# Varsity comrade died in my arms

Student was reserved and loved politics

hings will never be the same for 25-year old Felix Mwirigi, a third year student at Kikuyu Campus who cradled his dying colleague from the campus to Karen Hospital.

His friend Francis Maina, a third year Bachelor of Education student died after jumping from the sixth floor of his campus hostel room on Sunday morning after an underground electrical cable exploded. The students thought the ex-

plosion was a terrorist attack and frantically tried to escape.

While some used the staircases

in the hostel, others decided to jump through windows.


Like his colleagues, the late Maina was also trying to escape but ended up succumbing to the serious injuries he sustained from the fall.

"I had never seen a dead per-

son so close." said Mwirigi.

students who was sleeping in
Kimberly hostel when the electrical cable exploded in the wee hours of Sunday.

"I first heard girls screaming and then there were heavy footsteps of people running down the stairs. That is when I got up and ran out too," recalled

## Power fault triggered fall

**Explosions:** An electricity fault in the hotel's main sup-ply station caused several gunshot-like explosions, sparking panic.

Casualties: 141 students were injured and one died as they were taken to city

Though many students were screaming for help, it was Maina's bleeding that attracted Mwirigi's attention.

"He was bleeding from all openings. I ran from the campus to the road where other students gathered to get a car to rush him to hospital since the school's ambulance was not around," he said yesterday during an interview at

Nation Centre.
Mr Maina however succumbed to his injuries while on the way to hospital. "If there was immediate response, I am sure his life would have been saved. I don't regret that my clothes were drenched in blood. I only mourn the death of my comrade," said a melancholic Mwirigi.

### Having drinks

Mr Maina's friend described him as a reserved person who



# Students on Kikuyu campus leave as exams are postponed

About half of the students of University of Nairobi's Kikuyu campus have left the institu-tion. This follows an electric cable explosion on Sunday which caused a stampede, leading to the death of one student.

The students who were in-terviewed by the *Nation* said they were still traumatised after the incident and needed time to come to terms with what happened.

The university authorities have postponed examinations

on the campus yesterday.
In a signed notice, Vice-Chancellor Peter Mbithi said as a result of the incident, the tests would be done next

"The Senate on April 13, 2015, resolved to postpone examinations in Kikuvu campus to April 20, 2015. The decision was taken to allow students come to terms with the aftermath of the incident and prepare adequately for the examinations," the statement said.
Prof Mbithi added that the

university would use professionals to offer psycho-social

support to the students.

The University would also provide funeral expenses and other support to the family of the dead student

He said that as at yesterday, 27 of the 167 injured students were still receiving treatment in various hospitals.

Kenyatta National Hospital, which admitted 112 students, discharged 89.
"Six of the 22 students

still hospitalised underwent surgery and are recuperating. One student was transferred to Nairobi Hospital," Prof Mbithi added.

He said another four students who were admitted to PCEA Thogoto Hospital, had been transferred to KNH.

He said 50 students were treated and discharged from the hospital yesterday.
"We have been informed by

hospital authorities that the students admitted are in a stable condition," he added.

A third year student, Agnes

Mwasia said she could not spend another night on the campus

hostel. Everyone else has left and I am just waiting for my clothes to dry before I go," Ms Mwasia, who hails from Kitui County, said.

Ms Anne Kianira, a first year,

was at the gate leaving.

"After what happened on Sunday, let me go home and relax then come back to school," she said.

Another one leaving was Mr Zaccheaus Muchungu. However, some students chose to stay and read for the

examinations. One of them was Dickson Mwasia, a third year.

He said he could not leave the campus just because of a security scare.
"Even if I decide to go home,

anything could happen to me on the way. I will complete my exams before leaving," he said. Ms Mwasia said she would

not know what to do in case of a terrorist attack.

"Most of the windows in our hostels are fitted with grills. There is no way you can use them to escape. We also don't know if our hostels have emergency exits," she said.

Yesterday, the Kenya Red Cross team was at the insti-tution to offer counselling services to students.

Kenya Power workers were repairing the cables which exploded on Sunday causing the stampede.
