## Treaty Obligations OTHER NATIONS' INTERESTS IN CHINA.

### America to Stand Firmly on Her Rights.

#### MUST MAINTAIN THE POLICY OF THE OPEN DOOR.

The Government of the United States has issued a statement setting forth its policy in regard to the Far East more especially concerning China. This statement has also been presented to the Japanese Government as a reply to the recent announcement to Powers dealing with affairs in the Orient.

The statement points out that the United States is one of the signatories of certain treaties guaranteeing the integrity of China and the maintenance of the policy of the open door. America stands firmly on her treaty rights.

The United States adds that no treaty can be modified or terminated except by agreement among the parties concerned, and no nation can rightfully endeavour to impose its will in a situation in which the rights of other States are involved.

Following an assurance given by the Japanese Foreign Minister to the British Ambassador, Great Britain has decided to let the matter rest.

The Japanese Government, however, has been informed that Britain cannot admit Japan a right solely to decide whether actions by other countries in China are likely to be a danger to Japan.

Britain's Position.

It is authorized to state that the British Ambassador in Tokyo, Sir Francis Lindley, in his recent interview with the Japanese Foreign Minister, Mr. Kihara Hirota, made it clear that Great Britain maintained all her rights under the Treaty of Commerce with China and stood by all her obligations under the multilateral treaties concerning that country.

Sir John Simon is studying Sir Francis Lindley's report of the conversation and it is generally expected he will be in a position to reply early next week to Parliamentary questions which are to be asked on the subject—British Official Wireless Service.

# DEBT DEFAULT BY GERMANY.

## Cash Transfers to be Completely Suspended.

### PROTESTS BY BRITAIN AND FRANCE.

#### Breach of Agreements.

##### SERIOUS EFFECT UPON THE CREDIT OF THE REICH.

Germany has proposed completely to suspend cash transfers of interest on her medium and long term loans, which include the Dawes and Young Loans.

This intimation was announced in a broadcast message by Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, the President of the Reichsbank.

Britain and France have informed the German Government that a grave view will be taken of any proposal to apply a transfer moratorium to the Dawes and Young Loans as these were raised under inter-Government supplies and are governed by agreements.

The question of Germany's debts is at present under consideration by a conference in Berlin of representatives of creditor nations and of the Reichsbank. It is stated that the creditors intend to take a firm stand on the subject of the moratorium.

# RE-ARMAMENT BY ITALY

## Dramatic Announcement by the King.

"THE GREATEST GUARANTEE  
FOR PEACE."

### Unity of Command.

WAR MATERIAL TO BE RE-ARMED AND  
OVERHAULED.

Italy's latest contribution to the disarmament discussions is the announcement that she intends to augment the efficiency of her fighting services.

During the course of a speech in inaugurating the newly elected Chamber of Deputies, the King stated that "the greatest guarantee for peace is the efficiency of the Italian armed forces."

He added that efforts must be made to improve the physique of the Italian youth and their preliminary training in order to raise the level of soldierly efficiency.

Unity of command was a fundamental necessity, while war material must be renewed and overhauled.

The King also indicated that certain constitutional changes were pending for the better discipline of the country's economic forces. He affirmed the Government's intention to remain on the gold standard.

### The Training of Youth.

Italy wants the longest possible period of peace, but the greatest guarantee for peace is the efficiency of the Italian armed forces," declared the King when inaugurating what will probably be the last session of the Chamber of Deputies and gorgeous ceremonial. He was sustained by the Italian Royal Family.

He declared that the Government was striving to augment the efficiency of the forces which depend on order, material, and unity of command. Efforts must be made to improve the physique of the Italian youth and their preliminary training in order to raise the level of soldierly efficiency. War material must be renewed and overhauled while unity of command was fundamental.

### Constitutional Change.

The King declared that Italy led the way in the new form of government, which would probably lead to changes in the constitutions of other countries.

It is alleged by the advocates of the transfer that the British Government, which retained control of these areas when the South African Union was formed, has failed to develop these Protectorates which are still in a backward state.

Under the Union of South Africa Act of 1909 provision is made for the transfer to the Union Government of the Administration of Protectorates and other native territories, two of which are contiguous to the Union and the other actually surrounded by Union territory.

Nevertheless an inter-Imperial controversy is expected to arise. The natives, themselves, are stated to be opposed to the transfer, while the "Manchester Guardian" states that they must adopt a more liberal native policy before the request can be entertained.

Note to be Dispatched.

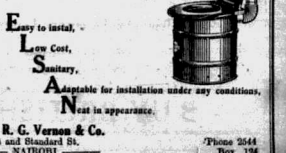

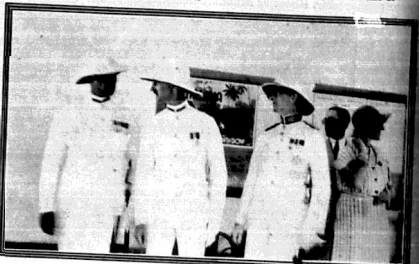

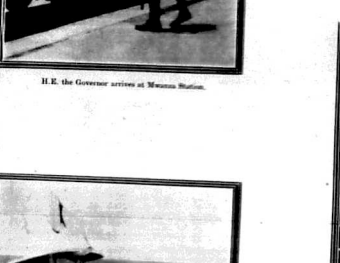

Purview to the short article published in the "East African Standard" on March 16, 1934, regarding Kenya Agricultural Department has now forwarded the full report of the samples of marrowfat peas, grown in Kenya at the "North Kaji District" and "South Kaji District" respectively, which were submitted by the Agricultural Department to their London Agents, Messrs. Mitchell Cotts and Co., Ltd., for their analysis.

Messrs. Mitchell Cotts and Co., Ltd. were asked to report on the suitability for the English market peas, and on the prices which they considered the peas would realize on the open market. The samples consisted of three different varieties of peas which had been treated in a number of different ways but Mitchell Cotts and Co.'s report can be considered an unbiased one as they were not told the variety of pea nor the treatments which any of the samples had undergone.

Four samples only, namely B, C, D, and E, were selected and these were considered to be good marketable types. The results of the analysis are given as harvested. It is worthy of note that the samples of peas, three occupy the first three positions of merit in Messrs. Mitchell Cotts and Co.'s report, the price quoted for sample "B" which was of Japanese Marrowfat peas, was 11s. 6d. per cwt. usually obtained for this type of pea, though it is common to find that the quality of sample "B" which was a Dutch Marrowfat type.

Previous to the report on each sample is given a short description of the details of harvesting, and a statement of the percentage of good quality (green) and bleached peas contained in these samples which had not been previously hand-picked. In this connection the correlation between the percentage of peas of good quality and the method of drying is most marked.

It will be seen that samples A, B, C, and D, which were shelled and dried gave 88, 72, 74, and 74 per cent. respectively of marketable peas, whereas samples E, F, and H, gave only 33.4 per cent., 52 per cent., and 53 per cent., respectively of good coloured peas.

The other samples were shelled and dried in tripods in the field (this method gives a shorter period for drying than that in which peas are dried in wads) occupy an intermediate position and figures indicate that these three methods are not 'good enough.' Whilst a sample of peas equal to any of those harvested E, F, or G, could eventually be obtained after any method of drying, it is clear that the lower the percentage of bleached peas in the bulk harvest, the more ready that bulk harvest and cost of hand-picking and the greater the return in yield and profit. It is therefore clearly established that shade drying is clearly advisable.

Sample A, could be hand-picked, as the peas are of a size of 1 1/2 per cent of exportable peas, whereas Sample D, which was harvested, so hand-picked, was of a size of 1 1/2 per cent. The difference between Sample A and Sample D, from this point of view, is a matter of 55 per cent. of the crop, or, in other words, so hand-picked, the difference of 3 1/2 bush per acre.

## INTERMINABLE WRANGLES BAD FOR BANTU PROGRESS.

### "Mission Villages" Problem.

Idle Lumwa youths with "sporting" attitude to crime. # BRITAIN TO PROTECT HER COMMERCIAL INTERESTS.

## COTTON DUTIES AND QUOTAS TO BE IMPOSED.

### Except in East Africa.

Mr. Walter Runciman has now informed the House of Commons of the substance of his communication to Tokio on the subject of British and Japanese trade.

Emphasizing that, though the Anglo-Japanese Treaty would not be terminated, both the Import Duties Advisory Committee and the Colonial Governments would be asked to arrange duties and quotas on cotton and rayon goods at the earliest opportunity, which arrangements would be made retrospective to to-day. These arrangements will apply to all foreign imports.

On account of the Congo Basin Treaties, the quotas will not apply to East Africa. In West Africa they will apply to Japanese goods only, while the Dominions will make their own decision.

### To be Retrospective.

It will be recalled that conversations and discussions have taken place between industrialists and later between the British and the Japanese governments. These have been conducted in extremely friendly spirit by proposals of a mutually satisfactory character between the two countries. It is understood that the British Government now considers that it would not be justified in further postponing the measures to protect the extremely important commercial interests affected in Britain and the Crown Colonies.

The Japanese Ambassador, Mr. Matsudaira, has undertaken to communicate to his government the memorandum regarding the British Government's future policy on the question of Japanese competition, handed to him by the President of the Board of Trade, Mr. Walter Runciman—British Official Wireless Service.

This resolution reached by the British Government was not unexpected. It is thought that Mr. Runciman will, on Monday, indicate the steps which the Government propose to take to protect the British market at home and in the Colonies against excessive Japanese competition.

Quotas to be Imposed.

London, May 7. Mr. Walter Runciman, President of the Board of Trade, today told the House of Commons that he informed Mr. Matsudaira that Britain would take steps of action in order to safeguard her commercial interests, but he would make a reply to Mr. Runciman's announcement on Monday.

The Import Duties Advisory Committee is as quickly as possible to make arrangements for the imposition of duties and quotas on the silk duties in the United Kingdom market and the Government of the Colonies would be asked to introduce import quotas, with the exception of West Africa.

Received Quota in Japan.

Tokyo, May 8. Mr. Runciman's announcement on Monday was received unenthusiastically.

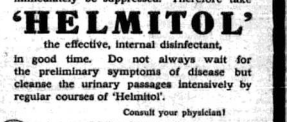

Murder and Outlawry in Northern Province. OFFICIAL PICTURE OF AN UNDISCIPLINED COMMUNITY.

100 People Massacred. TAX-DOGDERS AND POACHERS FIND ITALIAN TERRITORY USEFUL.

Life is still a hectic affair in the Northern Frontier of Kenya... Take the story of Dadu, a Gababa headman, He had been asked to keep away from Abyssinia but he persisted in going north. Result: massacre of Dadu and 93 followers by Gelubba who then raided the Boran and killed them more.

A chase by K.A.R. was the outcome and an unsatisfactory engagement was fulfilled with 200 armed Gelubba, only six of the raiders being killed. Then a Lamu policeman carrying mails, was waylaid and murdered and there is a story behind that.

Outlaws of the border are 'becoming more of a menace every year.' Tribal Feuds and Movements.

A graphic story of the Northern Frontier is featured by the Acting Chief Native Commissioner in his recently published Annual Report. The following extracts provide a record of murder, outrage, and general unrest and lawlessness in the many points throughout the Province.

The Bodo district was comparatively peaceful throughout the year, due, undoubtedly, to better administration. There were no reported murders, and only two rights reported. The Boran States, was in April, when a party of fifty poachers and a party of 100 men, with a Watamba hunting party, and the second in December, when a poacher hunting party from Italy and the Somalialand Quartermaster in the Boran.

The racial hatred which existed between the Boran and the Mohammedan tribes, and the murders of Boran living near Wajir, made it necessary to consider carefully the question as to which of the Boran living in the Wajir District could inhabit with the maximum of safety, and whether it was advisable to continue a policy of trying to keep the tribes separated by themselves.

On the morning of the 21st, the patrol came in sight of the Gelubba encampment, and an engagement followed in which the Gelubba patrol was subjected to heavy fire. A great amount of stock was driven away by the Gelubba while the Gelubba, scattered over the plain, were busy on a fairly regular basis. The Gelubba, who were armed with shotguns and rifles, were seen to be killing many of the animals.

by in British territory. All others have wandered to and from Abyssinia and Italian Somaliland. The chiefs and influential elders of the two main divisions—the Ogaden and the Bodo—have been driven to either Italian Somaliland or Abyssinia throughout the year. There have been no serious murders or feuds, and the situation has in the main part been quiet and peaceful.

There has been the usual movement of the tribes throughout the district. The Gureh, who have been driven to the district from the north, have been driven to the south in times by other Gureh from Abyssinia. In the middle of the year, many who had left the district to avoid paying tax, returned, but there is no doubt that they have suffered considerably among their own people for their loyalty to the Government.

On the whole, the district has been quiet, but there have been a number of murders, in particular the brutal murder of a woman carrying mails from Garissa to Lamu, but which was perpetrated by the avoidance of insolent outbursts rather than by the outbreak of a tribal feud.

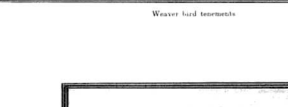

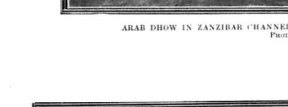

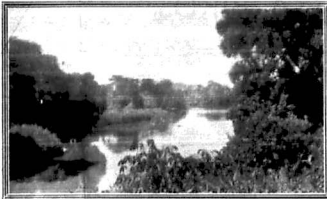

Germany's Supplies of Raw Materials.

### Rapidly Giving Out.

TEA AND COFFEE EMBARGO FEARED.

### (TECHNOLOGIST'S AGENT.)

Berlin, May 8. The problem of supply of raw materials is becoming increasingly acute. Industrial firms have already restricted their output considerably.

## ATLANTIC SHIPPING JUDGMENT.

Plaintiffs Lose Their Case.

### NO INJUNCTION GRANTED.

Against Cunard—White Star Merger.

### (BY WIRELESS.)

London, May 8. The International Mercantile Marine Company's application has been dismissed with costs by the Chancery Court.

Mr. Justice Eve said that prima facie, the plaintiffs in such a case must be shareholders which plaintiffs admittedly were not. They were merely unpaid vendors and had no lien on the shares they had sold, therefore it was impossible to hold that the action could be maintained by them.

### Oceanic Company's Rights.

"On April 23 the Chancery Court reserved judgment in the application by the International Mercantile Marine Company for an injunction against the Cunard—White Star merger. The plaintiffs contended that the merger agreement was ultra vires as it was substantially a sale of the Company's assets over which the plaintiffs had a prior lien as security for £2,500,000 being the balance of the purchase money of the White Star Line."

Mr. Franklin, the President of the International Mercantile Marine Co., alleged that the merger was a gross violation of the rights of the Oceanic stockholders. Mr. Neville Chamberlain, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, referring to the proposed injunction, said that the Oceanic Board had been authorized to advise that they were not entitled to implement their part of the merger scheme without the consent of the National Agency.
