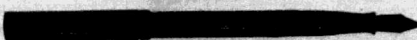

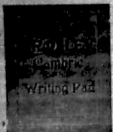

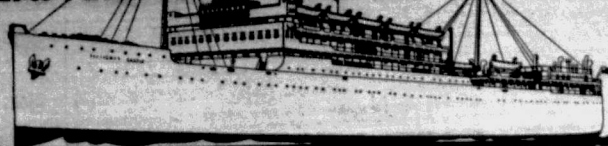

EAST AFRICAN INCOME TAX ADVISOR.

To Recover Compensation from Government.

FOR CANCELLATION OF APPOINTMENT.

Government was unable to state at its Thursday meeting of August 17, whether it will pay compensation to the holder of an appointment cancelled by the Government.

(1) The reply is in the affirmative. (2) A sum of £200 has been paid to the Income Tax Advisor under Head VI, item 2, of the current Estimates.

Previous Statement.

The question and answer of December 15 referred to above, are as follows:—

Capt. the Hon. H. E. Selwage (Nairobi South), asked: "(1) What are the terms of the agreement under which the Income Tax Officer has been seconded to this Colony as Income Tax Advisor, (2) What is the salary, (3) What are the conditions of his appointment, (4) Other particulars?"

The Acting Governor, intervening from the chair, replied that full information on that point was in the reply referred to in December last.

"(1) The appointment of the Income Tax Advisor to the Government of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory is temporary and non-residential, and no professional contributions are payable to him. His Government is requested to advise."

"(2) The salary of the Income Tax Advisor is £1,200 per annum, plus travelling expenses, and is shared equally between the Governments of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory."

"(3) The conditions of his appointment are as follows:—(a) He shall be seconded to the Government of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika Territory for a period of not less than thirty months, but not more than thirty-six months, continuous residential service."

THE E.A. CEREAL MARKET.

Latest Reports From London.

The following report on the cereal market, dated August 9, has been issued by Kenya Farmers' Association (Co-operative) Ltd.:

Hot and dry conditions are causing a material effect on the harvest crop which late rains indicate will not exceed 12 bushels compared with 30 bushels reported last year.

The efforts to restrict production of wheat appear doomed to failure, because the over-crop from last year, of 25 million bushels and demanding 10 million, while the Canadian grower is reluctant to consider the question.

Prices remain firm—Wheat, 30s.; Australian, 28s.; India, 25s.; German, new crop, 28s.

The position has been affected by the pressure to sell feeding barley in the British Isles and Persian Gulf, resulting in a fall of 1s. per cwt. in barley.

The latest South African estimate gives the crop as 5,000,000 gals. with the over-crop from last year, which is sufficient to meet the entire demand for six months' importation, but the balance crop is higher than formerly estimated.

PROGRAMME OF WORKS UNDER CONSIDERATION.

Ambitious Schemes.

IMPROVING THE TOWN WITH LITTLE COST TO RATEPAYERS.

The Nairobi Municipal Council have under consideration a number of schemes for the improvement of the town generally, which, although ambitious, are not expected to add any material amount to the existing rates.

The Council are particularly anxious to proceed as early as possible with the building of the Municipal Offices in order to take advantage of present low building costs. A modified scheme is already in existence.

The provision of a larger and better supply has been under discussion for some time. With an ample supply of water, a third-rate city can be carried out on a sewerage scheme and sewage disposal works.

A more up-to-date method of refuse removal from the central area by means of mechanical transport is under contemplation, while a further necessary improvement to the town is the re-planning of the bazaar area.

A Progressive Policy.

The Nairobi Municipal Council have under consideration a programme of work which, when carried to completion, will modernize the capital to a considerable degree of small cost to the rate-payer.

The chief schemes of this programme are, briefly, as follows:

New Municipal Offices.
Improved water supply.
Sewerage and sewage disposal works.

Extension of conservancy and refuse removal services.
Town planning of the Indian Bazaar area.

Some of these schemes are so important that a meeting of chairman of all municipalities has been held with a view to co-operation.

Municipal Offices.

With regard to the proposed new Municipal Offices, it has been decided that plans that have been under consideration for a long time. It will be required that an estimated cost of over £20,000, but it has been modified to cost only £12,000 exclusive of overheads. The site is the site where the new Law Courts and furniture.

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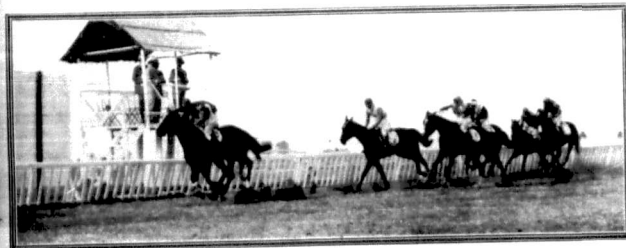

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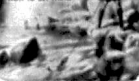

PRELIMINARY DETAILS OF ROUTES AND FARES.

Negotiations over a long period have just been completed, as a result of which, commencing next month, the Overseas Motor Transport Co., Ltd., will place a public motor omnibus service on streets of Nairobi.

Such a service was discussed a little over three years ago as a municipal enterprise, but it never got beyond that stage. Some months ago, however, the question propounded a scheme, which has been accepted.

Eighty-two passengers will be divided into first and second class. The fares will be 50 cents for the first class and 25 cents for the second class. The routes will be approximately 30 miles, with 25 cents for the full distance for first class and 20 and 10 cents respectively for second class.

Public omnibuses will probably be employed on what will be purely a private service, as the company has at the end of what is popularly known as the Broadway, the line terminating at the Government village. Fares on this route will be 50 cents and 25 cents for first and second class respectively. For a fifteen or 20 minutes' service on the first and second class, respectively, the fares will be 10c and 5c, and hourly will be 15c and 10c respectively.

The routes will be approximately 30 miles, with 25 cents for the full distance for first class and 20 and 10 cents respectively for second class.

Italy has not joined with Britain and France in presenting identical notes, but has taken an independent line. An official communication was conveyed to Berlin earlier in the week advising moderation and prudence, while Signor Mussolini is taking a personal interest in the matter.

A grave view is taken of a week-end incident on the Austro-German frontier which has led to an exchange of shots.

A member of an Austrian frontier patrol was shot dead when the patrol was ambushed by a party of German soldiers. The latter were then retreating. The Austrians in return fired at the ambushing party which escaped.

The frontier has been closed to travellers.

RESTRICTION OF COFFEE.

CONFERENCE OF PLANTERS IN SEPTEMBER.

The fifth meeting of the Coffee Board of Kenya was held on July 17 and 18, in the offices of the Board in Stanley House, Nairobi. The following official statement has been issued:

The question of the appointment of a Bio-Chemist was discussed and it was agreed that it would be inadvisable to appoint this expert to begin his experiments on this season's crop but that he should be appointed in time to commence work early next year.

A Storage Problem.
A memorandum from the Coffee Section of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce on subject of the storage of coffee in Nairobi was considered in detail. In view of the proposed extension of the period of free storage of coffee at the mills of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce, it was decided to refer the matter to the planters' group by group for their consideration rather than to ship as has been the practice in the past.

A Conference.
A request from the Coffee Section of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce for permission to buy coffee in bags of different weights and sizes was forwarded to the Department of Agriculture with a suggestion that the existing rules might be amended to meet the requirements of coffee exporters.

Restriction.
In view of the enormous surplus of coffee in the country, the demand, the question of the advisability of restricting further planting was considered and it was agreed that this was a matter for the attention of the Board. Further discussion of this matter was deferred pending the receipt and analysis of reports to the Board's committee.

Credit Needs.
The Report of the deputation which recently returned from the Land Bank Board was examined. It was agreed that the endorsement of the Board in this connection would not be a sufficient guarantee of the credit of the bank. It was agreed that the bank should be able to obtain credit from other sources and that the Government should be asked to help in various ways.

Registration Scheme.
The question of the registration of planters and their land was discussed and it was agreed that this was a matter for the attention of the Board. Further discussion of this matter was deferred pending the receipt and analysis of reports to the Board's committee.

REBEL CHIEF WHO COMMITTED SUICIDE.

Still Unsolved.

FURTHER LIGHT THROWN ON SUBJECT FROM TANGANYIKA.

The controversy concerning the skull of the rebel chief of the Wahaha tribe of Tanganyika, Mkwawa, who committed suicide near Iringa in 1896 is still going on. Under Article 246 of the Versailles Treaty, Germany undertook to return the skull to the tribe, the suggestion being that after Mkwawa's downfall, his skull was taken to Germany. Germany, however, has since repudiated that the skull was never in her possession.

The Clause in the Treaty has been the subject of discussion in the House of Commons and of considerable discussion in the League of Nations.

Further enquiries have been made by the Dar es Salaam correspondent of the "E. A. Standard" in the hope of clearing up this mystery. Views have been obtained from the son of the rebel chief and present ruler of the tribe, from an anthropologist who has lived for some three years among the tribe and from a settler of long standing.

Particular enquiry was made into the suggestion that "since the skull has rested on foreign soil nothing but disaster has befallen the tribe." The consensus of opinion, European and African, is, however, that there is no foundation whatever for that suggestion. The tribe—the Wahaha—has enjoyed continued prosperity equally with any other tribe of the Territory.

Present Ruler's Views.

["HEADLINE" CORRECTION.]

In the face of clearing up this mystery, enquiries were made of Mkwawa's son, who committed suicide in 1896, further enquiries were made to people likely to be able to throw light on the subject.

On the score of a visit to the Southern Tanganyika I interviewed the present ruler of the tribe. I also interviewed an anthropologist who has lived in the district some 12 years.

The present chief of the Wahaha tribe is Mkwawa's son, but his father who was not so successful as he was to be succeeded by his son.

On the other hand, Dr. Gordon Brown emphasized that there was no very definite connection between the tribe about the matter. "I would simply like to have the skull back."

When asked about the tribal exorcism which the alleged removal of the skull of Dr. Gordon Brown said that the Wahaha had had rather less trouble in the past few years than the Wahaha of the Territory and added that it was ridiculous to suggest that his tribal headquarters some 12 miles from Iringa. He produced a number of people relating to the present history of Tanganyika and referred to them for certain information regarding the Wahaha tribe.

Handbook Adds.—Mkwawa's body was decapitated and buried the day after it had been sent to Berlin. As a political importance was attached to the recovery of the British occupation of German East Africa, provision was made in the terms of the Treaty of Versailles for the return of the skull to the tribe.

Mkwawa and his tribe were to be regarded by the Germans as brave and chivalrous enemies. The chief's death, the tribe accepted the new order of things and never again did they take up arms.

An Official Report.
A German military report had the following to follow:
"Mkwawa always moved in the German Government or its officials with information and led in the very locality where his information, but the military authorities declined to give us any information and denied our right of access to his presence. Altogether it was certain that Mkwawa carried out his duties as a ruler rather than as an officer of the army. He was not a soldier, but a chief who would time after time blindly kill himself on the soldier's sacrifice. Mkwawa was a man of high character and a noble man. Mkwawa's Death.
The circumstances of his death have been put on record by a German military report. His report is quoted in the "Handbook of Tanganyika Territory."

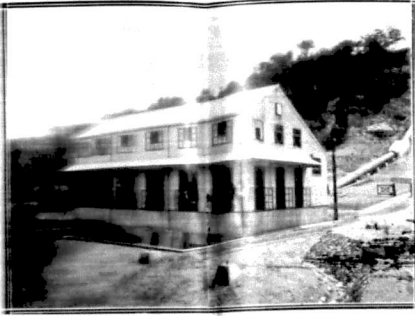

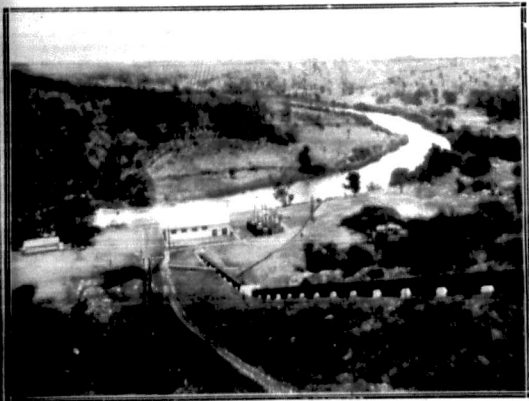

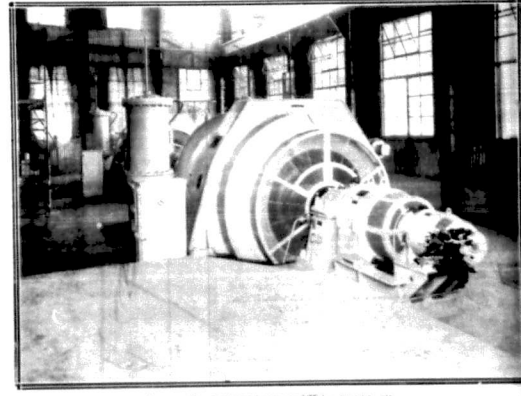

OPPOSITION TO THE GIBB REPORT PROPOSALS.

High Commissioner Alternative.

TRANSFER OF POWERS TO A COMMISSION OF THREE GOVERNORS.

A firmly worded memorandum on the Gibb Report on the railway finance has been adopted by the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa for submission to the Governor of Kenya in his capacity as High Commissioner for Transport. It sets out the views of the Kenya section of the Association.

Points in the memorandum are:—

- 1. A protest against the reflection cast by Mr. Roger Gibb on members of the Railway Advisory Council.
2. A proposal to transfer the powers and duties of the High Commissioner to a Transport Commission consisting of the Governors of the three territories.
3. Opposition to Mr. Gibb's proposal that rates should be increased and an expression of belief that the only way to improve railway finance is to increase production.
4. Preferential treatment to goods of local produce and manufacture.
5. Opposition to separation of the Railways from the Governments while the latter carry responsibility for railway loans.
6. Continuity of policy and no radical changes during the present period of economic readjustment.
7. The General Manager to be a member of the Legislative Councils of Kenya and Uganda when railway matters are being discussed.
8. Avoidance of rate wars at competitive points in East Africa.
9. Elimination of motor competition with main trunk line.

The Association also strongly opposed the appointment of a Railway Board in London.

The view was expressed that the Harbour Advisory Board should continue to function as a separate organization.

No London Board.

Mr. M. H. B. Sayer, Secretary of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa, during his session last week discussed the report on Railway Rates and Finance in East Africa by Mr. Roger Gibb.

As regards the position of the High Commissioner for Transport, a substantial case had been made out, prior to Mr. Gibb's arrival to show that the duties of the two positions of High Commissioner and Governor of Kenya are not compatible, particular evidence to this effect being found in Sir Edward Craig's Despatch to the Secretary of State on December 11, 1948, when dealing with the question of the transfer of the duties of periodical complaints from public to the High Commissioner. It is, therefore, the Section's view that while not subscribing wholly to the High Commissioner's statement, it is advisable that the position should be adjusted so that the High Commissioner's powers and duties to a Commission consisting of the three Governors of Kenya and Uganda and Tanganyika.
