CLOSER UNION RE-OPENED.

Associated Chambers Re-affirm Their Aims.

QUESTION TO BE PRESSED "WITH RENEWED ENERGY."

Answer To German Agitation.

COORDINATION OF SERVICES UNDER STRONG CENTRAL AUTHORITY.

The question of Closer Union has been re-opened by the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa in a resolution re-affirming the views placed before Sir Samuel Wilson in 1929 in which a desire for the earliest coordination of the central services in the three territories was expressed.

The Executive was instructed at the meeting in Mombasa this week to press forward the aims with "renewed energy."

Some speakers considered that there was a great need to provide a counter-blast to the agitation in Germany for the return of colonial possessions.

Time Opportunity.

The annual Session of the Association of Chambers of Commerce of Eastern Africa this afternoon discussed the question of Closer Union as a question put forward by the Mombasa Chamber of Commerce which read:

That this Association recommends the cable sent to Sir Samuel Wilson concerning the Closer Union of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika dated June 15, 1952. Mr. H. B. Campbell, Honorary Secretary, said that he wished to submit a resolution for the use of the Executive and after discussion of the same he proposed the following:

BRITISH ISRAEL NOTES.

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THE PETERSEN-DOYLE FIGHT.

Irishman Loses His Head.

Thrice Warned for Fouling.

Referee Tears Men Apart.

The biggest crowd in the history of British boxing witnessed the biggest of ring fiascos at the White City Stadium, when Jack Petersen retained his British heavy-weight championship on a second and third.

In the sixth round the contest Doyle landed a blow stronger than a dozen of his own from the 125-pounder, who crashed into each other in the centre of the ring. There they stood toe-to-toe hitting, wrestling, holding, in fact, doing everything except box.

The referee, Mr. C. H. Douglas, stopped the contest twice, and altogether gave the Irishman three warnings for wild hitting. These had not the slightest effect, for Doyle continued to punch without the slightest sense of direction.

The round ended in one of the wildest of scenes. The fighting was so furious that Mr. Douglas had to shout and tear the men apart before they realised the gong had sounded.

Once, in the height of the "milling," he appealed to both champions and challenger to keep their heads, but still the furious two-handed fighting went on. In the interval the referee went to Doyle's corner and said to him: "Boys, I have given you three warnings. Next time I will disqualify you. Don't forget."

It did not appear that the Irishman had heard a single word.

He was staring fixedly ahead at Petersen, waiting for the bell, which was a sign to leap from his stool and carry on with his amazing fighting.

He landed two more low blows, and was then disqualified. Even then, when Mr. Douglas called the bout, he was unable to keep Doyle away from Petersen.

Doyle, who had made his way from his dressing-room amid a storm of cheering people, returned discomfited to his dressing-room, jerking out:

"For a time panemissonem agitated there were ugly scenes in all parts of the stadium, and fights ensue."

It seemed that the Irishman was in a daze from the moment the bout started well he had returned to his dressing-room. He was unable for a long time to grasp the fact that he had been disqualified. His display was absolutely inexplicable.

The extraordinary part about the whole unfortunate affair was that for the few seconds Doyle chose to smash home blows, at the head he looked like beating Petersen at any moment.

Once or twice the champion smashed his right hand on Doyle's chin, but the Irishman did not feel anything, or know anything, about the fight he was waging.

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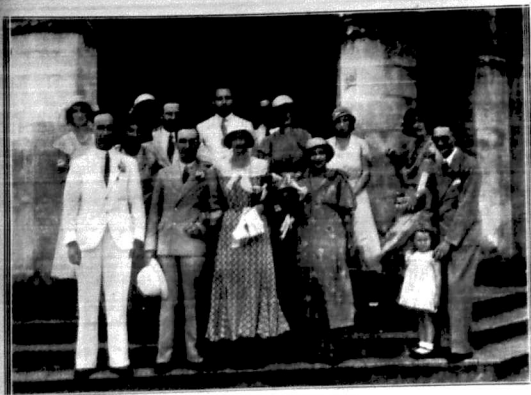

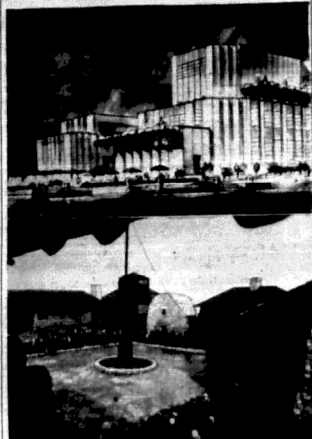

GOVERNMENT TO GIVE TEN YEARS' PREFERENCE.

A Big Scheme.

SEQUEL TO RESEARCH BY IMPERIAL CHEMICAL INDUSTRIES.

Important developments have taken place in the manufacture of home-produced motor spirit in Britain.

Under the plan in view, 3,000,000 gallons of petrol will be manufactured annually consuming 320,000 tons of coal.

Legislation is being introduced in the Autumn to provide a guaranteed preference of fourpence a gallon for ten years on this British petrol.

The scheme is likely to provide employment for some twelve thousand people.

Employment for 12,000 People.

[BY WIRELESS.]
The Prime Minister announced in the House of Commons that legislation which will give effect to a proposal which the Government believe would ensure immediate importance in the manufacture of home-produced motor spirit.

The proposal would take the form of a guaranteed preference of 4d. per gallon in respect of light hydrocarbon oils manufactured in Great Britain from indigenous coal, alone or in part.

The guarantee would be for ten years from April 1 next, subject to an arrangement the effect of which would be to vary the period of guarantee according to actual production—namely, the difference between constant duty and what, if any, extra duty should be imposed.

Big Advantage.
If the preference remained at its present level of 8d. per gallon the period of the guarantee would be four and half years. If reduced to 4d. a gallon the period would be ten years, and the intermediate rate of preference would vary with the period of the guarantee proportionately.

It was estimated that about 7,000 people would be directly employed and a slightly less number indirectly.

Under the plan in view about 100,000 tons or 3,000,000 gallons of petrol annually would be produced, consuming 550,000 tons of coal and giving employment to over 1,000,000 men. In addition

there was employment in connection with the plant.

The cost to the Treasury would be very small.

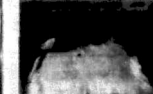

Despite the mishap Mrs. Mollison has the satisfaction of knowing that she is the first woman to make the difficult East to West crossing.

The machine was so accurately piloted that despite the rain, fog and wind they reached land only a few miles short of their compass course.

Great Navigation Feat.

(SPECIAL AGENT'S REPORT.)

July 26. On receipt of favourable weather reports Mr. and Mrs. A. Mollison flew from St. Lawrence Aerodrome, London, in their machine "Seaforce" to Heliport Sands in Wales this forenoon.

There they refueled and set on, with little delay and without any difficulty they set off on their great flight across the Atlantic which has been in preparation for some months.

New York, July 26. Mr. and Mrs. A. Mollison crashed in landing on the aerodrome at Bridgeport, Connecticut at 3 p.m. (British Summer Time) today.

A later message from Bridgeport states that both are in hospital, suffering from abrasions. They are not supposed to get out of hospital until their wounds have been treated.

The story of the last stages of their flight after they had crossed the Atlantic is told in the following message.

St. John's Newfoundland, July 23. The Mollison's plane was sighted at Bonaventure, Newfoundland at 5 p.m. (B.S.T.).

Harbour Grace, July 23. A plane which passed over the east coast of Newfoundland at 11 o'clock local time was identified as the Mollison's.

Halifax, July 23. A plane believed to be the Mollison's was sighted at 5 p.m. (B.S.T.).

New Glasgow, Nova Scotia, July 23. Here at 7.45 p.m. (B.S.T.) the Mollison's plane was seen.

A British Official Wireless Service message received from the Mollison's on July 23 gives further details of the crash and the extent of the injuries.

son in the course of an interview and they decided to land when they saw the lights of an airport as they were running short of fuel, but they were so tired that they could not see where they were landing.

The machine landed in a ditch some distance from the field and soon over in soft marshland. When officials dashed to the spot they heard Mr. Mollison shout: "For God's sake I'm over here."

The engines improved stretchers from one of the wives of the wrecked machine and one of Mrs. Mollison's shoes were carried to care and rushed to hospital. Both are suffering from exhaustion.

The machine crashed within sight of the lights of New York. Unfortunately Bridgeport is not equipped for night landings and the Mollison's landing at a high speed overran the boundary into the marshland.

Some 200 yards from the wrecked machine, the petrol had held out, Mr. and Mrs. Mollison would have been awaiting their arrival at New York, including General Bahar, Mr. and Mrs. West.

Severe Cut.

Mr. Mollison was severely, but not dangerously, cut above the forehead and his wife received minor cuts and abrasions. Both were taken to hospital, where they received medical attention and were put to bed overnight.

The machine was seriously damaged.

Crash in Darkness.

It is understood that they feared a shortage of fuel, so attempted to make a night landing on a small cinder-surfaced field at Bridgeport aerodrome. They apparently over-estimated the fuel and received most of their fuel on the ground.

Many witnesses had to be put in Mr. Mollison's forehead and hand, and a few in his wife's hand.

Magnificent Crossing.

This had luck overtook them. They then made a night landing at New York, and great sympathy was shown when news of the Mollison's misadventure was announced through a newspaper.

STEEN MEASURES TO DISCOURAGE A RIOT.

The long trial of General Calvanetti and thirty others concerned in the Sanjurjo rebellion at Seville in August of last year ended today.

General Calvanetti was sentenced to ten years' imprisonment in a military prison. General Poveda was sentenced to 22 years' imprisonment, while fourteen others received sentences varying from 22 to 20 years' imprisonment. The remainder were acquitted.

The prosecution had demanded the death sentence for General Calvanetti and another colleague.

Stipend in the End.

Provisions are being taken throughout the country following the arrest of 110 Spaniards. The labourers who are believed to have prepared a plan for a general strike.

Sixty three of the arrested men have been sent to provincial prisons.

Swift Struggle.

Madrid, July 25. Following the police today closed all centres of communist activity in Barcelona and a number of Communist disturbances and a Communist plot planned for August 1.

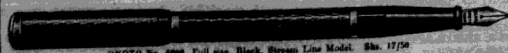

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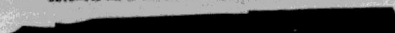

Nairobi Chamber of Commerce is still asking for the re-introduction of the distribution rates on the Kenya and Uganda railways following the introduction of an efficient substitute, and in connection to this effect, carried at Thursday's meeting of the Chamber, has been forwarded to the attention of the members of the Association of Chambers when they met at Mombasa on July 24.

Proposals for the recognition of the world's sugar supply have been submitted to the World Economic Conference by the International Sugar Council, recommending that countries with large sugar imports should stabilize their home production to the present level in order to prevent a reduction of imports and also countries trading almost wholly for their own consumption should undertake not to expand production beyond their home markets for export, while countries not belonging to the International Sugar Agreement should undertake not to increase their exports above the present level.

The Council reports that the United Kingdom is prepared to limit home-grown sugar to its present production and also to stabilize colonial output to 202,000 tons as a minimum. During the third, fourth and fifth years exports will be restricted in order to afford the Colonies a market in the probable increased British consumption.

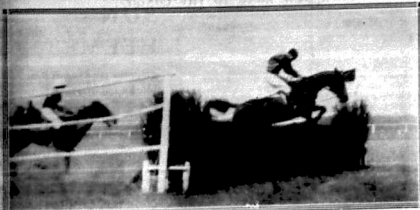

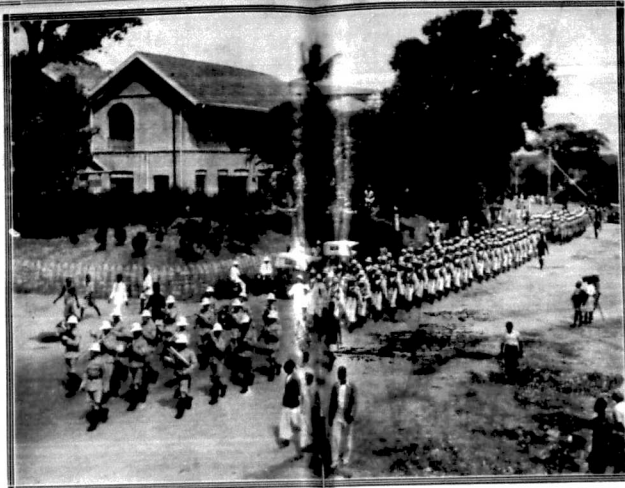

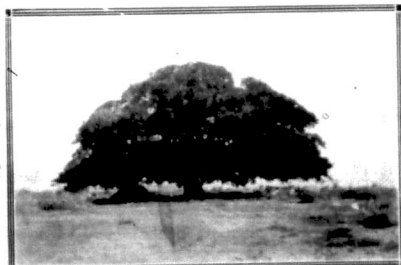

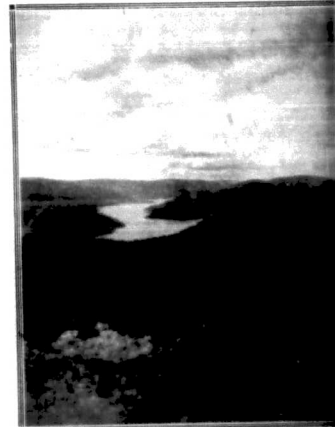

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How New Poll Tax Will Operate.

RESPONSIBILITIES RESTING ON THE TAXPAYER.

Heavy Penalties for Evasion.

COLLECTORS GIVEN POWERS ARBITRARILY TO ASSESS INCOMES.

Severe penalties are proposed in the Non-Native Poll Tax Bill for offences against the measure. These range from an addition of 20 per cent. of the tax in cases of evasion to a possible fine of £200 and treble the tax for six months' imprisonment or both for fraudulent attempts to evade payment.

Wide powers are given to the Treasurer of the Colony and particularly to his agents or Collectors who can themselves assess a person's income if the taxpayer has made no return or if the return is under suspicion.

Right of appeal lies to the High Court of the Colony and cases can be heard in camera if the taxpayer desires.

Definition of "Taxable Income."

Of the five new taxation Bills introduced to the Legislative Council next month, that which affects the non-native community is the most important. It is the Non-Native Poll Tax Bill, which provides for the levy of a poll tax on all non-natives of the Colony.

The measure applies to all persons over 18 years of age and for the purposes of the Ordinance a person shall be deemed to be resident in Kenya if, during the year of assessment, (a) he has spent more than six months in the Colony for a period of not less than six months or (b) he is in the Colony for a period of not less than six months during that year of assessment or (c) he is to be deemed to be in the Colony for more than six months during that year of assessment.

It is to be the duty of every non-native taxpayer in the Colony, who is liable for a poll tax, to file a return of income made out as a simple form giving names, addresses, professions or occupations and stating over his signature that the information is true.

My taxable income, calculated in accordance with the provisions of the Non-Native Poll Tax Ordinance, 1933, did not exceed £100 in the year ending 31st December 1932.

When this return is submitted to the Collector the date and time for the Collector to take any person who comes to the Collector's office after the date or leave the Collector before that date in any year and subsequently returns to the Colony before that date in any year after the date of any year and the tax has not already been returned and paid tax shall make a return and pay the tax within one month of the date of the assessment.

Where a Collector is satisfied that any taxpayer, owing to his inability to obtain knowledge of his income, is unable to make a return of income, he may, in writing, he may permit the Collector to assess the taxpayer's income on the basis of the information furnished to him in writing and authorized by the taxpayer's thumb print or other satisfactory means of identification.

When the return is made and the tax has been paid in accordance with the Ordinance, the Collector will give a receipt. He may accept the return for full satisfaction of the tax, or, alternatively, he may refuse to accept the return and then, to the best of his knowledge and belief, the amount of the taxpayer's income and assess it accordingly.

If the ordinary Poll Tax for 1933 has been paid, the amount can be deducted from the sum due under this new law, and the receipt for poll tax is surrendered.

Penalties. The penalties for infringement of the provisions of the Ordinance are set out in general clauses. The general penalty which covers all offences not specifically provided for is a fine not exceeding £50 or imprisonment for not more than 20 days or both.

Every person who without notice, suitable excuse makes an incorrect return by omitting or understating income is liable to a maximum fine of £100 and double the maximum if the return is made in the year of assessment or within three months thereafter.

Every employer, when required to furnish a return for his employees, shall prepare and deliver for each year, a return giving the names and addresses of all employees and the payments and allowances made in these respects of that employee to the Collector.

For the purposes of the measure the manager or other principal officer of any business or profession shall be deemed to be the employer and any director or person engaged in the management or control of the business or profession.

Appals. Special clauses make provision for alterations to the assessment and for appeals to the High Court. Where the assessment is made by the Collector within seven days of the date of the assessment, the taxpayer can then appeal to the Supreme Court. This appeal has to be made within 21 days of the date of the assessment.

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The Ordinance will continue in force until the 31st December 1934 and then expires, but such expiry does not affect any returns made under the Ordinance. Such legal proceedings or remedies may still be carried on.

New Professional and Trade Licences.

BILL TO BE APPLIED IN KENYA THIS YEAR.

Fees Due Before September 1.

POWERS IN HANDS OF GOVERNMENT TO CONSIDER SPECIAL CONDITIONS.

The scale of fees to be paid by traders and professional men under the new Licensing Ordinance which is part of the administrative proposals is published below for the information of the public.

It should be noted that Government proposes to introduce these licence fees this year. They become payable before September 1. For those months on half of the charges set out in the scale will be made, although persons already holding trading licences will be entitled to a refund of a half of the cost of the existing licence.

Wide powers are given to the Governor to vary downwards the scale of charges in any area or in respect of any trade if circumstances call for special consideration.

The Scale of Charges.

One of the important Bills in the series dealing with the new professional and trade licences is that with the ponderous title "A Bill to provide for the licensing of certain trades, professions and occupations within the Colony and to fix the licence fees thereon." The clause is preceded by a number of interpretations or definitions, a proper understanding of which is necessary to a study of the scope of the Bill.

The word "business" includes any trade or industry, but does not include the carrying on of a profession, trade, vocation, legal or newspaper or to any person licensed as a commercial traveller. It is defined as a person who travels in the Colony soliciting orders for goods on behalf of another person, whether such other person resides or carries on his business inside or outside the country.

The Exemptions. As already stated the exemptions under this Licensing Ordinance include planters, farmers, stock raisers, gardeners or dairymen dealing only in their own produce, and also liquor, trade, native domestic industries, dhobies, non-European tailors, dressmakers, hairdressers, tailors who do not use their own cloth, printers, non-European printers, and schoolmasters and schoolmistresses.

Power is given to the Governor to exempt by order any business or profession either generally or in any area in the interests of the community or in equity, if the business is liable to be carried on in another form.

Scale of Fees. The fees for the various trades and professions become payable annually (or such other fee as the Governor with the consent of the Legislative Council may prescribe) are—

1. Wholesale trader including all importations or exportation from his place outside the Colony. For the principal or sole place of business... 600/-

For the principal or sole place of business... 200/- For each subsidiary place of business... 100/-

INCOME TAX FINALE. Adviser Receives His Notice.

Brutal Murder on the Athi Plains. ELDERLY EUROPEAN DONE TO DEATH.

Attacked by Natives. CRIME AT LONELY STORE NEAR EMBAKASI STATION.

An elderly European, named A. Fabich, died on Sunday evening at the Nairobi Hospital, as a result of a brutal attack made upon him by natives on Friday night.

The deceased kept a store on the Machakos Road near Embakasi Station, and lived alone, his nearest neighbours living some distance away.

On Friday evening the store, receiving a number of native blows on the head.

The assailants entered the store and appeared to have ransacked the premises, but little appears to have been stolen. A curious feature of the crime, however, is that a considerable amount of paper was burnt.

A warning has been issued by the police to owners of similar stores in the country to be on their guard, while a diligent round up of suspects is being undertaken.

A Police Warning.

Admitted to the European Hospital, Nairobi, on Saturday morning was Fabich, who had been engaged to land, and by the means information was sent to the police authorities in Nairobi, with the result that the police were sent out and Fabich brought in to hospital. He reported to the police officer that he had been attacked by natives.

Fabich ran a small general store on the Machakos Road about a mile past Embakasi Station, on property owned by a fellow-countryman employed by the Kenya Veterinary Department. The store itself is a detached building, behind a fence of corrugated iron, in which Fabich also has a smaller room of similar build for the use of a milkmaid.

The main level entirely alone, and the nearest people in the district were some distance off, while since the closing of Embakasi Station, no one is resident there, and he is in favour of his assistants, who appear too to have visited Fabich's abode.

On the Friday evening, when it was reported that Fabich had been killed, the police were notified, and a search was made for the body, which was found in a shallow stream near the store.

Mr. Fabich, lived a lonely life, and long residence in East Africa—between 20 and 30 years—was made him very well acquainted with natives. A few years ago he was a native of Albania, Austria, (then Austria-Hungary and since under Italian administration) and on his first arrival in East Africa he was in the colony farming near Kilimanjaro. Coming to Kenya, he was in business in Nairobi, and when the partnership was dissolved, he went to the colony farming near Kilimanjaro, as he named it. He was a widower, his wife dying about two years ago.

So far as is known, there are no children, but a nephew is stated to be resident in Kenya. During the war Mr. Fabich was deported to an island in the Atlantic near St. Helena, as he was a widower, his wife dying about two years ago.

The funeral of deceased took place on Monday afternoon at the Forest Road cemetery, the last rites being performed by the Roman Catholic Church.

It is stated that the police are making a diligent round up of suspects in being undertaken.

Wilson, O.B.E., by her North Devon Trout Farm, has a single-handed, reeled 43 fish in three hours, the best weighing 14 lbs. 10 oz. in good condition.

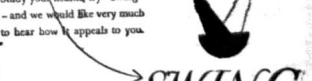

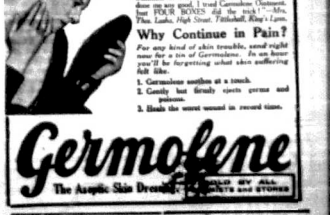
