

I have read with interest the report mentioning that porcupines shoot their quills. I am still a non-believer on this point. It seems to me to be rather on the level of the story that vipers swallow their young in a single gulp. No one dare say anything impossible and in both cases certain people might be said to have seen it at least. I am glad to see that the quills are not shot from the quills but from the skin between the quills and the skin with a controlling mechanism so that the quills are ejected only when necessary. I have seen quills which were ready to be shot when the porcupine was roused and rattling its quills. I have never seen anything to suggest that the quill can be projected beyond its body. The animal's porcupine quills are not so astonishingly rapidly when it is roused or angered, and it is quite possible that the quills are not so long as the loss of the quills is not so great but merely with sufficient force to injure.

As one knows, an angry porcupine charges backwards against his body with great force, and should think to embed the quills in a dog's deep. This would require a combination of the dog's rush forward, and the porcupine's rush back.

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

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
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

THE QUALITY OF BUKOBA COFFEE.

Mr. D. S. Gracie's investigations into Kenya
coffee soil which have revealed that a characteristic
fallowing of the leaves of the
coffee trees is due to potassium
deficiency in the soil are entirely
in keeping with the research which
has been conducted on apple and plum trees at the
London Horticultural Experiment Station in Kent.
There it has been discovered that potassium and
calcium deficiencies in the fruit trees are due to

potassium fertilizers. In the case of the Kenya
experiments, the soil with potash is
of little avail. Dressings of three, four and five cwt
of sulphate of potash per acre, applied sometimes

the trouble. Spraying the trees with a
solution of sulphate of potash in water, with a
few days' interval during the growing season brought about
real improvement in the fruit and timber, and chemical
analyses showed increased amounts of potassium
in the leaves and wood. We have not as yet tried

JOINT COMMITTEE ON THE MANDATE TRUSTEESHIP IN PARAMOUNT

PERMANENCY OF THE TITLE OF LANGANYIKA

Paramount, honorably defined.

The Report of the Joint Committee on the Mandate in East Africa was published further pages. Side-headings and headings have been inserted as follows:

Paramountcy Defined. It is clear from a study of the agreements and constitutions of the League of Nations and the Mandate for the Tanganyika Territory, that no amendment of the terms of the Mandate, however small or however beneficial, may be made without the concurrence of the Council of the League of Nations. The Mandate for the Tanganyika Territory is recited and embodied in the Mandate and any transfer of authority by His Majesty to another Power is clearly an amendment of the existing Mandate requiring the assent of the Powers represented on the Council of the League of Nations.

But, even if above the fact it must be borne in mind that Germany renounced all her rights over her former Colonies in favour of the Principal Allied and Associated Powers under Article 22 of the Treaty of Versailles, and that it flows from the Principal Allied and Associated Powers that His Majesty received the Mandate for the Tanganyika Territory. The grant was absolute and conferred full power of revocation. Hence any alteration of the Mandate would require the assent not only of the Council of the League of Nations, but also of the Council of the League of Nations. It is clearly the assent of the Powers from whom His Majesty received the Mandate would also be required, and in any event the assent of the United States of America. His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom would have to be considered in view of the Convention signed in London on February 10, 1919, respecting the Rights of the Government in the former German Colonies of East Africa. The Committee recites the substance of the provisions of the Convention. It is clear that the Mandate cannot be taken away from His Majesty without his consent or can be taken away after the Mandate or surrender it to another mandatory by any unilateral act.

Discussions have also been held regarding the Duration of the Mandate. In the Mandate itself there is no time limit, nor any clause making provision for its termination, but it is implicit in Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations that there can be no continuation of the Mandate when the conditions of the Mandate are no longer applicable and the Mandatory has no longer any conditions of the Mandate to stand upon.
