MATTERS OF MOMENT

East Africa's assertion that numerous cases of persecution, extortion, and even of torture by the local and headmen of Tanganyika were being reported to the local and even provincial authorities in the Territory, but were often not reported in the higher authorities during Sir Donald Cameron's régime, was brought to the attention of Mr. D. J. Jardine, Chief Secretary of Tanganyika, when he recently appeared before the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, as reported on page 218 of this issue. It is officially recorded to have expressed disapproval of the allegations, although, of course, isolated minor incidents of insubordination or portage to report, would not. We can assure Mr. Jardine that the occurrence of such incidents is widely separated from our own knowledge, in passing, and as a recent instance, we may recall that this was the only newspaper to disclose and expose the serious irregularities at Songea. The Tanganyika Government and our readers generally can be assured that we should never give currency to such statements if we had proof of their accuracy. Happily the reason to feel that the position in Tanganyika is improving markedly. Sir Donald Symes shows a disposition to follow the basic policy of Native advancement pressed so ardently by his progress that many District Officers and even some local and provincial commissioners, leave and not hundreds of whom the Governor should have been made aware, even though their sole motive might be the pleasure

Lord Moyne has been given the delicate task of investigating those financial problems of Kenya which are coming under the contradictory reports of the Joint Parliamentary Committee. The Closer Union, which is to report whether the two are held even between the various commitments in the matter of direct and indirect taxation and of the services provided, and to probe into the intricate details of heavy debts and imports, must meet upon Natives and non-Natives, and will be well wised on, and can hope that his report will be to destroy our present feeling that these difficult duties should have been laid upon a representative financial expert. Lord Moyne will be assisted by a number of expert services, and as an official or economist of the front rank, he is sensible that the investigation inevitably in the view of the report of the Joint Parliamentary Committee, might with more advantage to Kenya and to public enlightenment at home have been entrusted to a man whose analysis of public financial statements, such as those of Hillier, is one of the best in the world. It is to his Department that we should like to see Kenya for the future, but we should not see it as ideal, unless it is the most important of the world, and this inquiry will be the most carefully conducted, and we are glad to see that the views of the Government State interests are being put forward to the public. It is his duty to handle the whole matter with determination and to report on the on the cooperation of the European and

All of the elected members of the Kenya Legislative Council have expressed the hope that the post of Native Commissioner should be filled by a local appointee. The appointment of a local appointee with the name of Sir Donald Cameron would be a most interesting and useful appointment. If the appointment is to be made as an acting like the deputy-commissioner, by the Joint Parliamentary Committee on Closer Union, it will require to be entrusted to a strong man, broad and independent of view, to have considerable experience in both Native and European settled districts. It is no easy or simple task of absolutely suitable candidates for so important and delicate a task, and we do not yet propose to canvass the qualifications of individuals who might be considered for the vacancy. We have, however, one name which is being discussed by certain official parties, and we are sure that there is not a particle of truth behind the current assertion that a certain person is to be transferred from another East African territory to Kenya to fill the vacancy. Messrs. Bellamy, Harman and Co., Ltd., and other merchants of Nairobi and Mombasa, have opened a branch in Dar es Salaam.

Mr. Stewart Syme has been appointed to the Economic Advisory Board to make recommendations for the development of Tanganyika Territory.

Plans for the Dodoma aerodrome are worked out and it is hoped they should land within three hundred yards of the centre of the circle.

Certain machinery ordered from Kampala by air mail from England was delivered in Kenya nine days after the order had been dispatched.

As from January 1 incomes above £2,000 in the Territory administered by the Mozambique Company will be taxed at the rate of 10 per centum.

The Kenya business trading and motor services has been converted into a limited liability company and will henceforth be known as Kenya Services, Ltd.

A postal union between Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika would result in increased income. This is the opinion of the East African Chamber of Commerce.

The Zanzibar National Anthem has been added to the list of ceremonial music to be played at all Army Bands. The anthem is shortly to be published by Messrs. Hoeskey and Laidlaw.

The capital of Northern Rhodesia, Lusaka, since 1952, has been Rhodesia's largest city. An extraordinary general meeting of shareholders held on 22 January 1953, raised the share capital to £2,000,000.

Holders of individual shares in the East African Telegraph Co. are not allowed to take more than one share certificate. The East African Telegraph Co. directors have power to issue shares if they consider such a step necessary.

Among the minerals reported from the East African region, the following were mentioned in the 1952-53 report: diamonds, asbestos, copper, lead, zinc, gold, uranium, tin, iron, manganese, mica, cobalt, silver, and an endowment of £2,000 has just been made to the Mau Mau Memorial Hospital by an anonymous donor, whose only condition is that the principal fund be invested in Kenya and that the proceeds will be used to equip and maintain the operating theatre.

The Northern Rhodesian Legislative Council has rejected a motion urging the Government to consider the advisability of introducing legislation providing for free compulsory primary education for all children up to the age of 12 within a radius of two miles from any Government school in the Territory.

The memorandum containing proposals for a uniform concession on the appointment of persons to the posts to be adopted in trading posts in Northern Rhodesia has been issued by the Department of Trade, from which copies may be obtained on application to the Old Queen Street, Salisbury.

The regular London-Cape air route was forced to be flown between Mbeva and Mpika last week and during a violent rainstorm. No one was injured, and the aeroplane continued its journey when the storm had passed. The homeward journey was similarly forced down by rain near Broken Hill and landing on boggy ground caused damage. The aircraft was carried north from Broken Hill by a truck.

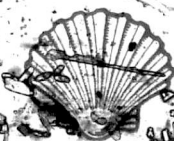
