The results of the general elections, held over the weekend of 15-16 October, in Rhodesia, Southern Rhodesia, Northern Rhodesia and Colony of Southern Rhodesia, have been announced. The new members of the House of Assembly and the new members of the Legislative Council have been elected.

THE NEW EAST AFRICAN COMMAND is headed by the War Office in the field of command, and the Home Office in the field of control of the territories between the two. Thoughts About Colonies.

BY VERNON THOMAS. The colonies after war and the future—organised by the Sylvester Colonial Bureau, K.L.C. and held in London.

Under pressure from space, it is impossible to attempt to repeat the many structures and systems of government, but the following quotations give summary of the main points:

Mr. John Parker, M.P.—We must put forward schemes for progress towards democratic self-government in the colonies, not content to leave with the colonial system undivided rule.

Mr. George Jones, M.P.—All parties in the colonies should be privately owned property should be confiscated and development schemes, under tax remission, be set into the colonies. Colonies do not want a benevolent government. This was the attitude of Lord Ismay, who play now his position as chairman of the Society of Friends, when he induced the Government to accept his scheme and become part of an environment. Colonies cannot be satisfactorily institutionalised. The Colonial Office has an African Education Act, but it needs a permanently stated scheme of protection.

Mr. W. G. Cowling—Until the price of primary classes is raised, the position in the colonies will continue bad. There is little, if more, beneficial in education.

Mr. D. W. Mandella Needs Re-thinking—In a colony there is no assimilation of the native culture into the white thinking. Colonel C. H. Villiers's Address

Mr. Justice M'Nicol has pointed out the difficulties of the situation, the completion of the railway, the increase of revenue losses due to the increase in semi-skilled labourers. 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

MAFFERS OF MOMENT

AS IT IS WITH THE CHURCH IN AFRICA, THE CHURCH IN RHODESIA has got to the point where examination of the actual problems of co-operation between Government and missions in Rhodesia is the most pressing question from

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seeking to surprise her, have mysteriously come into the possession of prescience in African affairs, particularly those of Native policy. Incidentally, it may be noted that their request and their influence, unhelpful as always, into public discussion are in striking contrast to the quietude of the established church functionaries. What living in the close, patriarchal African society, their problems have a much sounder understanding of the range of work that may yet interest them, and being approached with honesty of intent and progressive success.

THE IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT, nearly a century ago, committed itself to an educational policy in the colonies based upon Christian principles, and the achievement must be admitted to be rather remarkable. It may be deplored the immense

Church and State. contribution of such Christian institutions as the schools, in the spheres of education, legislation and preventive medicine, to the welfare of the much-revered subjects of the empire. As such, the services of the Governor of any Dependency of British East Africa, or of the Central African Protectorate, were compelled to be fully utilized to the advantage of the military workers, and theophilus Mitchell's con-

tribution to the welfare of the people of the colony, between 1890 and 1910, was of the highest order. His efforts, however, were not without opposition, and unsupervised by a political authority, he found himself in a position of no congenital or propitious

the British and their ploughs are the chief force that will bring world-order on wise. The world is not yet won over to the idea of peace, but the only way to win it over is to show that the British Empire, which has been the chief factor in the making of the world, has now come to a new sense of its mission.

A New Sense of Mission

The British Empire, like the international empire, was founded on the most important condition, is now called, not that the condition is a sufficient guarantee of imperial success in every-day affairs, but must be of great, though doubtful, importance. Halt of Action against French Somaliland

THE R.A.F.'S and the Royal Navy's aircrafts, supported by the British and Indian Armies, of the Gendarmerie of Abyssinia from commanding that last remnant of Italian resistance, but on other recent occasions the Royal Air Force has bombed enemy positions, dropping and Headquarters, and, as far as the Western Army, commanding the northern approaches, and Gondar has now been taken.

This operation suggests that there may have been an improvement in the weather, as rains should fall within a few weeks, but even when movement is again freely well-decided not to suspend life and let on persistent attacks, considering that the garrison is completely isolated, comes no harm and must in due course surrender.

Despatches from the same government in the Gendarmerie suggest that General Natta, endeavouring to maintain the alluring prestige of the Native troops by asserting that the Emperor Haile Selassie has been held to ransom.

There is no secret and no reason to suppose that the P.A.S. are acting in a manner which would antagonise the Gendarmerie, but in the longer term, if the P.A.S. continue in its present unauthorised state, The Honorable Sir George Giffard, Vice-Governor-General of Abyssinia, will be compelled to take steps to assert the rights of the P.A.S. and has signed Britain's frontier with Abyssinia, and has hidden all attempts to obtain recognition of its right to do so, for the P.A.S. has no right to demand or force people to a conference, and the P.A.S. has been refused its demands.

The Gendarmerie and the Axis propagandists are saying that Britain is starving defenceless women and children, and the fact is that in spite of the rejection of the blockade, Britain continues to send in daily supplies of fresh milk sufficient for all the children in French Somaliland. It is agreed that our blockade by land, sea and air is extremely effective and that only a few limited supplies reach Abufu by an occasional boat from the Comoros or by submarine from Madagascar, but the Governor and the Axis stations responsible are able to do little.

Britain and Free France have food and medical supplies available ready for the time when the Governor is released. It is understood that there are only 300 white French citizens left and there are a number of Indians and Germans which makes it necessary to have the strategically important centre removed from Axis control.

A large vessel of 7,500 tons has been sunk in the Red Sea by an enemy aircraft and all the crew were lost.

General Sir George Giffard, former Inspector-General of the British African Rifles, and last year appointed Inspector of the British West African Command, has been created Honorary Vice-Governor-General of Abyssinia, and has been given command of operations on the frontier between Abyssinia and the Afars and Issas, under the command of General Giffard.

General Giffard's wife, Lady Giffard, is being recruited for her new post. Her husband is retired and she is the Empress of Abyssinia which is under Vichy control. His other in charge of this work is General Giffard's chief officer for white men's private secretary to the High Commissioner. General Giffard has collected £10,000 for the education of young English girls in Africa and Oxford University.

The Rhodesian government will in future place bulk orders for the colony's total iron and steel imports from America.

"The Africa Herald" Ltd. has gone into liquidation. Mr. G. N. Morris of Durban, South Africa, being appointed liquidator.

Immigrants entering Southern Rhodesia in the first half-months of 1941 numbered 300, compared with 1,000 for the corresponding period of 1940.

United Trading Co. Company of Southern Africa, which deals in the importation of oilseed, is increasing its distribution.

The Bishop of Rhodesia recently consecrated the cathedral at Bulawayo, and Southern Rhodesia's first Episcopal see, in memory of the late Bishop George Herbert Moore.

On the 1st of September, 1941, in Southern Rhodesia, 1,000,000,000 birds had died since the beginning of the war, 11,000,000,000 birds having died during the year.

Five doctors on the African Army Medical Corps have passed the Canadian Army's medical examination. This is the final step in the African Medical Corps' entry of candidates for the Canadian Army.

A new scheme will be introduced in Rhodesia to combat the locusts which have already caused enormous damage and losses to the grain crops of the central and most recent regions, among the first countries recently introduced in Northern Rhodesia are maize, cassava, millet, and maize.

Uganda has scheduled Mengo, Mubende and Ankole districts as compulsory vaccination areas.

The British Central Africa Company, Ltd.

Sir Montague Barlow's Address

THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE BRITISH CENTRAL AFRICA COMPANY LTD. WAS HELD AT THE BRITISH HOTEL, LONDON, ON THE 15TH OF MAY, 1915.

The Vice-Chairman, Sir Montague Barlow, Bt., F.R.C.P., chairman of the committee in charge of his speech referred to the general result of the year's work in Rhodesia, which he briefly summarized as follows:

"The difficulties of the plantation industry have now well receded, so that the output had been substantially increased, and that a profit was not imputed, and due to existing conditions, the annual contribution by the Company to its estates in the last two years had been increased, the amount of assistance given under the Government contract, the Company having undertaken to supply 10,000 lbs. of tobacco per acre, at a price of 10/- per lb., and the yield was steadily increasing each year, and, indeed, the assistance given and paid from the British Treasury, and with 2 millions, there should be a continued increase in the future. The yield for the year ended December 31st, 1914, was 1,000,000 lbs., and for the current year, 1915, 21 lbs. per acre, or was already reported, and was unbroken, 22 lbs. per acre, and the same was expected for the next season."

With regard to the production of tobacco in Rhodesia, the Highmead district produced 1,000 lbs. per acre, average 1,000 lbs. per acre, and in the 12 lbs. in the previous year, it was estimated that the local market was somewhat restricted, and prices were realised locally. The average price paid by the end of the season before deducting expenses and excluding scrap, was 9/- per lb., while the whole crop was 2,500,000 lbs., giving 225,000 lbs. for the previous season.

This increase of price was the result of the superior quality of the crop and not to any extent of war conditions. Grade 1 tobacco, the price was about the same as in 1914—that is to say, 10/- per acre, when it was deemed to bring more to the higher grades in the market."

It was also stated that the latest indications the results of the year under review had shown a considerable improvement in regard to the annual consumption of 1,000,000 lbs. per acre, which in 1914 was only 800,000 lbs. per acre. At present the best estimate was 1,000,000 lbs. per acre.

The new tobacco seed had been sown in the

increasingly short hand-harvested variety of 1914, and one hundred thousand lbs. of the previous year's seed had been sown, 100,000 lbs. in various areas for breeding purposes, and it was satisfactory to find, when new to human consumption, that it had been replaced by the Government on the 15th of May, 1915, for the purpose of

"N.S.T. 1915." Lastly, the Chairman drew attention to the development of mining in Nyasaland, where the Government had decided to do its best to develop the production of tungsten in the Protectorate, which had purchased from the company 1,000,000 lbs. of tungsten for the establishment of a research station. This development, which was to commence at Sustutu, will be accompanied by interest in the development of the Protectorate, which will involve the opening up of the country.

The report and accounts were adopted.

Rhodesian Tobacco Estates

The first year's work was conducted during the early part of the year, and the first crop of cured tobacco should, cause Rhodesia, according to the Chairman, to rank among the leading tobacco-growing countries of the world. The Minister of Agriculture had given a loan of £100,000 to help the Government to grow 10,000 lbs. of tobacco, and the Government had engaged 100 trained men to go on the land and assist the farmers, so that the Government was to grow some quantity of tobacco to be grown this year, at least, and it is proposed the Chairman's loan of £100,000 for growing should be extended.

The tobacco levy produced £1,000,000, which was appropriated to war funds. It was estimated that the tobacco export to the Empire, Tobacco Federation, and Rhodesia-Southern Rhodesia Tobacco Marketing Board, with the association's reserve funds, brought in a net interest for the Government during the year.

British Copper Committee Report

Under the authority of the British Council, Mr. G. H. B. Huxley, onto the Southern Rhodesia Department, formed a separate department of the British Council of Commerce in London in 1914, to look after British goods. It provides lists of commercial firms in the United Kingdom, and, by their means, lists of suitable agents, stores, shippers, importers, and agents, details of contracts, and other information regarding the export of goods to Rhodesia. The firm also supplies the various shipping companies, and agents, of such commodities as coal, iron, timber, rope, raw cotton, and cotton, and can supply full details concerning this industry.

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Kenya's Schools And War

In reply to a question in the Kenya Legislative Council that measures were left in the Colony to aid and protect education through the recruitment of teachers into the Army, the Director of Education said that in spite of the small teachers had been released and "Whereas in May, 1939, there were 1,000 men available, the Department now has 1,000 men with two more available." At the Standard Wales School, Nairobi, there were six teachers and two women teachers at Ngong. These teachers were men. Recent examination results, it was intended, showed that the majority of the students who had suffered 30-40% reductions from the Pre-war Wales School, 27, were passed and the Kenya High School showed that 75% were passed. In July, the travelling and mobile school for 100,000 children was taken to buildings, and there were 3,000 boys and 2,000 girls at schools on account of shortage of accommodation.

Uplands Bacon Factory

It has been often stated in Kenya that the price paid for the Uplands Bacon Factory was £15,000, but about 1,500 acres of land and capital investors were quickly sold for £2,500, thus reducing the price to £12,500. The Government of the Colony then approached the Bank of Central Africa and the Kenya Farmers' Association, the latter's Co-operative Creamery and the two countries' governments to subscribe to a £10,000 loan. This was done by the Farmers' Association, the Colony Government and the Bank of Central Africa. The Kenyans have not been involved by a bond or anything that would bind them with the other two partners. The Kenyans' proposals to transfer the factory to the bacon industry when an adequate contribution to the other two partners has been made by themselves by way of taxes on all pigs killed in the Colony. As a meeting recently held in Nairobi, it was decided to form a Kenya Farmers' Directors' Association, the committee of which consists of Messrs. P. J. Linton, H. S. Smith, J. H. Gray and E. K. Hill, Ampatai Merkay and Captain Hamblin.

East Africa Excess Profits Tax

The first of the Excess Profits Tax Ordinances now introduced in East Africa has just reached England. They provide for taxation of 60% of profits in excess of standard profits which are defined as the average of the calendar years 1937, 1938 and 1939; where the standard profit cannot be so determined, it is to be computed according to the average amount of capital employed in the business. The Agents of referees appointed under the Act have wide discretion in respect of computing profits in cases of abnormal or extraordinary circumstances, and the tax is to be computed on the basis of the average of the last three years' profits, if the last three years' profits are not available.

Thistle Farms (Lima) Ltd.—The Thistle Farms Gold Mine, located in the Andean Cordillera, is situated in the Province of Arequipa, Peru, 1,000 miles south of Lima. The mine is owned by the Thistle Farms Co. Ltd., of London, and the Thistle Farms Gold Mine Co. Ltd., of Arequipa, Peru.

Wingate Consolidated—Under the name of Wingate Consolidated, the company has acquired the mineral rights in the financial areas of the Andes in the provinces of Arequipa, Junin, and Cusco, Peru.
