IF PORCUPINES SHOOT THEIR QUILS

Opinions of a Zoologist Expert  
To the Editor of "East Africa"

I have read with interest the account published in the "East Africa" regarding the porcupines shooting their quills. I am still a non-believer on this subject, and it seems to me to be rather on the level of the tales of the vipers swallowing their young in a single gulp. No one can say anything impossible, and in both cases certain people might say they have seen it. I am on that other extreme, and see nothing but a statement of your correspondent, Mr. Quills, implies. He finds that a porcupine has three quills through its shoulder, and that a porcupine, through the upper part of the back, and on the neck, can shoot its quills. To produce this result, it is said that air is forced through the quill so far through the solid flesh of the back and the skin from the pores. Does he suggest a connection between the pores of the skin and the skin with a controlling mechanism so that the quills are forced outwards to be shot? I have seen quills which were ready to be shot, but the porcupine was roused and rattling its quills, I have never seen anything to suggest that the quill can be projected beyond the body. The animal, I suppose, has a mechanism for shooting its quills rapidly when it is roused or angered, and it is quite possible that the quills are shot out from the loss of the quills to support the back, but surely with sufficient force to rupture the skin.

As one knows, an angry porcupine charges backwards against his body with great force, and should think to embed the quills in a dog's deep. This would require a combination of the dog's rush forward, and the porcupine's rush back. I'm afraid I cannot go any further.

The porcupine was dead, and possibly the porcupine had not tried to shoot the quills that were still sticking in his back. My view is that the quills are shot out from a porcupine when it shakes itself, and it seems likely that the belief that "shooting" is possible has arisen from a mis-observation or description of a similar incident, although the porcupine cannot shoot its quills. I fully agree with your correspondent in desiring to know if any one can believe in the feat and are willing to bet on their belief in it. It is always surprising to read of strange beliefs held in good faith as, for example, that certain people can see things that are not there at the time and that in the tropics of East Africa crocodiles of all sizes are to be seen in the marshes of the Sabian Nights.

Mr. C. A. Haslam, Honorary Treasurer, East African Dependencies Trade Information Office, writes on the annual report for the year ending 31st March 1924, that the Northern Rhodesian capital and the other two ports to which cotton is exported to the East Indies and to the "doubtful" East Indies, which he records for the first time.



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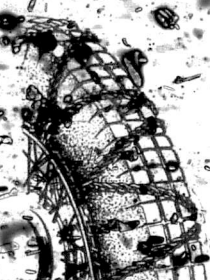
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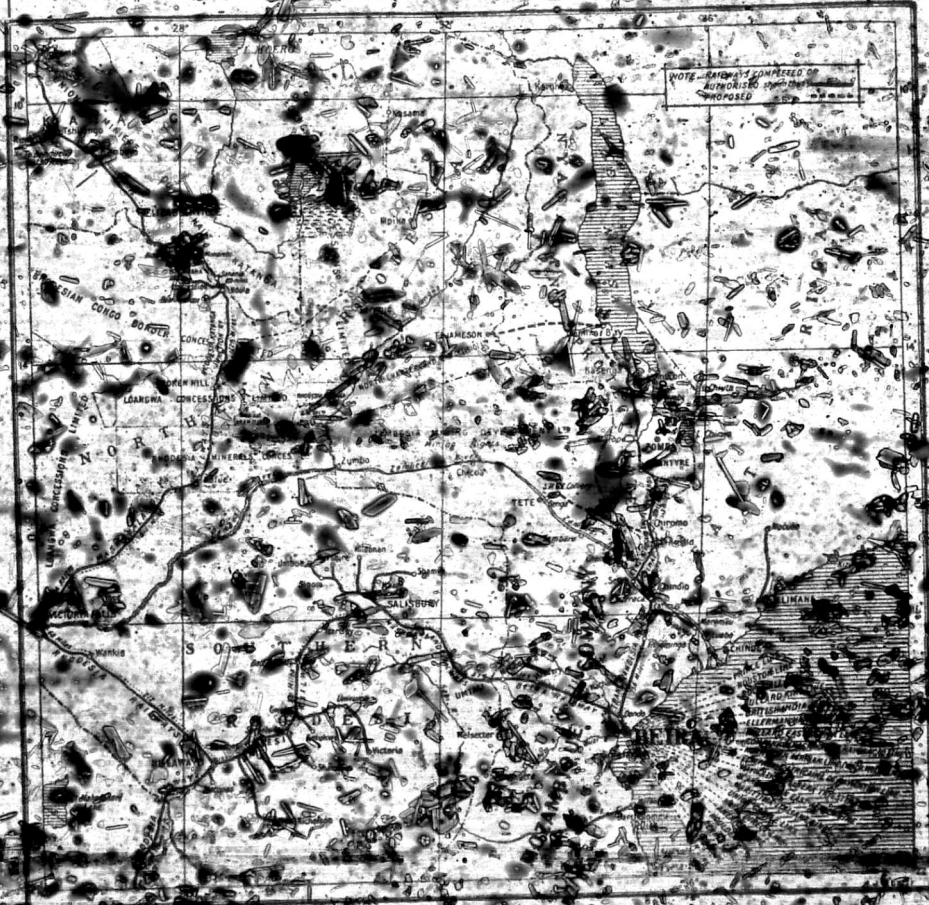

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**A HINT FOR COFFEE CROWERS**

Mr. D. S. Gracie's investigations into Kenya coffee soil, which have revealed that a characteristic yellowing of the leaves of the coffee trees is due to potassium deficiency in the soil, are entirely in keeping with the research which has been conducted on apple and plum trees at the Horticultural Research Experiment Station in Kenya. It has been discovered that potassium deficiency in the fruit trees are due to potassium deficiency in the soil, and that the plants do not close their veins and opening leaves, but the point of interest in the Kenyan experiments is that manuring the soil with potash is of little avail. Dressings of three, four and five cwt of sulphate of potash per acre, applied sometimes two or three successive years, occasionally produced good results, in many cases failed to cure the trouble. Spraying the trees with a solution of sulphate of potash at intervals of ten days throughout the growing season brought about a marked improvement in the fruit and timber, and chemical analyses showed increased amounts of potassium in the leaves and wood. JOINT COMMITTEE ON THE MANDATE TRUSTEESHIP IN PARAMOUNT

PERMANENCY OF THE TITLE OF LANGANYIKA

Paramount, honorably defined.

The Report of the Joint Committee on the Mandate in East Africa was published further progress. Side-headings and headings have been inserted as follows:

**Paramountcy of the Title of Langanyika.** It is clear from a study of the agreements and constitution of the League of Nations and the Mandate for the Tanganyika Territory, that no amendment of the terms of the Mandate, however small or however great can be made without the concurrence of the Council of the League of Nations. The title of Langanyika is not embodied in the Mandate and any transfer of authority by His Majesty to another Power is clearly an amendment of the existing Mandate requiring the assent of the Powers represented on the Council of the League.

But, even if above the fact it must be borne in mind that Germany renounced all her rights over her former Colonies in favour of the League of Nations and Associated Powers under Article 22 of the Treaty of Versailles, and that it flows from the Principal Allied and Associated Powers that His Majesty received the Mandate for the Tanganyika Territory. The grant was absolute and conferred full power of revocation. Hence any alteration of the Mandate would require the assent not only of the Council of the League of Nations, but also of the Council of the League of Nations. It is possible that the assent of the Powers from whom His Majesty received the Mandate would also be required, and in any event the assent of the United States of America. His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom would have to be considered in view of the Convention signed in London on February 10, 1919, respecting the Rights of the Government in the former German Colonies of East Africa. The Committee recollects the content of the position in order to make it clear that the Mandate cannot be taken away from His Majesty without his consent or can be taken away after the Mandate or surrender it to another mandatory by any unilateral act.

Discussions have also been held regarding the Duration of the Mandate. In the Mandate itself there is no time limit, nor any clause making provision for its termination, but it is implicit in Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations that there can be no continuation of the Mandate when the conditions of the Mandate are no longer applicable to themselves or may lead to conditions of the Mandate which are impossible to stand alone.

The Committee has also considered the question of the 16 those doubts and misapprehensions which in East Africa have arisen regarding the effective permanence of His Majesty's title to and jurisdiction over the Territory of Tanganyika. The Committee would like to ever like to emphasize the fact that the obligation upon His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom to carry out the Mandate, both in the letter and in the spirit of the obligation which it has already fulfilled.

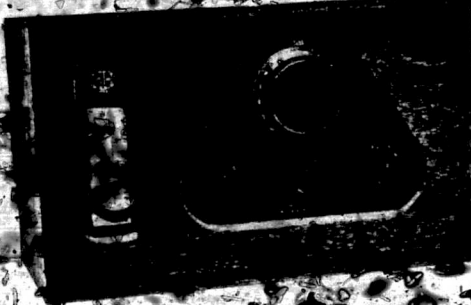
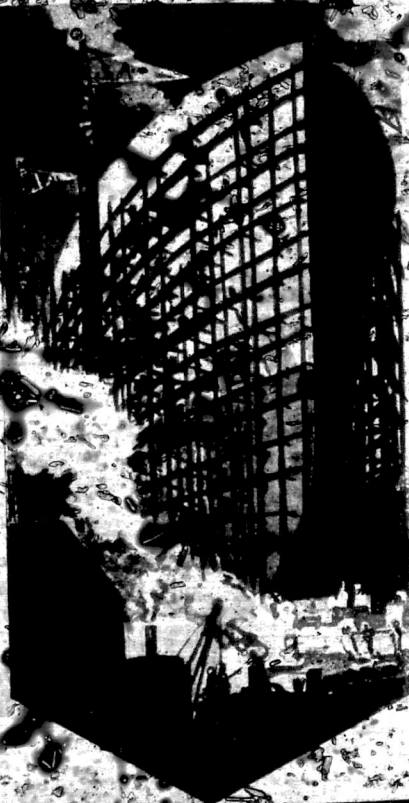
