Motor Notes From Great Britain.

THREE MOTOR INDUSTRY EXHIBITIONS.

The Amazing Growth of Motoring.

A HUNDRED THOUSAND NEW CARS REGISTERED IN SIX MONTHS.

This year will see three exhibi- tion covering all histories of the Motor Industry, at Olympia, London. The Motor Show will run from October 12 to 21, the Commercial Vehicle Exhibition November 2 to 11 and the Motor Cycle Show November 25-December 2.

Each week sees the introduction of more new season's programmes and these make it possible to obtain a fairly accurate idea of the general trend of progress in 1932. It is already clear that the additional refinements in the 1932 specifications more than atone, and purchasers will certainly have no cause for complaint. Still gear change, crankshaft and flywheel are better and more every bodywork features which are prominent in the new models.

The Triumph Range. In the latest Triumph range recently announced an altogether new 6-cylinder motor, known as the Ultra Six, makes its appearance. 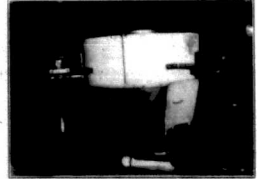

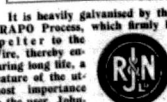

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# Railway Earnings Continue to Improve.

## ANTICIPATED SURPLUS AT END OF 1933.

### The Main Causes.

#### POSITION IN REGARD TO THE PORT NOT A GOOD ONE.

Unless there is any set-back in trade conditions, locally or overseas, during the remaining period of the year, the railway authorities anticipate a surplus on purely railway working at the end of 1933 of £250,000.

The above statement was forthcoming from the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration during the course of an explanation of the financial position of the railway arising out of a recent article published in the "E. A. Standard" announcing a continued increase in railway earnings.

Railway revenue has increased mainly as a result of the record Uganda cotton crop and the prohibition on road competition, while the drastic measures of economy carried out during recent years are now being revealed.

The position in regard to the port is not so bright, and it is anticipated that at the end of the year there will be a loss of approximately £40,000.

### Figures For Eight Months.

Revenue has increased in 1932 as a consequence of the record Uganda cotton crop and the attendant increase in Uganda and Kenya (and also in the case of the legislation prohibiting road competition along the railway routes) and in consequence of the publication of that article there has been obtained from the railway authorities an appreciation of the administration's financial results of working concern in the improved results already announced.

To appreciate the significance of the figures published, reference has been made to the annual report of the Railway and Harbours for recent years.

They show that the Railway revenue in 1929 was £2,448,000; in 1932 it had dropped to £1,838,000 or in round figures by £610,000. On the expenditure side, the 1929 Report shows the controllable expenditure, i.e. the ordinary working, which excludes Depreciation and Loan Charges, was £1,485,000 in 1929 and £1,044,000 in 1932, a reduction of £440,000 per annum.

### The Estimates.

The approved estimates for the present year anticipated a Railway revenue of £2,000,000, ordinary working expenditure of £940,000 and a loss after depreciation and loan fund charges of £168,654.

It is in the light of the foregoing figures that the approximation of the actual financial results of working the railways has been achieved.

It is understood that for the next months, January to August, of this year, Railway earnings were £1,234,000, the slight excess proportion of the estimate for the eight months was £60,000.

The final estimate result is a loss at the port of over £292,587 savings of £1,244,896.

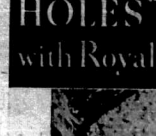

Events of world peace, he declared, will only be reached when the conception of victor and vanquished has vanished and been replaced by a bearable application of equal rights for all.

The future of the Disarmament Conference is uncertain, but the position created by Germany's dramatic withdrawal was the subject of an anxious international discussion during the week-end.

#### The Demand For Equality.

[THROUGH BUREAU'S AGENT.] The termination of the session of the League of Nations Assembly cleared the way for intensive discussions on the disarmament question.

[BY WIRELESS.] Herr Hitler, October 13. Although conversations between the leading delegates are continuing at Geneva there is no longer any likelihood of a postponement of the General Commission of the Disarmament Conference which will meet on Monday next.

This view is strongly supported by the British Government, and it is understood that the conversation yesterday between Sir John Simon, Mr. Paul Bonnaux and Mr. Norman Davis revealed that it was fully shared by France and America who are equally determined to push ahead with the work of the Conference. 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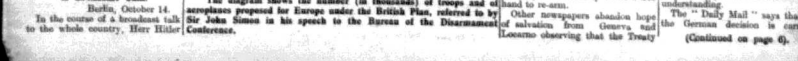

WITHHELD WAGES.

Cases at Kitale and Kakamega.

H. H. Halifax, Manager of Commercial Lodge Estate, Kitale District, appeared in the District Court at Kitale upon 31 charges of withholding wages from native labourers and six charges of taking cattle and money from natives for the right to receive a farm under the provisions of the 'Boarder' Native Labourers Ordinance.

The accused was convicted on all counts and sentenced to six months imprisonment. In addition, the accused was ordered to pay the wages which amounted to Shs. 290.95, and also the sum of Shs. 50, as compensation to the owners of the cattle.

In passing sentence the Magistrate said that he believed the behaviour of the accused was careless and foolish, rather than deliberate. He was sorry that it was coming to this belief that he had imposed an extremely light penalty.

In the case of Kakamega, a minor was convicted in the District Officer's Court at Kakamega on the charge of withholding wages from 25 native labourers. The accused was sentenced to 10 days imprisonment and to pay the wages which amounted to Shs. 225.00.

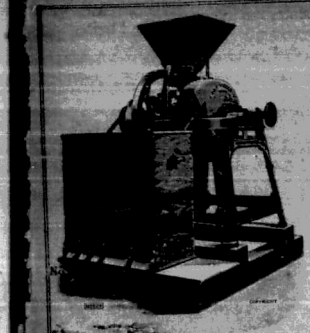

Phatters Want a Better Return.

RESOLUTION FOR BOARD.

At the recent meeting of coffee planters held at Mtwara much interest was shown by all present in the existing system of marketing coffee. Consequently upon the poor prices realized for last season's crop many planters have had serious problems of finance, are looking around to see if it is possible to secure a better return for their efforts. There was a very strong feeling at the meeting that all in past right and that a larger return to be done by the Coffee Board to investigate the possibilities of securing better prices, or a larger return to the grower. A resolution in the following terms was proposed by Mr. J. Nordlinger:

That this Association requests the Coffee Board, in view of its limited resources, to concentrate its efforts in the first instance on a thorough investigation of marketing Kenya Coffee in the English market with a view of deriving some more accurate and better return to the planter.

The speaker said that in the first instance he would like to see a quiet care that the motion was not in any way meant to reflect on the work that the Coffee Board had done in the past. All realized that the commencement of its labours had not yet got into its stride. Nor had any of the discrepancies between the prices paid at auction and the actual prices were given prices in their minds and it was getting too great. A thorough investigation by an expert, business man was really required and the Coffee Board could do so during the present time that to push such a proposal in hand as soon as ever possible.

General Disaffection.

On the other hand planters could not believe that the selling of their coffee in the public market was the only possible or necessarily the best way of disposal. There was an almost universal feeling among the planters of disaffection with the present methods of marketing. They all knew that the grower who sold in small quantities must have a good profit but the discrepancy between the prices paid at auction and the actual prices were given prices in their minds and it was getting too great. A thorough investigation by an expert, business man was really required and the Coffee Board could do so during the present time that to push such a proposal in hand as soon as ever possible.

Planters hoped that as a result of such investigation the Coffee Board would be able to institute plans for the marketing of coffee in such a manner as would lead to the grower obtaining better prices. Even if this could be done it was felt that the present marketing methods were found to be the best planter would have the satisfaction of knowing that the matter had been thoroughly investigated and that if the conditions were not justified by the facts.

In answering the resolution Mr. W. J. Webb said that he was certain that if the proposal investigated the matter would be very soon possible. He expressed some prevailing feeling in the present and pointed out that it was absolutely necessary for the industry that improved such returns to the planter. Mr. R. S. Wallen Chairman of the Coffee Board advised the meeting that the Coffee Board intended the resolution and informed those present that a sum of money had already been reserved for the purposes mentioned in the resolution. The motion was carried unanimously.

THE BUTTER LEVY - FARM BUTTER.

Sir—I shall be glad if you can find space in your paper for a few comments on the remarks made by Mr. C. C. Byrnes, at the meeting of dairy farmers, held at Nairobi on September 15, as reported in East African Standard.

1. If Mr. C. J. Symons is losing 2 per cent. of his butter fat in the separation of his cream, it is time he changed his separator or the boy who turns the handle.

2. If he loses anything like 10 per cent. in churning his cream, the boy who does the churning must be getting exceedingly fat.

When I was at the "British Dairy Institute" I was taught that 1 per cent. loss in the butter fat is a serious loss. It is well known that a separator will separate 1 per cent. loss in churning. The separator was periodically tested to see that the separator was working properly. The butter milk was also tested occasionally, and if any one over-churned the butter, they were at once sent to the testing room to test the butter milk and would then sometimes find as much as from 5 per cent. to 1 per cent. loss of fat in it.

Now of course I realize that a farmer who has a high allowed fat just to test his separator must not butter milk but if he has a low allowed fat separator, or about half the butter fat in his milk, he will not get any cream. The cream floating on the separator milk after it has stood a short time, and should then be separated—and as for 15 per cent. in the butter milk, that is a heart.

Again, it is not, etc. 15 per lb., a very high cost for making farm butter? One understands in a satisfactory where there is expensive machinery, and a highly paid staff, that it supplies fat much below ordinary, the cost of production becomes considerable. It is not an ordinary farm a churn and butter maker, but not cost a great deal and with ordinary care last a lifetime and whoever makes the butter fits up his time when the supply of cream is reduced doing other jobs on the farm.

One more point, when has the pay-out from the Co-operative Societies been as much as 50c per lb. butter fat? It is only for the last three months that we have got as much as 65c per lb., before that for many months it has been from 65c to 60c to 75c per lb.

Pour the mixture into a pudding basin, and steam for twenty minutes, then add a marriage top made of the egg-whites and sugar, and bake slightly in the oven.

**Devonshire Souffle of Poultry:** For four people, use two eggs, one ounce butter, a small onion, and a half pound of butter. Beat the eggs, add the onion, salt, and a piece of ground pepper, and mix well. Allow it to come about two inches above the top. After cooking the potatoes, hot them thoroughly in a stew. Beat the egg-whites in a very stiff froth, and mix into the mixture. Pour this into the soufflé dish, and bake in a moderate oven for thirty minutes. 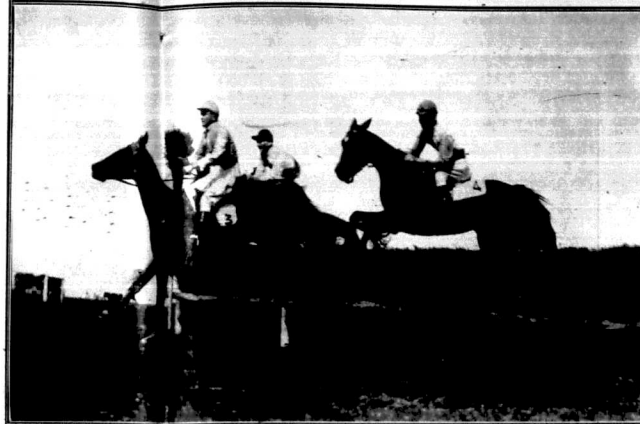

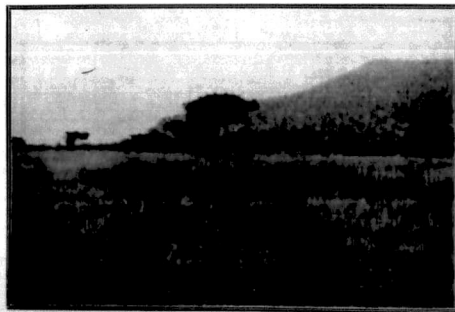

# A KENYA REORGANISATION

## Number of Provinces Reduced to Four.

### ECONOMIES BY CHANGES IN CIVIL SERVICE CONDITIONS.

#### Secretariat Alterations.

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENT TO INCLUDE MINES AND SURVEY.

The Kenya Government announces decisions reached by the Secretary of State on some of the recommendations of the Expenditure Advisory Committee.

Sir P. Cunliffe-Lister has agreed to the re-organisation of the provincial system whereby the existing nine Provinces will be reduced to four or extra-provincial districts. It is estimated this will result in an economy of £4,700 per year.

Important changes are to be made in Civil Service conditions. These include lower initial salaries for beginners; increase in the age of retirement from 55 to 60; reduction of 20 per cent. in longer hours of service; restriction of passenger expenditure.

The Secretariat is to be re-organised and the Local Government, Lands and Settlement Department will become a separate entity to include Survey, Registration and Mines Departments.

#### Four Year Terms.

The Government of Kenya has issued a copy of a memorandum regarding certain decisions of the Secretary of State upon the questions of Terms of Service and Pension of Provincial Administrators and the Secretariat.

The Secretary of State's decision arises from recommendations made by the Expenditure Advisory Committee. It is estimated that the normal report on methods of economy.

The Committee discussed some length salary scales and reached the conclusion that generally speaking the rates of the various grades of departments were not unreasonable, although it was suggested that they should be graded according to the importance of the department.

Another proposal by the Committee was that the normal age of retirement should be fixed at 55.

In regard to the foregoing matters the Secretary of State has agreed that the initial salary of £200 per annum is to be retained as at present. It is suggested that the normal age of retirement should be fixed at 55.

The Committee were of the opinion that the salaries at present offered to recruits in the Kenya administrative service were necessarily high. They suggested that in future the salaries of officers joining the Kenya administrative service should be at the rate of £250 per annum for two years and then at a rate of £300 per annum normally, he draws £500 per annum. It was further proposed that the maximum salaries of administrative officers other than Provincial Commissioners should be £1,000 per annum.

Free Quarters. The Despatch states that the decision to reduce the initial salaries of the administrative service naturally involves some reduction in the principle of other transfers of the Colonial

Service. The consequential alterations are at present under consideration.

The recommendations made by the Expenditure Advisory Committee on the subject of Terms of Service, Increases of Salary, Local Leave, and other matters, have been accepted by the Secretary of State with certain modifications which are indicated in the memorandum issued.

Terms of Service. It will be recalled that the Expenditure Advisory Committee recommended that both present personnel and future entrants who were or might be eligible for overseas privileges should be employed for a period of four years each followed by subsequent tours of three years.

Present in the Service, the Committee recommended in the case of those who had completed nine or more years' continuous service that they should be employed for five years to be confirmed to three years.

In regard to Asian officers the Committee recommended that for all present members entitled to overseas privileges, the normal period of service should be five years with few exceptions all future recruits could be made locally and would not carry overseas privileges.

The normal period of service in regard to hours of service are those which have been accepted by the Secretariat.

Overseas Leave. On the subject of overseas leave the Expenditure Advisory Committee recommended for European officers full pay leave at the rate of three days per month (instead of nine and also three times as much) for the remainder of the tour.

In the case of three years tours the basis recommended was full pay for the first month of each completed month, which was reduced to two months for all officers travelling by air.

All officers travelling by air, it was suggested should be granted the same basis of remuneration as proposed for each journey by air.

#### Fewer Provinces.

Another part of the Secretary of State's memorandum refers to Provincial re-organisation. It will be recalled that the Expenditure Advisory Committee expressed the view that in regard to the provincial system the Secretary of State should be largely in agreement with the Committee.

The Committee recommended that the arrangement of the provinces require modification in the interests both of efficiency and economy.

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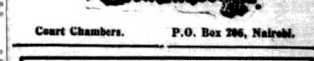

New Record for Flight to Australia.

PREVIOUS TIME LOWERED BY 40 HOURS.

By Sir C. Kingsford-Smith.

JOURNEY ACCOMPLISHED IN JUST OVER A WEEK.

Air-Commodore Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith has accomplished a solo flight from England to Australia in just over a week and has lowered by 40 hours the previous best time for the journey of 8 days 20 hours 47 minutes established by Mr. C. W. A. Scott last year.

When Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith set out from England on Wednesday last week, he had no intention of attempting the record, but his flight was so good that his British machine was running so well that he decided to try and beat Mr. Scott's time.

A British Machine.

Wynham, Australia, is a port on the northern coast of Western Australia. Kingsford-Smith arrived at Wynham, Australia at 12.12 p.m. local time in Australia, thus beating Mr. Charles Scott's record for the England-Australian flight by 40 hours. Mr. Scott's record was 8 days 20 hours 47 minutes was made last year.

Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith left England last Wednesday morning, and has thus taken only a little over a week for the journey of approximately 8,000 miles. His last stage, mainly over sea, was 1,200 miles. He was using a new biplane, called the "Cobra," which is a new type of biplane, with a winged monoplane, with a dipper engine.

On his departure he declined any intention to attack the record, but later he telegraphed to London from Melbourne, "I have not extended myself, but I can well beat Scott's record and am very well pleased with the machine's behavior in all conditions of weather. I have therefore decided to go for a new record for the fastest."

# THE DISARMAMENT RING.

## Grave Warning by Mr. Stanley Baldwin.

### TO NATIONS WHICH BREAK THE CONVENTION.

#### The War Fear in Europe.

#### PRESENT CONDITIONS CAUSED BY ABSENCE OF CONFIDENCE.

A remarkable and dramatic speech on the disarmament question was delivered by Mr. Stanley Baldwin to a Conservative mass meeting at Birmingham, during the course of which he referred to the present serious situation in Europe.

World conditions to-day were not good, he said, one of the causes was want of confidence, which arose in Europe out of the fear of war. It was therefore imperative to bring about the Disarmament Convention.

Mr. Baldwin therefore issued a grave warning to those nations which broke the Convention either in letter or spirit, or who deliberately prevented such an agreement being reached. These nations would have no friend in the civilized world.

If disarmament began in Europe there could be no reduction of taxation for a generation, while some countries would become bankrupt. The world would be put back to 1914 with more knowledge than people had then. Another war in Europe would be the end of civilization.

Mr. Baldwin concluded by saying that the foundations of European civilization had rocked during the last 15 years, and they could not stand a second explosion.

#### A Serious Situation.

Grave references to the state of Europe were contained in a speech delivered to a Conservative mass meeting in Birmingham last night by the leader of the Council, Mr. Stanley Baldwin, the leader of the "Conservative Party."

World conditions are not good, he said. "They are affected largely by a psychological cause, and above the economic one—absence of confidence. That want of confidence is the chief fear and the chief cause of the present state of war. That is one reason why it is imperative to bring about the Disarmament Convention."

A Warning. "I do not mean disarmament on the part of this country alone and not of the others. It will be of vital importance to us that every signatory to the Convention enter into it as it is in the letter and the spirit."

If that Convention signed the nation that breaks it will have no friend in this civilized world, and the same is true of any nation which deliberately prevents such an agreement being reached by putting in a demand which is not acceptable after a time, but which could not be acceptable to-day to other co-signatories.

How—and really I apologise for using the word "how"—is it possible to see the world that our country has less regard than she had for this agreement, as set to have set aside the war, which may possibly be the only way to make the Treaty of Locarno as the most

categories they are determined to keep. A Critical Phase. "BY WIRELESS." Friday, October 5. The Disarmament problem this week enters upon an important and perhaps a critical phase. In Geneva the Bureau of the Conference meets to-day, and the question arises whether the full Conference, starting the work on Monday, will be a week's time or whether postponement is considered advisable. During the week-end the conversations have taken place between delegates of the five powers, and Captain Ashmead-Eden, the Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has had interviews with the British, the French and Italian and Swiss representatives.
