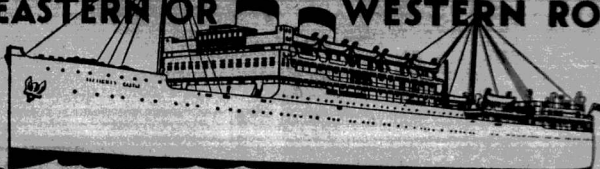

ANOTHER TRADE WAR?

Retaliation Threats by Germany.

IF BRITAIN ESTABLISHES A CLEARING OFFICE.

Colonial Question Revised.

POSITION REVIEWED BY CONFERENCE IN LONDON.

The situation created by Germany's debt moratorium and the consequent reprisals threatened by Britain, is becoming increasingly complicated.

The President of the Reichsbank, Dr. Schacht, maintains that the establishment of a clearing house will mean eventually the complete cessation of international commercial relations.

Among the alternatives suggested by Dr. Schacht are the return to Germany of her former Colonies and also a reduction of both capital and rates of interest on Germany's debts.

Meanwhile the Bill now passed by Parliament gives very comprehensive powers to any retaliatory measures taken by Germany with regard to the establishment of a clearing office.

Dr. Schacht's Demands.

A warning that Germany will cease all commercial relations with any country imposing a trade moratorium was given by Dr. Schacht at a reception of diplomats and representatives of the foreign press at the Ministry of Propaganda.

He said that Germany's demands for a moratorium would not be met unless she was given non-payment for goods which would reduce international trade to a minimum and finally lead to a complete cessation of international commercial relations, hence nobody could be advised to accept a moratorium unless Germany would take it lying down. Undoubtedly the establishment of a clearing house in Great Britain would seriously affect the trade of the British Dominions with Germany.

Dr. Schacht suggested three remedies for the present situation. Firstly to return Germany's former colonies, secondly Germany must be given the opportunity to increase her exports and thirdly a reduction of the capital and rates of interest of Germany was not permitted additional exports. This will enable the resumption of her debt service.

Objects of the Bill.

One of the main objects of the Debt Clearing Offices and Import Restrictions and Reprisals Bill which will be debated in its second reading in the Commons on Monday will be to empower the Government to suspend or restrict foreign imports in retaliation for quota restrictions, import duties, or special duties, or any other measure which is likely to result in a loss of trade to any country which applies retaliatory action by Germany.

Delegation Leaves Berlin.
The German delegation is leaving Berlin today for London in response to the invitation conveyed in the British note of last week. They will engage in discussions on Germany's decision to declare a moratorium on all debts, including Dawes and Young loans to come into effect from the 1st of July.

The second reading of the Bill, which is known as the Debt Clearing Offices and Import Restrictions Reprisals Bill, will be held on Monday afternoon by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Neville Chamberlain, and will be put through its remaining stages at a later date.

It is anticipated that the Chancellor will emphasize that the Government's position is well understood in the House of Commons and that the Bill is not intended to be a precedent.

German Threat of Retaliation.

The Clearing Office would use its funds to discharge full interest on sterling bonds of Dawes and Young loans provided that holders of such bonds held on June 15 by British and foreign residents in the United Kingdom.

It was thus hoped that the Clearing Office would not need of concern to do so.

German's Own Fault.

Referring to Germany's reduction in reserves of gold and foreign exchange, the Chancellor said that there was a large part due to the device of the German Reichsbank to purchase raw materials to German exporters in order to get German at higher prices.

The Chancellor's hope that the negotiations might yield a settlement was echoed by the opposition speaker, and the Liberal Unionist, Sir Herbert Samuel, emphasized that since the Government had not been able to secure the restoration of the settlement, the final settlement must be reached under the Dawes and Young loans, which would be a sacred obligation to govern all financial relations between Germany and the British Empire.

British Reply to American Debt Note.

OBJECTIONS TO PAYMENTS IN KIND.

Previous Experiences.

PRIMARY QUESTION FOR SETTLEMENT IS AMOUNT TO BE PAID.

The British reply to the note from the United States on the question of war debt payments has been issued, and states that the Government would welcome an opportunity for resuming discussion whenever there are favourable circumstances. The note puts forward objections to payments in kind, as the economic difficulties of such payments would apply with equal force to payments in cash. The experience in connection with German reparations is cited as an instance.

Transfer Difficulties.

[REUTERS' BUREAU'S AGENT.] London, June 28. The British note reply to the American debt note of June 12 has been issued. In regard to the American suggestion of payments in kind, the note repeats the experience of the German reparations which showed that transfer difficulties are a serious obstacle to a system of deliveries in kind. The economic difficulties of such payments in kind are pointed out, and it is stated that the Government is not prepared to pay further till her debts were scaled down to an unmanageable sum to which Britain might agree. Such a situation could be the result of the proposals of the debtor and not by the creditor.

IMPERIAL AIR DEFENCES.

Close Co-operation Being Developed.

BRITAIN'S FORCE TO BE STRENGTHENED.

[BY WIRELESS.] London, June 28. During the debate in the House of Lords on the merits of the advisability of creating an Imperial Air Force and raising the Imperial Defence Conference at an early date to consider the Imperial Air Force and other matters, the Secretary for Air, said that practical difficulties made it impossible. Agriculture in the Fascist State.

PLANNING FOR ITS OWN PROSPERITY.

The Moseley Ideal.

CO-OPERATION BETWEEN PRODUCERS AND THE CONSUMING PUBLIC.

Sir Oswald Moseley and his Fascist followers are preaching the "Moseley ideal" of a "Corporate State" on the Italian model, by which is meant a constitution composed of "Corporations" representing all interests in each industry, business and profession.

Every "Corporation" will be responsible for the planning of the progress of its own industry and all will be represented in the central body, the whole being controlled and directed by a strong Central Executive akin to a one-party dictatorship.

The same suggestion as his solution of Kenya political problems was set out in detail some time ago by Sir Edward Grigg who is opposed to the conception of a government in Kenya as visualised by the adoption of the British political model in East Africa.

The following article, taken from a British Fascist propaganda newspaper, deals with the "Corporation" of greatest interest to Kenya—agriculture—and indicates broadly its construction and purpose.

Controlled Production.

Increasing interest is being shown in the progress of the Fascist movement in Britain. The political movement known as the Fascist Front is the creation of a "Corporate State" on the lines of the Italian Fascist regime. A similar suggestion was made some time ago by Sir Edward Grigg, an able statesman and one of the British constitutional practice and principles, in connection with the development of Kenya. It is of interest, therefore, to understand something of what the "Corporate State" means and the following article, reprinted from a British Fascist newspaper, explains some detail the plans of agriculture (the most important industry in such a constitution).

The writer states, first of all—Some 1,000,000 people as present obtain their livelihood from the land, but under Fascist arrangements at least a further 1,000,000 would be employed in agriculture. The important work to do is co-ordinating and co-operating to bring about the present chaos of individual competition. The whole of England, Scotland and Wales must be considered as one unit.

Co-operation. The employees' representatives would be composed of yeoman farmers, tenant farmers, landowners, and food-stuff manufacturers. They would have exacting and important work to do in co-ordinating and co-operating to bring about the present chaos of individual competition. The whole of England, Scotland and Wales must be considered as one unit.

A National Plan. Agriculture is an active force in the mind of national planning that any industry to grow, as owing to the nature of the work, will be the tradition of land tenure in this country, farming is carried out in small fields by men who are ignorant of their independence and lack effective co-operation. It was necessary to search this country for rugged individuals, one would find a few, who are examples among our yeoman farmers.

Such independent spirit cannot fail to awaken our admiration, but, under the present chaotic conditions it leads to cut-throat competition, periodic gluts on the market and other economic results of unplanned, chaotic economy.

Eventually, some form of ordered planning must be introduced, compelling individuals to make compulsory advances imposed upon them by Government, as has been done in the case of the "planning of Government" with no striking success.

Industry's Powers. A Fascist Government would set up an Agricultural Corporation with power to legislate for the entire industry, to control the entire industry, to control the entire industry, to control the entire industry.

factories. An Agricultural Workers' Union would be organised to cover all employees in the industry, and would have a very important part to play in adjusting the actual and material welfare of the agricultural labourer.

All fields in the same quire there can be no question but that it is a much more skilled worker than the average man employed in mass production, and should be paid a much better wage than 50c per acre as at present.

No Foreign Food.

By the exclusion of cheap foreign foodstuffs British farmers will be given an assured and good market. In return they will be expected to improve the standard of the agricultural worker more in keeping with that of the town worker. At the same time steps will be taken to give better amenities to the farming community. Cheaper and better transport will enable them to reach local markets towns where all modern amenities and educational facilities will be available.

The Consumer.

Finally we come to the consumer's representatives who have been completely ignored by present Government actions. These will be appointed by Government and will contain a number of women nominated by their Domestic Corporation.

When such matters as the supply of milk, bacon, etc., are considered, it is important that the well-being of the children and the well-being of the husband in the breakfast table, depend so directly on these products. The Fascist Corporation will remedy this intolerable defect in the present system, and women, through their own co-operation, will be represented on the Agricultural Corporation as consumers of household necessaries, and will have a large measure of influence over the supply and prices of all agricultural products.

Doubled Production.

The first organ of Fascist Government will be directed to the restoration of property to British farmers. The Corporation will immediately undertake the task of doubling output of agricultural production, and bringing every available acre under cultivation. It will eliminate the wastefulness of co-operative planning, bringing small settlements in the "village" type of farming, and will give the small farmer a chance to produce more by means of new agricultural methods, and restore to the whole country the security, prestige and dignity that is its heritage from the distant past.

BURDENSOME FARM DEBTS.

Italian Measures for Relief.

LARGE LOANS GRANTED.

For Working Capital and Farm Improvements.

The agricultural credit section of the Bank of Italy has been reported actively in giving effect to the measures suggested for relieving burdensome farm debt liabilities, in adjusting the actual income payable on their accounts to the reduced incomes now obtainable from the farms, in strengthening the market for the leading farm products.

It has granted farmers loans for a total of 222.8 million lire of which 202.4 million for working capital and 21.9 for farm improvements.

In the six years during which the agricultural credit section has been at work it has loaned for such purposes 1,244.7 million lire. The report notes with satisfaction that in 1935 the farmers have been more punctual in their payments and the number of unpaid bills has declined as compared to the two previous years.

These figures are revealed in the monthly survey of trade and industry issued by the Association of Italian Corporations and the General Fascist Confederation of Italian Industries.

Problems of the Clove Industry.

ALARMING CONCENTRATION OF LAND IN MONEYLENDERS' HANDS.

Very important measures have been taken by the Government of Zanzibar to protect the Arab and African land owners and agriculturists against their own improvidence and, in doing so, to make an attempt to relieve the peasant producer from the stranglehold of the non-Native moneylender.

The position in Zanzibar is that the best clove land is passing rapidly from the hands of the agriculturists into those of a non-agricultural community, as the Arabs and Africans—heavily in debt—are unable to meet their commitments and are being sold up.

The Government proposes to introduce legislation providing for a moratorium for a year against foreclosure by mortgages and an establishing which will be an effective Clove Industry Management Association and Land Bank.

Decrees are also being introduced to penalise adulteration of produce and to compel inspection and grading of the main export products.

A New Oil Industry

The Government of Zanzibar has published in a special Issue Supplement to the Official Gazette yesterday four draft Bills which will be placed before the next session of the Legislative Council on 30th instant. These Bills deal with the clove industry (and to some extent with the copra export trade) and together represent a development of Government policy of the greatest importance to the main agricultural industry of Zanzibar.

Perhaps the most important Bill (or Decree) as it is known in Zanzibar, is that intended to restrict alienation of land in order to make and make provision for evidence and procedure in such cases. In the official statement of objects and reasons it is explained that for some considerable time the Government of Zanzibar has been greatly exercised in regard to the vast loss of land alienations under which the agricultural population of the Protectorate labours.

It is pointed out that this loss was sufficiently heavy before the world depression was felt in Zanzibar, but has been considerably increased by the break in the prices of clove and copra with the consequent reduction in land values. The agricultural position was regarded seriously by both Mr. Strickland (who reported on the position of the clove industry), and Sir Alan Dean, who recently inspected the financial condition of Zanzibar. Mr. Strickland recommended legislation to restrict the alienation of the land of agriculturists—in some cases with retrospective effect.

At the time, however, the Government were of the opinion that the situation was not so serious, and that, justly restrictive legislation, should not be introduced. The fact, however, that the Government have now decided to introduce such legislation, is a strong indication that the Government are of the opinion that the situation is now so serious that it is necessary to take such measures as will be necessary to restrict the alienation of the land of agriculturists.

REGISTRAR-GENERAL'S ANNUAL REPORT.

Trade Marks and Patents.

MARKED INCREASE SHOWN IN DEPARTMENTAL REVENUE.

The Registrar-General, who is also the Official Receiver and Public Trustee, has submitted his Annual Report for 1933.

The total revenue received by the Department showed an increase of over £12,000 as compared with 1932. This increase was mainly accounted for by the increase in the amount received from Estate Duty.

By far the largest section of the report is that dealing with bankruptcy and deeds of arrangement. The number of bankruptcy notices issued in 1933 showed an increase of 120 over the number issued in 1932, but the total number of cases was only 71, a decrease of eight compared with 1932.

Companies Registered.

In his annual report for 1933, 64,517, as compared with 63,027 in the previous year. Altogether 202 bills of sale were registered, as against 194 in 1932.

As far as the registration of trade marks was concerned, there were 442,728 more than in 1932. The revenue was added up to £20,413, 7s. 6d., compared with the proceeds of the previous year. This was mainly due to the amount received from estate duty.

The total number of companies registered during the year was 118, of which 94 were private companies and 24 public. The total had year was 62, 63 private and 17 public.

Under the laws of estate duties it is revealed that 178 estates of assets were filed, on 75 of which the duty was assessable.

Bankruptcies. The fees collected for bankruptcies, exclusive of court fees, aggregated £1,481, as against a decrease of £213 in comparison with the previous year.

Business Names. There were 272 applications for the registration of business names and 231 renewals being requested.

Fusion of the Parties in South Africa.

TERMS OF BASIS ACCEPTED BY LEADERS.

The Imperial Connection.

It was announced recently in the "E.A. Standard" that General J. B. M. Botha and General J. C. Smuts had agreed upon a basis for the fusion of the two major political parties in the Union of South Africa. Details published the full basis of the agreement.

Important clauses in the agreement deal with the maintenance of the existing relationship between the Union and the British Commonwealth of Nations; the military basis of the constitution; agricultural policy; language rights; and native policy. The last-named recognises the natives as a "permanent portion of the population of South Africa," and the Christian trusteeship of the European race.

Following on the publication in South Africa of the agreed basis for fusion between the two leaders, the Malan section of the Nationalist Party is laying down terms upon which the members of that particular group were prepared to accept fusion with the South African Party.

These terms of the Malan section provided among other things, for "the maintenance and development of a purely South African nationalism," and the "assurance that loyalty to the Union and to the voluntary on our side, and may be renounced whenever the South African Nation so desires."

The Republican Issue.

The terms of the basis for the fusion of the Nationalist and the South African Parties, decided upon by General Botha and General Smuts have been announced from Pretoria and give wide spread publicity throughout the country.

The following are the principal clauses of the agreement: The object of the present Party is the development of a predominant spirit of unity based on the equality of all African-speaking and English-speaking sections of the community, coupled with the recognition and appreciation of the distinctiveness of the distinctive cultural heritage of the other.

It is the intention of the manufacturer to use the lower grades of Kenya coffee and the Coffee Board believe that this will prove valuable new outlets for these lower grades.

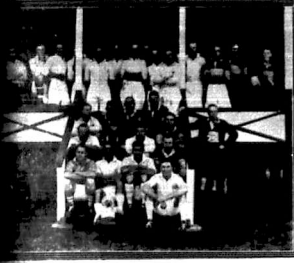

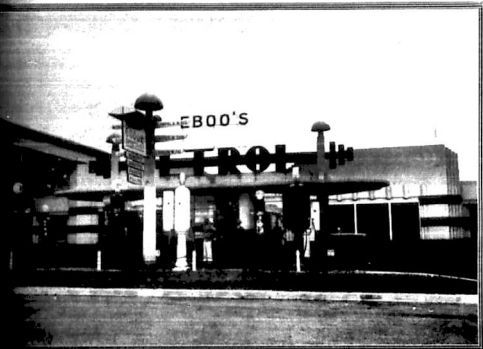

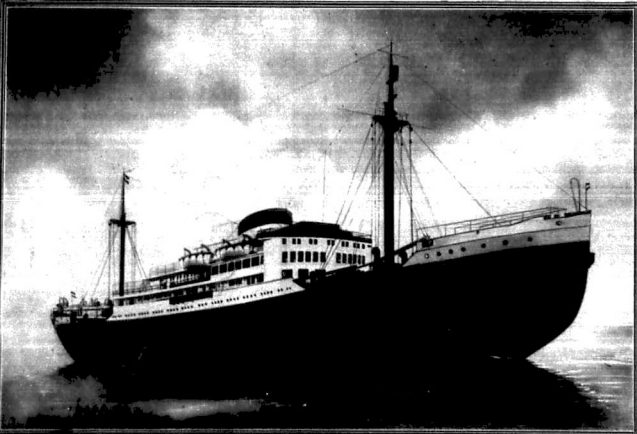

Investigation by Kenya Police.

A FARM THEFT. Following on the death of a young Suk in hospital at Kitala, the Kenya Police are conducting an investigation.

Early on Friday morning, June 9, Mr. and Mrs. G. Selwyn, of the East, Kitala, were informed by their Native employees that eleven cow bells had been stolen during the night. Mr. Selwyn, accompanied by a number of laborers and squatters, started to be about fifteen, set out on the footprints which took them in the general direction of the West Suk Native Reserve.

Mr. Selwyn was unable to keep pace with the group of natives and followed at a distance. He suddenly found that at some little distance from Kitala, on the neighboring farm of Mr. A. P. Brattell, 11 in standing, a group of natives found in the huts four and the allegation is that those natives were accused by Mr. Selwyn's laborers and squatters of the theft of the cow bells. Showing and notes from the huts attracted the attention of Mr. Brattell, a pupil on the British farm, and according to police investigation him and natives who accompanied him and natives who alleged that they saw Mr. Selwyn's laborers usually at the place. It was further stated that the four Suk were in danger of being killed had been given orders by Mr. Brattell to slay the night there.

The four Suk went to Mr. Selwyn's house where they denied knowledge of the theft. It was alleged they were later beaten, together with two Suk in Mr. Selwyn's employ. Mr. Selwyn went to the Police Station and returned an order to be sent to remove the Suk as they had no registration certificates. They were subsequently arrested and on arrival at the Police Station were removed to hospital for treatment at the instigation of the Sub-Inspector of Police. One died on the afternoon of June 23 while in hospital and a post mortem was held by Dr. Cowan, Kitala.

NO ACCOUNT.

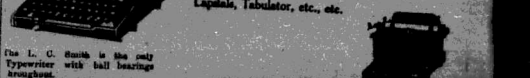

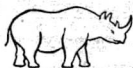

Commission to Consider Zanzibar Problem

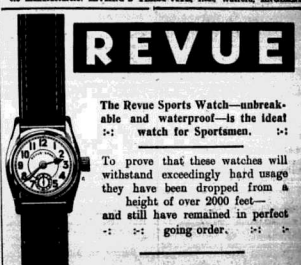

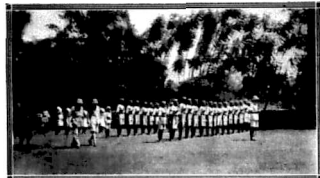

This time of year always seems a rather "off season" for news in the dog world. I think it is breeding with owners and if they are interested in pups at all, and I have an idea that it is also the time when the best pups are bred and reared in Kenya. Logically you would imagine that the dry weather months would be far and away the best time, but in practice I believe that animals breed almost as much as plants to the "growing seasons." The same occurs at home, of course, and springtime is looked upon as the best season for breeding operations, but there it is with the idea that the cold and damp of the winter militates against the easy rearing of pups. In Kenya it is the other way about as this is the wet season, but it is our nearest equivalent to Spring and is probably the best time.

There are encouraging signs of a revival of interest in dogs in East Africa, partly because people are perhaps a little lettered off, partly due to the removal of quarantine restrictions over the greater part of the Colony, whilst the recent increase in burglaries and other forms of crime have awakened people to the great advantage of owning a decent dog as a guard to themselves and their property.

In fact I think owners who have been afraid of being landed with unwanted families, might risk breeding again, although in moderation, keeping perhaps four pups, and at least three of these being dog pups, as bitches are not so easy to sell. If they have any difficulty after this advice in disposing of the pups, an advertisement in the "Special Advertisement" column of this newspaper will soon get them out of that difficulty, and if they care to send me details of the family I shall be glad to pass them on to anyone whom I know may be interested.

At the present moment I have an urgent request from Uganda for a young Irish Wolfhound for sale, and cannot hear of anyone who is breeding at present.

Mr. Trent of Old Kalou is starting a kennel of these lovely dogs which are well suited for hunting and as personal guards. He imports a really good dog here from the famous English dog "Rank" who has again topped the list of Champions at home this year, his future wife being called Delight, and I think being one of Mrs. Sharpe's breed from Uganda. The pups, when there are any, should be very nice indeed. Mrs. Sharpe imported a very nice pair from England a year or two ago which were very much admired.

Feeding of Dogs.

Like all these big "boned" dogs Irish Wolfhounds require

very careful attention when they are young, and must be really well fed. They should be given just an amount of good beef that can get through from the time they are fully weaned. Duck meat is not nearly so blood rich as mutton, although far better than no meat at all. In fact unless owners are prepared to give them at least a couple of pounds of meat every day for the first year, and plenty of whole milk and raw eggs it is a waste of time to get these big breeds at all. A diet of potato, or sweet potatoes or such like food, unless it is merely supplementary to the meat means puny, small boned and weak caricatures of the breed, with a tendency towards rickets and useless for breeding purposes. Good butcher's meat is not expensive, and there is no excuse for the infrequency of meat in the diet of so many dogs in the Colony.

People have a fixed idea that much meat is bad for a dog and will make him smelly in the house. This is based on a misapprehension. First of all the so-called "dog-meat" that is frequently sold as such, is all of a horrible mixture of rot-over-fresh innards, and the odd scrap of meat and bone that were left over on the butcher's shop and are on the verge of going bad. It is probably fly-blown and will certainly lead to worm trouble, the most frequent cause of smellyness in dogs. It is also, unless parboiled, and given killed meat, is also a cause of worm trouble. Dogs fed on really good meat will be very free of worms, that is, unless, as actually meat, free of infection itself, is the food best likely to encourage the harbouring of these pests in the dog's intestine.

To return to the question of the increased demand for dogs I have also at present enquiries before me for good, cross-bred dogs. By cross bred I do not mean mongrels, but dogs whose parents on both sides are well-bred and well-known!

One enquiry is for a dog really well suited for use by a big game hunter to lay buffalo, and track wounded animals. At the present moment I cannot think of any dog more suited for going after buffalo than a good pointer, a breed that has shown itself as many times as such big game, and is too small for the big hunts itself to be able to do damage. For tracking, however, they are not so well fitted, unless not materially interfere with the intuitive value of the milk.

If anyone reading this article would be interested in that Mrs. Snape would be pleased to hear from them, and perhaps it would be possible to get a pup by ear from Iringa to avoid the very heavy expense entailed by the round about route of train and boat which is the only alternative at present. There are a good many cars going up to Tanganyika these days on big game and gold hunters "safari", as it should not be impossible to arrange transport.

I should be very interested if owners of recently imported dogs would let me have details of their breeding etc. My readers are always on the look out for new blood in the colony, and if they are interested and such details are made available.

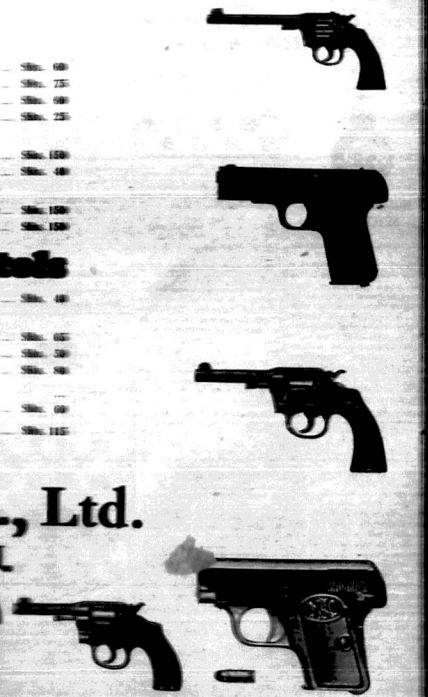

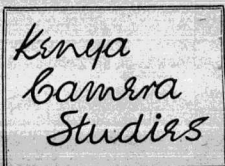
