returned. Dr. E. R. Longstaff, a public surgeon, said he thought that Newton must have fallen from a train about 11 a.m. on Wednesday and remained in the accident way unconscious until about 1 a.m. the next day. It was stated that Newton insisted on attending his office in Holloway two or three times a week, against the advice of his doctor.

Importance of African Convention

SOCIETY'S MEETING

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT] London, April 26. (By Air Mail.)

The Society for the Preservation of the Fauna of the Empire held a General Meeting of the Zoological Society's Office, Regents Park, on Monday, April 25. Sir Peter Chalmers Mitchell took the chair. The Chairman apologized for the fact that the President of the Society, the Earl of Onslow, was unable to be present, and he very much regretted the reason which, he said, was owing to the illness of his wife.

"To deliver an address," went on Sir Peter, "is the last thing in the world I like doing, but I would like to say that the Society is slowly but steadily progressing. We have signed on 15 new members today, which is not bad, although I should have preferred it to have been 1500."

"Since we last met I think the most important event that has happened has been the graduation by the British Government of the African Convention. The British Government has had to deal with a very large number of Governments in Africa, and other parts of the world. The Society ought, however, to be very pleased with this. In itself it is a very good thing; it is the first and most important stage in preserving the fauna of the Empire, and it has happened in a most important way. Locust Problem "There is one other point that I would like to mention. As soon as you begin to try and find legislation or active measures of any kind to control nature, you are always up against some serious problem. One of the greatest troubles for some time has been the locust. A new method of dealing with locusts by aeroplane has been adopted, and a powder

containing arsenic has been used very largely, and very effectively so far as the locust is concerned, but unfortunately it not only kills the locust but kills a large number of animals, in which we are rather more interested than the locust. I am glad to say, however, that there is now some hope of getting a preparation which, while it will be destructive to the locust, will do no damage to birds, mammals and other creatures. I think I am right in saying that the Research Department of the Biological Industries Limited is doing its best to find such a preparation."

Executive Report The Report of the Executive Committee of the meeting ran as follows:—

"Our last General Meeting was held at the end of January and was comparatively little that will prove of interest to members has since occurred."

"The All-India Conference for the Preservation of Wild Life met at Delhi on January 28 and the Agenda and Resolutions are now to hand and are being published in the next issue of our Journal. They are of great importance and it brought into force by appropriate legislation or Executive Order much improvement will ensue. It should, however, be clearly understood that as regards British India everything now depends on action by the Governments of the various Provinces and it is not too early to say how the provincial governments will view the conditions and to what extent they will set upon them. The same, of course, applies to the Indian States, many of whom represent themselves to the Conference."

Permanent Sanctuaries? "The question of the possibility of establishing permanent Sanctuaries for wild life does not appear to have been discussed at all, the reason probably being that the subject was not specifically included in the Agenda. By implication, however, it must have been discussed, for the Conference was requested to consider the extent to which India can accede to the African Convention of 1933. In the Resolutions however, no article particularly referred to it was No. 9 of the 1933 Convention—this applies to control of the export of trophies across boundaries in which, however, it was recommended that an International Convention should be drafted, much therefore hinges on the scope of that draft. The situation which develops will be watched with great interest."

Animal Films "It is pleasing to be able to report that the arrangements with the Chief Film Officer in regard to advice on so-called animal or jungle films are working quite well. We have also established relations with the Film Institute in regard to educational films. The question of the promotion of films of this kind is one of great difficulty, particularly due to the paucity of the supply of producers. Until this obstacle is overcome it is not easy to see how films designed for educational purposes can be made to cover the cost of production. Progress in this direction is thin for some time, likely to be slow."

The Treasurer reported that the Society had about £480 to its credit in the Bank.

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INDIAN OBJECTIONS TO CLOSER UNION
Afraid of Social and Economic Effect

TANGANYIKA CHANGES

In moving the resolution opposing the Government demand for modification of administration of the British East African territories at the third session of the Legislative Council of India, Chamberlain of Commerce and Industry in Tanganyika over the week-end, Mr. G. K. Oka confined his remarks to the grounds on which the Indian community here is opposed to the Chamberlain proposals.

From this party, he said, the Indians had been strongly opposed to any such modification, but personally had never been cognizant of the truth of the statement that it would be better for Tanganyika to unite with Kenya than for it to be returned to Germany. To state that Tanganyika was united with Kenya it would not be handed over to Germany was to live in a fool's paradise. Jubaland was an integral part of British East Africa, yet it was given to Italy; Hamud and Uruud were integral parts of Tanganyika, and they were given to Belgium.

Assuming that Tanganyika would remain an integral part of the British Empire, however, he contended that it would be better from the Indian viewpoint for it to remain as it was and not be given to some other country. The weightless argument in support of this was the absence of racial discrimination in Tanganyika's economic organization. There was, he pointed out, no discrimination between Indians and Europeans in the administrative services of the Territory but in the trading, mining and land acquisition rights of the Territory no discrimination had as yet been imposed.

Localism in Kenya

"On the other hand Kenya is burdened with the onerous of race," he said, "and wherever we turn we see in the utterances of political leaders and in the reports of economic commissions, hatred of the African race and suggestions for excluding the African from economic opportunities. The union of Tanganyika with Kenya means the discharge of existing economic arrangements, the restriction of the good things of the country for

British trade and commerce, and the compulsory restriction of the African race to petty trade and subsistence agricultural activities.

"We are fighting against all of these in Kenya, but we cannot permit the being united to be extended to Tanganyika and other territories in the British Empire that Indian economic policies will be completely unimpeded except under the terms of the Mandates, and that we will have no voice in the Mandates being drafted. We are equally strongly opposed to Tanganyika being linked up with any other part of the Empire so long as guarantees exist there safeguarding our race from economic persecution.

His final plea was that it is impossible to agree with the European claim that closer union would result in economic in administrative, judicial and police administration and economic decisions. "The increase of population and the development of economic activities here result in all over the world in decentralization," he stated. "The conditions in East Africa at present, after the necessary postal and Customs unions and with a little more coordination of the railways, should be ideal."

Unification with Kenya would result in the multiplication of subordinates and irresponsible officials, which the natives of Tanganyika would be unwilling to do. He pointed to a highly disintegrated situation from Kenya and Dar es Salaam. Kenya would benefit by closer union, but the natives of Tanganyika and Uganda would be discriminated.

The Central Federal Administration, he contended, would be one of touch with Dar es Salaam and Kampala, and this would spell disaster to all other intermediate, British, Indian and Imperial.

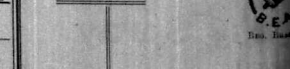

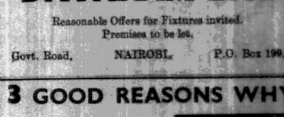

Good Year for Railways and Harbours

REMAINDER OF DEPRESSION DEFICIT WIPED OUT

Reserve Account Opened

REVENUE SURPLUS OF £1,173,913 OVER WORKING EXPENDITURE

The annual report of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours just issued discloses a very satisfactory position.

On the combined services there was a balance of revenue over ordinary expenditure of £1,173,913. After meeting interest and sinking fund charges, a sum of £317,946 was available to wipe out entirely the deficit which accumulated during the years of depression.

The Department was also able to start a Reserve Fund with an initial amount of £26,708.

There was a loss on the Port of £41,805, after allowing for the interest and sinking fund obligations.

Loss on the Port

The 1914 annual report of the General Manager of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours has been issued. It discloses that the gross revenue was £2,006,977 which was in excess of the total expenditure of £2,120,880, leaving a surplus of £125,097.

The second chapter of the report deals with the Railways revenue. It shows that the earnings last year were £2,247,225 compared with £2,098,119 in the preceding year. The ordinary working expenditure of the Railways was £2,006,977, which leaves a balance of net earnings of £1,173,913.

From the balance, interest and sinking fund charges were met on behalf of the Railway amounting to £614,034 on an total of the interest of £215,256, leaving a surplus of £400,225.

Of this surplus £317,946 has been transferred to the Railway Reserve Fund, which has now reached the balance of £26,708.

This continued surplus for a year showed an increase over 1913 of £153,850, while ordinary working expenditure only increased by £5,250 and £131,000 being the working expenditure of 1919.

The percentage of ordinary working expenditure to earnings in 1914 was 44 per cent, compared with 62.21 in 1913 and 55.15 in 1912.

Pre-Depression Comparison

Compared with 1929, the year immediately preceding the depression, the combined earnings of the railways and harbours show a decrease of 68.5 per cent, while the combined ordinary working expenditure rose to 45.49 per cent, which has resulted in the 1924 surplus yet recorded.

An important factor in the operating ratio. For the combined services the percentage of ordinary working expenditure (i.e., including depreciation) to earnings last year was 56.31 per cent. In the pre-depression year it was 41.27 and in 1914 it was 41.45.

The earnings in 1914 were £259,480 above the estimate while the ordinary working expenditure was £21,190 below the estimate.

The Burden of Interest

Interest and sinking fund charges on the transport services presented last year a 5.31 per cent on the extraordinary operating ratio, a charge of 5.70 per cent on the whole ratio and a half million increase in the transport services. The total loan charge for 1914 amounted to £2.29 per cent on the revenue.

Total—£2,497,098

Deficit Closes

The Department wiped off its Deficit Account last year. This account was opened in 1910 to record the deficit resulting from the fall in revenue when the income was insufficient to cover the requirements of renewals. At the close of the deficit account all arrears of principal sums and interest balances carried forward at the end of 1919 were £317,946, which has now been liquidated and a Reserve Account has been opened.

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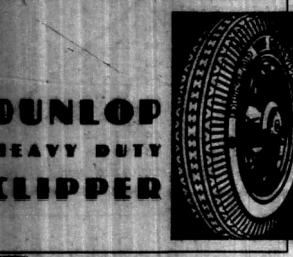
