STATEMENTS BY SAFARI OUTFITTERS AND PHOTOGRAPHIC EXPERT.

There has been a prompt repudiation of the astounding story, reported by the London correspondent of the "East African Standard" yesterday, that Mr. George Vanderbilt, the millionaire sportsman, caught lions in Tanganyika by the use of baited hooks.

It will be recalled that the story was cabled in the form of an extract from an article contributed to the "Toronto Daily Star" by Mr. Gordon Sinclair, based on alleged remarks supposed to have been made by Mr. Vanderbilt to Mr. Sinclair in London. The original article (a copy of which was shown to the "East African Standard" yesterday) was published in the Canadian paper in September. Extracts were published in British sporting journals about two months ago.

Yesterday the Game Warden of Kenya, Captain A. T. A. Ritchie, received the following cable from Mr. Vanderbilt, despatched from Palm Beach, Florida, on Saturday:

Article appearing in Canadian and British press regarding my catching lions with baited hooks. Utterly false and I make complete denial of same. Only lion killed by me in Africa I shot with rifle stop. Would deny it great favour if you could publish my denial in East African press. Regards. George Vanderbilt.

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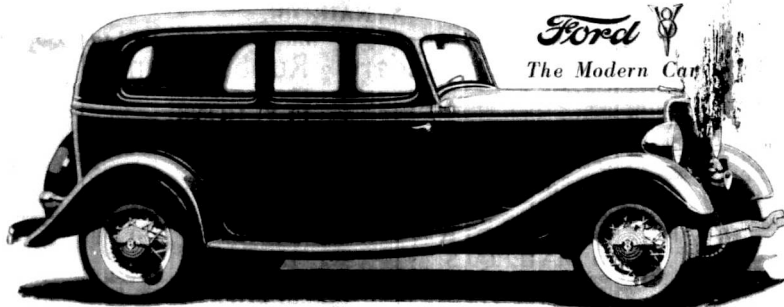

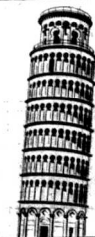

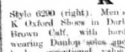

President Roosevelt's Monetary Policy.

PERMANENT METALLIC RESERVES OWNED BY STATE.

Devaluation of Dollar.

MINIMUM CUT OF 40 PER CENT. IN GOLD CONTENT ADVOCATED.

President Roosevelt in a keenly awaited message to Congress has explained his monetary policy.

He is hopeful that events throughout the world are leading to a general agreement.

The President has taken steps to establish permanent metallic reserves owned by the State and to this end asked Congress for authority to vest in the Government of the country the title to all supplies of monetary gold.

He aims at restoring the dollar to a level which will enable it to be repaired with a coin of the same value as that at the time they were contracted.

Mr. Roosevelt's recommendation to Congress is a minimum cut of 40 per cent. in the dollar's gold content and a maximum of 60 per cent.

A Message to Congress.

President Roosevelt's address to Congress on January 16, 1934, was the most important message since the Monetary Conference at Washington in 1933. The President's address was broadcast to all parts of the world and it is believed that it was the most widely heard of any President's address since the beginning of the Republic.

It is stated that President Roosevelt and the Secretary of the Treasury have conferred with the Democratic Republican Members of the Senate and discussed methods of taking into the Treasury the title to all supplies of monetary gold.

President Roosevelt is sending a message to Congress tomorrow, asking the transfer of all monetary gold to the Treasury in order to effect the dollar devaluation program.

Washington, January 16. President Roosevelt in a message to Congress recommended a minimum cut of 40 per cent. in the gold content of the dollar. He asked for the authorization of the Government to acquire gold supply. The possible negro loss of revolution is 40 per cent.

Additional Legislation. To approve the financial monetary situation, President Roosevelt has asked for legislation to establish permanent metallic reserves owned by the State.

President Roosevelt expressed his confidence that the Government would take prompt action to meet the emergency.

There was an increase in the price of gold of 10 cents to 131 1/4. The provision of 1 cent over the French franc is included in the bill.

On the stock exchange there was little business, indicating that the market was still in a state of uncertainty.

British Government stocks were quoted at 106 1/2 to 107 1/2, based with war loan at 104 1/2 to 105 1/2.

Story of Alleged Confession.

RACIAL RELATIONS.

Not quite so much public interest was taken yesterday when the hearing commenced of the case in which Odojaga, a Kikuyu, stood in the Supreme Court, Nairobi, before Mr. Justice Horn, and three native assessors, charged with the murder on November 19 at Riuraka of Mr. Henry Turbin, half a dozen Europeans in Court and no representatives of other races were present.

Mr. M. H. Fox, Government analyst, was first called by Mr. Lewy, Crown Counsel, and after having examined certain articles which had been handed to him by the police. They consisted of two knives, a shirt, a cloth and a pair of shoes, and he had searched primarily for blood, which, however, did not appear.

Unsubstantiated by Mr. J. D. Finch, defending witness said that blood had been on the blades of the knives, it would not necessarily have run down the handle. On the other hand, it might be found in preliminary indications of blood, which, however, he could not confirm.

The native force who on the previous day was sent to Riuraka and had had a certain amount of re-examination, was again recalled, and Mr. Justice Horn said he had not known before that Mr. Turbin's land although he had heard something about it. He said that Mr. Turbin had never been heard of since he had never been caught by him, nor had he heard his relations ever anything taken away by the police.

The first provides for a month to twelve months imprisonment with fines from 50 to a thousand francs for intentional publication of false news or forged documents.

The second bill provides for imprisonment up to five years and a fine of 5,000 francs for both publishers and corrupted in cases where the exercise of improper influence is proved.

The introduction of such new measures was announced during the debate in the Chamber on the Bayonne bonds scandal.

Notes of the Week.

reply to the judge the toto said he could not tell the limit of the date. The question then was as to fixing his age, and he was taken to the witness box. He had asked to judge. 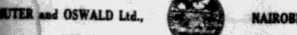

GOLD TO BE WITHDRAWN FROM CIRCULATION.

Washington, Jan. 15. The Senate has passed the Bill extending the life of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation until February 1, 1935, and increasing its lending power by \$50,000,000 dollars.

The Corporation has purchased about 97,000,000 dollars worth of foreign gold of which 10,000,000 dollars worth has been bought since January 1.

Congress Reactions.

The first reaction of the Congress to President Roosevelt's message was very favourable.

Mr. Morgenthau, Secretary of the Treasury has announced that beginning on January 16 the official price of newly mined gold per ounce will be \$34.50 dollars less one quarter of one cent per ounce.

This is assumed to be the Treasury price and not the Reconstruction Finance Corporation price.

Washington, Jan. 16. The House of Representatives has passed the Bill the purpose of which has been introduced to both Houses of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The Bill contains the following major provisions:

1. The title to all Federal Reserve gold deposits in the United States Government and Federal Reserve system is given over to the equivalent amount in dollars.

2. All gold to be withdrawn from circulation gold coinage is to be taken up and no currency can be redeemed in gold except gold coinage except by the Federal Reserve banks, in such amounts as the Secretary of the Treasury decides are necessary to maintain equal purchasing power for every dollar of currency.

3. The Secretary of the Treasury is to be authorized, with the President's approval, to purchase any amount of gold, either at home or abroad.

4. The Secretary of the Treasury can anticipate payment of interest on public debts, and pay either at home or abroad. To stabilize exchange he can purchase and sell gold, silver, cheques, bills of exchange, negotiable or other evidence of indebtedness.

Appalling Havoc of Indian Earthquake.

MORE SERIOUS THAN WAS AT FIRST SUPPOSED.

Especially in Bihar.

TOWN - REDUCED TO RUINS AND STREETS STREWN WITH CORPSES.

Earthquake shocks have been felt throughout the length and breadth of India, and loss of life and extensive damage are reported from many centres, especially in Bihar.

It is impossible yet to estimate the complete number of casualties, as telephonic communication has broken down in the affected areas, but they are known to number many hundreds.

Families Rendered Homeless.

Up to the present 25 people are reported killed and at least 200 injured in the earthquake which has broken down in the affected areas.

The area affected is from Gopri in the west to Bhagal in the east and from the Madra Presidency to the Himachal and the Punjab.

Ninety people have been admitted to hospital at Patna where many families are homeless and many dead and injured are lying on the debris.

It is now stated that 83 people have been killed and 49 injured in the earthquake at Jattar and ten

# "KNEES"?

## No, Thank You!

**I**NDIVIDUALLY sprung wheels have been used more or less extensively in Europe for many years. The records reveal the fact that the first car equipped with so-called knees was a foreign built racing car entered in the Indianapolis Speedway event in 1918.

The device was born in Europe out of the need for improving riding qualities at high speed over worn out macadam, stone, and wooden block roads. Poor roads in Europe may make "knees" desirable on some European cars, but even in Europe many leading automobile manufacturers have rejected this device. European automobiles, including Rolls Royce, Bentley, Alfa Romeo, Hispano-Suiza, Fiat, and Citroen continue to be built with the time tried and proven conventional type front axle.

There is nothing new about independently sprung wheels. European engineers themselves are not agreed on the best design, and a formidable group of European engineers representing the manufacturers above listed apparently are not convinced that "knees" are desirable at all. Practically all American manufacturers have for some time considered this change, and most American manufacturers have rejected the innovation as impracticable from the standpoint of American conditions.

Most American engineers, we believe, are agreed, however, that the use of independent wheel suspension involves the redesigning of the car from stem to stern; that simply making a few changes in chassis design to accommodate the new device will not create a well balanced car.

In November 1933 a prominent engineer made the following statement to the Detroit section of S.A.E.: "A poorly laid out independent suspension is worse than a good conventional one. As to the effect on car design generally of possible adoption of independent suspension, experience so far seems to indicate rather definitely that it is not something that can be added to a car—it requires a redesigning of the car around the suspension system."

Practically every innovation in automotive engineering has resulted in a period of grief for the car owner. It takes months, sometimes years, for the manufacturer to get the bugs out of new engineering designing. Is the public to pay for this innovation in the shape of grief while the manufacturer hallyhoses a new sales feature?

Independent wheel suspension does not necessarily result in improved riding qualities. As a matter of fact, tests made by American manufacturers revealed the fact that cars so equipped generally gave a less satisfactory ride on good pavement than cars equipped with conventional axles. Independently sprung cars possibly and probably will ride somewhat easier on extremely rough road, but the same car will ride less easily on good city pavement and smooth concrete, macadam, and gravel country roads. The average driver now travels 95% of the time on good road. Why sacrifice 95% of your driving comfort to secure a possible easier ride 5% of the time!

The new device is supposed to reduce unsprung weight. Of the various European designs of independent suspension examined none secured a sufficient reduction in this weight to produce other than a detrimental effect on riding qualities.

Possibly independent suspension is being adopted by some manufacturers to overcome the shimmy that develops at high speed. This is a real problem and hazard on many cars. The Ford transverse spring eliminates this trouble on Ford cars, which hold the road nicely, run smoothly at 75 to 80 miles per hour, and bank the corners without undue strain.

Merchandising, during the depression, has resorted to hallyhosing "features"—offering something "special"—anything to stimulate trade. That may not be so disastrous in the purchase of small items, but the investment in a new automobile is a major investment for the average man. If you do not like the trick golf club you bought you can throw it away and charge \$20.00 up to expenses. But the purchase of a new automobile is something else. If the new car has bugs in it you will have to endure the bugs and the annoyance for a long, long time.

After all, it is wisest to let the other fellow try the new device and suffer the grief. It is time enough to buy the new ideas after they have been developed to a high state of efficiency and proven through the only practical school of experience.

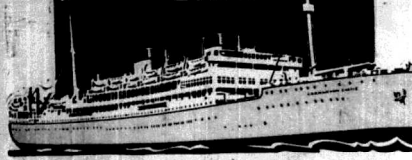

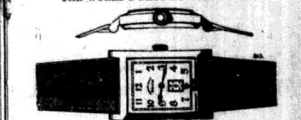

## SECRETARY OF STATE'S VISIT—A NATIVE REQUEST.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—I learned with great interest from the East African Standard of December 30 the news of the forthcoming visit of His Majesty's Secretary of the Colonies, Sir Philip Curle-Lane.

I heartily welcome the visit of the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies to our country and sincerely trust that this visit will be of great help to the Kavirondo sections of the Nyam Nyam. I therefore beg to inform you that I have been directed by the members of the Kavirondo Chamber of Commerce Associations to ask you to let them know if permission can be afforded to them to make their representations to the Secretary of State direct.

The members of my Association also ask me to point out to you that, since establishment of their Association, no other body represents their interest in any Council. They also asked me to reply to the allegations made by Mr. J. B. Pandya, who presided over the Indian Chamber of Commerce meeting during the second session of the Federation on the 25th at Nairobi, with reference to Native production in the Reserve.

I must make it clear to the Indian Chamber of Commerce, or Federation of the Indian Chamber of Commerce, that the time has now come when the African Native should be given opportunity of trading and making use of their own, that most of the Africans possess sufficient knowledge for trade, and to encourage other Africans also to follow them I regret to say that I have seen that the natives themselves fail to find means to trade where the Indian settlers can be given a chance of organizing their trade in the district.

At the present moment, Africans look forward to immediate support from the Government, as they had seen the Government do when sending Agricultural and Veterinary Instructors to the Reserves to encourage the natives to make use of development and foster the wellbeing of their country. By this means the natives will soon get well off with their trade, although Agriculture is not doing well at the moment. But by the kindness of His Excellency the Governor of Kenya, they will do good to the natives in both directions, agriculture and trade.

There is only one thing which can do no good to the Natives, if it is not well controlled—that is to say the thing which is called bribe or tip. We have seen Indian traders who, though the Native Chiefs to follow this disgraceful condition by giving these small things, or bribes, provided that they may go and persuade their Elders, who are the controllers of the Reserve, to give them permission to have their trade within the Reserve.

This system has been adopted commonly in the Reserves of South Kavirondo until native traders who were making jobs had to stop their factories from running. This is done owing to lack of proper organization of the Native Administration.

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

TO KILL ANTS.

How to Prepare a Poison Bait.

The following recipe has been recommended by the Department of Agriculture for the common black ant and the sugar ant:

(1) Sugar, 4lb.; tereb. 1oz.; water 1 pint. Boil together for fifteen minutes and then allow to cool.

(2) Arsenic of soda (20 per cent arsenic oxide), 1 lb.; Dinitro in 1/4 pint of hot water and let cool.

Mix (a) and (b) and stir in six drops of kerosene.

Four two or three half ounces of the bait into small thin (cigarette) tin will answer the purpose, and place in the tin small pieces of dead pig or "food" for the ants when feeding. Within five or six days the ants generally disappear, the bait having been conveyed to their nest.

As there is a trace of poison in this bait, it should be kept out of reach of children and animals.

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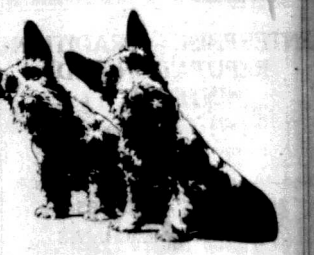

### SECRETARY OF STATE'S VISIT—A NATIVE REQUEST.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—I learned with great interest from the East African Standard of December 30th the news of the forthcoming visit of His Majesty's Secretary of the Colonies, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister.

I heartily welcome the visit of the Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies to our country and honestly trust that this visit will be of great help to the Kavirondo sections, Nyamira Province. I, therefore, beg to inform you that I have been directed by the members of the Kavirondo Chamber of Commerce Associations to ask you to let them know if permission can be afforded to them to make their representations to the Secretary of State direct.

The members of my Association who ask me to point out to you that, since establishment of their Association, no other body represents their interest in any Council. They also asked me to reply to the allegations made by Mr. J. B. Parsly, who presides over the Indian Chamber of Commerce meeting during the annual session of the Federation on the 26th at Nairobi, with reference to Native production in the Reserves.

I must make it clear to the Indian Chamber of Commerce, or Federation of the Indian Chambers of Commerce, that the time has now come when the African Native should be given opportunity of trading and making use of their own, that most of the Africans possess sufficient knowledge for trade, and to encourage other Africans also to follow them. I regret to say that I have seen that the natives themselves fail to find ways to trade where the Indian merchants can be given a chance of organizing their trades in the district.

At the present moment, Africans look forward to immediate support from the Government, as they had seen the Government when sending Agricultural and Veterinary Inspectors to the Reserves to encourage the natives to make use of development and foster the well-being of their country. By this means the natives will soon get well with their trade, although Agriculture is not doing well in the country at the moment. But by the kindness of His Excellency the Governor of Kenya, they will do good to the natives in both directions, agriculture and trade.

There is only one thing which can do us good to the Natives, if it is not well controlled—that is to say the thing which is called herbs or tip. We have seen Indian traders who taught the Native Chiefs to follow this "herb" tradition by giving them small things, as herb, provided that they may go and persuade their Elders, who are the controllers of the Reserve, to give these permissions to have their trade within the reserves.

This system has been adopted commonly in the Reserves of South Kavirondo until native traders who were making gains had to stop their factories from running. This is due owing to the lack of proper organization of the Native Administration.

May I also be allowed to state that the Native Chamber of Commerce much regrets to hear that miners have been allowed permission to enter all locations of Central Kavirondo. Our people now look forward to the support of His Majesty's Secretary

of State who is sent to us by His Majesty King George V. and our refuge, supreme trustee, and our shelter.

How to Prepare a Poison Bait.

The following system has been recommended by the Department of Agriculture for the common black ant and the sugar ant—  
(a) Sugar, 1 lb.; lard, 1 lb.; water, 3 pints. Boil together for fifteen minutes and then allow to cool.

(b) Amount of water (20 per cent. saturated solution), 1 lb.; Dioxane in 1/4 pint of hot water and let cool.

(c) Mix (a) and (b) and stir in dust of honey.

Four or five or three fluid ounces of the bait into small tins (tinboxes or cigarette tins will answer the purpose), and place in the tins small pieces of cloth as a "fourth" for the ants when feeding. Within five or six days the ants generally disappear, the bait having been consumed by their use.

As there is a trace of poison in this bait, it should be kept out of reach of children and animals.



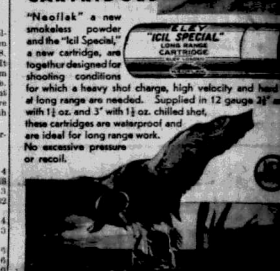
