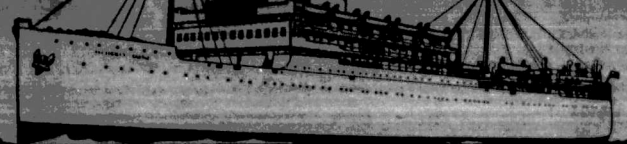

THE CEREAL MARKET.

Maize Improvement Maintained.

Better Trade.

STEADY DEMAND FOR WHEAT.

There has been a steady demand for wheat and the improvement in the maize position continues, states the weekly cereal market report dated November 15, issued by the Kenya Farmers Association (Co-operative) Ltd.

The following is the report:
Wheat. A fairly steady demand has been evident during the past week and prices indicate a firmer tendency.

Maize. The improvement mentioned in our last two reports continues and there has certainly been some rather better trade passing. Since last week there has been a rise of about 5s. per quarter on all qualities of maize.

Other Provisions. The demand for tinned beef and mutton qualities has been heavy, although Genuine Harley's is much fewer. Prices range from 12s. to 12s. 10d. to quality.

Dr. Hindorf Celebrates His 70th Birthday.

NOTABLE PIONEER.

Big Benefits from Far-extended Action 20 Years Ago.

From a contemporary. A few months ago the Tanganyika Signal Grocers' Association at their first annual dinner mentioned the fact that it was just forty years ago since the first small plants were introduced into the island of Africa.

CITY FINANCIER SENT TO PRISON. After Trial Lasting 17 Days. A COMPLICATED CASE. Two Associates Found Not Guilty.

[REPROCESSED BY AGENCY] London, November 15. The trial lasting 17 days of Mr. M. C. Harman, the well-known financier, and his associates, concluded at the Old Bailey today when the jury returned a verdict on Harman of guilty on all counts and sentenced to 18 months imprisonment in the second division.

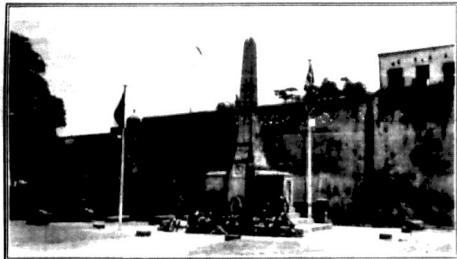

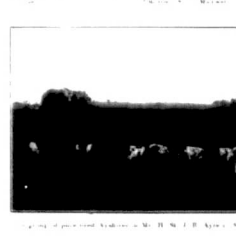

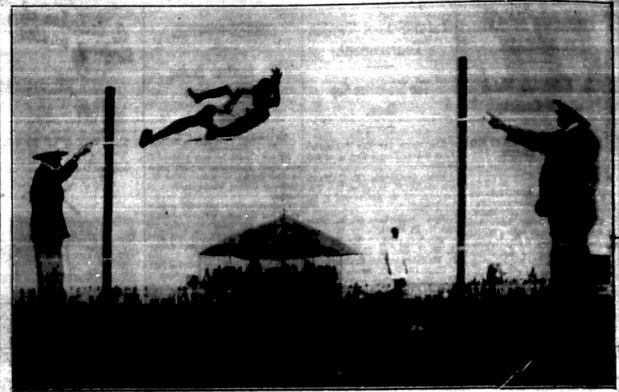

Heavy Loan Charges.

Squatter Stock Menace.

"SYSTEM WHICH HAS LITTLE TO RECOMMEND IT TO STOCK FARMER."

Mr W. D. D. Jardine, Animal Husbandry Officer of the Kenya Government, has great faith in the future of "Arable Dairy farming" in the Colony.

In a recent address to Trans Nzoia farmers, Mr. Jardine said that the development of the dairy industry on a sound basis, being convinced that the butter market assures the dairy farmer of an economic return.

He holds uncompromising views on the squatter problem. "Disease," he says, "is holding up progress and one is forced to the conclusion that the presence and uncontrolled movement of squatter stock is a very serious menace." He hopes that by the vigorous steps now under consideration the ground will be prepared "for the abolition of a system which has little to recommend it to the stock farmer."

Importance of Native Type.

The Kenya Government's Animal Husbandry Officer, Mr. W. D. D. Jardine, has stressed the importance of the native type of stock in the development of the dairy industry in Kenya. He pointed out that the native type of stock is better adapted to the conditions of the country and is more resistant to disease and parasites. It is understood that new regulations are shortly to be introduced and it is to be hoped that as a result the spread of disease will decrease and that the ground will be prepared for the introduction of a system which has little to recommend it to the stock farmer.

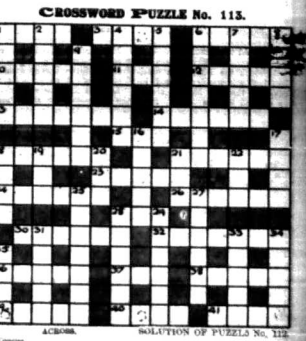

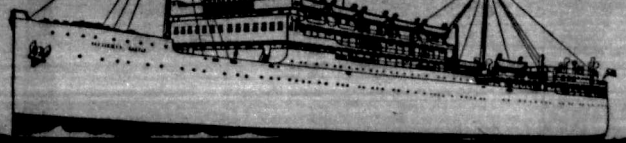

properly, the front right wheel, which had broken in poor condition, should be able to pull up at one yard per second.

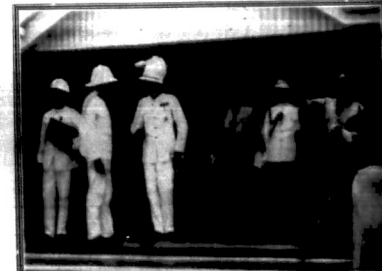

SIR STEWART SIMES EMPHASIZES VALUE OF CLOSER ECONOMIC CO-OPERATION.

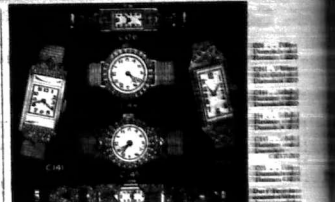

Kenya the Cradle of Earliest Man.

IMPORTANCE OF DR. LEAKEY'S INVESTIGATIONS.

Theories Proved.

TWO LINKS IN EVOLUTIONARY CHAIN SUPPLIED.

At a meeting of the Royal Anthropological Institute attended by some of the foremost scientists in Britain the young Kenya scientist Dr. L. S. B. Leakey has aroused world-wide interest dealt with the proof of the antiquity of human remains found at Kanjera and Kanjera near Lake Victoria.

Kanjera man, as he is now known to the scientific world, is accepted as the most ancient survivor of the human species yet traced, whilst Kanjan man (or "Homo Kanjanensis, as he is to be called) is a new species, believed to be directly descended from Kanjan man.

Two of the missing links in human evolution are thus filled by the discoveries in East Africa and plausibility is lent to the theory first advanced by Darwin, that Africa is the cradle of the human race.

The types of stone implements discovered with the remains in Kenya are paralleled by a complete evolutionary series found at Oldoway and lead to the belief that it was in the part of the world of the fashion of tools from the oldest of large stones flaking off shippings.

The Dawn of Intelligence.

London, October 25. (By Air Mail.) Dr. L. S. B. Leakey, who has addressed members of the Royal Anthropological Institute on his recent investigations in East Africa. Professor G. Elliot Smith, F.R.S., was in the Chair. Dr. Leakey, who was the leader of the expedition, announced that the meeting that he was now situated that the Kanjara skulls which were established as belonging to the Middle Pleistocene age must be regarded as specimens of true *Homo sapiens*. He gave a view of their age as the oldest unthrottled *Homo sapiens* yet discovered.

The Kanjan mandible of early genetic antiquity belonged to the very beginnings of the Lower Pleistocene of even the Pleistocene. In many characters the type shown did not differ from primitive *Homo sapiens* but new features and deviations made during the past few days by a X-ray examination of the roots of the molar and premolar teeth, he considered it should be separated from the *Homo sapiens* and rank as a new species of the genus *Homo* for which he proposed the name *Homo Kanjanensis*.

Homo Kanjanensis was in most respects very like *Homo sapiens*, and must be regarded as a true Lower Pleistocene ancestor of *Homo sapiens*. This remote ancestor of modern man was at least as old as the distant cousin, *Pithecanthropus* from Java, *Sauveteriensis* (Peking man) and *Erdosienis* (Pilsden man). While these formed groups distinct from the line of modern man, *Homo Kanjanensis* belonged to his genus, and formed the species most closely related to his. Kanjan man had a pronounced chin and the arrangement of the teeth in the dental arch, as well as those agreed with those of *Homo sapiens*.

An Appeal to the Country.

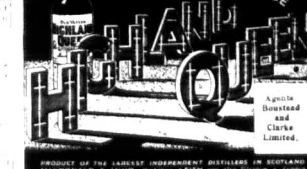

IMPORTANCE OF DR. LEAKEY'S INVESTIGATIONS.

Theories Proved.

TWO LINKS IN EVOLUTIONARY CHAIN SUPPLIED.

At a meeting of the Royal Anthropological Institute attended by some of the foremost scientists in Britain the young Kenya scientist, Dr. L. S. B. Leakey, whose investigations into the origin of man have aroused world-wide interest, dealt with the proof of the antiquity of human remains found at Kanam and Kanjera near Lake Victoria.

Geneva Suspicion of East African Policy.

MANDATES COMMISSION AND "CLOSER CO-ORDINATION."

Criticism of Britain.

COMPLAINTS THAT INFORMATION OF CHANGES IS NOT PROVIDED.

Some members of the Mandates Commission on the League of Nations are suspicious of British policy in East Africa.

They complain that despite the assurance that any decision on Closer Union following the Hilton Young Report, would be communicated to the Commission, full information has not been given.

The Postal Union and the recent Governors' Conference meeting at Entebbe are quoted as examples of events on which the Commission has not been informed.

It is contended by some members that the Commission should be kept advised of all developments "closer co-ordination" and "closer co-operation" now practised in East Africa as affecting the status of Tanganyika as a "true mandated territory."

They suggest further that the Commission should be in the forefront of the developments in adjoining territories likely to affect the interests of Tanganyika.

The Adjoining Territories.

A very important discussion on the general question of a closer co-ordination and closer union of the Mandated Territory of Tanganyika with the neighbouring British possessions of Kenya and Uganda took place at the recent meeting of the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, the official report of which has recently arrived in this country.

It is proposed in a short series of extracts to give some of the main features of the discussion, so that the people in East Africa may properly appreciate the international character of the important issue.

Necessary Majority.

UTAH, OHIO AND PENNSYLVANIA THE LAST TO VOTE "WET."

The eighteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States of America, providing for the prohibition of liquor, will now be repealed. This amendment was brought into force on January 29, 1919.

Of the 48 States in the Union, the vote of 36 is necessary in order to obtain the repeal of any part of the constitution, and this number has now voted "wet." The last State to register its vote in favour of the repeal of prohibition was Utah, with Ohio and Pennsylvania similarly voting.

The Prohibition Law arose out of a special wartime measure intended to preserve grain, but after the war it was given wider scope and became the law of the land.

Dissatisfaction with the position began to take shape in 1903, chiefly owing to the lawlessness, arrest, and out of smuggling, and the first move was taken some months ago when the law was a stronger force was allowed.

A Wartime Measure.

When the United States was at war with Germany, it was necessary to conserve grain, and the Prohibition Law was enacted in 1919. It was intended to be a temporary measure.

The consent by 36 out of the 48 States, which comprise the United States of America, brings to an end one of the biggest attempts in the world's history to ban the manufacture and consumption of alcoholic liquor, which since its inception in 1917 has been one vast controversy.

In December 1917, what is now known as the Eighteenth Amendment was submitted to the States by Congress. This stated that after one year from

War-time Measure

Prohibition had as its basis the Wartime Prohibition Law. It was designed as a measure to conserve grain during the war, which entered in November 1918 because of the shortage of grain.

It should not be imagined that the whole of the 48 States were ever in favour of the amendment. It was agreed to as this was not the case. Six were "dry" and 10 were "wet" at the time.

Various provisions were included in the law, one being that a physician might prescribe liquor for medicinal purposes. Exemptions had also to be made for trade purposes.

A Court Ruling

The greatest interest was treated when United States Judge W. C. Clark ruled in a case at Newark, N.J., in December 1930 that the 18th Amendment...

Amendment was unconstitutional, as it was improperly ratified, being done not by State Conventions but by State Legislatures, which he held did not necessarily represent the popular will, on this particular issue.

Enforcing the Law.

In the early days of prohibition, before enforcement measures could properly be taken, a tremendous stir was given to the imagination of liquor. Later, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Bureau of Prohibition, and the United States Department of Justice were established to enforce the law.

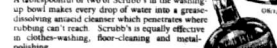

Britain's War Debt to the United States.

TOKEN PAYMENT FOR NEXT MONTH'S INSTALMENT.

Not a Default.

COMPLETE AGREEMENT NOT POSSIBLE AT PRESENT.

As was the case last year, Britain will make a token payment to the United States on account of the war debt instalment due on December 15 next. The actual sum to be paid will be 7,500,000 dollars.

In announcing this decision in the House of Commons, Mr. Neville Chamberlain, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, said that the token offer had been accepted by President Roosevelt, who did not regard this method of payment as a default.

He added that in view of the existing economic and financial situation there were difficulties in the way of complete agreement on the question.

A Difficult Period.

Mr. Chamberlain said that the present period was a difficult one for the United Kingdom, and that the Government was doing its utmost to meet the obligations of the war debt.

A Token Payment.

The token payment of 7,500,000 dollars will be made on December 15 next, and will be followed by a further instalment of 15,000,000 dollars on January 15, 1935.

Mr. Chamberlain said that the Government was doing its utmost to meet the obligations of the war debt, and that the token payment was a necessary step in the direction of a complete settlement.

Whole Issue Again Postponed.

The whole question of the war debt was postponed until the next meeting of the Anglo-American Commission, which will meet in Washington on December 15 next.

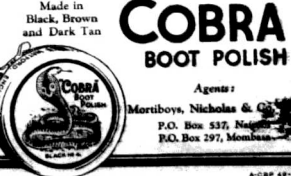

GREATER THAN ANY OTHER NATION.

Subject Debated in Commons.

HOPES EXPRESSED THAT GERMANY WILL CHANGE HER MIND.
