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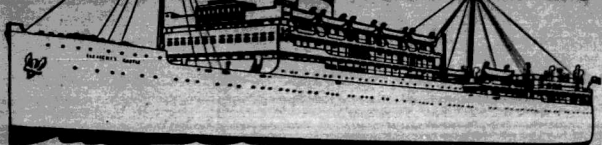

It will be recalled that Admiral Byrd has flown over each of the Poles, and in addition has flown the Atlantic. Having served in the United States Navy he took up flying towards the end of the War.

'An area of about twenty square miles thickly infested with locusts was so treated and millions of dead locusts were afterwards found in that area and over the surrounding country.'

While these tests were being carried out General Kemp, Minister of Agriculture, welcomed at Union Buildings, Pretoria, the delegates to a conference specially convened to lay down methods of co-operation between the states south of the Equator in fighting locust incursions.

This relief may take the form of an order to delay all proceedings for a period not exceeding 12 months.

FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES OF COMPULSION.

Remission of School Fees.

PROBLEMS RAISED BY INCREASING NUMBER OF INDIAN CHILDREN.

The Director of Education, in his report on the work of his Department during 1933, draws special attention to the question of compulsory education.

Objections of a financial character, states the Director, are of great importance, but it is difficult to estimate the damage which is being done to the Colony by postponement. At the present however, the financial position is such that it would not be advisable to take even the first step towards compulsion.

It is the financial question again which causes great difficulty in making the necessary provision for the continued increase in the number of Indian children. In passing the Director pays a tribute to the Advisory Council on Indian Education for their helpful criticisms and suggestions.

The Coast Population.

In a chapter on Primary Education in his annual report for 1933 the Education Department has pointed out last year, the Director, Mr. H. R. Bond, deals with the question of compulsion and whilst he recognizes the difficulties of introducing such a system he believes that the general treatment that, sooner or later, it must be accepted. The number of pupils enrolled in the end of the year in all Government and private schools is 71,000, as compared with 60,000 at the end of 1932. The increase of 11,000 is due to the increase of the number in the primary schools because the National Primary School retained 40,000, which up to that time had been the only kind of school open to the children. There was, therefore, a fall of about 10,000 to be accounted for.

The statistics in numbers were confined in the main to Nairobi, Eldoret, Kisumu and Kitale. The numbers at Eldoret and Kitale were accounted for by the removal of children to the goldfields. The moratorium on lease accounts, all for the temporary withdrawal of more than 20,000 from the field in the latter half of the year was considerably above the average.

On the Goldfields. The Director notes that the presence of a considerable number of children on the goldfields had created a problem of some difficulty. A recent examination of the situation revealed that the number of children of school-going age was more than 40,000.

The Director continues: "It has been suggested that Government should provide facilities for these children. There are serious objections to such a proposal. The area in which mining operations are being carried out is not particularly healthy. It is indeed regarded for the purposes of the public health authorities as a malarial area, and it is to a certain extent so much scattered and, for a time at least, will more than make up for the more desirable areas as shown open. It is, therefore, feasible that any provision of school facilities would be a serious burden on the Government.

Indian Schools. The number of Indian primary schools increased last year from 4,995 to 5,288. The number of pupils in private schools in the colony is also increasing. The increase in the number of pupils in private schools is due to the fact that the Government schools are not providing for all the children in the colony.

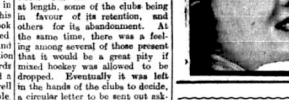

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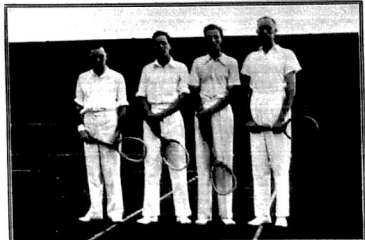

A Saturday Sermon.

AMBITION.

[FROM A CORRESPONDENT.]

No man worth his salt is without ambition; it is the finest goal to great achievement. So long as he has an ambition lives in a man, that man will find a way of surmounting every difficulty between himself and his goal, and even the goal itself, in most cases, will prove but a stepping stone to something higher. Many a schoolboy dreams of conquests which he can only make when he becomes a man, but see him in his boyhood dreams and you rob the man of his conquests.

THE story is told of the young wife of an emigrant to the United States, in the early days of the settlement of that country, who was asked by an officer on the ship that carried her from her native land her purpose in going to America. "I'm going there to raise Governor" was the terse and determined reply. She was the mother of two boys who in time became Governors of one of the Middle States (George Washington, when but about fourteen, sent one day to a place where there was a great steep, sandstone cliff on the face of which many people had, at various times, carved their names. Some of the names had been carved high up on the cliff, from well nigh inaccessible perches. George Washington's determination was put to a severe test. He went to the cliff with his gun, and with some difficulty worked his way up the cliff till he stood on a spot where he could reach up above every name recorded there. Despite aching arms he cut into the sandstone with his penknife, till the name so long associated with the Presidency of the United States could be seen. He was determined it should be seen—at the very top.

AND what if God gives a student with his many non-ambitious natural advantages? Would it be wise to glory in mental achievement, even if it did mean advancement to the highest position above the average in the crowd? Would not the mind be thereby narrowed by the constant use of self and its possessions and achievements?

RIGHT ambition is a fine thing for many fail or fall short of their ambitions; and yet when success does crown our efforts there is danger that we glory in the success achieved rather than in the Ours which has given us the power to achieve. The scientist or philosopher secures fame as the result of his work or study; the politician holds sway over the people whose favor he has won; the business or professional man makes a name for himself calling and may be, feels justly proud of the place he has achieved. But in no case would the value of the position held be otherwise than enhanced by humility, springing from the recognition of the debt owed to God for all that He

BEATING CAUSES DEATH OF AGED NATIVE.

Unsuccessful Appeal Against Death Sentence.

At the beginning of this year a large beer drink was held at a village in the Rift Valley Province. After the party a Native, Rubere Ketto, who had been drinking beer for some time before, and was an onlooker at the festivities with some friends, was suddenly seized upon by a man who was suspected to be a member of the secret society. He was an old man, and the beating caused shock and exhaustion which resulted in death. Kamaja was Chiggo and Waga-teera was Kamau, two of four Natives who were charged with murdering the old man, were found guilty and sentenced to death. They appealed against the sentence, but the Acting Chief Justice of Kenya (Mr. Justice Lucie-Smith), Mr. Justice Horne and Mr. Justice Webb, presiding over the recent special session of the Governor's Appeal for Eastern Africa in Nairobi, found that the evidence supported the conviction and dismissed the appeal.

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Drowned While Returning from South Island?

POSSIBLE FATE OF MISSING SCIENTISTS.

Dr. Dyson and Mr. Martin.

As there now appears to be practically no hope that the two missing members of the Lake Rudolf Expedition, Dr. Dyson and Mr. Martin can still be alive the "East African Standard" writes today that an enquiry into their disappearance will be held shortly.

There seems little doubt that both the missing men succeeded in reaching South Island for traces of camping places were found. It is supposed that on their return trip to the mainland, their boat was wrecked and they themselves drowned. The story of their disappearance, as far as it is possible to piece together, is published to-day in diary form.

No Further News.

In the opinion of those best able to judge—those who are acquainted with the land which could be seen in the Lake Rudolf area—there is no hope that the two missing members of the Lake Rudolf Expedition are still alive.

The most likely explanation of the fate of Dr. Dyson and Mr. W. H. Martin is that after leaving South Island in the expedition's inflatable boat, they were overtaken by stormy conditions, their frail craft was wrecked and they were drowned. In support of this theory is the fact that although traces of their camping places on South Island were seen from the air there was no sign of equipment of the kind which the discovery of the boat's hull, after setting off to return to the mainland, were dropped. It is now possible to provide a fairly complete account of the tragedy and the fruitless search for the two scientists.

First Crossing to Island.
July 20. Mr. Fuchs, leader of the expedition and Mr. Martin, surgeon, crossed in a small canoe fitted with an out board motor from their camp on the shore of Lake Rudolf to South Island. The suggestion to explore South Island was made in a letter received by Mr. Fuchs from Admiral von Hornel, who is Count Felski's superior at Lake Rudolf in 1938. One of the questions to be decided was which was the more suitable to ascend was whether South Island, which has ever supported human life.

July 29. Mr. Fuchs returned to the mainland leaving Mr. Martin working on the island in the expectation that Dr. Dyson would arrive in a day or two.

July 30. Mr. Fuchs left the camp on the mainland and set foot to the south end of the lake. Dr. Dyson remained in camp awaiting favourable winds to cross to South Island. Bakers employed in the expedition had camp sites that Dr. Dyson left for the island that day. While there it is considered to be definite proof that he reached the island, the probability being increased since camp servants say they saw the camp of a hurriedly set up on the island that night, which was the pre-arranged sign for reporting back to the mainland. The two men had ample supplies, their intention being to stay for six days.

A Fire Seen.

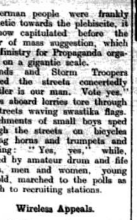

Preliminary Figures of Agricultural Census.

UNFAVOURABLE CONDITIONS FOR THE INDUSTRY.

Effects of the Drought.

MARKE DECLINE IN PRODUCTION OF COFFEE AND MAIZE.

The Department of Agriculture has issued a preliminary report from the Agricultural Census figures for the year beginning March 1, 1933 and ending February 28, 1934. These figures reveal that mainly, owing to the drought conditions, the period under review was definitely an unfavourable one for agricultural and pastoral activities.

Setback Temporary?

The comments made by officials of the Agricultural Department on the figures are as follows—

Area Under Crops.
With the exception of maize, area sown showed an increase, the decrease being in the area of maize sown which was valued by 21,000 acres. The area of wheat harvested increased by 10,000 acres, while the area of wheat sown increased from 139,854 to 144,005 acres, and the area of groundnuts sown from 12,673 acres and that under sugar cane from 12,698 to 12,704 acres.

Crop Production.
Total production of maize for 1934 was 746,958 tons, as compared with 692,728 tons. Coffee production for 1934 being 395,000 cwt., as against 408,000 cwt., a decrease of 68,000 cwt. Both tea and wheat show a marked increase, the figures for the former being 3,008,087 lbs. and 2,421,050 lbs. as against 2,819,435 lbs. and 2,605,485 lbs. respectively. Woolly sheep registered an increase of 10,000.

Livestock.
The total number of cattle for 1934 is 250,187, a decrease of 9,022 as compared with 1933. These figures may be subdivided into (a) breeding stock 151,053 (a decrease of 641, and (b) other cattle 104,214 (a decrease of 2,380). Pigs increased by 342 to a total of 14,973 and sheep woolly by 14,974 to 228,716.

The Census Figures.
The figures, which are subject to correction, taken from the preliminary report, show such as follows—
It should be noted that the end of the census year is from March 1, 1933 to February 29, 1934.
Compared with 1933 there was a decrease in area occupied by area sown, of 2,138,354 acres, figures for 1934 being 75,315,079 gallons. Cream sold from 73,887 gallons to 83,070 gallons.
Wool sold from 721,542 lbs. to 521,300 lbs.
Eggs sold from 88,785 dozens to 100,105 dozens.

Mr. Lillywhite's first point was that very little consideration, if any, had been given to the position of the tourist hotels in the vicinity of Mombasa. He instanced one hotel five or six miles away, and said that in Mombasa several young men had formed themselves into a kind of club or walking club.

After their religious duties on a Sunday, performed early in the morning, they went for a walk on the mainland or in Mombasa. Often this walk led them to this particular hotel, but on arrival there they were naturally a little bit thirsty, the club members found it impossible to get a drink until noon.

Mr. Lillywhite argued that the matter of opening at the coast and in Mombasa on a Sunday should be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., instead of from 12 noon to 3 or 3.30 p.m.

Firmly Evidence.

The Hon. Conway Hurry (Nyanza) expressed surprise that although an Select Committee of Government existed at which efforts were made to co-ordinate ideas on such subjects as were introduced into the House, this particular matter had been suddenly sprung on them. Moreover, it was flimsy evidence on which to upset the unanimous recommendation of the committee, who had taken special steps to ascertain the needs of Mombasa.

To this the Hon. F. A. Baniamir (Mombasa) replied that the matter had been debated at the last meeting of the Organisation. Supporting the amendment, Mr. Baniamir again brought up the matter of the "free allowance" on ships in the harbour.

Lost Revenue.

The reply of the Treasurer on the previous day that no revenue had been collected from the sales of liquor on ships in Kilindini during 1933 and 1934, absolutely staggered him. He only wanted the existing law made operative in that the free allowance of one ounce of tobacco, one quart of beer, and five tins of spirits should be according to the law for services of the ship. How could it be contended that that allowance was a source of revenue to the shipping companies, without any return to Kenya revenue? Mr. Baniamir submitted that it was wrong that in a poor colony like Kenya, the privilege of free allowance was granted nowhere else on this coast—a free allowance of liquor to the passengers and officers of a ship, should be the means of Kenya losing revenue.

Special Consideration Wanted.

In view of this actual competition by ships, he asked for special consideration of the point. Mombasa, he said had to contend with this

competition from ships paying no duty, not taking out any licence, and not paying rates even for the consumption of electric light.

He admitted, nevertheless, that the ships were a great attraction to Mombasa.

As to the unanimity of the report, he stated that the Indian member on the Committee wanted to present a minority report, but in order to get agreement signed for the report in accordance with the European view.

Canon Burns strongly opposed the amendment, and said that on the ground that there was no need for it at all, and because of the necessity of the opening work at the time of religious ceremonies of the day.

Amendment Unnecessary.

At this stage, the Attorney-General reminded members that the amendment to the motion for the adoption of the report was hardly necessary, as the report would have to be implemented by legislation, and every opportunity would then be given to propose any amendments they desired. The committee had been representative of the House, he said, and had received the views of those able to give advice.

Mombasa people had adopted special terms of licence known to the Committee in Nairobi, and had been accepted in fact. He had yet to be satisfied that the two members were, in fact, speaking for the people of Mombasa, in view of the report which the latter had sent up to the committee.

Members' Rights.

Mr. the Hon. F. W. Caveney (Nyanza) said that the Attorney-General had introduced the amendment, admitting that there was some ground on which it contained a right to being forwarded in the coastal interests. Members should be allowed to move any amendment to bring their particular points of view before the House.

This particular amendment, he added, had drawn the attention of Government to the fact that it was possible to secure a certain amount of revenue from ships in the harbour, and, no doubt, in any legislation introduced, it would need attention. It therefore recommended that it be withdrawn.

Amendment Withdrawn.

This advice Mr. Lillywhite accepted. He obtained leave to withdraw it, and the report was then unanimously adopted.

In winding up the debate, the Attorney-General, in reply to Mr. the Hon. G. H. Biddell, who had challenged the accuracy of the revenue figure, stated that the Treasury maintained that they were correct. As to the revenue from ships, he said the Treasurer would be only too glad to go into the matter, where he was considering means of raising revenue, especially if he knew that he had Mombasa behind him.

Rewards Offered.

What is at present causing the Department a good deal of alarm is the fact that scattered cases of rabies have been occurring over a very large area to the north and north west of Nairobi, including the Usita Gishu District, where dense tracts of forested land make it next to impossible to control satisfactorily the disease. Government had given the first incentive for the destruction of jackals, Major Sir H. Brassy-Edwards added, by offering Shs. 1/- for every jackal brought in. This had not been a very big reward to this effect, however, a quarantine area was indicated by the fewest jackals.

Giving Cause for Alarm.

THE GENERAL POSITION OUTLINED.

"The Rabies position is again giving cause for alarm on account of the isolated outbreaks of the disease whose source of infection are unknown. The extensive baiting campaign is continued in districts and native locations in and around the infected areas, with the object of reducing the number of pariah and jackals."

The above is an extract from the report on the rabies outbreak issued by Major H. Brassy-Edwards, Deputy Director (Animal Industry) and Chief Veterinary Officer. The report continues as follows—

"Two practice cases, both in jackals have been ascertained. In a previous report dated July 11, 1934 was published one in the Turu area, the jackal was taken by the other in the Kakungu area of the North Kavirondo. Native Baiting was carried out in the reserve in a dog which was found to be infected. In the same area suspicion has been confirmed positive one."

An actual outbreak of the nature (shown from January 1, 1934 to June 30, 1934) is as follows: Out of the ten cases returned as positive to rabies have been found affecting jackals, while the remaining two cases have been confirmed in dogs, with a history of having appeared some time contacted with rabid jackals.

The outbreaks were reported during the following districts—Usita Gishu district four; North Kavirondo Reserve two; Central Kavirondo two; Kisumu-Lushaka Districts (Sogor) two.

22,065 baits were laid which caused mortality among 2,520 dogs, 100 jackals and 90 other animals. Double the number of baits are being taken during this year's campaign as compared with last year's.

Fifty natives were bitten by rabid animals.

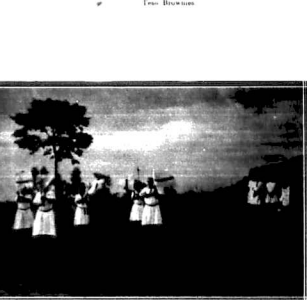

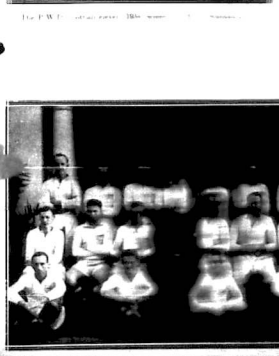

Elephants Respond to Punishment. DIFFICULTIES OF CONTROLLING UGANDA HERDS.

Estimated at 20,000 Head.

TRIALS EXPERIENCED BY NATIVE GROWERS OF BANANAS.

A native, having been woken up in the middle of the night by elephants raiding his banana plantation, went outside his hut to investigate. The night seemed very dark and his surroundings unfamiliar. This was not to be wondered at since the native found himself standing almost underneath an elephant, standing broadside to the doorway.

This interesting incident is taken from the annual report of the Uganda Game Department. So troublesome are the elephants in Toro that the Game Rangers have had a difficult task to control them, the carrying out of which has given the natives the unfortunate impression that the Game Department exists solely to kill wild animals.

Ever-Increasing Numbers.

That the district of Buganda harbours more than a third of the total elephant population of Uganda is stated in the Report for 1932 issued by the Uganda Game Department. The total number of elephants should aim at expanding to at least three hundred elephants per annum in each district. Had during the past year as a result of the absence of settlers, supervision there was a fifty per cent increase in the number of the elephants destroyed.

In the same district in spite of the movement control of the herds, little damage occurred to crops, and the situation had been controlled by guards and mounted elephants had been turned back. One guard had been seriously injured by an elephant and on various occasions three natives had been killed.

GRUELLING CONQUEST OF AN EAST AFRICAN VOLCANO.

Following Gorilla Trail.

PERILOUS MOMENTS ON PRECIPITOUS KNIFE-EDGE RIDGE.

A new story has been added to the records of East African mountaineering. Mt. Sabino, one of the group of volcanoes on the Ruanda border, has been climbed.

The story of a thrilling ascent, made possible largely because gorillas had been driven trail, is told in the following special article by Dr. J. E. Church of Gahini, Ruanda who, with the Rev. H. S. Jackson, conquered Sabino.

A Strange Silence.

(By Dr. J. E. Church.)

Mount Sabino, "the father with the teeth," is familiar to many who have travelled along the new road from Kabafo in V.N. Uganda into the Belgian Congo. It is the centre of the five volcanoes which form the southern border of Ruanda. The official height is just under 12,000 feet, and it differs from the others in having seven precipitous peaks instead of the more usual egg-shaped tops. These groups, wind-swept peaks of dense bamboo forest, and are generally buried in mist and cloud.

Muhavura was one thought to be almost impossible to ascend. In 1921, when the Belgian Congo was still a difficult spot on the west side. Also the Duke of Moellendorff's expedition had difficulties in the intense cold and snow, before the way and on the summit of Kabafo, but both these expeditions have since been eliminated many times because of the weather. It is a strange fact that several people have reached one or more of the lower peaks of Sabino, but that the main peak has remained unascended. A letter from the Director of Surveys in Uganda, states that the ascent was made in 1921. It may be of interest to some to know that the summit was reached in the early part of this year by a route from the eastern ridge starting from the Belgian side.

The Start.

Preparations were made and eight Belgians people known to us were employed, and sent off from Kabafo. This is a Belgian post about seven miles from the northern base of the mountain. At five o'clock the first day was started on the edge of the dense bamboo forest which surrounds the base of the mountain. At an altitude of about 6,000 feet, the forest was so thick that we found which went through the forest up to the saddle between Sabino and the eastern ridge starting from the Belgian side.

At one p.m. we set out on our way up the eastern ridge. Four of the natives armed with their "Umuhoro," or axe, proceeded, as we followed elephant and buffalo tracks, cutting the bamboo in the way so as to mark our route to the base camp. After about an hour's march we began to climb up the east ridge which seemed to be about 45 degrees. There was no undergrowth, so we thought that no view could be obtained except for occasional glimpses of Mt. Muhavura and Mt.

The Gorilla Track.

At this height of about 10,500 feet the ridge was very steep, and we came along a knife edge. The gorilla signs were very steep, and were in many places. There were also many tracks and signs of gorillas, including the triangular shaped faeces, in some cases as large as the palm of the hand.

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from above to see the tender bamboo shoots, and so we considered ourselves with the fact that the number of men behind to three and hundreds pounds weight could pass safely, we could. We began to see the gorilla tracks and even their footprints, swinging ourselves on their hands. We were ahead now armed only with our axes, no arms allowed as this is in the Park National Albert and the thought was very pleasant one of what would happen if we met a gorilla on the narrow track with no room to pass. We were in the middle of the gorilla arms and . . . the depths below!

With great difficulty we got our porters to follow us along this track to the first of the seven peaks, but here on the narrow trail they lay down and were prepared to die. All we could do was to give them a fire (for the leopard skin) and leave them to wait for us, as they were probably afraid to return without us. There had been a lot of wind on the way up the ridge but now there was beautiful dry sunny haze and stillness and the lakes of Buhima and Ruanda were glittering blue like silver specks.

At 2 1/2 p.m. Mr. Jackson and I set off alone, to try to reach the summit. It would have been very bad and dangerous to have continued with porters carrying big loads on the top. The fact that we got to the top was due to the fact that we travelled in light clothing, tunics, trousers, and swinging our way along without any kit. Sometimes these passed along overhanging cliffs with enormous drops below. We reached the top of the second peak, six hundred feet higher. The summit faced us with a sharp half an hour. Here it was a task of getting help to the top and connected to the peak we were on about one hundred feet lower. We decided to attempt it. There was absolute silence, an unknown thing in the central Africa day or night. The sun was shining through wings of mist that hung round us. Below by the side of all the other peaks, from the west, and there burst one of smoke to the east, from the porters. Fire through the purple haze one looks into enormous dark crevasses which split the mountain up on all sides, while several thousand feet below the top of the valley green African forest. This calm is hard to describe. We felt somehow as though we were trespassing upon the Divine and found ourselves talking to Heavens as a certain. NATIVE WAGES CASE AT ELDORET.

Comments by the Magistrate.

"CO-OPERATIVE CHRISTIAN SETTLEMENTS SOMEWHAT."

Not yet abeying a summons issued by the Resident Magistrate, Eldoret, on a charge of withholding Native Wages, Kap Europeans, Maria Edna Stuart Watt and D. J. Bateman, appeared in court on August 2. They were unable to obtain bail and were remanded to the next day. They were conveyed by car. Both were found guilty of withholding wages from about 250 Natives on the estate. Mrs. Watt was fined Shs. 500/-, or in default of payment by September 7, 200 days imprisonment, and was ordered to find security by the next day for a further Shs. 866/7, the wages due mainly to her personal servants; the wages of other labourers and squatters amounting to Shs. 2820/-, to be met out of the fine, if it occurred in circumstances.

In the course of his judgment Mr. P. P. Thompson, the Magistrate, stated that the total sum found withheld by Mrs. Watt was Shs. 1687/-, and that the second accused, who was not concerned in three of the cases, Shs. 2081/-. The circumstances of the case, he said, were taken together, the Magistrate had not yet encountered. On the one hand it was perfectly clear that Mrs. Watt was employing this labour force for, at any rate, 25 days after the wages were due. On the other hand, more money would be forthcoming from Mr. Cronne, who was coming from the other side of the border. Moreover, they had clearly attempted to cheat many of their squatters.

In Hands of Husband? On the other hand they appeared, though not really definitely proved, to have been very much in the hands of Mrs. Watt's husband, who, after bringing out Mr. Cronne from Ireland and attempting to get other young men to do the same type of agreement, was now in England, and had written to say that he had lost £210/7 in the world. Whether or not this was really the case was in the main preoccupation of the court in coming payment of the money due to the unfortunate labourers and other concerned in the case either of the accused had no money or could not obtain it, to pass sentence on them, and to wish their while to pay if they could, and thus prevent the lowering of prestige of European employers in the country, in the eyes of the Natives, which would otherwise be the case.
