THE CEREAL MARKET.

Fluctuating Maize Prices.

Little Business in Wheat.

FAIRLY GOOD DEMAND FOR BARLEY.

The following is the weekly cereal market report, dated October 6, issued by the Kenya Farmers' Association (Co-operative) Ltd.—

Maize. Prices have fluctuated slightly during the past week, mostly due to exchange movements. Shipments from the Argentine were about half a million quarters, about half a million quarters, practically all of which was sold. Afloat cargoes have been sold at 1/6 per quarter during the week, with forward sales at a premium of about 1d.

Danubian maize is scarce. No fat wheat is coming on the European market at the moment and, therefore, demands a fairly strong premium. It is reported that the Italian maize crop is likely to be 15 per cent. to 20 per cent. less than a year ago.

Wheat and Maize in Good Condition.

The rainfall for September has averaged over the area at about five inches. Some farms have had slightly less. This is about 50 per cent. above normal. The majority fall, during the first two weeks of the month, since when there has been a very welcome dry spell, which has done both the crops and the grazing a vast amount of good. This is especially the case with the wheat, for the majority of it is now in ear and has been flowering during the last fortnight. The wind that has been blowing every day during this period has undoubtedly helped a great deal with the pollination of this, together with the warmth during the day and the humidity of the night, which has resulted in good fertilization. In fact some ears already show up to four grains in each spikelet, and three grains per spikelet is the general rule, all of which promise a crop well above the average. Another week of fairly dry weather—or even of light drizzle—would do the wheat no harm, and the final crops should be assured.

Maize Doing Well.

The maize has gone ahead by leaps and bounds during the last month and it will not long be used before that portion, which has been reserved for silage, will be ready to cut. Present indications seem to point to quite a normal crop, in spite of the main rain being past in late May. As a matter of fact some maize, which was sown in the first week of July, is almost ready for cutting. It has been sown in May, so that it looks as though maize can be planted here at any time but weeks February and July will give a good return.

Other Trades.

Barley.—There is still a fairly good demand for choice English milling barley. Imported barleys are finding a ready sale and is being freely offered at 21/-, with grinding qualities dull and selling at 18/-.

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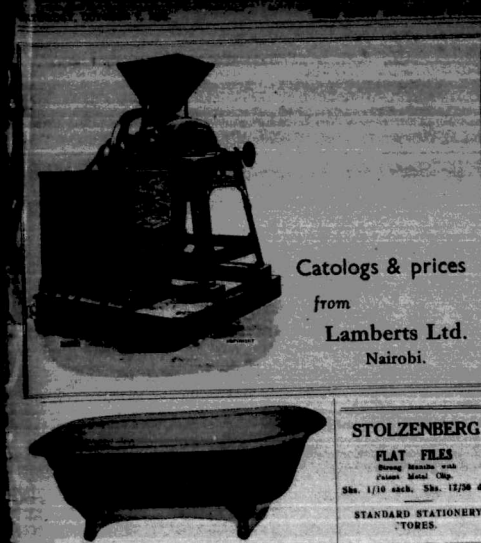
LOCUST SWARMS IN KENYA.

Reported in Rift Valley Recently.

Some Damage to Crops.

Kenya.

Several reports of swarms in many cases referring to the same swarms, have been received during the last fortnight from the Rift Valley Province, from which it appears that some half-dozen swarms flew south from Elgeyo and Kericho between September 22 and 26, and reached through Kaviru, Solai and Solokhi, doing some damage in places. By the end of the month these swarms in general showed a westerly tendency, and were seen flying west at Kaviru, Bomet and Malo on September 29 and 30, and October 1 and 2. These swarms are noted and while some specimens show maturity and readiness to lay, others are still immature. A few swarms are also known to be circling in the lower part of Elgeyo and in Baringo, particularly in the area between Lakes Baringo and Hamington. A swarm, which is yellow, was reported circling in the Ngohi area on September 12, and proceeding on its way, having lost twelve hours, which was later made up. It appeared that the collision between the two Spanish ships had taken place in the early morning during a thick fog, and that the "Llanoverly Castle" had succeeded in reaching the Captain and five members of her crew of the foundered ship. The "Llanoverly Castle" was late in arriving at Mombasa, but this was due to delays at Port Sudan, and Aden and to encountering a three and a half ton land cargo between Quarantilla and Mombasa.

GERMANY AND THE JEWS.

More Criticism at Geneva.

By British Delegate.

POLITICAL SYSTEM WHICH HAS GRAVE DANGER.

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.]

Geneva, October 3.

A direct attack on the Jews was made today by the French Senator, M. Henri Béraud, in the course of a discussion on minorities by the Sixth Commission of the League of Nations.

M. Béraud argued that the German law against Jews directly conflicted with Minority Treaties as set out in Upper Silesia.

A German delegate denied that this was a minority question. The Jewish question in Germany, he said, was a social one due to the large influx of Jews from Eastern Europe.

He stated that the Government would practice their religion with full liberty. The problem should be dealt with independently of the minorities question.

British Opinion.

Geneva, Oct. 4.

German treatment of minorities and Jews was challenged by Mr. Bromley Gwynne, British delegate, in a vigorous speech to-day before the League of Nations.

Mr. Gwynne's speech evoked considerable opposition of a state which had been so long a champion of minority rights.

At a political session of a national conference purely national.

Equality of status was the only thing that had to be brought together. There was a long tradition of religious tolerance in Germany.

The Jews in Germany must be regarded as a racial minority and not as a political minority.

It was pointed out that the Government had no right to grant special privileges to any minority.

Natural Game Parks.

KENYA AND THE OMMING CONFERENCE.

Sir,—As I have been interested in game for many years and am a fairly familiar with the game distribution in Kenya, I have taken it upon myself to express some views on game preservation in the Colony in view of the important Conference which is being held in London in October.

It is important that some indications of local opinion on these questions should appear in the East African Standard as early as possible.

From first experience of conference some rather interesting points which Kenya will ever have a fine game reserve or a National Game Park unless there is a stronger local public opinion in favour of the game reserve. The game reserve the only suitable locality in the Colony is the present Southern Game Reserve, which has worked very well for over 30 years; why not for ever?

There should be no difficulty in reaching an agreement with the Masai who reserve extent over the whole of the Southern Game Reserve.

The conditions and amenities from the viewpoint of the tourist have been considered in the past during the last few years, without in any way encroaching upon the preserve of the animals. The game is well protected and the Masai are well treated.

That was why the Masai, one of the smallest tribes in Kenya, were also the most numerous. They graze their cattle over such a huge area that they are not overgrazed. As it were in the main, the Government did not see the need to interfere with the Masai.

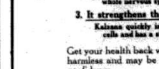

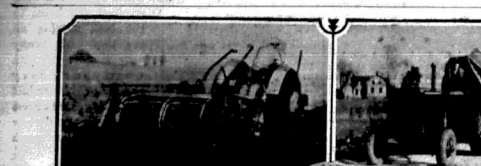

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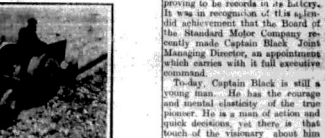

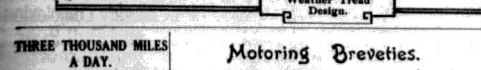

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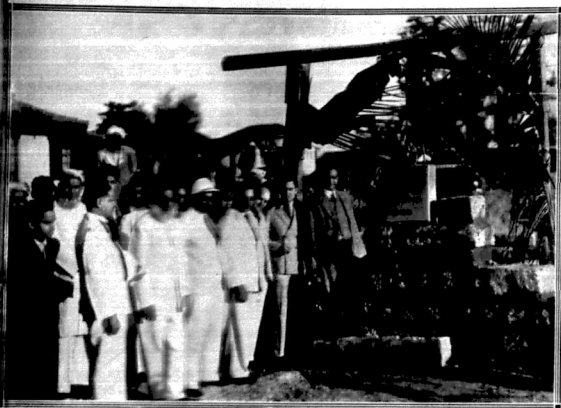

Great Soldier; Greater Statesman.

GERMANY'S "MAN OF THE HOUR" IN THE TIME OF HIS COUNTRY'S NEED.

Hindenburg, President of Germany, soldier, statesman, politician, diplomat—at one time virtually Dictator of Germany—was 86 on Monday.

There is no more striking figure in Europe to-day than this old man, still vigorous in body and mind, whose reputation as a soldier has survived the three great wars and whose fame as a statesman of peace will go down in history.

Germany recently showed something of its gratitude to the old veteran by declaring his home at Neudeck and his estates free from taxation during his lifetime.

President Hindenburg.

A Personal History.

(By Carol Hamppman.)

Germany has never produced a more remarkable man than President Paul von Hindenburg, who celebrated his 86th birthday on Monday. As a soldier, he is a veteran of three major wars against Austria and France, and he has to his credit one of the most brilliant victories in history—Tannenberg—achieved after he had emerged from retirement.

His popularity can be gauged from the fact that a year after his death there was no serious opposition to his re-election as President. At any time of the day you can see people outside No. 73, Wilhelmstrasse, the President's home in Berlin. He has a "fan club" that some estimate at over 100,000 members. To a politician who has been called "the father of the fatherland" and "the man of the hour" in Germany, it is not surprising that his children, as well as his grandchildren, should be so numerous.

MANY STILL ON UNEMPLOYED LIST.

From March 1929 to June 1933, the Industrial Training Depot has sent out 630 apprentices. Of these, 271 were carpenters, 238 were fitters, 18 painters and 5 tailors.

An analysis of the employment position on August 10th shows that of the carpenters, 119 are not employed and the whereabouts of 150 are unknown; of fitters, 157 are unemployed and 11 have not lost sight of; of smiths, 17 are unemployed, two cannot be traced, two fallows are out of work and the whereabouts of one is not known, so that 304 are unemployed. Of the painters, 109 are not employed, 49 have disappeared, and four are unemployed.

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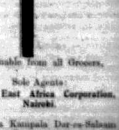
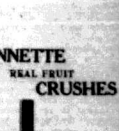
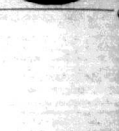
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NEW Great Drive Needed In Native Reserves. PRODUCTION CAN BE DOUBLED IN COMING YEAR.

If Kenya Has a Programme.
SIMPLE STEPS POSSIBLE TO INCREASE
AFRICAN'S EXISTING CAPACITY.

In the first article published in the East African Standard on the subject of "Plan now for Prosperity," main points in the task to which the people of Kenya should set their hands and brains were emphasized. Well in line was the following:

"VIGOROUS PLANS FOR DEVELOPMENT OF NATIVE RESERVES."
Only once during the past five years has the surplus of agricultural products of Native origin exceeded in value half a million pounds. This was in 1949, when the figure was £25,740. It is necessary to remember, of course, that the Native Reserves, and more particularly the great food producing area of Kikuyu, supply a very large and growing internal market and by doing so release the higher-grade European produce for export to other important fields. One is that, in the main, Native produce is in the low-value categories and that is perhaps a better indication of present expansion of production than value. The other point is that with the general slump in world markets, money values of all agricultural exports were bound to fall.

Nevertheless, the following table of the values of produce exported from Kenya and originating in the Native Reserves expressed the opportunity and the need for a steady drive in the direction of greater effort.

1928	£487,437
1929	£530,740
1930	£250,750
1931	£213,020
1932	£260,150

Native production offers a vast potential field for producing quick results. The African contributor to the markets of the world does not suffer from the handicaps common to the European farmer whose production is restricted on account of restrictions of seasons.

The Native has the land, which costs him nothing. He has an immense comparative labour force. His standard of living and his need of living have not risen very much. He has the benefit of free advice and free means of high-quality seed. He is in every way in the best position to catch all products in Kenya to produce in markets suffering from low prices.

One extra acre per family would increase the area under Native cultivation in one year by approximately 700,000 acres.

His food supplies are assured. There is no reason at all why all the resources of the Government of the country should not, therefore, be concentrated on securing the end of increasing costs of seasons, exports production which is double the existing figure.

Every Administrative Officer—the man in whose proud power it gives in the Native reserves—should with the aid and advice of all the technical officers of Government, to create new high records within a fixed period.

That is their general aim to-day. What is now needed is a new inspiration and a fresh impetus.

A Common Concern.
Every department is essentially concerned in economics. The Medical Department's aim of better health, the Education Department's object in improving the mental capacity and equipment of the young, the Agricultural Department's object in raising the standard of the stock, the Agricultural Department's object in providing more modern methods of subsistence, the influence of the Local Native Councils in securing general improvement in all economic matters. Their work should continue to be closely co-ordinated and all their influence directed, as a team, in a great drive towards increasing the economic wealth of the Native peoples. By this means alone will it be possible to provide the basis of prosperity on which better social conditions can be raised.

The immediate object should not be the super-imping of something new and foreign to Native intelligence in its present stage of development. That process takes too long. Present conditions are particularly poor experience of native methods should be the starting point, leaving experimental propaganda to continue to produce benefits through long and slow improvements.

The aim should be to expand the present capacity.

A Starting Point.
Let us look at one simple example. To-day the maintenance of the fertility of the soil is little more than a slogan. It is the first essential and must obviously come before seed selection and type improvements and even before the replacement of the soil by the plough and the harrow.

But what is the position? The African cultivates one patch of ground and moves on to the next without doing anything to restore fertility. 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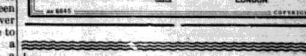

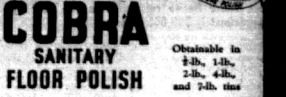

BUDGET SURPLUS IN PROSPECT.

Encouraging Revenue Returns For Half Year.

BIG DECREASE RECORDED IN EXPENDITURE.

[By Wireless.]
Rugby, October 2. The revenue returns for the first half of the financial year, which ended on Monday, are regarded as most encouraging. Until the final quarter of the year is completed, the returns show a substantial deficit, but the shortage of £48,000,135 disclosed in the return is the smallest in the first half of the year for five years, and compares with £40,628,862 at the corresponding period last year.

Reduced Expenditure.

Ordinary expenditure on the other hand shows a reduction of £81,190,168, and amounts to £254,239,379. Allow for supplementary grants a decrease in expenditure of £32,500,000 was expected in the complete financial year.

Expenditure always exceeds revenue in the first half of the year as the bulk of the revenue, especially from income tax and surtax, is not collected until the last quarter of January/March. The customary anomalies of the current deficit is a hopeful sign and the absence of any serious setback in the general revenue position in the next six months is the prospect. The Budget surplus in April are considered good—British Official Gazette.

THE DISARMAMENT DISCUSSION.

Divergencies of Opinion Being Narrowed Down.

DIFFERENCES BETWEEN FRANCE & GERMANY.

Outstanding Problem of Control and Equal Rights.

[By Wireless.]
Rugby, Sept. 29. Disarmament conversations are continuing in Geneva, and there is some doubt as to whether Sir John Simon, who is taking part in the talks, will be able to return for a few days to London as contemplated. The Bureau of the Disarmament Conference is due to meet in two days' time, and earnest efforts are being made to secure some measure of agreement in advance of the meeting.

Following conversations which Sir John Simon had yesterday morning with the British Ministers and later with Mr. Norman Davis, he sent the German Foreign Minister the evening of the meeting.

Discussions with Germany.

The disarmament conversations at Geneva, in which Sir John Simon again took part yesterday, were suspended last night on the departure of the German Minister for Berlin, where Baron von Neurath will put his Government in possession of the latest facts of the discussion. It is hoped that the German will be able to return next week and the importance which attaches to the reply they will bring is recognized in view of the fact that the Bureau of the Disarmament Conference is due to meet in the following week.

The Questions in Dispute.

The French view provided for limitation at the present level, but with eventual reduction with a limited period of all armaments, especially military expenditure after general permission control had been set up, provided that period were good results and that there were some guarantees for security. The Germans on the other hand are understood to claim that the principle of equality of rights called them to possession of "samples" of all armaments, including the facilities to her by the Treaty of Versailles. The Future of Tanganyika.

SIR J. SANDEMAN ALLEN SAYS MANDATE MUST ALWAYS REMAIN BRITISH.

The French and Italian delegates to the League of Nations Council criticised the proposals for closer union in East Africa, when the subject of the Tanganyika Mandate was under discussion. Sir John Simon, however, gave an assurance that Britain would not infringe the terms of the League Covenant.

During the course of a lecture given in Nairobi on Thursday evening, Sir John Sandeman Allen, M.P., emphasised that the Tanganyika Mandate was permanent and the territory had been handed over to Britain for ever. He added: "If there is any attempt to undermine that authority, we should put our foot down hard."

Integral Part of the Empire.

[THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.]
Geneva, Sept. 28. A Mandated Territory, but it was an integral part of the British Empire and could not be touched. I am sure that the previous statement that Tanganyika in its own way was a part of the British Empire, was not intended to suggest that the Mandate Territory have each their periods at large. Dr. Schone says his competitors know well how carefully His Majesty's Government have followed the Mandate and that every German and other Government has equal right to see the Englishman in Tanganyika today."

TANGANYIKA TERRITORY.

A Permanent Mandate to Britain.

Hopes to Return.

Sir John Sandeman Allen, M.P., speaking at the Capitol Theatre, Nairobi, on Thursday evening, stated that the Mandate of Tanganyika Territory was a permanent mandate handed over to Britain by the League of Nations Council. He said that the Mandate Territory had been handed over by the League of Nations Council to the British Empire, and that it was an integral part of the British Empire.

In the course of his talk, he spoke of the proposal of the British Empire, passing the test of an old Canadian stamp "We are not to share up there, but we are to share them down here." He added that the development had been due to the establishment of a new order, and its greatest dates occurred the open field. It was while tracing the constitution of the British Empire that he was struck by its own history, that coming on Kenya and the discussion of the treaty in the history of the native race, he said that as a history grew older than it was.

Part of the Empire.

"We had that country," declared Sir John. It might be called a Mandated Territory, but it was an integral part of the British Empire and could not be touched.

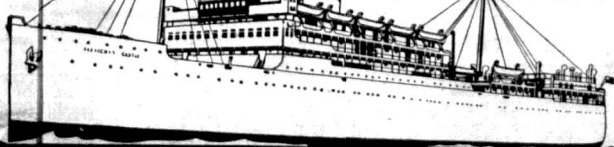

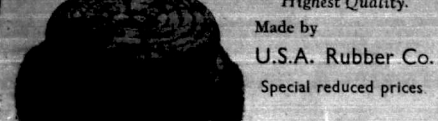

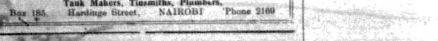

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The Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933.

Every individual liable to tax under the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933, is required to make a return of his taxable income for the year ended 31st December 1932, and to pay the tax due thereon on or before the 31st of November, 1933.

2. Individuals liable to tax under the Ordinance include—

- (1) Every non-native male resident in Kenya who has attained the age of eighteen;
(2) Every non-native female resident in Kenya who has attained the age of eighteen and who has a taxable income of more than £120 per annum.

3. Copies of the statutory form for making the required return of taxable income, and explanatory leaflets showing the rate of tax payable may be obtained at the office of any District Commissioner. Copies will also be available at Post Offices and Police Stations throughout Kenya.

4. The return of a taxable income should be forwarded with THE TAX to the Collector of the area in which the taxpayer resides or carries on business. The Collector is, in most cases, the District Commissioner, but—

For the Nairobi, Kiambu and Fort Hall Districts, the Collector is the Officer-in-Charge, Central Revenue Office, P.O. Box No. 520, Nairobi, whose offices are in Sixth Avenue above Khoo's Printing Station.

Any taxpayer may, if he wishes, send his return of taxable income and pay his tax to the Officer-in-Charge, Central Revenue Office, P.O. Box No. 520, Nairobi.

5. The amount of Non-Native Poll Tax already paid for 1933 under the old Ordinance (Chapter 32 of the Laws of Kenya) but not the amount of any penalty incurred under that Ordinance will be taken into account as a set-off against the tax payable under the new Ordinance provided that the receipt is surrendered at the time of payment of the tax to the Collector or otherwise satisfied that Non-Native Poll Tax for 1933 under the old Ordinance has been paid.

PLAN NOW FOR PROSPERITY

Cultivated Area Must Be Increased.

RESUME THE PROGRESS CHECKED BY THE SLUMP.

The Immediate Task.

IMPORTANT WORK AWAITING LONDON AGENTS' APPROVMENT.

What are the foundations on which Kenya's plans for prosperity will rest? A brief survey of the agricultural industry reveals how very solid is the basis for the work which must be done during the coming year.

Crop estimates published recently give the following averages:

Coffee	140,850
Wheat	42,925
Maize	100,645

But let us look back a few years to see the growth—an increase achieved despite every kind of handicap including two major depressions, locusts and merials marauds.

LOOKING BACK.

For Maize the acreage harvested and the yield has been as follows:

Year	Acre	Yield
1919-20	92,175	996,414
1920-21	155,731	909,614
1921-22	1,049,728	1,049,728
1922-23	1,049,728	1,139,616

The industry has not lost very much ground. But nevertheless there is no figure lower than that for the present season unless we go back nearly ten years. A higher yield per acre should be the aim this year.

In the case of Wheat, the figures for the last two years were:

Year	Acre	Yield
1919-20	29,156	86,892
1922-23	30,114	85,408

There is, therefore, in prospect for the present year an encouraging increase in wheat acreage of nearly 100 per cent. over that for 1919-20 and room for still greater expansion with an assured internal market.

Coffee figures show a steady increase:

Year	Acre	Yield
1919	90,200	90,200
1920	98,574	98,574
1921	100,645	100,645

Since 1921 the acreage under coffee has increased two and a half times. In this year it will only 43,530. But that is not enough. There is still land suitable for coffee. And the yield must always be improved in the yield per acre and in the quality. On no basis plantation settlement on smaller units will succeed.

Thus there is a solid foundation for the future.

The recent improvement in Sial values and the statistical position lead to the belief that the upward movement will continue.

Take Tea as an example of a vigorous young industry:

But despite these remarkable figures the industry of Kenya has not yet been fully exploited. The 12,000 acres with produce a much larger crop when the bushes come to maturity.

And look at Sugar, Wattle, Hatter, Banana, Fruit, Essential Oil and all the other branches of agriculture already established, some well organized and all available for intensive culture.

These are the foundations. There lies the encouragement to go ahead and plan now.

LESS ATTRACTIVE.

But there is another side to this attractive picture, and it is not so bright.

City Almost Obliterated.

OTHER CENTRES MENACED BY WORST FLOODS OF RECENT YEARS.

The East Coast of Mexico has been visited by another disastrous hurricane which has almost wiped out Tampico, one of the chief ports.

The death roll in Tampico is placed as high as five thousand and the damage to property at millions of dollars.

The whole district is described as a region of desolation. Honduras has also been hit by the worst in recent years.

Disastrous Silence.

Sensational Incidents in Leipzig Trial.

SANITY OF DUTCH ACCUSED IN DOUBT.

Curious Demeanour.

BULGARIAN COMMUNIST WARNED BY COURT PRESIDENT.

There were sensational incidents during the trial at Leipzig of the five persons charged with setting fire to the German Reichstag building on February 25 last, and also of high treason.

The demeanour of the Dutch accused, Van der Lubbe, who had gone on hunger strike, was such that a mental specialist was called to testify as to his sanity.

Allegations were also made that a letter from Van der Lubbe's family regarding his defence had been withheld by the prison authorities.

Unruly Scenes.

Leipzig, Sept. 29. A Fascist atmosphere pervaded the small and crowded Supreme Court when, in the glare of spot lights, the aged President of the Court, Dr. Buenger, opened the trial of the five accused men charged with setting fire to the Reichstag on February 25 and also with high treason.

Vandalism, the principal scene, was to only 24, walks with stop. He entered the court house and referred to the prisoners had their hands free as they were all garbed by seven plain clothes policemen.

Dr. Buenger at the outset emphasized the high importance of the trial to Germany and declared the attempt to perjure the trial by an enemy had failed. He also regretted the way the trial had been prejudiced by the foreign press and referred to the "communist provocations" that Nazi leaders had committed as far as the Reichstag.

The President informed Van der Lubbe that the death penalty was pronounced for this offence with which he is charged.

The examination of Vandenhoeke followed. He refused legal aid and declined the services of the Dutch advocates. Herr Bremer who, associated with Vandenhoeke's family, flew to Leipzig.

A Mental Specialist. The trial of the accused opened in connection with the fire in the Reichstag building on February 25 was continued today. The Dutch accused, Van der Lubbe, 36, who is accused in the dock was an inmate yesterday that a mental specialist was called to testify as to his sanity. The specialist declared that Van der Lubbe was normal, as shown by his test and that his behavior was natural or was a consequence of a sane mind.

The President remarked that yesterday's outbreak of laughter suggested insanity.

The specialist remarked that Van der Lubbe bore a hunger strike in prison in order to expedite the trial, but he shortly desisted.

The proceedings today were followed by a declaration by the Prime Minister of the Reich, Dr. Brüning, that he had had the party which set fire to the Reichstag and explained
