A KENYA INDIAN CONFERENCE.

To Meet in Mombasa This Month.

REPLY TO UNOFFICIAL MEETING IN NAIROBI.

Demand for Common Roll to be Renewed.

As a result of the Unofficial Committee held in Nairobi on July 2, the East African Indian National Congress has decided to call a Kenya Indian Conference to meet at Mombasa on July 22 and 23.

At a meeting of the Executive of the Congress held on July 19, the following series of resolutions was adopted:

The Executive of the E. A. Indian National Congress, with great concern the resolution passed as a result of recent deliberations, by the Unofficial Committee of the European Colonies of Kenya, held on July 8, 1950, at Nairobi, and regrets to find that the White settlers are playing the country again into serious political controversies at a time when the country is faced with a serious economic situation and a demand for action from all sections of the population of Kenya is necessary.

During the week a sharp rise took place, followed by a slight fall, but prices are certainly steadier. Italian and Danubian varieties are not pushing to sell and forward sale is not readily obtained. The consumption, although much less than last year, is still more than sufficient to consume the viable supply before new crops are available. The present is selling at 17/- and African type are valued at 21/-.

Wheat.

The market during the past week has been in a highly speculative condition, under the influence of the American Exchange situation and the very sharp rise in wheat prices in the U.S.A. 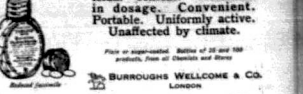

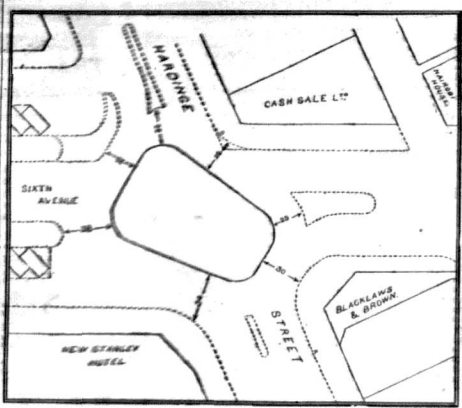

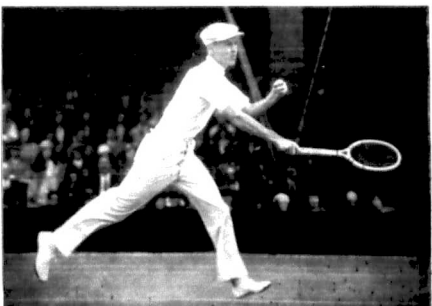

TEN CONTESTS STAGED IN MUNICIPAL MARKET.

NAVY WINS ONLY THREE OF THE FIGHTS.

Though only ten contests were staged at the Municipal Market, Nairobi, on Friday evening, the fighting was keen and interesting. One of the best bouts of the evening was that between Boam of the Navy, and Randall of the Navy. The Navyman won, but only just. It was unfortunate that owing to an injury received at a bigger fight Yates, who was unable to enter the ring, Hartley, Nairobi, however, stepped in to fight Boam, and immediately after the pair went to the ropes. Boam fell over his man and the ropes. The Navy's man landed with a left to the head, and the right to the body, but there was nothing in it, the round ending in a draw. A second round followed, Randall landed to the body, and the sailor made a light of it, and a fine right swing sent the Navyman down in his corner, but he was soon up again. It was Boam's turn to be the finding diff, but he was not in keeping their feet. Randall missed with a right uppercut. It was a splendid scrap, for both men mixing it up, and giving and taking with will. Boam won on points, and well deserved, but it was a fine "draw".

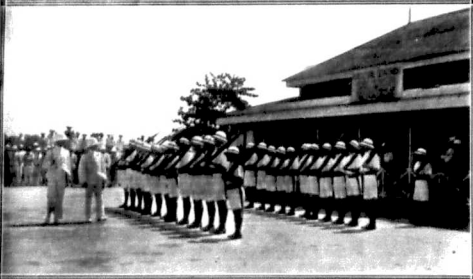

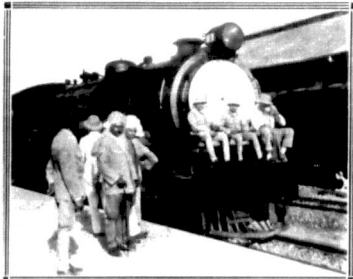

1932 Forests Report.

CRITICISM OF FAILURE TO MEET JAPANESE TRADE.

The Kenya Forest Department's annual report reveals 1932 as one of the most difficult years in the history of the timber industry. The sales of timber have not been so small since 1922.

The principal bright spot was the export of pencil cedar slats, the value of which was almost trebled. Great Britain provided the main market.

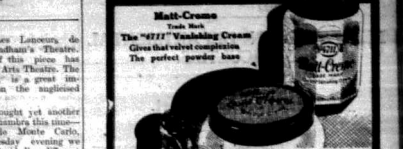

"A Strange Document."

The memorandum presented to the World Economic Conference by Herr Hugenberg, and afterwards withdrawn, demanding a Colonial Empire in Africa for Germany, was the subject of strong comment recently by "The Times," which describes it as a strange document.

It is a document which is regarded to Tanganyika, German Mandate, and that it is doubtful whether there are fewer German residents in Tanganyika to-day than before the war.

The Wrong Time.

The demand for a Colonial Empire in Africa for Germany submitted to the World Economic Conference by Herr Hugenberg, one of the German delegates, who demands a vast empire, was immediately withdrawn by the head of the delegation, for the subject of a leading article in "The Times."

After pointing out that the demand is not a matter for the Conference, "The Times" reviews the memorandum, which it describes as vague and valueless, and not a helpful contribution to the subject of the Conference.

The paper states: "The strange document which the German delegates, Herr Hugenberg, presented to the Economic Commission of the Conference was an example of how well one can make a helpful contribution. It was composed in a jargon well known to those who speak the language of a Nazi audience, but less intelligible to a sensible man of business. One or two of its ideas were indeed striking, but they were not stated, and probably put forward by Dr. Schaadt, the President of the Conference."

"But most of the phrases were of the expatiatory and celestine in one which can properly be brought up only before the League. It would be calculated merely to impede the work of the Economic Conference. This is not the time when either Germany can be treated with 'caring out great world enterprises' or should be found 'new areas,' presumably beyond her Eastern empire, where her energetic race can carry out great works of progress."

"Foreign publicity has helped to get the latest German extravaganzas before the public. One has the best of the way. The Commission is naturally soiled, and probably will be in the Commission and Committees."

A large measure of agreement has also been reached on the economic side of the Conference.

A Premium on Sheer Stamina.

An Anomalous Position.

The Committee appointed by the Kenya Turf and Tennis Association to run the 1933 Championships have got down to work, and entries are now being invited for the event. The tourney, which is to be held at Nairobi, should not be rushed, as, to force competitors to play several matches on one day, places a premium on sheer stamina rather than on skill and knowledge of the game. This view would appear to be substantially correct, but it is understood the committee are taking all points of view into consideration.

A noteworthy addition to the usual notice is that no single entry for a lady or a gentleman will be accepted under Sbs. 7, 8 and Sbs. 10, respectively. This means that single entries for the Singles will cost the amount mentioned while if two people enter for the Mixed Doubles the price will be Sbs. 17, 50, 17 for the Men's Doubles, Sbs. 20, 50 for the Ladies Doubles, Sbs. 15, 50 for the Men's Singles, and other entries, only the fixture will be charged the extra amount. In every case where a competitor has entered for more than one event, the usual rates will be charged. Whether this new regulation will have the effect of increasing the number of competitors or reducing their number remains to be seen.

In the past it has been possible for a lady or a gentleman to obtain a competitor's ticket (which is the equivalent of a season ticket) for Sbs. 7, 8 and Sbs. 7, 50 respectively, simply by entering for one event. 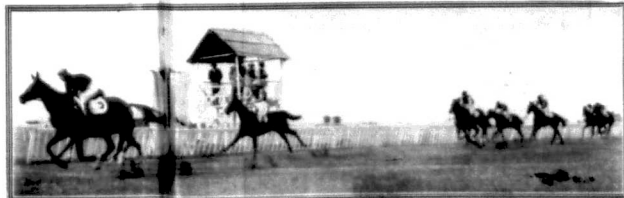

Tanganyika Hit By Drought.

CROP INCREASES WILL NOT BE REALISED.

Coffee Suffering Setback.

SOME DISTRICTS FACED BY PROSPECTS OF A FOOD SHORTAGE.

In consequence of the drought it is now officially anticipated in Tanganyika that the crop increases expected earlier will not be realised.

The latest crop report states that the rains have failed definitely, coffee is suffering severely, maize crops are short and in some districts cotton is either backward or has almost completely failed, especially in the Northern and Tanga Provinces.

Conditions are better in the Central and West but in the Lake Province the crop results are far from satisfactory. The Lindi Province has been favoured with a better rainfall than most other parts of the country.

The prospects of famine in Tanganyika are not yet serious but in some districts the food situation is likely to become critical if the drought continues.

Floods Spoil Maize Plantings!

A discouraging review of the crop outlook in Tanganyika is contained in the May report issued by the Department of Agriculture. Many parts of the country are seriously affected by the continued drought and it is now clear that the increased production for which Government hoped at the beginning of the season will not be realised. The report reads as follows:—

Northern and Tanga Provinces.
Arusha.—The rains have doubtfully failed, severely from drought in some areas. Coffee picking has begun in East Arusha; the expected increase will be realised. No shortage of native foodstuffs is anticipated.

Moshi.—The rains have failed except for showers at the highest altitudes. Coffee is fair but cotton is very backward.

Eastern Province.
The 150,000 tons of cotton harvested will be obtained only if further rains are experienced during the next two months. Rice generally is good and is now ripening; extensive plantings of cereals are taking place.

Ruhi.—The rice harvest is in progress and yields vary according to the locality but the general estimate is good. The second maize crop is being planted. The condition of the upland cotton is fair.

Pharosani.—Rainfall in the first half of May was good though less than there was in March. The crop will be disappointing. Drought conditions reworked in the middle of the month and seed rice planted in valleys and swamps are being harvested, but rice crops planted on high ground are poor. Cassava plantings have been increased and being well.

Morogoro.—Rains very scarce, the growing conditions are not so well as in the Central, Eastern and Western areas. A considerable reduced crop may be expected. An acre of the second harvest of Mwanza rice is expected and excellent yields are anticipated. The maize harvest will be small.

Rufiji.—Rains, showers of rain have been frequent. The maize and other crops are well.

Early first picking is anticipated, and prospects fairly satisfactory. The rice harvest is in full swing and will be an average crop. Kibungo.—A good rice crop is being reaped and cotton prospects are very good.

Central and Western Provinces.

Siaya.—Harvesting in general of all crops is well advanced. Kisumu.—(Mid-May Report). Owing to the comparative failure of the second rice, the ground maize crop, although it will exceed last year's, will not reach the first year's in quantity. In fact, the first year's crop is satisfactory, but at Sandawe the crop is very poor.

Dodoma.—Harvesting is general; grain crops are poor, groundnuts fair and yields considerably reduced on account of lack of rain. Rice yields are also reduced.

Mpwapu.—All crops are now being harvested. Yields are fair to good.

Tilimbar.—The groundnut crop has suffered from lack of rain and also from later crops.

Kilimanjaro.—The rice harvest is good and the rice crop is good on the average but in the southern part of the district it is likely to be spoiled by the lack of rain.

Mkwinda.—Crops are good in all areas. Rainfall is good and the maize and cotton crops will not ripen owing to failure of rains but sufficient maize and sweet potatoes have been seen and are doing well.

Lake Province.
Mwanza.—Showers in May help, but the crop is still very poor. It was too far developed to benefit from rains are likely to be poor. The rice crop is very poor and will not be up to previous expectations. Cotton is as good as failed. The prospects for the good areas. The general prospects are fair.

Russia Signs a Non-Aggression Pact.

WITH NEIGHBOURING STATES IN EUROPE AND ASIA.

Term Defined.

NO JUSTIFICATION FOR ANY ACTS OF ATTACK OR INVASION.

Russia has entered into a non-aggression pact with a number of her neighbouring states in Europe and Asia. The document was signed in London on Monday by the representatives of the countries concerned.

Following detailed definitions of acts of aggression, which cover a wide field, the pact stipulates that no consideration of any kind will serve as a pretext or justification for any act of aggression.

Negotiations in London.
